New Weapon In Drug Fight

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration has developed a sleep analyzer which tells you and your doctor whether you sleep tight, loose, deeply or disturbed. In the fight against drug addiction, the NASA-developed sleep analyzer already is being offered to hospitals and medical centers, two years before it is to be used to pry into the sleeping habits of three astronauts aboard the U.S. Skylab earth-orbiting space station. Thus, for the first time, NASA technology is being applied in public and private institutions before it is to be used in the space program. Developed by Dr. James D. Frost of Baylor University's Col-

lege of Medicine, Texas, the analyzer employs electroencephalogram (ECG) (brain wave) and electrooculogram (EOG) signals. By combining and evaluating the signals, the device provides a record of the depth and hence the quality of sleep. Dr. Frost explains: "Rapid eye movements indicate by the EOG signals, coupled with the ECG measurements of brain activity, show that the patient is dreaming, is experiencing disturbed sleep, has just dozed off or will awaken soon. Medical researchers who try to evaluate the sleep patterns of drug addicts believe sleep analysis may be useful in identifying harmful side effects from drugs being developed to combat "hard" narcotic addiction. One of the three prototypes is being used by the University of South Carolina Medical School for use in sleep research with patients suffering from burns. Gambler Appeals To Highest Court

ORLANDO (AP) — Harlan Blackburn, whose conviction on interstate gambling charges has been upheld by the 5th Court of Appeals, said today he will immediately appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court. Blackburn was convicted last Aug. 24 by a federal jury in Jacksonville on two charges of running an interstate gambling operation. U.S. District Judge George C. Young gave Blackburn an eight-year prison sentence and fined him \$8,000. The federal government's star witness at the trial was Thomas P. McCormick, who testified he had been Blackburn's bookmaking partner for four years while receiving \$600-a-month as an FBI informant. Lawyer Ed Kirkland based Blackburn's appeal on grounds that statements by McCormick to the FBI were illegally withheld and that Judge Young had failed to investigate alleged complaints by a juror that he had been harassed by the jury foreman during deliberations. The 5th Appellate Court in New Orleans ruled that the government did not have to make all the statements available to Kirkland. It also found the trial record "barren of any showing" of juror misconduct.

Bernovich Trial In Rape Sept. 20

Trial was set for Sept. 20 in the case of Dennis Bernovich, 26-year-old Sanford man charged with the rape of the 19-year-old daughter of a Sanford businessman on May 2. Bernovich entered a "not guilty" plea to the charges at his arraignment this morning before Circuit Judge Dominic Salfi. Bernovich is represented by Gordon Frederick, who was appointed as special public defender in the case. Other arraignments included Leon Jesse Hill, who entered a plea of "not guilty" to charges of carnal intercourse with an unmarried person under 18 and lewd, lascivious or indecent assault or act upon or in the presence of a child. Hill is in custody in lieu of \$5,000 bond. The court set the trial for the week of Aug. 9. Also set for Aug. 9 is the trial of Eugene Terrell, charged with carrying a concealed firearm. Terrell pleaded "not guilty." Two arraignments were continued until next week due to the absence of counsel. These include Verne Edwin Riggall, charged with larceny of a motor vehicle, and Michael John Evans, charged with breaking and entering with intent to commit a misdemeanor. Leslie Howard Marder, charged with possession of a narcotic drug, marijuana, road the court a letter from his attorney, Stuart Marks, in which the attorney indicated that he was unable to appear due to conflicting court action. However, Markus advised the defendant to waive jury trial and the court accepted, after determining that Marder understood his rights in that the judge will determine the facts and render a verdict. Trial was set for the week of Aug. 9, after Marder entered a plea of "not guilty." The court issued a capias, for failure to appear, for George Kessel, charged with worthless check. Notice was sent to Kessel and his attorney, Stephen Johnson, and a capias was issued on July 20 and returned unreturned. Kessel was released on his own recognizance by a justice of the peace court.

