Apollo Set For May 18 Launch

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) - The Apollo 11 astronauts, spacecraft and rocket have been declared ready to begin final preparations for a May 18 launch that could clear the way for a manned lunar landing in July.

At this time, we are going for the launch of Apollo 11 on May 18, subject to successful completion of scheduled operations.

Dr. Charles L. Gen. Samuel C. Phillips, Apollo program manager, said after an all-day flight Wednesday with project officials.

By "scheduled operation," Phillips was referring to an important countdown rehearsal with the Saturn 5 rocket fully fueled next week and other tests to be conducted during the actual countdown leading up to a launch at 12:49 p. EDT May 18.

The meeting included officials from all National Aeronautics and Space Administration centers involved in the project, as well as Defense Department representatives responsible for the operations.

Apollo 11 astronauts Thomas P. Stafford, John W. Young and Eugene A. Cernan are to take an eight-day flight that includes orbiting the moon 11.5 hours.

Three times longer than the Apollo 8 astronauts stayed in lunar orbit last Christmas.

While circling the moon, Air Force Col. Stafford and Navy Cmdr. Cernan are to transfer into a spidery lunar module (LEM) attached to the command ship's nose, separate from the command ship piloted alone by Navy Cmdr. Young and fly to about eight miles above the surface. This is the point at which the Apollo 11 pilots will fire an engine to make the landing in July.

No landing was planned for Apollo 11 because ground track errors are not certain how well navigation calculations can be made around the moon.

Apollo 11 showed that ground-determined altitudes might be off as much as a mile, and this could lead to hazardous errors on the landing and during reentry in moon orbit after the touch-down is performed.

Wolfson On Way To Jail

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP) - Multimillionaire Louis Wolfson leaves the world of high finance today to begin a 2 1/2-year stint at the nondescript barracks of a federal prison "house camp."

The 56-year-old resident of Miami Beach and Jacksonville was scheduled to surrender to Emmett Shelby, U.S. Marshal of the Northern District of Florida, then proceed to Eglin Air Force Base.

On that sprawling 287,000-acre reserve, the rich financier will join another 150 or so inmates in residence in a minimum security "house camp."

Wolfson, numbered among the nation's most spectacular financial wizards was convicted in 1967 of selling \$2.8 million in unregistered stocks and sentenced to a year in prison. In 1968 he was found guilty of conspiracy to obstruct justice and perjury involving dealings in stocks.

The second trial ended with an 18-month sentence.

Wolfson made his first million by age 20 and once controlled a \$240-million web of 17 corporations.

His personal fortune has been estimated at \$100 million.

He acquired Merritt-Chapman & Scott 30 years ago and built it into a world wide firm. He once waged a widely publicized but losing battle for control of Montgomery Ward & Co.

Wolfson's lawyer still is fighting for reversal of the convictions, but the U.S. Supreme Court recently turned down his petition to hear the case.

Father Saves Son

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) - The life of an injured high school baseball player apparently was saved Monday when his father rushed from the stands and performed an emergency tracheotomy as his son struggled for air.

The injury came as young Anthony Durham, 18-pound freshman second baseman for Donelson High School, was tagged in the throat as he tried to steal third base in a game with Tennessee Preparatory School.

He reportedly suffered a fractured larynx.

His father, Donald, an aeronautical medical superintendent for the Tennessee Air National Guard, ran from the stands and used a pocket knife to open his son's throat and give him air.

The youth was listed in fair condition at General Hospital.

Confederate Memorial Day Rites

History is a treasure? That's what Touchton Drugs is currently offering in one of its display windows. The members of the Norman de Vere Howard chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, at their program today marking the observance of Confederate Memorial Day.

It was begun in 1864 by a Miss Williams, of Columbus, Ga. As she desecrated the grave of her father, killed in the war which had ended only the year before, she thought of his many comrades in arms who lay near him, many with no family remaining to leave flowers.

She called a few friends together and explained her idea of a Southern Memorial Day. The idea gained acceptance easily, and the practice was generally begun in 1907.

April 26 was the day set aside for this, for it marked the particular anniversary of Miss Williams' father. Two most ardent in the South were their flowers at the peak of blooming at the time of news.

Boom in the construction industry in the Central Florida area is being reflected in the number of zoning changes at least one to two times monthly.

With the moratorium now lifted, the Commission is again confronted with 10 to 12 public hearings on zoning changes at least one to two times monthly.

