U.S. Attacks Russia's Plan For Disarming

Senator Connally Declares Russia Bans Atom Bomb But Retains Other Arms

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Dec. 2.—(AP)—The United States today attacked the disarmament program which Russia has proposed for the United Nations.

Senator Tom Connally, speaking for the United States, said today the idea of the Russian program seems to be to get rid of the atom bomb and then place all other arms questions under the Security Council where they would be subject to what he called the "atom bomb of the veto."

The Soviet proposal, said Connally, is "too narrow and too circumscribed."

The Texas Senator said the Russian program, while emphasizing that the A-bomb must be outlawed, makes no mention of jet-propelled weapons or poison gas.

"We think a man dead of poison gas is just as dead as if he were struck by an atomic bomb."

Connally said Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov had accepted the principles of international inspection and control. He then asked:

"How can there be international control if any member of the Security Council can rise in his seat and veto inspection?"

"That is not international control," said the Texas Senator. "That is individual control. We insist that the veto must not apply on inspection and control."

Connally said the United States insists that measures of control must be "effective," and pointing the table he added, "that means effective."

Market Director Coleman Named As Head Of Civic Music Association

Formation of a Seminole County Music Association, the purpose of which is to sponsor a series of concerts by nationally known singers and instrumentalists, set under way Friday evening at the Tourist Center at a meeting of musically minded citizens.

William L. Wilson, Director of Florida State Farmer's Markets, today named Coleman as head of the association.

Plans for enrollment of membership in the Association were made, and Dec. 6 to 12 was set as the time for the enrollment drive. Concerts are planned to take place at the Seminole High School auditorium after Jan. 1 and through the winter season. Similar programs are being planned in Orlando, Daytona Beach, Jacksonville and other Florida cities, according to Miss Katherine Brock, field representative of Civic Council Service of New York, who met with the association's board of directors at the point where this sort of musical program should be carefully anticipated, said Mr. Coleman today.

"There are many people throughout the county, young and old, who enjoy fine music, and this series of concerts offers the opportunity of seeing and hearing nationally known artists."

The Civic Music Association operates on a closed membership basis 51 weeks of the year. On the 52nd week, the membership privilege is thrown open at which time the \$5.00 dues are payable by adults. 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Grand Jury To Probe Slaying Of 4 Negroes

Evidence Uncovered May Be Given To State For Action

United States District Judge P. Hoyt Davis made his charge to a 24 man grand jury called this morning in Georgia to investigate the slaying of four negroes near Monroe, Ga., last July 25. The jury, composed predominantly of farmers with two negro members, heard Judge Davis make only indirect reference to the massacre at Apalachee Bridge in calling on them to probe for violation of federal laws.

Judge Davis pointed out "the federal court has no jurisdiction over the offense of murder unless the crime is committed on a federal reservation, or on the high seas or in certain situations where federal officers are killed in line of duty."

He did commit the jury, if it found evidence of violation of law that does not fall under federal jurisdiction, to furnish evidence to state officials.

Judge Davis reminded the jury that in considering the offense where the major violation might fall within jurisdiction of the state courts there still might be violation of certain United States criminal statutes. This is the closest he came to making reference to violation of federal laws which must be the basis of federal prosecution in lynching.

Some 100 witnesses have been subpoenaed by the government to appear before the grand jury. Central figure in the case is 60-year-old J. Garrison, planter and one-time wholesaler, who reported that a mob of about 20 armed men stopped him at a bridge east of Monroe at dusk on July 25 and took two negroes and their wives from the car. One of the victims, Roger Malcolm, had been released that day in Garrison's custody pending trial for stabbing a white man.

Utmost secrecy shrouds the government's case which has been four months in preparation. The instance of President Truman, it is assumed that evidence gathered by a score of special FBI investigators in questioning 2500 witnesses will be made available to the jury.

Gov. Ellis Arnall, who said that he would not reveal the names of several of the mob members are known, but added that it was difficult to get evidence necessary for conviction.

He is survived by the widow, Mrs. J. W. Newell of Sanford; one sister, Mrs. Joseph Hearden of Ft. Pierce; one brother, Eugene Newell of Birmingham, Ala.; one nephew, John W. Hland of Vineland and several other nieces and nephews.