Subject To Doctors' Approval Mental Facility Is OK'd

Seminole Memorial Hospital will purchase a Sanford nursing home for a reported \$235,000 for joint use with the county as a mental holding facility and an ambulatory patient center, provided the hospital's medical staff approves the acquisition. This was accomplished Monday night at the hospital's trustee board session after County Commissioner John Kimbrough appeared at the meeting to seek trustee consent in buying Seminole Lodge nursing home. The county will pay 60 percent of the purchase price with the hospital responsible for the remainder. Kimbrough said the county would have to know the trustee's feeling concerning the purchase, since there had been a \$300,000 mandate from the people to provide a facility that will allow mental patients to be removed from the present practice of holding them in jail until they can be removed to a state hospital. Under the proposed arrangement, the hospital would operate the entire facility with the county responsible to fund the facility in the event the adjunct does not pay for itself. Bottle Club, Rock Fete Law OK'd

CASSELBERRY — Despite the absence of two councilmen at last night's regular meeting, a quorum was present and the city's new bottle club and rock festival ordinances were adopted into law. Councilmen Bill Greer and Harry Sambrook were absent from the meeting on vacation, as was City Clerk Mary Hawthorne. Mayor Curtis Row was absent due to illness. The new bottle club ordinance is designed to control the establishment of such clubs in the city and provides for control of opening and closing hours. According to the ordinance, bottle clubs must be closed from 2 a.m. to 9 a.m. each day of the week, except on Sunday when they must be closed from 2 a.m. to 9 a.m. on Monday morning. Penalty for violations of the ordinance is a fine up to \$500 and/or imprisonment up to 60 days. Council has long been working on this ordinance, having been concerned with incidents surrounding a county bottle club in the recent past. Promoters desiring to stage a rock festival — "musical renditions in open spaces not within the confines of an enclosed structure" — in the city will find the new rock festival ordinance something to be reckoned with. Council prepared this ordinance due to the "increasing and illicit drug use in Casselberry and Seminole County," and because it is widely known that "illicit drug uses and sex practices" endangering the health, safety and morals of those attending are widespread at rock festivals. The ordinance not only stipulates necessary insurance precautions but requires that promoters obtain a special entertainment permit from the city. This special permit provides for the control of all aspects of a rock festival, including traffic and sanitary regulations, internal security precautions, medical necessities, plans of the festival site, and other items. The permit also requires that tickets to a rock festival stipulate in writing that the holder of such a ticket will allow the search of his vehicle or person at any time during the festival. Councilman Charges: N. Orlando 'Forgets' Air For Breathing

NORTH ORLANDO — Contending that it is "inflationary" in proportion to the number of people served, Councilman Charles Kelley cast the lone dissenting vote against the first reading of an ordinance which establishes occupational license fees. The ordinance is encompassing in every possible category and includes professional, \$30 yearly for profit making business, and \$15 for non-profit; utility companies, \$100 yearly plus the franchise and property tax; industrial \$40 yearly plus a surcharge of \$2 for all employes above 10; contractors (general) \$100, \$60 and \$40 in each of three classifications; sub-contractors, \$25. Entertainment is \$100 per annum, with some exceptions; news media \$100 and \$50 depending upon whether there is a local office; lodging is based upon divergent scales as is service. All other occupations are \$40, which are not specified in the ordinance. Kelley, sarcastically quipped, "You left out one thing . . . charging for the cubic feet of air a contractor breathes when he comes here." Kelley expressed that the ordinance will hurt people in the village as regards to getting services. Kelley also voted "nay" to the first reading, which was subsequently approved by the eight per cent utility tax. Present tax is 10 per cent with a 75 cent cap. Kelley has termed the tax excessive with a 300 per cent increase. In contrast to Altamonte Springs, in which an army of petition bearing citizens was present in protest, no one appeared in North Orlando. Council approved placing the village building inspector, James Palmer, on salary effective July 1. Palmer presently receives one-half of all permit fees. Palmer's salary was set at \$6,000 annually. A public hearing was set for Aug. 16 on a request by former Mayor Clifford Jordan for a zoning change from R-1A to R-1 at Meadowlark Unit I. Enemy Breaks Lull

Bombers Pound Reds

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. B-52 bombers dropped 600 tons of explosives on suspected North Vietnamese positions along the demilitarized zone today after enemy gunners broke a lull of more than three weeks with new attacks on South Vietnamese bases just below the DMZ.

19th Brigade 43 miles southwest of Da Nang, killing one American and wounding four. Enemy losses were not known.

Otherwise the battlefront lull across Vietnam continued for the 24th day.

Associated Press correspondent J. T. Welker reported from Quang Tri that all units of the 1st Brigade, 8th U.S. Mechanized Infantry Division have been pulled out of combat, and the 5,000-man brigade is withdrawing from Vietnam at a faster pace than originally planned. He said the new target date for completion of its redeployment is Aug. 20 instead of Sept. 1.

The brigade is now at the Quang Tri combat base packing equipment, and all responsibility for the defense of Quang Tri Province, South Vietnam's northernmost, has been given to the South Vietnamese 1st Infantry Division.

