Rocket blasts off

CAPE CANAVERAL — A 128-foot unmanned Delta rocket blasted off with a satellite that will add telephone and color television circuits to communications for Indonesia and other countries.

The 2,770-pound Palapa satellite, nine feet in diameter and almost 23 feet in height when deployed, will augment two working Palapa satellites already aloft.

The satellite launched Wednesday will provide 24,000 telephone and 24 color television circuits to Indonesia, Papua-New Guinea, Brunei, Malaysia, the Philippines, Singapore and Thailand.

Give us a break!

PSC urged to OK toll-free Orlando calls

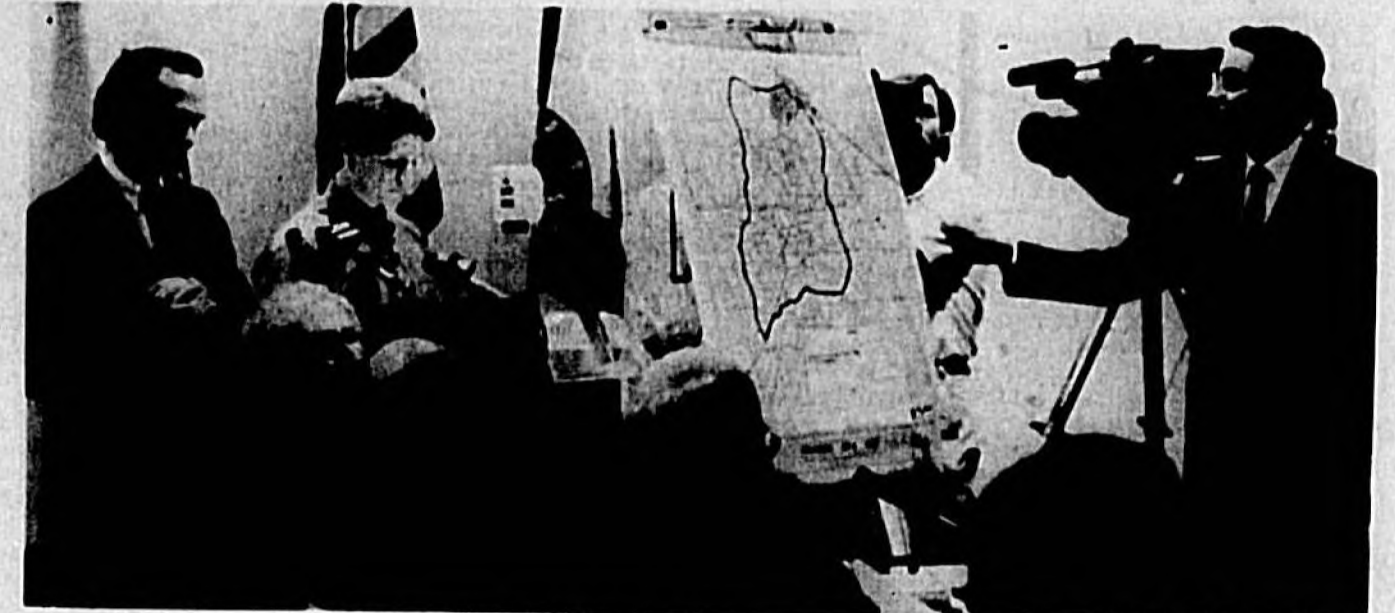
LAKE MARY — North Seminole County residents, business owners and government officials raised a unanimous voice Wednesday: We are a part of the greater metropolitan Orlando area so we shouldn't have to pay tolls to call there.

The testimony came during an unusual out-of-Tallahassee hearing conducted here by the Florida Public Service Commission.

The purpose was to consider a request by Lake Mary, Sanford and Seminole County officials who say residents of their areas should not have to pay a toll to telephone Orlando. Instead, the officials say, phone users would pay a flat-fee increase of only 80 cents per month. The officials are also seeking a reduced, 25-cent per call rate to Apopka. Local mayors pledge to withdraw the request if the PSC accepts a higher rate than those paid by Orlando-exchange customers.

Seminole County Commission Chairman Bob Sturm, of Lake Mary, set a fiery tone repeated by many. "We are fractured from the rest of the metropolitan Orlando area by Southern Bell's tolls," he told the five PSC commissioners. "Bell still cannot see the total area."

All of the 39 government officials, business men and women, and residents spoke in favor of "flat-

rate" or "toll-free" service for Southern Bell customers in the Sanford and Lake Mary area.


