



### Carillon Recitals Will Be Given From Bok's Tower In Polk County Ridge Section

LAKE WALES, Fla., Nov. 17.—(By International News Service)—Carillon recitals at sunset every day from the highest point in Florida will resound throughout the scenic highlands after February 1, when Edward William Bok's "single tower" and bird sanctuary will be opened.

Bok, donor of the famous \$100,000 American Peace Award, editor of the Ladies Home Journal from 1880 to 1919, and considered one of America's leading authors and editors and a staunch advocate of international peace, will dedicate his single tower on that date, if it is completed as planned.

The tower, 212 feet in height, crowns Iron Mountain, found by the state geological survey as the highest point in Florida. The tower is steel faced with pink marble and coping rock and will resemble the tower of a castle. It will house what is believed will be the largest set of carillon chimes in the state.

Several carilloners of note will be engaged by the famous peace advocate and author to give a concert at sunset of each day. A recital will be given at noon every Sabbath.

The Boks will come to Florida in their private car January 8 to remain at their Mountain Lake home for the winter.

"I have built this beautiful tower not for my own pleasure, but for all the people. I believe that if there were more appreciation of beauty in this country there would be less crime," Mr. Bok said, when announcing that the singing town was open to the public.

The only restriction the author placed upon the tower was that visitors must do nothing to drive the birds away from his sanctuary or to destroy the beauty of the estate.

(Continued from page One) ness man and banker, with the project which he is partly responsible for bringing to its present stage, will bring scores of wealthy business men from the north to Longwood this winter. Many of them, in Dr. Johnson's opinion, will be donors to the Longwood project and will naturally wish to have winter homes in the vicinity.

The combined influx of both the laboring and leisure classes will necessitate a considerable development of surrounding farm lands and the considerable development of surrounding farm lands and the enlarging of the poultry and dairy industries. The combined influence of all these factors will brace the moral and business tone of Longwood and the entire surrounding territory, Dr. Johnson believes.

Returning to Bistline, the poultry raiser, Dr. Johnson lauded him as the type of man who really made a community despite years of adversity. He told how Bistline had come to Longwood, taken a job painting the Orange and Black Hotel for a dollar a day and finally after years of fighting bugs and other pests, reached the peak which he now occupies in his particular class in the poultry industry.

Bistline's birds have registered almost clean sweeps in their class at Madison Square in New York at the Sesqui-Centennial and in Tampa. At last year's Tampa fair he took the majority of 23 prizes awarded to breeders in the Longwood colony. While Mr. Bistline was taking the honors in the wyanottes, Mrs. F. L. Sawyer was winning other ribbons with her white wyanottes.

Another man praised as a builder of Longwood was R. L. Fletcher formerly of Massachusetts, who has in the last year developed one of the finest dairies in the entire section. From the 20 cows he had when the dairy was purchased, he has increased his herd to 50 head.

At present he is producing a large portion of Sanford's milk and in the last dairy report rated the highest of any of the dairies serving the country showing high butter fat and the lowest bacteria count of any Seminole County dairies.

Dr. Johnson's conception of Longwood from the point of view of such men as Fletcher and Bistline is patterned on the famous little town of Putnam, Cal., the poultry center of the United States. Putnam has a population of only 2,000 but last year they owned 9,000,000 white leghorns and shipped eggs to New York and the eastern seaboard by the trainload. According to Dr. Johnson, Florida and especially Longwood can equal the California mark and have shorter train hauls to the eastern markets and consequently deliver fresher and cheaper eggs.

He deplored the fact that Florida consumes \$31,000,000 in poultry products each year and only raised approximately \$14,000,000. He said the poultry raisers of the country were overlooking the opportunity of their lives by not coming to Florida.