A Viet Cong broadcast today echoed the North Vietnamese statement 24 hours earlier indicating that the Vietnamese Communists would not accept any peace deal President Nixon worked out during his visit to Peking unless it satisfied their demands.

Marijuana Law Is Questioned

TITUSVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Florida's new law designed to make the first-time possession of less than five grams of marijuana a misdemeanor may not really do that, Brevard County Solicitor Jerry Bross said Monday.

Bross told the Titusville Star-Advocate that possession of less than five grams "may still be a felony."

Because of the confusion over the wording of the law passed by the 1971 Legislature, Bross has asked Atty. Gen. Robert Shevin for an opinion on just what the law says.

The solicitor said when the legislation was proposed, the bill read that the penalty for the first offense "shall be misdemeanor punishable by up to one year in county jail."

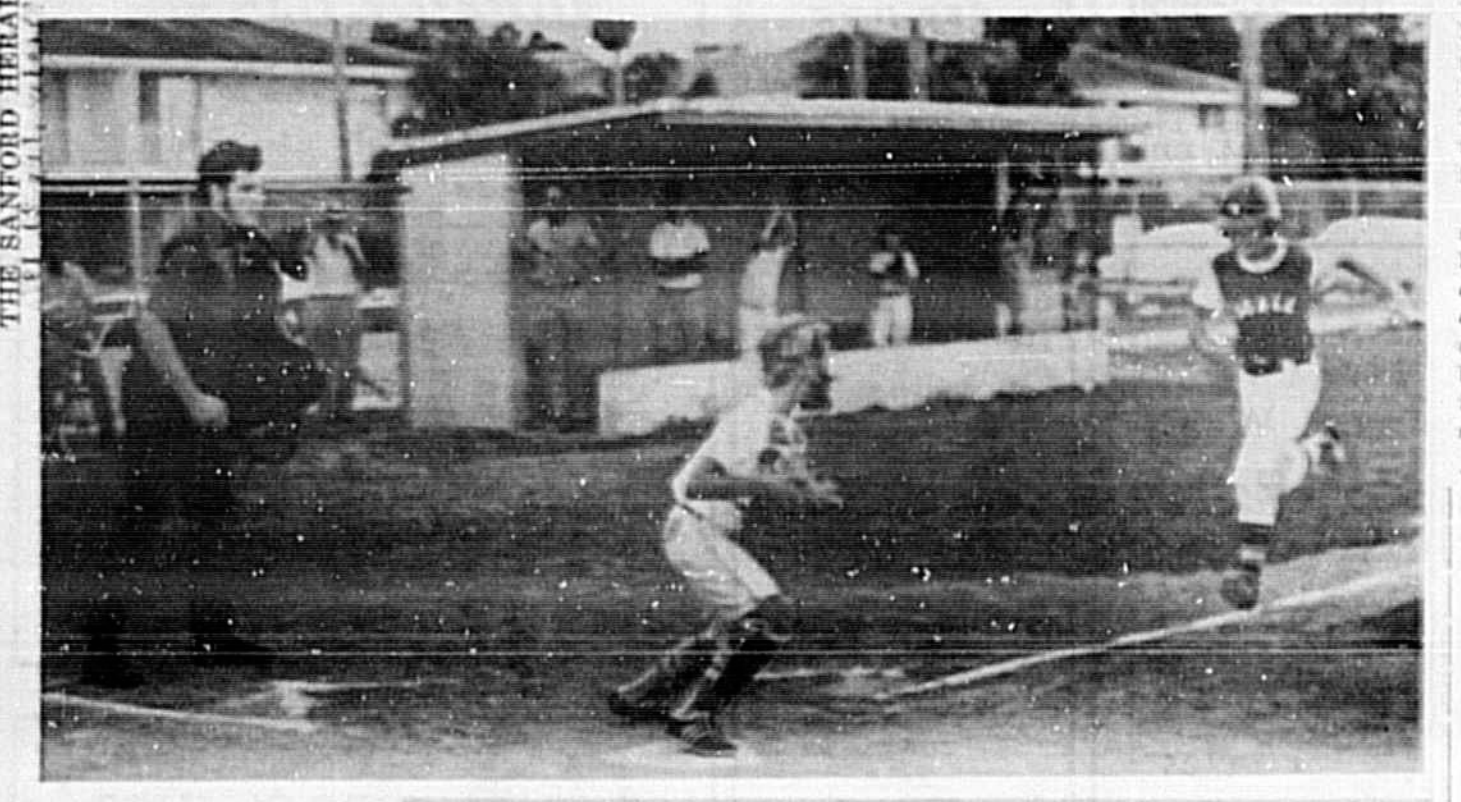
