## SCHOOLS AND CHURCHES REMAIN OPEN

### DECIDED NOT TO CLOSE PUBLIC PLACES AT THIS TIME

After considerable agitation concerning the closing of the schools and churches in Sanford on account of the influenza it has been definitely decided that no action of this nature will be taken at this time.

The city council after going into the matter thoroughly with the state health authorities and the physicians of the city found that the epidemic in Sanford is not so bad as has been some times reported. It was found that up to date there was but one death on account of the recent wave of the disease.

The council spared no pains in making a thorough investigation and even went so far as to wire the state board of health who sent Dr. Keely, one of the board, to Sanford, to investigate conditions and advise in the matter.

While it is believed by everyone that every precaution should be taken against the spread of the disease by infected persons, it was not deemed advisable by the physicians of the city to close the public places in the community. Every precaution will be taken in the schools and picture shows and any child in any public meeting or at a child in school who shows symptoms of a cold or influenza will be asked to leave. This has been done out in the schools of the city at the same time.

The proceedings of the council meeting in which final action was taken follows and stands for itself:

The council of the city of Sanford, Florida, met in special session December 12th at 1:30 p. m. Present, F. L. Miller, president and chairman, R. A. Newman, G. F. Smith, L. P. Hagan, Jno. Adams and Guy D. Bishop. Absent, Roy S. ... President stated the object of the meeting was the receiving report of Dr. Keely and hearing the report of the physicians present.

Dr. Keely, Dr. Marshall and Dr. ... these conditions as to the present recurrence of influenza and advising precautions necessary to be taken.

Motion G. F. Smith, seconded by L. P. Hagan and carried a vote of 5-0 was given to Dr. Keely for his advice and help in the present matter.

R. A. Newman took the chair and President F. L. Miller expressed his views as to the conditions existing after which he resumed the chair.

On motion L. P. Hagan, seconded by R. A. Newman and carried, the matter of closing schools, churches, theatres, pool rooms, etc., was deferred until further developments. If any serious developments arise the president will call a meeting of the council and take action on same, and city clerk was instructed to get the number of cases daily and report to president of council and city physician is requested to report on next Monday night the then existing conditions of influenza.

Motion R. A. Newman, seconded by G. F. Smith and carried, council adjourned.

**Harry Edward Walker**  
Harry, the beloved son of Mrs. Anna Walker, died of pneumonia following a week's illness of influenza at Palatka, in the early hours of Sunday morning. The news spread through the city shortly after daylight, casting a gloom over the entire town, for no young man has had more friends or was better known than this boy who had grown from a babyhood to young manhood in the community. Esteemed and honored for his sterling character and high principles, faithful in business, loyal to friends and employer alike, a most devoted son and brother, Harry will be missed not only in the home circle that knew and loved him best, but among a large circle of friends and business associates where his genial disposition and kindly thoughtfulness won for him a place all his own in the hearts of the people.

Mr. Walker was born in Bartow, the family shortly after moving to Longwood, where his early boyhood was spent. While he was yet a boy he came to Sanford to live. Beginning his business career in the grocery stores steadily increasing in usefulness and position, he became head clerk in the Roberts' grocery, maintaining this position for a number of years.

About three years ago, he accepted a position with the Southern Utilities Company at Bradentown, his ability gaining for him rapid promotion. Just six weeks previous to his death Mr. Walker was transferred to Palatka, again being promoted. Mr. Walker was twenty-five years old on the second of April.

The funeral took place from the residence of his sister, Mrs. M. Minarik, Monday morning at ten-thirty, interment being in Lakeview Cemetery. Sweet and appropriate music was rendered at the house by Mrs. Julius Takach, Mrs. Aspinwall, Mrs. Frank Woodruff and Mrs. Schelle Maines. The officiating clergymen were Dr. DeWitt Brower, Rev. Arthur Seuring Peck and Dr. E. D. Brownlee.

The pall bearers were Messrs. T. D. Hayes, Claude Couch, Frank Adams, Sam Bradford, R. H. Bronson and Tom Getzen.

The many beautiful floral tributes that covered the grave testified to the love and esteem in which "Harry" was held.