Altamonte Springs' moratorium on zoning changes was recently lifted also. A large number of public hearings on changes are scheduled there on May 11.

Councilman Albert Sabbarose of Altamonte Springs at a recent city meeting suggested that zoning changes be speeded to \$100 following the lead of the City of Orlando. In this manner the city would use the item as a revenue producer.

Orlando currently charges \$25 for zoning change applications and has scheduled a public hearing to consider the possible increase in fees to \$100.

All of the state's junior college squads, 16 in all, are expected to field entrants with a three-way duel shaping up between the Raiders, Miami-Dade South and Manatee. The Raiders captured first place in the 440 relays, 100 dash, 440 and 220s, 440 high hurdles, 2 mile, and mile relay. Additional blue ribbon performances were registered with firsts in the 1200 yard dash, 1500 yard dash, 1600 yard dash, and 2 mile relay. This is the second year in-row in which the Thomas crew has won the Division II Track Title. "Perhaps the biggest thrill for me came when Jim Buck broke the javelin record, just recently established by Roy Dunn at 297', with a heave of 312' 31". This is the leading throw throughout the nation. Pat was happy for Jim," said the coach. "Now we have two of our members who are the current national leaders. Ben Hallauer made the national junior college discus throw at 170' 10".

When asked about some of the team's strong points, in addition to the current records of Buck and Hallauer in the javelin and discus, respectively, Thomas beamed praise on his mile relay team. "This is one of those which is ranked very high nationally," added the Coach. Never, that is, unless he insures himself against loss. Most lending is on the mortgage market today, you need every eye you can get in convincing a lender that you're a good risk. Private insurance just might be the deciding factor.

Mail Rate Hike Hit

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chairman of the Senate Post Office Committee says President Nixon's proposed one-cent hike in first class mail rates is a "scheme" to get the administration out of a budget bind.

As I understand it, Sen. Gale W. McGee said in an interview, revenue from the boost from 6 to 7 cents "will not necessarily improve mail service at all. It will go largely to pay for capital improvements which should be financed by the government's general revenues."

The company was licensed to do business in 14 states before the ink was dry on the incorporation papers, and another 10 states are reported ready to recognize the new company.

The popularity of the insured mortgage is attributable to the fact that it has benefited both lender and borrower. Since the lender is guaranteed against loss, he can afford to lend up to 90 per cent of the property's value. He can also afford to take a chance on a marginal proposition that might not make the grade in the ordinary course of events.

McGee also said he was disappointed in Postmaster Gen. William M. Blount's testimony Monday before the Senate appropriations subcommittee on the Post Office's budget request.

"We have heard lots of statements from the new administration about how it was going to institute business practices in the Postal Service," he said.