Arguments and motions by attorneys will continue before the PSC in their regular Tallahassee venue Friday morning. The commission is scheduled to decide the case August 18. The commission will also decide whether to extend flat-rate calling service to the 1,800 Geneva customers.

New owners closing 'First Federal'

SANFORD — Federal Trust Bank will close the six former branches of the First Federal Saving and Loan Association of Seminole County next week and lay off up to 40 of the remaining First Federal employees, officials confirmed today.

Federal Trust president George Foster, a former First Federal man-

ager, refused to comment this morning.

"I'm not going to say anything more than what is in the press release," said Foster. "Thank you."

In a press release sent at the Sanford Herald's request this morning, Federal Trust spokesman Anne T. Coonrod stated that all six branches would be "vacated" May 22. Branches are located in Sanford, Longwood, Oviedo, Fern Park and

Orange City.

"Federal Trust prefers to pay competitive interest rates rather than operate costly branches and hopes that a majority of the former First Federal deposit customers continue to bank with Federal Trust and take advantage of its highly competitive deposit products," the release stated.

All of the savings, checking and certificate of deposit accounts will

be transferred to the bank's Winter Park office, 1211 Orange Ave., said Coonrod.

"If they want to continue banking with us, they can go to the Winter Park office," said Coonrod this morning.

Federal Trust acquired the assets of the failed 57-year-old thrift from the Resolution Trust Corp. April 3 and declared they would continue to

Sturm faces '90 campaign law violation

LAKE MARY — An investigation by the Florida Division of Elections has concluded Seminole County Commissioner Bob Sturm probably violated election law codes during his 1990 re-election campaign, although a division attorney said the law is open for interpretation.

Sturm will be given an opportunity to appeal the decision to the Elections Commission. Sturm may face fines if the commission agrees he violated the laws.

"As we interpret this, it is a staff interpretation and we are treating it just as that," Sturm said Wednesday afternoon. "I suspect it's done all over. We are not concerned."

The investigation stemmed from a complaint filed in February 1991 by Sheila Sawyer, a critic of local government operations. Sawyer contended Sturm violated state

Bank opening downtown

SANFORD — In less than four weeks, Sanford will have a Security National Bank. The new facility will be located at 201 N. Park Avenue in downtown Sanford, the former Freedom Bank Building.

The new bank is expected to begin operations on June 8.

The Security National Bank has assets of \$140 million, and \$20 million in equity.

"This will be our fifth location in Central Florida," said newly elected President J. Todd Williams. Williams has been serving as vice president at the bank's Altamonte Springs location for the past two years.

He commented, "Each of our banks is under local management by people from right here in Central Florida. What we want to do is get banking back to a local operation like it used to be 30 to 40 years ago."

The Advisory Board of Directors for the Sanford facility includes

John Y. Mercer as Chairman. Members are Kenneth McIntosh, Jack Greene, John Wimbish, Herbert Stenstrom, Robbie Robertson, Dr. Bill Edwards, and Dora Lee Russell.

Williams explained, "We have an Advisory Board for each of our locations, who help us with local needs and situations." He added, "For all five facilities, we have a general Board which meets once a month in our Maitland offices."

The administrative Board of Directors has 19 members, including Michael Sheffey, CEO and president of Security National Corporation and Security National Bank. Sheffey is the founder of the corpo-

ration, which is the holding company for Security National.

"What we want to do," Williams said, "is target people who are tired of big banks, and want to deal with people they know, on a local basis."

Williams said present plans call for the old Freedom Bank building to be renovated. "Outside," he said, "we'll be putting up all new landscaping, resealing the driveway, and refinishing the exterior of the building."

For the interior he plans "A complete new carpeting and marble floor, with decor and furnishings that will make it as warm and homey as possible." He added, "Our prime focus will be on business banking, and we'll be aiming the entire structure, inside and out, toward appealing to that clientele."

The bank was originally scheduled to begin operations on July 1, but Williams said, "Everything has been going so smoothly, we have now moved the opening date to June 8th."

Williams plans an open house at the new facility after the bank gets into operation.

Students protest budget cuts

SHS teachers, staff back peaceful lunchtime march

SANFORD — The students at Seminole High School are interested in telling lawmakers in Tallahassee that they are not willing to sit back and watch the budget-cutting ax take away their educational future.

A group of those students, with the full support of the staff and administration of the school, were to have spent their lunch hour today marching peacefully around the campus, holding placards and encouraging others to sign a petition they have prepared that expresses their unhappiness with the proposed budget cuts.