He leaves a devoted little mother and one sister, Mrs. M. Minarik. The deepest sympathy of friends goes out to the family in their hour of great sorrow.

## PLANS FOR NEW HOTEL FOR SANFORD

### WELBORNE BLOCK TO BE CONVERTED INTO MODERN HOTEL BY SANFORD CITIZENS

The city of Sanford now has the foundation for a modern brick hotel that will be the pride of the city when completed.

At a meeting of the subscribers to the new hotel project, held on Monday night in the Court House, arrangements were made for the purchase of the Welborne Block and the Second property adjoining and the first payment is now ready to be made as soon as the proper papers are drawn and signed. Architect Trimble was present and presented plans for the remodeling of the property which was pronounced by all present as entirely satisfactory in every way.

The plan calls for a complete remodeling of the Welborne Block and finishing of the interior. It was found that the arrangement of the building is such that it can be made a very desirable hotel without removing any great part of the inside walls. A court is to open to the east which will make each room an outside room. The plan contemplates the removal of the Second building in order to make room for a complete power and water plant. When completed the hotel will contain forty-four rooms, nearly all of which will be with connecting bath. The hotel will be equipped with steam heat and a private water and light plant. Total cost including the purchase price of the property, remodeling and furnishing will be about \$50,000, nearly half of which is already subscribed.

With the proper support of the people of Sanford we will have a hotel in Sanford by next winter that, for its size, will be second to few in the state.

## FAMOUS BAND VISITS SANFORD MONDAY

### WILL GIVE PEOPLE OF CITY REMARKABLE OPPORTUNITY TO HEAR ONE OF COUNTRY'S LEADING BANDS

Sanford is to have the wonderful opportunity of hearing the Royal Scotch Highland Band which filled a twelve weeks' engagement at Royal Palm Park, Miami, in 1917; twelve weeks in Williams Park, St. Petersburg in 1918, has played at state fairs all the way from Detroit, Mich., to Dallas, Texas, and has just completed an engagement at our own state fair in Jacksonville. This is the only band carrying a pipe organ and among the many excellent features are Manuel Yingling, a trombone soloist from the Theodore Thomas' orchestra, the Great Burns, the Nyllophone artist and Bobby Brolier, the great Scotch tenor, in Scotch and other war songs who is alone said to be worth double the price of admission. The airs played by the band are the popular songs dear to us, and it will be a great treat to hear this excellent music, especially since we have been deprived so long of our own Sanford band.

The Royal Scotch Band, the members of which are attractively attired in their native costumes, wearing the Gordon plaid, are filling in a little time between the Florida state fair engagement and the St. Petersburg engagement, and Sanford is one of the few Florida towns fortunate enough to secure this organization. The concert will be held Monday, December 16th, both afternoon and evening. In the afternoon at 3:00 o'clock the band will play at the Carnes Hotel, with the evening concert will be in Central Park at 7:30.

The proceeds will be divided between the Children's Home Society of Jacksonville and the Welfa Work of the Woman's Club, and while the concerts are well worth \$1.00 each, there being an entire change of program, the rates will be only a few cents. #### Carl Malm of this City Dies in France

Word was received this week by Mrs. H. E. Tolar of the death of her brother, Carl Malm, who died in the service in France on November 17th, 1918 of bronchial pneumonia.

Carl was a Sanford boy, enlisting from here and joining the 33rd Engineers. He was with the 304th Field Artillery at the time of his death. He was well and favorably known in Sanford where he lived for about seven years prior to his enlistment. He leaves a father and four sisters to mourn his loss.

At the age of twenty-three years, with most of his life before him and with all of the hopes and ambitions of youth he laid down his life for the cause of democracy and that those left behind might live and enjoy the blessings of freedom. Is there any greater sacrifice conceivable than that made by this young man?

May the blessing of God rest upon the bereaved relatives and friends left behind and may his memory live always with us. "For greater love hath no man shown, than that he lay down his life for his friend."

