Word was received this week by Mrs. H. E. Tolar of the death of her brother, Carl Malm, who died in the-service in France on November 17th, 1918 of bronchial pneumonia.

Carl was a Sanford boy, enlisting from here and joining the 33rd Engineers. He was with the 304th Field Artillery at the time of his death. He was well and favorably known in Sanford where he lived for about seven years prior to his enlistment. He leaves a father and four sisters to mourn his 16ec

At the age of twenty-three years, with most of his life before him and with all of the hopes and ambitions of youth he laid down his life for the cause of democracy and that those left behind might live and enjoy the blessings of freedom. Is there any greater sacrifice conceivable than that made by this young man?