Funeral arrangements, in charge of the Erickson Funeral Home, will be announced later.

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J. C. Petrillo Case Is Dismissed By Court

CHICAGO, Dec. 2. (AP)—A federal court judge today dismissed government charges against the president of the American Federation of Labor, James C. Petrillo. The union leader had been charged with violating the Lee Act. Judge Walter J. La Buy ruled that the act is unconstitutional.

The complaint against Petrillo was that he had violated the Lee Act by calling a strike at a Chicago radio station in support of a demand for hiring additional musicians. The station contended that additional employees were not needed.

The Lee Act was passed by Congress to prohibit compelling or attempting to compel broadcasters to hire more employees than are needed to perform actual services.

LORES LINEL SUIT
LONDON, Dec. 2.—(AP)—A former chairman of the British Labor Party, Harold Laski, today lost a libel suit against a weekly newspaper. The paper quoted Laski as saying Labor might have resorted to revolution by violence. After deliberating 40 minutes, the jury decided in favor of the newspaper.

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Goldsborough Holds News Reel Quoting Mine Chief Is Not Legal As Evidence

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough announced this afternoon that the court itself will present evidence tomorrow in the contempt trial of Mine Workers' Chief John L. Lewis. Goldsborough said that the evidence would tend to show that the United Mine Workers' leader did not obey a restraining order in the soft coal dispute.

Goldsborough said that if the testimony establishes that fact, it would tend to leave Lewis and the Mine Workers' Union "in the technical position of a contempt of court."

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough refused this afternoon to admit a news reel record in the contempt trial of Mine Workers' Chief John L. Lewis. In the news reel Lewis purportedly said that last Spring's coal argument would last as long as the government operated the soft coal mines.

Judge Goldsborough ruled, however, that the statement may be admitted in the trial if he finds that the government attempted to raise the news reel recording as evidence in the Lewis trial.

The chief government attorney, John Sumner, explained to the court he wished to enter the news reel as proof of what he termed "willfulness" by Lewis in declaring the contract terminated last month.

Meanwhile, Interior Secretary Eric DeLoach said that within the next few days the government will move to force the coal shortage, but King does not believe the "big" coal strike will occur.

The prize has often gone to internationally famous writers like W. B. Yeats, Rabindranath Tagore, Luigi Pirandello, Knut Hamsun and our own Eugene O'Neill. Other awards have gone to authors who even after the honor brought them to attention, remained unnoticed...

Of course the fact that Hesse and the other winners are unknown to most Americans may reflect on us rather than on the authors.

WASHINGTON LETTER

By JEAN EADS WASHINGTON. (AP)—Modest, merry-eyed Robert Brennan, the Irish Minister to the United States, is unable to describe the matching medals which he and his wife proudly pin on for fancy affairs...

The medals had been awarded to them both for the same services—their part in the Rebellion of 1916 and the War of Independence 1916-1922.

Mrs. Brennan, the minister explained, is now visiting in Ireland after accompanying their son, Robert Patrick, 18, to their native land to enter Trinity College.

Pettie, somewhat retiring Mrs. Brennan was a little surprised when she first learned she had been awarded the medals, although she is considered as much of a heroine in her country as is her husband at home.

It was she who hoisted the flag of the Irish Republic after the siege of Enniscorthy during Easter week of 1916. She nursed the wounded and fed the hungry. Later she assisted in transferring of arms, and housing the publicity department of the Irish Republican Government.

Brennan has been a journalist off and on since 1900 until he became Minister of Ireland to this country in 1938. He was director of publicity for the Sinn Feiners from 1916 to 1921.

Around about 1929 he had two plays produced in Dublin, one in the famous Abbey theater. His last play was called the "Bystander" and was based on a prison theme. It went very well, he says.

He seems to feel that he got his most famous of the second production—a farce called "Goodnight, Mr. O'Donnell," written especially for the famous Dublin comedian, Jimmy O'Dea.

The Brennans have three daughters, named after the ancient Irish queens. There's Elmer, the eldest, who is married to Svend Yort, who was born in Denmark and now is associated with the Washington telephone company.