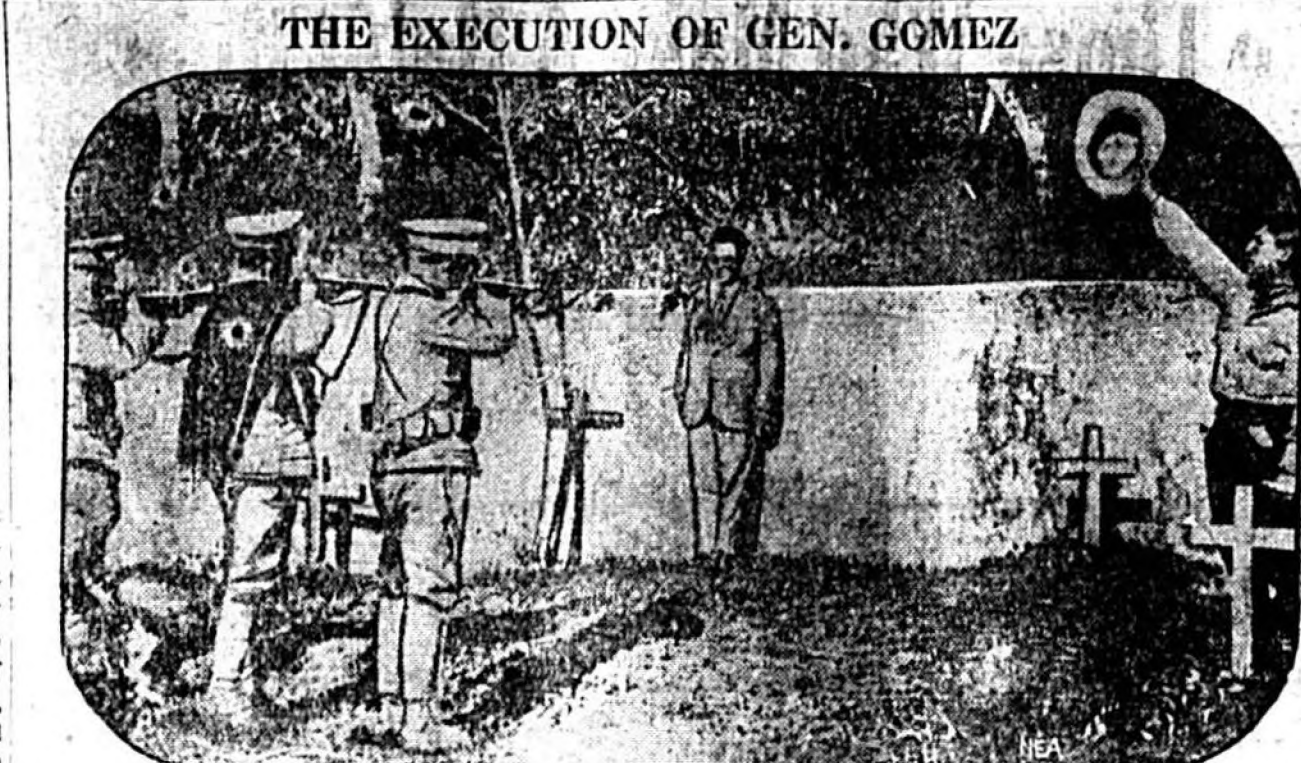

### ENGLISH COURT GIVES EXTREME MARITAL VIEWS

Justice Hill Hopes Law May Change So Court Can Grant Decree Without Request

LONDON, Nov. 18 (INS)—Some day, perhaps, the law will be altered so as to enable a judge to use his own discretion and order a divorce even if such relief is not asked for.

These words of Justice Hill, uttered in the Divorce Court with great solemnity, has brought to a boiling point the seething controversy in Britain over the question of divorce and legal separation.

In the British Courts, an average of twenty separation orders to one divorce decree are made annually. In national cases in Britain, except where infidelity is clearly proved, separation is the only legal remedy however grave the complaint of the applicant may be.

There is no divorce for such reasons as desertion, cruelty, insanity, drunkenness, and incompatibility is rarely sufficient reason for a separation order.