"This is going to be a peaceful protest," said principal Gretchen Schapker earlier this morning. "It is our intent to let our voices be heard."

Schapker said that the students who organized the protest wanted the legislators to know that they are displeased with the proposals that would cut millions of dollars from school budgets.

"These cuts affect them personally," Schapker said. "They feel very deeply about this."

She added that the petition will be mailed to the Appropriations Committee tomorrow from the school.

The students had organized a protest without permission of the school a few weeks ago, but Schapker, fearful that some might "confuse the issues" with the rage being felt across the nation about the Rodney King verdict, called the protest to a halt.

The students willingly agreed to meet with administrators and plan the protest with school approval. Schapker said teachers who had a lunch break during the times of the protest had expressed an interest in participating as well.

"This is something that affects all of us," she said. "I don't know how many teachers will be involved, but they are interested in showing their support."

Just who owns the Shiloh Cemetery?

SANFORD — Most Sanford residents and officials know of the Shiloh Cemetery, located at the rear of the City's Evergreen Cemetery on W. 25th Street. No one however, knows who owns the property.

Sanford Parks and Recreation Director Mike Kirby, who is also in charge of cemetery operations commented, "People keep asking us why we don't do something about the Shiloh Cemetery. The problem is," he added, "we don't know if it's ours to control."

City Manager Bill Simmons agreed. "The city has no records or deed to show that we own or have control over the property. We don't even know if it has been annexed into the city."

He commented, "We have always thought it being located in the county, but the county says it's within the City of Sanford. Yet, neither of us can prove it."

"If it was indeed annexed," Simmons said. "The next question is, who signed the annexation papers, and where are they?"

Seminole County Property Appraiser Bill Suber said, "According to our records, it is owned by the First Shiloh Missionary Baptist Church." He added, "But being a cemetery, it is tax exempt, so there is no one we have listed who might pay taxes on the land."

The Rev. Harry D. Rucker of the First Shiloh Missionary Baptist Church says it's all a matter of confusion. "They're not really talking about the Shiloh Cemetery," he said. "The church owns that. What they really mean are the many individual grave yards owned by a number of different families." He added he was referring to small yards, not sites.

The Rev. Rucker explained, "The land that is the real Shiloh Cemetery was given to the church back in 1965 or 66 by a social club called Friendship and Union Society, who found they were unable to continue operating the cemetery."

Rucker added, "What the city is looking into, I think they will find, is really known as the Pace/Jackson Cemetery, not the true Shiloh Cemetery."

Seminole County Sheriff's spokesman George Prochel said, "It's definitely in the county's jurisdiction, and the sheriff's office takes care of all calls out there, whenever they are reported."

Sanford Police Chief Steve Harriett said, "Based on our maps, we consider the area as

being on non-city limits, and rely on the sheriff's department for law enforcement out there."

Several weeks ago, City Attorney Bill Colbert was asked to conduct a title search on the property. In the hope of determining the present ownership.

Simmons said, "If Mr. Colbert finds that the city actually does own the property, we will probably take immediate steps toward either maintaining it, or transferring it to someone who would take care of the area."

Simmons said he could not even verify the exact size of the Shiloh Cemetery. "The problem that has happened," he said, "is that people are being buried out there without any official approval or plot locations, and we have no idea of how many people may be buried out there." He added, "Every time we go out there, we see a new grave site has been added."

Simmons commented, "I hope whoever is doing this is someone licensed to handle legal burials."

During this past Monday's Sanford City Commission meeting, Colbert explained that the process of determining the ownership has been lengthy and complicated. "We've looked into records as far away as some cities up north," he said, "and we are still looking into more."

Rebuilding

More than \$1 billion. That's the price tag put on the reconstruction job necessary in Los Angeles following the citizens' rampage. Peter Ueberroth, chosen by Mayor Tom Bradley to head the rebuilding effort doesn't know where the money will come from, other than he thinks it should be a mixture of public and private funds.

The emphasis should be on private. Even if a city, state or federal governments had an extra \$1 billion to spare, the rebuilding of Los Angeles should still be primarily a community responsibility. The destruction last week was not an act of God or of war. It was not caused by hurricane, earthquake or foreign invasion.

The causes of the problem are rooted in Los Angeles, primarily in relations among ethnic groups and in relations between the police and the population.

Underlying it all is the failure of the welfare system to give the underclass the motivation and opportunity to escape their lives of deprivation.

