Appeal For Aid In Promoting Growth Of Holly Is Made

Do not pull up, mutilate the holly; plant it. Let its berries brighten your gardens and so preserve the Christmas memories and spirit. It takes three years or more for the scarred trunk to replace the branches that you tear from it for a week's decoration. If you cut or destroy you are wasting, abusing Nature's gifts. Let your children know that the holly, like many choice plants, has departed from the beaten pathways of men. It is retreating into the outlands, the wild lands which the ruthless axe has not yet found. The \$100 fine for cutting holly without written consent of the land owner has not yet been sufficient to protect it. Unless we soon learn to preserve and plant it, there will be no holly berries to brighten Christmas days.

So set out the holly trees, water, feed them. Use substitutes—we have many of them in Florida that grow luxuriantly as the Brazilian pepper, the ardisia, the carissa, the Russelia or fountain plant, and the yaupon. Tips of pine branches, sprays of ligustrum, pittosporum can substitute for holly wreaths that may be brightened with pine cones frosted with aluminum paint or dipped in red lacquer. Use cranberries, kumquats, or tiny bright vegetables for color.

And when you call to the children "Let's go get the Christmas tree" urge Daddy to take along a shovel instead of an axe. Thoroughly wet the ground about the graceful cedar selected, transfer the roots with as much earth as possible to burlap, bag it up without exposing the roots to the air. Your tree can be planted later. Its fragrant branches will keep alive your Christmas memories.

Local Police Come Near Meeting Thugs Who Miss Death Twice Near Lake Monroe

Three men, heavily armed, held up and robbed the Bank of Orange City of approximately \$2500 at 11:11 o'clock this morning, and made their escape after attempting to lock the bank's president and cashier, and two customers in the vault.

Arrest of the trio might have been accomplished in the heart of Lake Monroe had Sheriff J. P. McClelland and Chief of Police Roy G. Williams been notified of the robbery five minutes earlier, for they arrived in Lake Monroe only a few minutes after the trio had passed through the town after a wild ride which nearly saw them halted by a plunge into the St. Johns River and possible death under the wheels of an Atlantic Coast Line freight train.

Two of the robbers, unmasked, entered the bank building shortly after 11:00 o'clock leaving the third robber in a new Plymouth coupe whose motor was running.

D. B. Tuten, bank president, and Hobson Haight, bank cashier, were the only occupants of the bank at the time the men advanced to teller's windows, whipped out guns, and ordered them to "Stick 'em up."

Obeying the command of the armed robbers, Mr. Tuten and Mr. Haight lay down on the floor, and the robbers entered the teller's cages, scooping up all available money.

While they were at the bank, two customers entered the building, to be forced to lie down with the two banker's while one of the robbers obtained a key to the inner door of the vault. He entered