And separation never gives the right to re-marriage. Consequently nearly all advanced opinion in Britain is opposed to the principle of separation, because it is generally agreed that in many cases it only leads to immorality.

Talks of Separations But Justice Hill, speaking with the weight of the Bench, has gone further. He has dealt openly with another and very serious aspect of the question—where one party has the right to claim a divorce, but prefers to remain content with a separation order, in order to prevent the other party from re-marrying.

Outcome Of Treason Trial Has Facilitated And Hastened Preparations For His Legal Return, Carol Avers

PARIS, Nov. 17.—"He is a dog!" Former Crown Prince Carol of Romania, applied this epithet to King Bratianu today when an International News Service correspondent asked him for his opinion of the "black book," which the Romanian Premier is having distributed throughout Romania.

in which contains facsimiles of two letters alleged to have been written by Carol to several women. That Carol contemplated re-attaching to his native land was indicated when he declared that the offense of the Manolescu treason had "facilitated and hastened preparations for his legal return."

Carol's rejoicing over news that his brother, Michael Manolescu, had been acquitted at Bucharest of the treason charges lodged against him by the Bratianu government, tended to hostility by mention of the "black book."

"I believe," continued the former Crown Prince, "that you have a fitting opinion in America of politicians who seek to establish their qualification for office by a so-called 'mud slinging campaign' against their political opponents."

Carol was found in his chateau surrounded by a group of Roumanian friends who had called to congratulate him upon the acquittal of Manolescu. The former Crown Prince was light hearted and in the gayest mood he had shown since the death of his father, King Ferdinand, of Rou-

### Persia To Get Roads Costing 45 Millions Under U. S. Expert

TEHERAN, Nov. 18, (INS)—No less than \$45,000,000 will be spent in Persia on roads if plans as formulated by an American engineer with a record of successful work in Panama, now in charge of road development in this country. The annual cost of maintaining these roads will be a million and a half "tomans," or dollars.

That was the attitude of Quaker Oats when it stopped advertising, but it soon found out that the public is a fickle thing. It soon forgets, and turns quickly from the old to the new. It is the thing that is constantly brought to the attention of the public that sells.

Pillsbury flour is one of the most successful concerns in the country and is perhaps the most widely advertised. Its advertising manager is said to draw a salary larger than the President of the United States.

We would like to see some local merchant who is not satisfied with the volume of his business catch the idea of these other business men. Business can always be improved by judicious advertising.

Judge Gary On Success

Success, that goal which every man aspires to attain, has been the subject of numerous books and addresses which have come to the public's attention from time to time.

As we have just said, there is an unlimited supply of advice at hand on this subject. Most of it is bunk. However, there are those requisites of success which everyone must recognize. They are very interestingly set forth in a list of ten maxims which the late Judge Elbert H. Gary compounded after years of experience and considerable thought on the matter.

- 1. Be honest, truthful, sincere and serious. Being slippery and tricky may gain you temporary advantages, but in the long run it will be your undoing.

## CRIMSON MEETS YALE FOR FINAL GAME OF SEASON

### Blue Goes Into Game Great Favorite To Win Large Margin Despite Tradition Which Forecasts Close Game

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 19.—Yale's powerful and rugged football eleven will battle both Harvard and tradition in the confines of the classic stadium on Soldiers' Field today. The blue will go into the game a favorite to win by an uncertain margin but it will be faced by a Crimson eleven playing better football than it has ever if tradition of many years is maintained.

Despite whatever advantage Yale may have gained or merited by virtue of its victory over Harvard through a season ended only by one defeat at the hands of Georgia, it will be forced to play its best in order to overcome the Crimson which fighting within the stadium in the last nineteen years has only once seen its goal line crossed by a Yale eleven. That goal in small letters came in 1923 when Dudley Pond made a thrilling run of more than half the length of the field for a touchdown but it stands as the only one Yale has made against Harvard on the Crimson's home ground since the gates of the Stadium were thrown open to the first year of the great Percy Haughton's reign as director of Harvard's football, decades back in 1907.