In terms of public resources for the physical rebuilding, the riots couldn't have come at a worse time. The city of Los Angeles has a deficit close to \$200 million this year; California's state government raised taxes to close this year's budget deficit and faces another deficit next year; the federal government is \$400 billion in the red this year.

Ueberroth is the right man for this job. The man who made the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics a financial success, largely through private fundraising, today faces a new kind of challenge. The task in 1992 is not to renovate the city's sports facilities, but to renovate whole city blocks, leveled as though hit by waves of B-52s.

The people of Los Angeles can do it. As the smoke cleared and the embers died, they came out with brooms and buckets to start the cleanup. Just as they are showing their heart in cleaning up the mess, they will show it in rebuilding, though the job facing them is daunting.

It is a task for citizens at every level. Los Angeles is the nation's largest manufacturing center which means the corporate community has a large stake in reconstruction. But so do small businesses and private citizens. If Los Angeles is to remain a thriving center of manufacturing, the service industry, entertainment and tourism, each resident has a role to play in rebuilding.

Ueberroth, who recently completed a somber report about California's economy, knows the limitations of local government. The Bush administration has offered \$600 million in federal aid, primarily from the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the Small Business Administration, which, in the circumstances, sounds like election-year generosity.

Rebuilding Los Angeles today will not be as easy as in 1965, following the Watts riots, which didn't do as much damage. If the tab reaches more than \$1 billion, the city may need to explore creative ways of financing, such as a temporary sales tax, like those sometimes used to finance highways or sports facilities.

The bad news is that the hangover from its terrible binge is just beginning and is going to hurt. The good news is that the organism is fundamentally healthy, has formidable resources and convalescence shouldn't take too long.

Roots of the permanent underclass

If there's one thing almost everybody agrees on concerning the Los Angeles riots, it is that there must be no attempt to fix the blame for them. President Bush says so, because he must appear statesmanlike and above such mundane considerations as politics. The Democrats and their liberal allies in the media say so, because they are rightly terrified of what any serious discussion of the responsibility for this disaster would do to their reputations and their policies.

Yet if we are not permitted to examine the true roots of this tragedy, we will learn nothing from it. Must nearly 60 people die, and 3,000 be injured, and almost a billion dollars' worth of property damage be done, without this country learning anything from the experience because we are too tactful to suggest that anybody was responsible for the policies that led to it?

Besides, it's only fair to credit them with the best of intentions. But what keeps today's liberal Democrats from acknowledging the historical truth is the fact that they are still wedded, albeit rather uncomfortably, to those disastrous policies of the 1960s.

Say that to a liberal apologist, however — Mark Shields, for example — and he will instantly go into the old broken-wing trick, leading you on a

diligent hunt for the errant policies while craftily luring you away from the truth.

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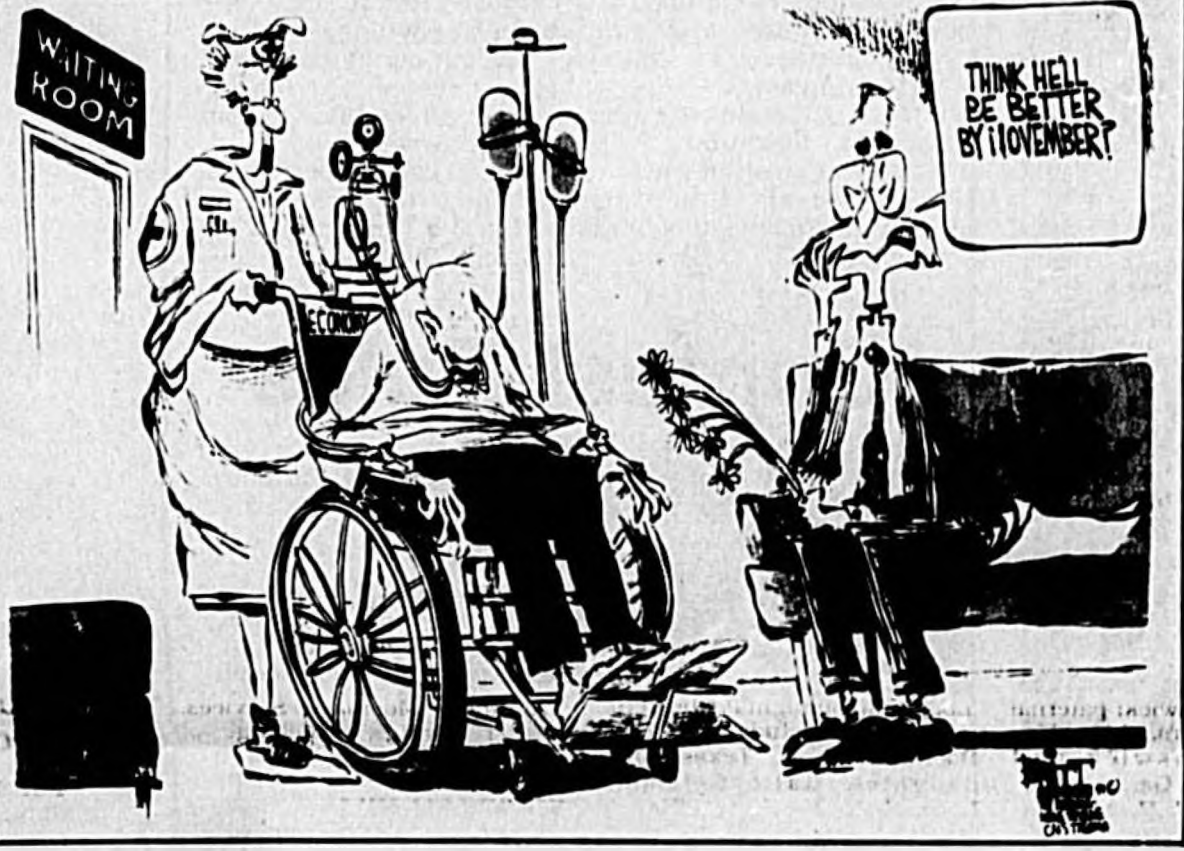