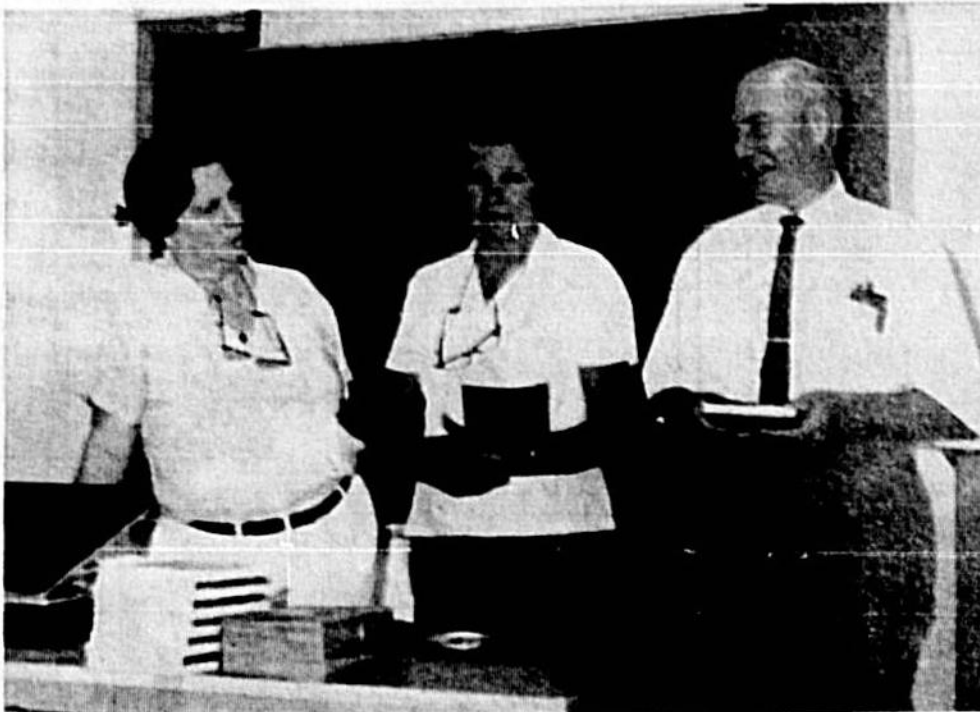

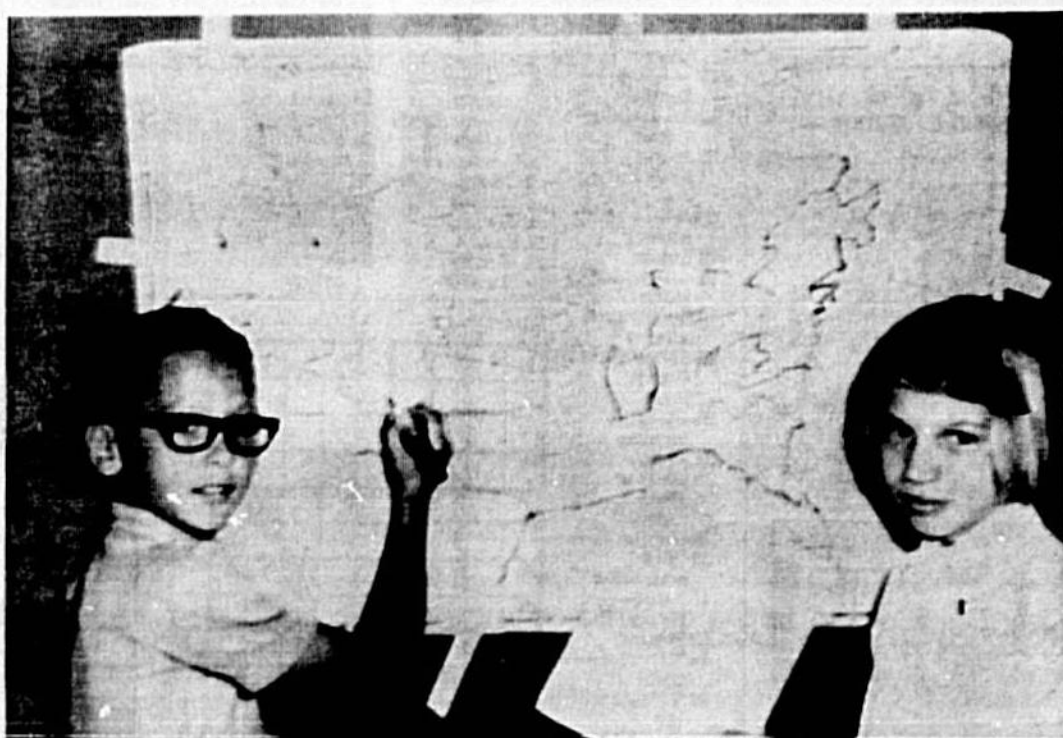

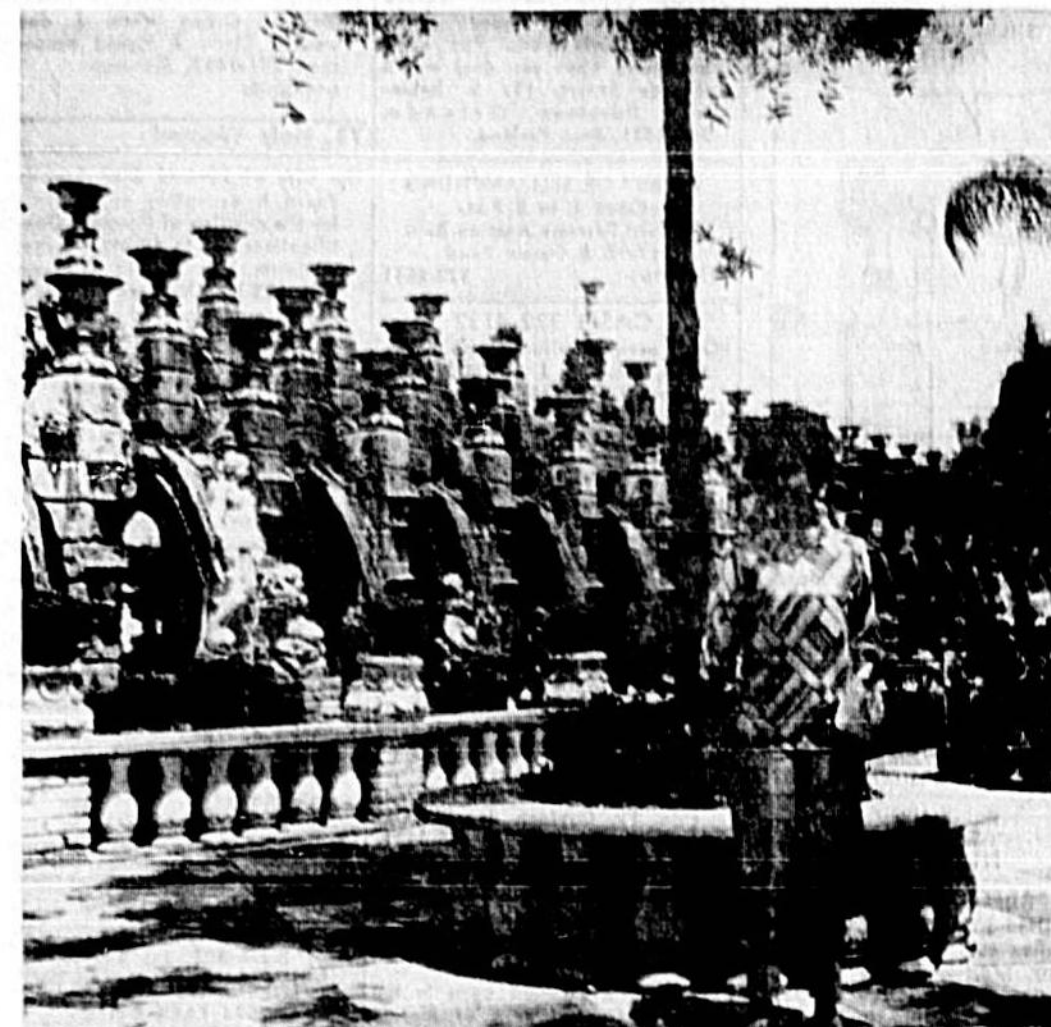

The two-hour drive from Sanford will not only introduce you to Florida's famous Kapok tree, but transfer you to an atmosphere dating back to the Roman Empire.