Yale will go into the game today somewhat weaker than it was when it crushed the Princeton Tiger in the Bowl last Saturday. Captain Bill Webster, a tower of strength on the left side of the powerful Yale forward line, will in all probability be unable to play because of an injury aggravated by the terrific mauling he received in the game with the Tigers.

Like-wise Johnny Upton, the hero of the Princeton battle with his long passes, and Jack Carvey, who at the last moment took the place of Bruce Caldwell, in the Yale backfield, will probably be unable to play for more than a few minutes, for each was badly injured. With the prospects for fair and cold weather Harvard is prepared to lay the host to an army of more than 55,000 spectators.

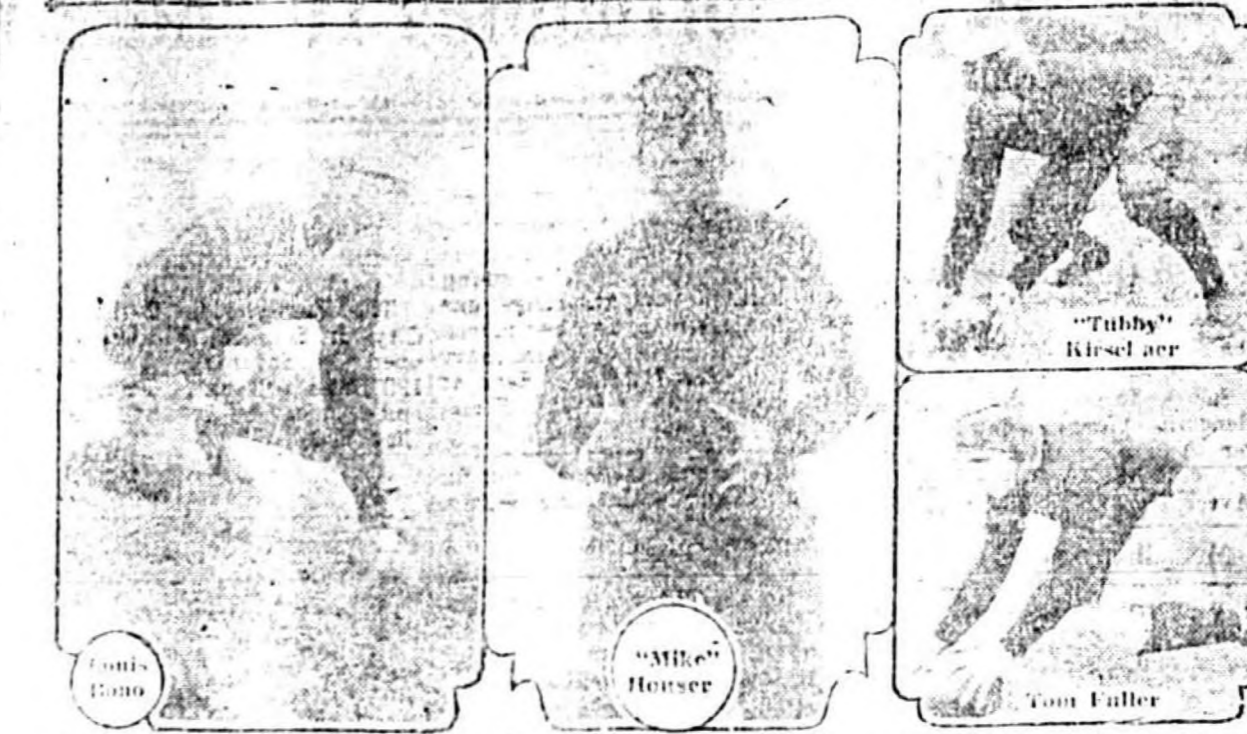
