

### Burns Foresees Insurance Cut With Bond Issue

**CORAL GARDNER (UPI)**—Gov. Haydon Burns touched a subject dear to the heart of Floridians when he proposed four-year highway bonds with bonds might mean lower insurance rates.

It was the first time in the governor's series of speeches since he took office in 1963 that he stressed the benefits that might result might be cheaper insurance.

The proposal, a state constitutional amendment, will go to the voters Nov. 2.

"An audience as well as formed as this one knows that there is a direct relationship between the number and severity of accidents on the highways and the amount of insurance premiums," he said. The bond issue would finance 1,441 miles of highway.

### Cape Kennedy 'Public Beach' Proposed

**TALLAHASSEE (UPI)**—The U. S. Department of the Interior has been asked to turn a 16-mile long beach just north of Cape Kennedy into a public beach, the state Outdoor Recreational Planning Committee said.

The committee also agreed to acquire 75 acres for 1100, on the east shore of Lake Oklochee. Ultimate development of the Hoover Dike area would cost about \$250,000.

The committee agreed to make an inspection visit Nov. 10 of Fort George Island as guests of the Greater Jacksonville area Chamber of Commerce. The chamber is interested in having the state buy the 400 to 500 acre site for a public recreational area.

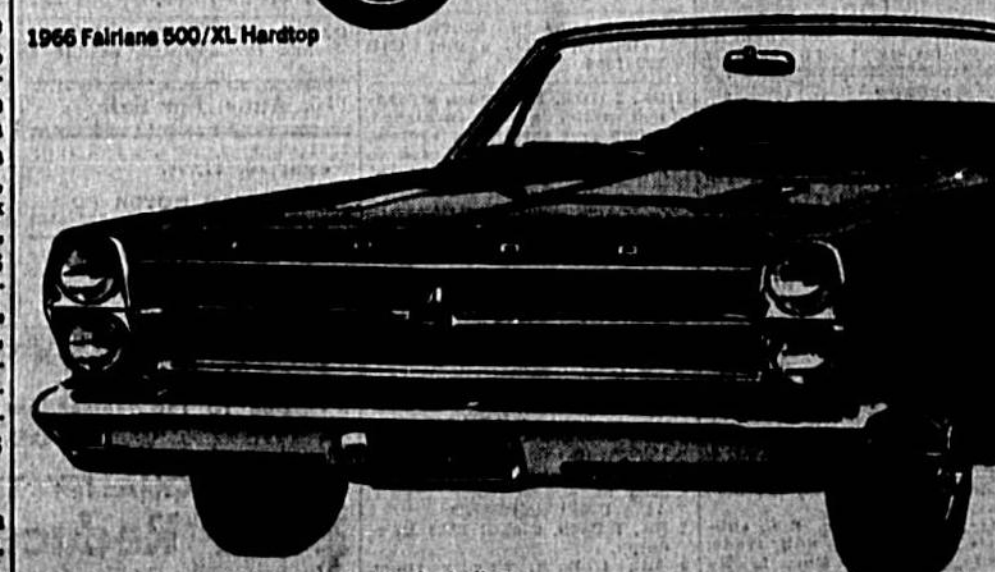
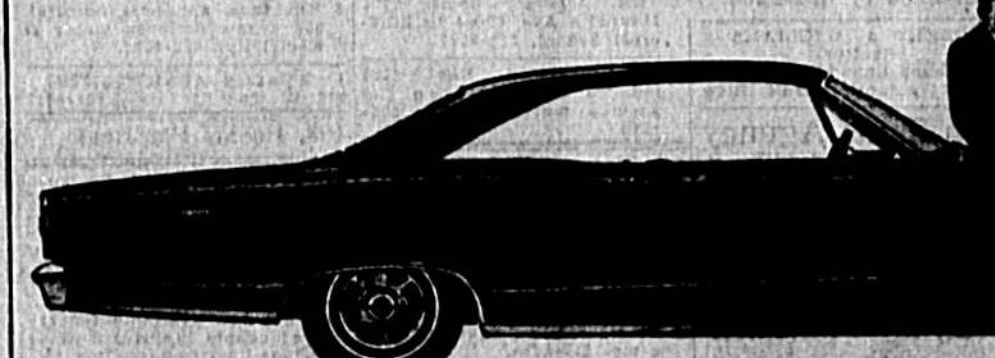

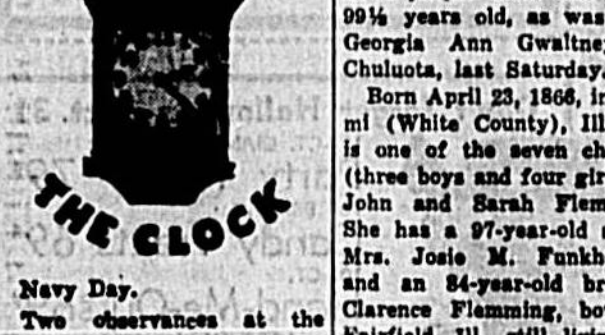

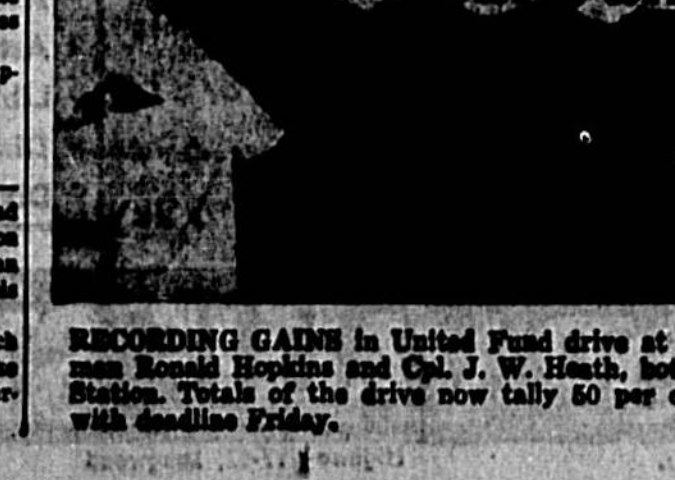

Broad plans for the establishment of Seminole Junior College were outlined for Seminole County civic leaders and school officials Wednesday by Dr. Earl S. Weldon, president-designate.

Speaking at a luncheon at the Lookout restaurant in Fern Park, Dr. Weldon noted that there are six areas of effort to be undertaken.

One is planning of the curriculum, which will be coordinated with feeder high schools in the area and with senior colleges to which junior college students will be transferring.