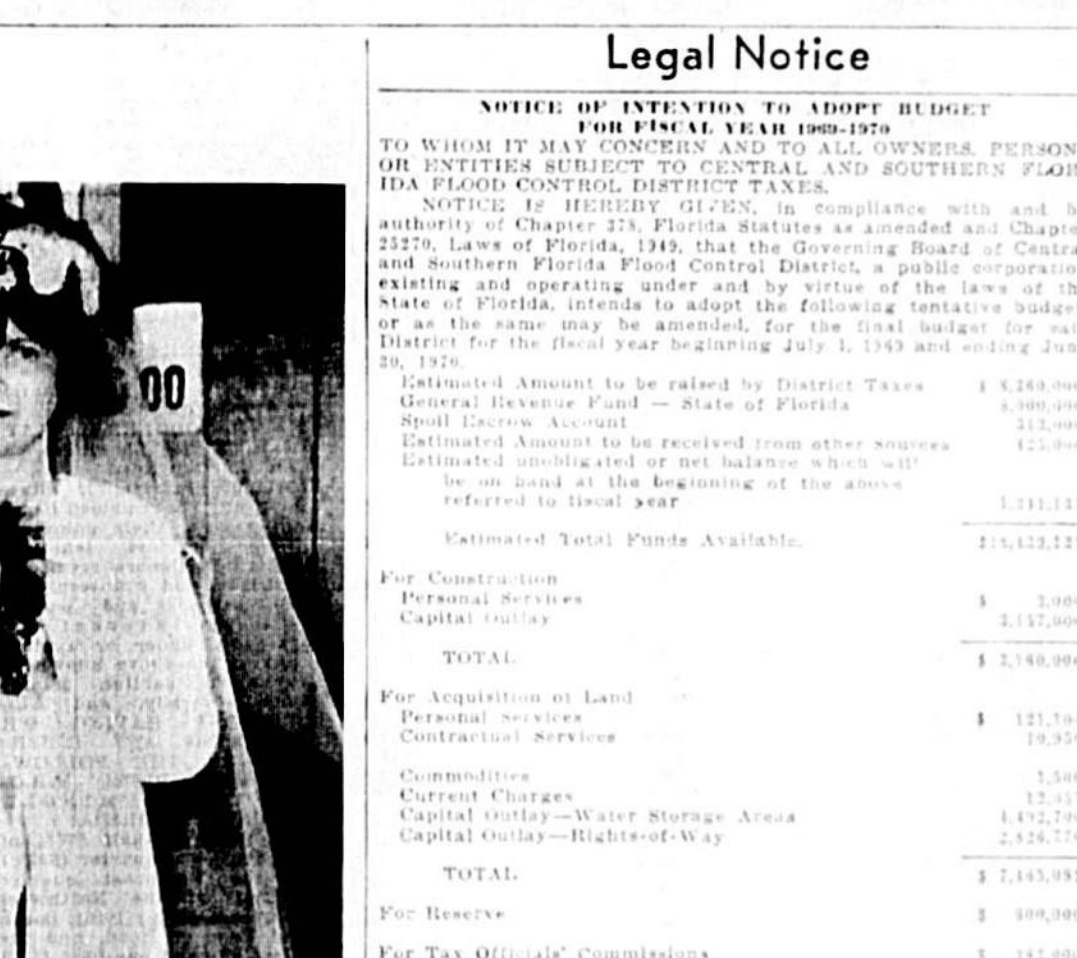
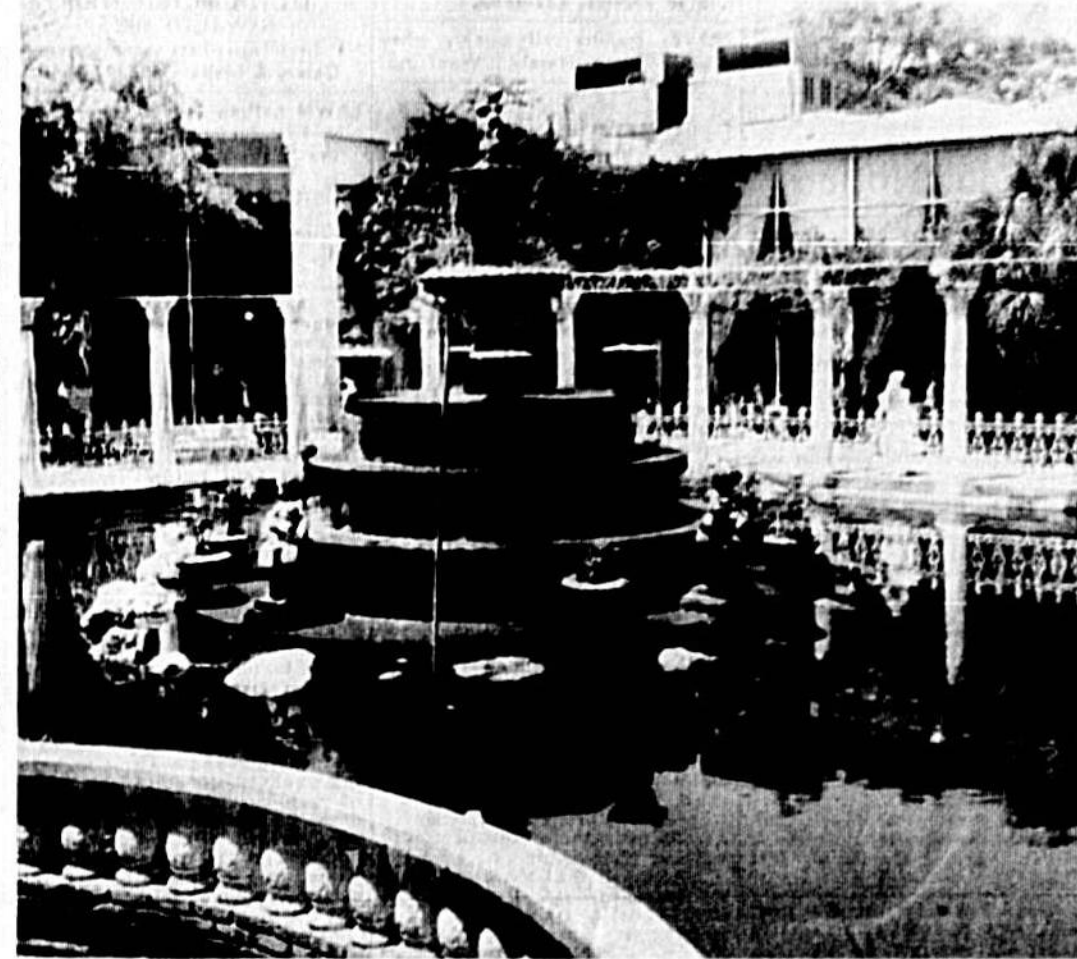
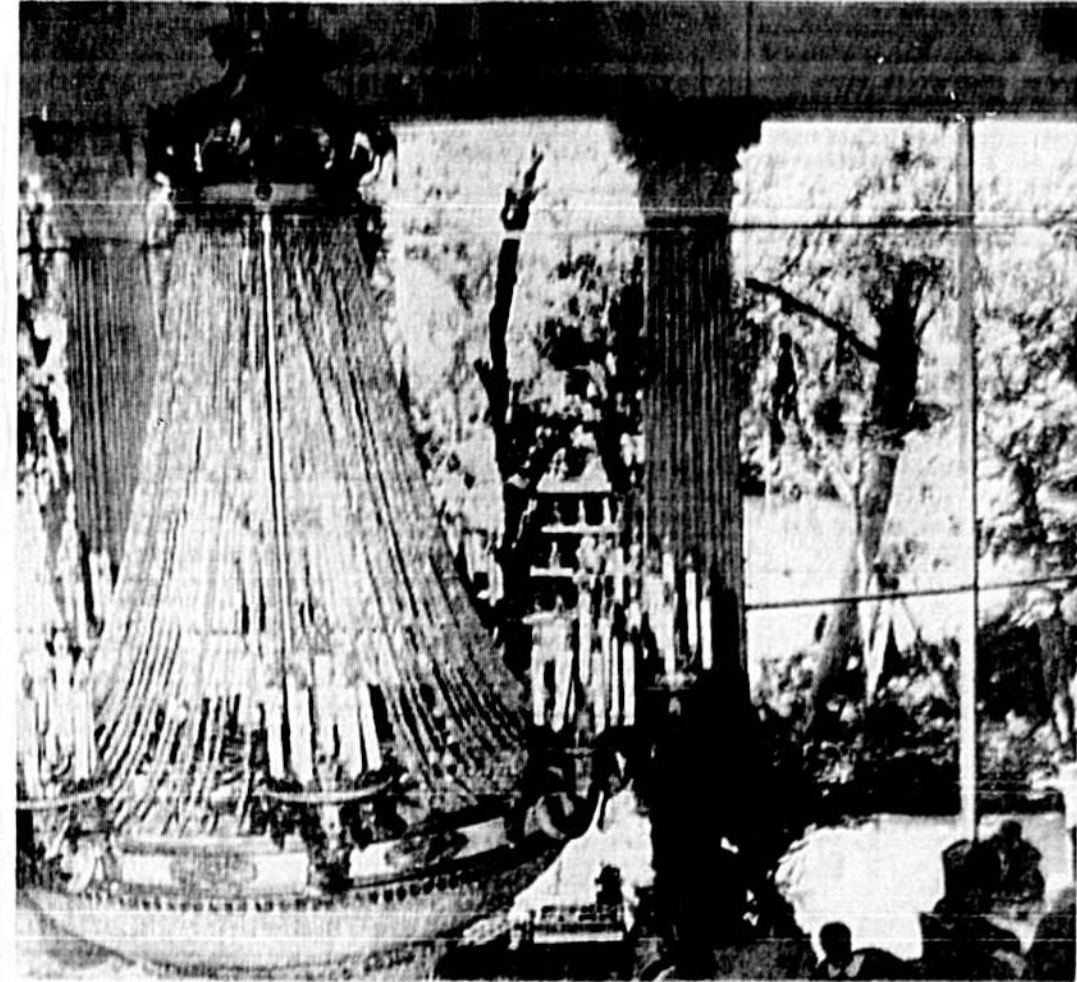
Surrounding the Kapok tree is an enchanting inn, capable of seating approximately 2,000 diners individually, all at most reasonable prices. There are seven different dining rooms, each carrying an identification of its own.

All of the eating areas permit the patrons to view the impressive grounds which feature varied statues, flowing fountains and water falls, plus a manicured, attractive garden.

The seeds of the Kapok tree were brought to this country by missionaries. The limbs spread a canopy of 200 feet which bears flame-colored blossoms as winter advances. In bloom, the lovely tree gives the appearance of a ball of fire, and can be seen for miles around.

These blossoms fall to form a carpet of rosy wonder at the tree's 60 foot base.