I can think of only one group that did: the powerful black Congressmen and their patronage appointees in the welfare agencies, through whose hands the money trickled down to the needy, converting the latter into a permanently dependent underclass.

A primer for handling leaks

I am sorely disappointed in Peter E. Fleming and the United States Senate. Since last fall, they've been promising us a blazing shootout at the congressional corral, but when they get to the point where the guns are drawn and the lead is about to fly — all we get are a couple of fizzes and a plop.

We ought to sue them for nonfeasance or something.

Surely you recall the name Peter E. Fleming. He's the New York lawyer hired by the Senate to unearth the fiends who leaked Anita Hill's charges that she had been sexually harassed by Supreme Court nominee, now Justice, Clarence Thomas.

Oh, the Republicans were so upset. We want a Leak Probe, they said. OK, responded the opposition, but only if we get a Leak Probe, too. We want to disinter the dogs who leaked all that foul stuff about the ethics investigation of the Democratic senators who did favors for S&L swindler Charles Keating.

And so Peter E. Fleming was brought aboard. He hired a staff of investigators, interviewed 200 people, pored over who-knows-how-many documents, subpoenaed four reporters and demanded their sources (which they did not give him), spent several hundred thousand dollars — and a few days ago filed a 171-page report that said he had found nothing.

After all that ballyhoo and threats of a constitutional showdown, we get nothing. We ought to demand our money back.

Truth is, it would be a waste of time. You see, there's a rule in the secret Leak Probe Manual used by public officials which says: "It is not expected that Leak Probers will actually find leakers. Leak Probers are expected to flutter about and make noise, sparing no expense, until public anger subsides. They are then to report no progress and close the case."

Here are just a few of the other rules in the manual:

1. "The more vital it is for the public to know something, the more fierce should be the reaction when it is leaked."

When The New York Times disclosed in 1969 that the United States was secretly bombing Cambodia, for example, Richard Nixon and Henry Kissinger inveigled FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover into installing wiretaps on the telephones of 17 people, including seven members of Kissinger's staff.

In response to the famous Pentagon Papers leak, Nixon and his minions set up the White House plumbers team, which enjoyed a short but merry career of plugging leaks through various means, legal and illegal.

When journalist Daniel Schorr obtained a

secret congressional report in 1976 on the sins of the CIA, the House Ethics Committee — which had never investigated a congressman — launched a seven-month probe of the leak. The Ford administration also proposed fines and jail terms for anyone who leaked intelligence information.

2. "Charges of 'leaking' are wonderful diversionary tools and are most effectively employed with a great display of honking and the flapping of wings."

The show put on by the senators at the Thomas hearings are a good example. They were caught redhanded sitting on an explosive bit of news but managed to put off public examination of their indiscretion by appointing Fleming and publishing his non-findings half a year later.

When Spiro Agnew was caught taking kickbacks and payoffs from contractors, he vehemently denounced the leaks, then served subpoenas on nine reporters to force them to reveal their sources. The confrontation was averted only by his resignation.