There's Maeve, associate editor of Harper's Junior Bazaar in New York and there's Delirdre, the youngest, married to Gilbert Jerold, in Washington with the French Purchasing Commission.

Some of the most colorful of the new war stamps to come out of Europe are those of Romania, whose recent issues publicize a wide range of subjects.

One of the latest series of stamps to come from the Balkan nation consists of five bi-colored semi-postals using such subjects as agriculture, sports, science and industry to symbolize its post-war renaissance.

Each of the stamps has a colored border with a design in another color set in the center of a white background. A 10-plus-100-iel has a brown border with a central design of wheat in the orange.

Three trackmen leaping over hurdles are pictured on a 10-plus-200-iel green and brown value which bears a souvenir sheet inscription: "Through Sports Towards a Healthy Life."

A workman with a hammer over his shoulder is pictured against a background of a factory on an 80-plus-300 brown and purple design. "For a Free and Happy Romania" on the souvenir sheet.

Two airmail stamps of the same series are a 200-iel blue with green border which pictures a two-motor plane at an airport, and a 500-iel blue and orange border portraying the profile of a pilot against a sky in which three planes are visible.

Earlier Romanian issues include five postage and two semi-postal stamps marking the 25th anniversary of the Romanian Philharmonic Orchestra and featuring the picture of George Enescu, noted Romanian composer and conductor.

Another set, issued to celebrate Labor Day last May, portrays workers in white silhouettes.

LEWIS AND MINE WORKERS FOUND GUILTY

Entire City Is Bottled Up By General Strike

Transportation System In Oakland Is Tied Up As Operators Stay Off Jobs

OAKLAND, Calif., Dec. 3.—(AP)—A general strike went into effect in Oakland this morning at 8 A. M., Eastern Time and its impact was immediately apparent. Commuter trains stopped running—trains that normally carry 120,000 Oakland people across the bay to their jobs in San Francisco. Trolley cars in Oakland remained in their barns. And an immediate tie-up of transportation and industry for one million East Bay residents was threatened.

The general strike was called by the A. F. of L. It resulted from strikes at two department stores, where the A. F. of L. retail clerks union is seeking contracts. All unions belonging to the A. F. of L. are taking part in the general strike, and other unions, including the CIO, are respecting picket lines.

Pickets were out this morning at factories, stores, newspaper plants, restaurants and even at bars in Oakland. Alarmed city officials made hurried plans for a disaster relief program, and talked about getting citizens to volunteer to bring in food and other necessities of living.

Crash Of French Transport Plane Kills 12 Persons

DELOFT, France, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Twelve bodies have been recovered from the charred wreckage of a plane that crashed in the eastern slope of the Ballon D'Alsace peak in the Vosges mountains yesterday.

French authorities say the plane is believed to have been a military transport on a flight from Germany.

The wreckage was burned so badly that the searching party was unable to make positive identification of it. Neither could they identify any of the victims.

The crash is believed to have occurred when the plane was caught in a storm while flying over the mountains.

The accident was reported by a motorcyclist riding along a mountain road through the storm. He saw flames and located the wreckage at the edge of a chasm.

Members of the party that brought out the first of four bodies and a child's shoe, women's clothing and German occupation money was found strewn about the wreckage.

Labor Meets New Strength In Focus

ATLANTA, Dec. 3. (AP)—Southern Labor leaders said today that employer resistance to organization of workers is stiffening. Both George L. Goetz of the American Federation of Labor and Van A. Blinn of the Congress of Industrial Organization said that employers are less open to union organizers.

Goetz blamed the increased opposition in part on lawyers. He said that there is no field for lawyers in collective bargaining. The A. F. of L. leader explained that certain lawyers, formerly employed by the government, had opened law firms and were instructing employers on how to wriggle through loopholes.

Speaking to 42 union representatives from 14 states, all members of the A. F. of L. Southern Policy Board, Goetz said that during the past year southern membership rose to 2,000,000.

Farmers Market Expects Bigger Produce Demand

The current cold wave sweeping the northern states and middle Atlantic seaboard is expected to stimulate demand for Florida citrus fruit and vegetables and to keep up sales at the Sanford State Farmers Market, said manager H. J. Lehman. Northern states have had a surplus of home-grown vegetables which cold weather may reduce.

