# Reds Observe Birthday

Shortest Military Review Ever Seen Is Staged In Moscow Before Joe Stalin

HY EDDIE GILMORE MOSCOW UP—One of the shortest military parades ever seen in Muscow marked the 35th anniversary celebration today of the Bolshevik revolution. Prime Minister Stalin reviewed the parade from his usual place atop the big marble tomb of Lenin in Red Square. Because of low clouds there was no display of Soviet airpower, as has been the case in past years.

Before the parade started Marshal Semeon Timoshenko, commander of the White Russian milltary district and one of the Soviet Union's inlitary heroes in World
War II, told the nation the armed
forces of the Soviet Union have everything necessary to repel an invader.

He dénounced "warmongers," saying they dream of a new world war while carrying on a barbarous war against the Korean people. He said Russia "can be confident that the Soviet armed forces are prepared to fulfill the task of defending the peaceful labor of the Soviet would."

Stalin wore his generalissimo's uniform. The Russian leader, who will be 73 on Dec. 21, walked up about 40 steps to a landing, where he raised his right hand in greeting to foreign diplomats, including those of the U.S. and other Western powers, who were in reviewing stands to see the show. Then he walked up the remaining 30 or 40 steps to the usual reviewing place.

The resolution, sponsored by the West's Big Three and 18 other counties, notes with approval the unified command's refusal to send back Communist war prisoners who say they do not want to go; it also issues an appeal to the Chinese Communists and North Kohreuns to agree to these terms.

Vishinsky charged that the U.S. was not interested in ending the war, but wanted to keep it going and expand it in order to gain control of the world and increase the profits of "American billionaries." He said that, as part of this plan to keep the war going, the resolu-tion was submitted. The U.S. knew, he said, that the Chinese and North Koreans would not agree to it and this "would inevitably lead to the collapse of the talks (at Panmuniom) and the protraction of

The Soviet foreign minister said the U. S. resolution confirmed that Washington did not want peace through negotiation; but was in-terested only in a "military deci-sion-victory at all costs."