3. "Where possible, Leak Probers should be people who don't mind looking or sounding foolish."

White House plumber E. Howard Hunt was given to wearing ridiculous-looking wigs and using voice modulators.

In his official non-findings, Peter Fleming imparted a timeworn truism:

"The media views leaking from a different perspective. It may be fairly said the American media is addicted to leaks. It argues that leaks are essential to fulfilling its obligation as a public watchdog."

Col. J.V. Brennan: true propagandist

It was the springtime of our discontent, 1970, and America was tearing itself apart. President Nixon had just announced that he'd sent troops into Cambodia, widening a war we wouldn't win — and ripping new wounds at home that would take a generation to heal.

And in the White House, an eager-to-please military aide, Marine Col. Jack V. Brennan, sent a memo to Nixon's secretary, Rose Mary Woods — ostensibly for posterity, but knowing it would reach The Boss.

We've now come to see Brennan as a networker in a lucrative 1984 deal to supply Saddam Hussein's troops with new uniforms — a deal studded with disgraceful middlemen: Spiro Agnew, John Mitchell, Nixon and Romania's communist dictator Nicolae Ceausescu. We'll get to all that — but first, a look at a young networker perfecting his craft:

"May 4, 1970
 TO: Rose Woods
 FROM: J.V. Brennan



Nixon emphasized the point by punching the air.

"On the day following the president's historic speech ... I had the privilege of being in his company for most of the afternoon. I was so moved by the spirit, determination, dedication and patriotism which he conveyed that I feel obliged to record the mood for history. May I humbly submit this:"

There followed nine paragraphs — part sycophancy, part pop-psych novella — about a ride on the presidential yacht, Sequoia, with Nixon, wife Pat, daughter Julie and David Eisenhower, and presidential pal C.G. "Bebe" Rebozo. Mainly, it was about Nixon's repeated obsession with a special ceremony he wanted when they passed Mount Vernon: "He told me he wanted the National Anthem 'blasted out.' He wanted it to be heard! He emphasized this point by punching the air with his closed fist."

The memo notes Nixon effected a "deliberately gruff" voice to ask: "As a Marine, do you approve of what I said last night?" Brennan called the speech "one of the proudest moments of my life," adding: "I only wish I were over there to help carry out what you've ordered."

Nixon responded: "I do, too. I think I'll reign and we'll go together." Eventually, they did — they went to Nixon's Elba in San Clemente; Brennan was his chief of staff.

In 1980, Brennan left Nixon to join convicted Watergate John Mitchell, Nixon's ex-attorney general, at his consulting firm, Global Research. There he got involved in the deal to sell Saddam's troops uniforms. Details were revealed recently in D.C.'s Superior Court, and reported by The Washington Post: Brennan, who succeeded the late Mitchell as Global's president, sued to recover uncollected commissions on two contracts totaling \$181 million.

Initially, a European-based company, Pan East, heard Iraq wanted to buy uniforms. Needing someone with connections in Baghdad, Pan East contacted Agnew, Nixon's vice president, who resigned without contesting evidence that he took kickbacks. Agnew's consulting firm referred Pan East to Mitchell — and collected \$797,000 in commissions.

Today, Brennan knows better than to quit his new day job — one most Washington insiders don't even know he has. His new business address: 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue. His title: director of administrative operations in the Bush White House. It's strictly a non-policy job, Bush's press office says. Unless, of course, Jack Brennan chooses to humbly submit a memo or two, just for posterity.

campaign finance laws by making nearly \$83,000 to two firms owned by Randy Morris, who was paid as Sturm's advertising consultant.

Sawyer contended the payments should have been made directly to the television stations and sign makers that provided the goods and services.

Sawyer, who supported Morris's 1990 mayoral opponent Jim Lormann, said she made the complaint to assure public officials follow the law.

"If Mr. Sturm decides to run again, he needs to clean his act up," said Sawyer. "Mr. Sturm has said he would do it again. That, to me, is an elitist attitude."

Jeff Richardson, elections attorney, said the election law requiring campaign payments to be made directly to the end recipient was "open to interpretation." Richardson stated confidentiality rules and declined to comment specifically on Sturm's case.

"There is a question of applicability here," said Richardson. "But it behooves them to be sure."

According to Sturm's 1990 campaign finance reports, a total of \$67,651 was paid to Morris's two firms, Image Engineering and Morris and Associates, prior to the October 2, 1990 primary

run-off. Of that amount, Sturm indicated in his finance reports that \$5,000 was paid to the two firms for "consultant services" or "consultant retainer."