## PROCEEDINGS OF THE COMMISSIONERS

### PURCHASE OF COURT HOUSE AND MANY OTHER MATTERS ARE HANDLED.

Sanford, Fla., Dec. 3rd, 1918. Hon. Board of County Commissioners in and for Seminole county, Florida, met in regular session at 10 o'clock a. m. Present: Chairman L. A. Bramley and Commissioners L. P. Hagan, O. P. Swope and E. H. Kilbee, with V. E. Douglass, deputy clerk and E. E. Brady, sheriff, in attendance.

Minutes of the last regular meeting, also called meeting held Nov. 16th, 1918, were read, approved and ordered filed.

Motion of L. P. Hagan, 2nd by O. P. Swope and carried, that this board recommend the redemption of tax certificates covering land in Section 24, Township 19, Range 29 E., 5 acres, for the flat sum of \$5.00, plus clerk's fees, provided F. L. Woodruff has title or claim to this land.

Motion of L. P. Hagan, seconded by V. E. Douglass and carried, that the following resolution be adopted by this board:

Whereas, heretofore, at a regular meeting of this board, held at Sanford, Florida, on the 9th day of November, 1918, after notice of its intention to build or purchase a court house, it was decided to buy a court house building and site if a suitable one could be had, a committee having at that time been appointed to make investigation of proffered buildings and sites, and:

Whereas, said committee after investigation has made its report recommending the purchase of the building and lot known as the Elk's Club, for the sum of \$21,375.00 and terms covering a period of ten years:

Therefore, be it resolved by this board that it purchase the said building and lot known as the Elk's Club for the sum of \$21,375.00 and upon the following terms to-wit:

\$3,337.50 on or before January 1st, 1920.
\$3,337.50 on or before January 1st, 1921.
\$3,337.50 on or before January 1st, 1922.
\$3,337.50 on or before January 1st, 1923.
\$3,337.50 on or before January 1st, 1924.
\$3,337.50 on or before January 1st, 1925.
\$3,337.50 on or before January 1st, 1926.
\$3,337.50 on or before January 1st, 1927.
\$3,337.50 on or before January 1st, 1928.
\$3,337.50 on or before January 1st, 1929.

Be it further resolved, that if any of said payments shall be made before maturity, the same shall be discounted at the rate of 6 per cent for the time between such payments and the date of maturity.

The following resolution offered by C. W. Entzinger who moved its adoption, which motion was seconded by L. P. Hagan, and was duly put and carried.

Whereas, the records of the county judge and the tax collector reveal the fact that a large number of people of Seminole county have failed to provide themselves with occupation license required by the laws of the state of Florida, for the year beginning October 1st, 1918, and ending Sept. 31st, 1919, and:

Whereas the county judge has caused a notice to appear in the Sanford Herald notifying all parties concerned that occupation license for the current year is due, and that a list of these persons failing to procure the necessary license on or before the first of December, 1918, would be delivered to the prosecuting attorney for the county:

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the board of county commissioners for Seminole county, Fla., in regular session assembled this 3rd day of December, 1918, that Schelle Maines the prosecuting attorney for Seminole county, be and he is hereby instructed to enforce the payment of all occupation license for the current year, and that, if in his judgment such is necessary, to proceed by prosecution of any and all persons failing to provide themselves with proper license by the 10th of December, 1918, and:

Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be printed in the Sanford Herald for the issue of December 6th, 1918.

## U. S. REFRIGERATOR EXPERIMENTS

### WILL MAKE COMPARATIVE TESTS TO DETERMINE BEST CARS FOR FLORIDA SHIPMENTS

How Florida perishables may best be handled while in transit to the markets is going to be answered by experiments now in progress by the United States Department of Agriculture.

A corps of experts and assistants have already arrived in South Florida and experiments with refrigerator car equipment will be kept up throughout the present shipping season. Sixteen brand new ventilator and refrigerator cars of the latest approved type have been sent here for the purpose of making comparisons. As far as may be practical, it is understood, the government men will endeavor to secure two car loads of the same perishable commodity moving from the same point to the same northern market on the same day. One car load will then be loaded into one of the new type cars, the other being loaded into cars ordinarily supplied Florida growers for the movement of their products. The cars will then be started forward on the same train in company with a coach on which two of the government men will travel. Special apparatus will enable the taking and recording of temperatures in various portions of each car once every hour until they arrive at their destination.