Another \$62,651 in payments were made to the two firms for other designated purposes. A \$9,425 payment was reported made to Image Engineering on Aug. 1, 1990 for "C.V. - T.V. time and production." On Aug. 29, Morris and Associates was paid \$13,514 for "materials, labeling and postage."

Morris said it is standard advertising agency practice to make payments to the agency for television time and other goods and services obtained by the agency for the client. Sturm said the vendors that provided the services were hired by Morris's firm, not his campaign.

Morris said he and Sturm discussed which vendors would be used and some recommendations came from Sturm.

In a April 21, 1992 letter provided by Sawyer, Richardson wrote that following a preliminary investigation, the division concluded "there is probable cause to believe that a willful violation... has occurred."

The letter also states the matter would be forwarded to the Elections Commission for review.

Sturm said he has not been notified of a hearing.

Astronauts rescue satellite

CAPE CANAVERAL — Endeavour's astronauts released a communications satellite early today after a historic three-man spacewalk that rescued both the \$157 million craft and NASA's can-do reputation.

The astronauts grabbed the satellite by hand in unison Wednesday, held it in place for 1 1/2 hours and spent several hours more attaching a rocket designed to lift it out of the uselessly low orbit in which it was stuck for two years.

The rocket was to be fired this afternoon when the shuttle was thousands of miles away. The Intelsat-6 satellite was to be sent to a working orbit 22,300 miles high.

NASA today said Endeavour would remain in space until Saturday — for a total of nine days — to give the crew an extra day of rest.

The mission had already been extended one day to accommodate the rescue effort after two failed earlier attempts. In which a single astronaut tried to snare the satellite with a 15-foot bar instead of his gloved hands.

today, a shuttle record, to test construction techniques for a space station.

Intelsat, the international communications consortium, said it expected to have the satellite's 120,000 telephone circuits up and running in time for the Olympics in July.

"I think we have seen some incredible work by some awfully brave men at NASA," said Irving Goldstein, Intelsat chief executive. "This means that we are out of the woods."

A miswired rocket had left the satellite in the wrong orbit. Wednesday's spacewalk — the first by three people — was the last chance for Endeavour to retrieve the satellite. The shuttle did not have enough fuel for a fourth try.

The astronauts risked puncturing their spacesuits, which could be fatal in the vacuum of space. And if they had caused the 12-by-17-foot, 4 1/2-ton satellite to wob-

ble, it could have smashed into the shuttle.

They finally caught the craft by waiting, arms raised, on cargo bay platforms until it was within reach. Three pairs of gloved hands, 225 miles above the Pacific Ocean near Hawaii, gripped Intelsat at its base.

"Got it!" shouted Pierre Thuot.

At Mission Control in Houston, flight controllers applauded.

"Houston, I think we got a satellite," said commander Dan Brandenstein, whose precision steering put Endeavour only a few feet below the Intelsat as it whizzed around Earth at 17,500 mph.

After they grabbed it, the astronauts held the drum-shaped satellite steady for 80 minutes, one full orbit of Earth. Then, with Akers keeping both hands on, Hieb and Thuot attached a bar that allowed the satellite to be grappled by the shuttle crane. The crane lowered it to the rocket and it was bolted on.

Later, it took several tries to release the satellite-rocket combination, but Intelsat ultimately floated away slowly over the Pacific.

"You've made the agency proud today," Mission Control told the astronauts.

Insurers: Decrease car rates

TALLAHASSEE — Some of the state's largest automobile insurers have asked regulators to let them decrease their premiums. Industry executives cite fewer accidents as the reason.

Last year, automobile insurance rates in Florida rose 3.5 percent, down from increases of 5.3 percent in 1990 and 6.4 percent in 1989.

Industry executives say fewer people are traveling because of the recession. They also cite increased technology such as air bags that have made driving safer.

The state's largest insurer, State Farm Mutual, had a slight decrease in its rates approved by the state Department of Insurance in March. State Farm, which insure 1.67 million cars in Florida, lowered its average rates by \$2 a year, from \$616 to \$614.

"We've experienced a reduction in claims," said Ron Koepf, assistant regional personnel manager for Nationwide Mutual, an Ohio-based company with its Florida operations based in Gainesville.

Nationwide, the state's fifth-largest auto insurer, has filed for a 1 percent decrease in the rates it charges 212,000 Florida drivers. This would be the company's second decrease — it reduced rates 3.9 percent in August — in the last 12 months and third in four years.

The company's average annual premium would decrease from \$632 to \$622 if it is approved.

Government Employees Insurance Co., or GEICO, also has a pending rate decrease before regulators. The insurer, the third largest in Florida, wants to decrease its rates for 343,000 cars by 0.4 percent. That's about \$2 a year.

"Obviously, that's good news for consumers," said Dave Pushman, regional vice president for GEICO's office in Macon, Ga., which handles the Florida market for the Washington, D.C., company. "Overall, accidents are down a bit."

Federal court backs off in redistricting

TALLAHASSEE — A trio of federal judges is loosening its grip on Florida's legislative redistricting plans following their approval by the state Supreme Court.

"It's time now for the federal court to recognize we have a validly adopted plan," said House Reapportionment Committee Chairman Peter Rudy Wallace, D-St. Petersburg. "At this point, the federal judges should not be involved in drawing plans."

A few hours after the Florida court ruled 6-1 Wednesday in favor of the plan crafted by Democratic leaders, the three-judge federal panel canceled its scheduled hearings on how to draw its own legislative plan.

U.S. Circuit Judge Joseph W. Hatchett said the panel would consider May 27 whether it should do anything further on the legislative districts. The panel retained control of crafting the 23 congressional districts, which it intends to adopt May 29.

Because the state Supreme Court agreed to conduct a full-fledged hearing on any new Voting Rights Act challenges that the legislative plan fails to give blacks and Hispanics sufficient seats, Democrats say further federal review of those plans is unnecessary.

Reducing dangerous cholesterol levels



MEDICINE

PETER GOTT, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm beside myself trying to do what is right. My cholesterol level was 489 about two years ago. Questran and Lopid were taken to no avail. Mevacor brought it down to 285 for a year, so the doctor doubled my dose of Mevacor and Questran. My last results reveal a level of 400. Can stress be doing this? I've resorted to vitamin C and niacin and a weight-watcher's diet, but I'm very discouraged.

DEAR READER: You seem to have a serious problem with excess cholesterol. You probably inherited this tendency. Unfortunately, you have not responded satisfactorily to the standard treatment for this disorder: diet and medication.

Medical authorities recommend serum cholesterol levels of 200 milligrams per deciliter or lower, depending on age. Yours is clearly too high. This places you at risk for heart disease and stroke.

Fortunately, there are many drugs to lower cholesterol. Some of these are brand new. Ask your doctor about this. If she is uncertain how to proceed or has run out of options, request a referral to a metabolic laboratory in a teaching hospital. The nature of your elevated cholesterol needs to be identified and categorized. Then metabolic specialists can prescribe appropriate therapy.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 67-year-old female diagnosed with morphea. What is it? Is it life-threatening, and how can it be treated?

DEAR READER: Morphea is an unusual skin condition in which part of the skin itself and, sometimes, the underlying tissue are replaced with scar, leading to white or pinkish patches, bands or lines. The cause is unknown and there is no treatment.

Some experts believe that morphea is a form of (or related

to) scleroderma, a disease marked by the appearance of scar-like tissue in areas of the skin, joints, intestinal tract, lungs, heart and kidneys.

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WIN AT BRIDGE

Last year at the Sunday Times tournament in London, the World Women's Pairs and Teams champions from the United States, Karen McCallum and Kerri Shuman, were slated to play. However, Shuman had to withdraw at the last moment, so McCallum teamed up with Sally Horton, a World Women's Teams champion from Britain. For this year's event, also sponsored by the Macallan Malt Whisky Company, McCallum and Horton revived their partnership. Lack of practice worked against them in such a strong field, but Horton played today's hand perfectly.

Horton opened with the maximum pre-empt, five clubs. In response, McCallum decided that they were unlikely to make exactly 11 tricks. Either the hands would fit well and they would make a slam, or they

would fit badly and not even make a game. This made the six-club bid logical.

West, trying to find a safe lead, opened with the spade seven. Declarer ruffed and cashed the club ace. Needing to find the diamond queen for her contract, Horton embarked on a journey of discovery. She played a heart to dummy's ace, ruffed a spade in hand, ruffed the heart jack in the dummy and ruffed another spade in hand. West, realizing he would be endplayed if he overruffed, discarded a heart. But declarer exited with a trump.

Now West could lead a heart safely as dummy was out of trumps, but when East discarded, the hand had counted out. West was known to have begun with 2-8-1-2 distribution. Horton ruffed West's heart, played a diamond to dummy's

ace and finessed the diamond 10 for her contract.