This will be done continuously throughout the season and the statistics resulting from comparison of the figures should afford a reliable index to the relative worth of the different types of equipment.

For a long time it has been contended by some of the growers that the equipment usually supplied for the movement of citrus fruits and vegetables from Florida did not af-

## NEXT WEEK XMAS ROLL CALL WEEK

### EVERY CITIZEN IS EXPECTED TO GIVE ONE MEMBERSHIP TO ASSIST IN THIS GREAT WORK FOR HUMANITY

The Red Cross Christmas Roll Call campaign will be launched on next Monday, when every man, woman and child in Seminole county will be asked and expected to join the Red Cross or pay their dues, which will amount to only one dollar.

It is expected that this amount from the American people at this time will provide sufficient funds to carry on the work without the usual big drive for donations. Surely there is no more worthy cause than that of the Red Cross, and it is expected that every one will respond when called upon by the local workers.

The campaign, under the able leadership of Mrs. R. A. Terheun, is now organized throughout the county and the working teams will start the work on Monday morning. Arrangements have been made to call on every person in the county and it is hoped that each person of the community will have their dollar ready in order that the work may be carried on by the workers with the greatest possible speed.

Henry P. Davison, chairman of the War Council of the American Red Cross today issued to the 3854 Chapters and the 22,000,000 members of the Red Cross the following statement outlining the future policy of the American Red Cross:

To the 3854 Chapters and 22,000,000 members of the American Red Cross:

The whole American people will be invited in the week preceding Christmas to enroll as members of the Red Cross. It is confidently believed that there need be no further campaigns for Red Cross funds, but instead, the annual Roll Call will constitute the foundation of the Red Cross. The people should therefore know as definitely as possible the plans of this, their national humanitarian society.

Since the armistice was signed, I have had an opportunity to confer in Paris with the heads of all American Red Cross Commissions in Europe and later in Washington with the President of the United States, the War Council of the Red Cross, the managers of the fourteen Red Cross Divisions of the United States and with the heads of our departments at National Headquarters. I am therefore able to speak now with knowledge and assurance in saying that the beneficent work of the American Red Cross is to go forward on a great scale, not alone, as heretofore, for purposes of relief of war, but as an agency of peace and permanent human service.

Since America's entry into the war, the purpose of our Red Cross has been primarily to aid our army and navy in the care of our own men under arms, and, secondly, to extend relief to the soldiers, sailors and civilians of those nations which were fighting our battles along with their own. With the funds which have been so generously contributed by the American people this war work of the Red Cross will continue and be completed with all possible sympathy and energy.

ford them sufficient protection when very cold weather was encountered upon the trip northward. They have insisted that failure in any instances of Florida fruit to arrive in the markets in good condition was not the fault of the grower or shipper, but was wholly due to certain inadequacies in the cars provided for its loading.

The Florida Citrus Exchange together with other organizations has made an effort to get at the bottom of the trouble. The governmental investigation is the result, and the data obtained from the experiments this season should be most valuable to the growers of the state.

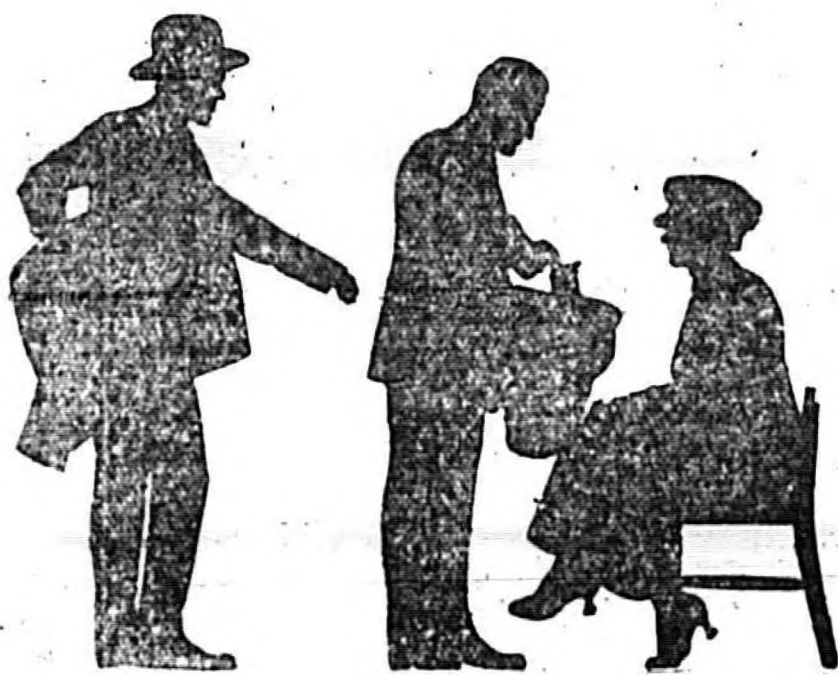

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PRESIDENT WILSON AND THE PEACE CONFERENCE

President Wilson's trip abroad to attend the peace conference is a wise and appropriate undertaking. There are several reasons why he should be abroad.

In the first place, the German advances for peace have been made to him and presented to the allies through his agency.

In the second place, at the conference many questions will naturally come up which will be subject to marked differences of opinion. The

allies, necessarily harmonious in time of war, may disagree in regard to the terms of peace. President Wilson's authority and personality are likely to be a strong factor in composing any such differences. The fact that America has nothing to ask for herself will strengthen his position.

In the third place, though America seeks neither indemnity nor annexation of territory, she has a real and grave interest in many of the adjustments to be made. Who can handle these matters as well as Mr. Wilson? We applaud his decision to go.

We have heard much in recent days of the influenza epidemic. It is essential to prosperity. Money must circulate freely, and the wheels of antebellum production must be set turning at top speed. And Clarkson is right.

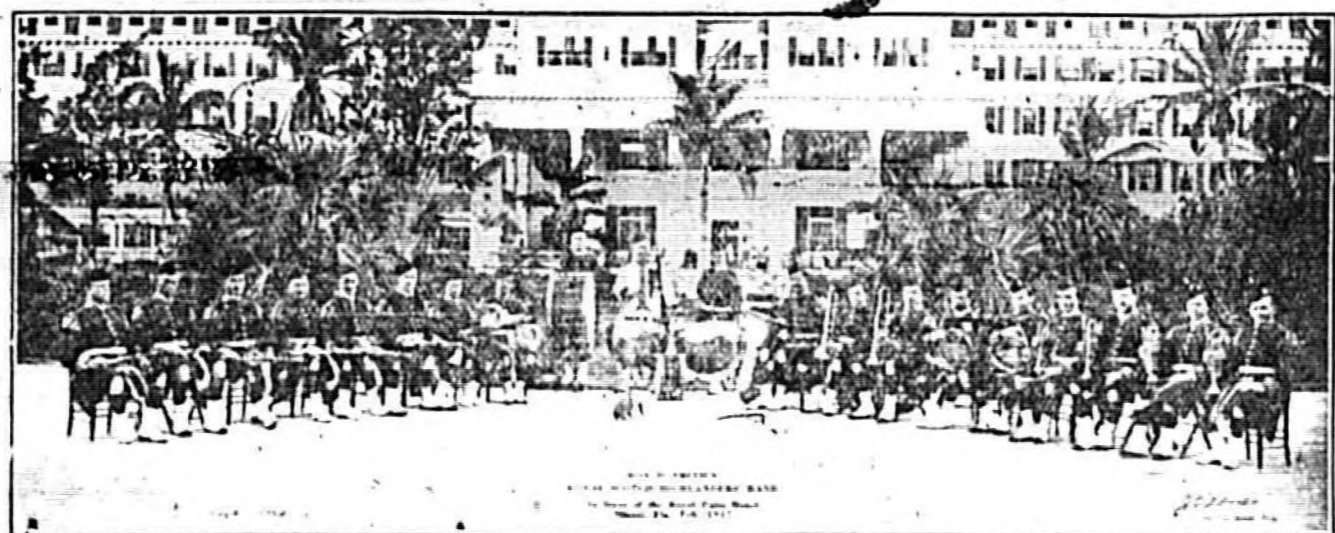