Locally, celery growers have been hoping for rain and cooler weather such as the present windy, cold snap. Unseasonably warm dry weather throughout November has reduced quality of celery considerably, according to growers.

First shipments of A. Duda's Zellwood grown celery, and described as fair in quality, have been selling at \$3.00 a crate in the market. Cabbage is still in ample supply and selling for 90 cents to \$1.00 a sack. Green peas are bringing \$3.00 to \$3.25; eggplant, \$2.50; fancy cucumbers, \$6.00 a hamper.

Holiday demand for citrus is fairly good with oranges priced at \$2.50 a crate. Some of the fruit arriving at plants looks pretty green prior to adding color, but the color is expected to add to its natural appearance. Packing is brisk at the Sanford Fruit Company and at nearby fruit companies. Patrick Fruit Co. has a belt conveyor working up to the new freight car loading platform.

Mr. Lehman yesterday contrasted the business activity in the market area at present with that of 12 years ago, when the property on which the market now stands was sold for taxes. Now it is rumored that a small filling station and area at the corner of French Avenue and Thirteenth Street has sold for something like \$15,000.

The metal Quonset Truck Shop, owned by Harry Tooke, and managed by H. B. Odham, is now starting operations and repairs of trucks and cars. Some new equipment, including a grease lift, is still expected. The roundtop structure with its metal siding and bracing and cement floor measures 45 by 120 feet.

Gift products, including tires and accessories will be sold there. It faces French Avenue and is near T. B. Sale committee of the V.V.W.

County Commissioners were today advised by County Engineer M. C. Hagan that the dirt road between the Paola Road and Lake Mary and parallel for a long distance to the Atlantic Coast Line railroad is being graded by County workmen, and that a clay surface will be applied.

County Commissioner James McClelland attested to the bad condition of the road at present, with ruts so deep as to make motoring on it nearly impossible.

The Commission approved the request of J. C. Pearson, Lake Mary resident, to grade a right-of-way on the half mile stretch of road running west along the north shore of Crystal Lake. There are about five residences served by the old, single rutted road and it is impossible for cars to pass each other, he declared. Mr. Pearson is planning to develop a camp for tourists who wish to remain throughout the winter season on the shore of the lake, but said he was deterred from building cottages because he was unable to secure priorities.

Engineer Hagan reported that the Cassidy ditch, running south from a point near the County Farm to Lake Jessup, had been dug by the State. Convict labor, using picks and shovels, did the job. The ditch runs about three-eighths of a mile south of Elder Springs and will help in drain farms in that vicinity. Work is ready to be started on repaving and widening the two and a quarter mile stretch of Orange Boulevard which connects Road 48 and Monroe, he announced. The road will be widened from nine to 12 feet and will have a sand road surface.

A. A. Jans and R. L. House requested that a road be run to their property near Lake Harney. Commissioner H. B. Pope protested against the County going to the expense of building roads into private subdivisions. Action is pending on the request of the property owners.

Leaders Meet In London On India Problem

Harmony Sought Between Hostile Factions In India To Prevent Civil War

LONDON, Dec. 3. (AP)—Indian and British leaders today hurriedly sought a basis for harmony among Indian political factions. An agreement is sought before the first meeting of the constituent assembly in New Delhi on Dec. 9. Viceroy Lord Wavell plunged immediately into the conference with British government heads after his two-day plane trip from Karachi. The leaders of India's rival Hindu and Moslem groups will join the discussions and consider British proposals at various times this afternoon.

An India office spokesman frankly conceded that the talks are "rather high-sounding" because of the failure to settle the differences between the Hindus, the Moslems, and the Sikhs might be followed by civil war in India. The British government has only a few days in which to work out plans for the desired pathway of peace to India's independence.

One of the two leaders, Pandit Nehru of the All India Congress Party, was promised return passage to New Delhi by the weekend in return for his agreement to make trip.

The key to peace may lie in a scheduled talk tomorrow between Prime Minister Clement Attlee and Mohamed Ali Jinnah of the Moslem League. Jinnah, 57, has kept open the breach between the Moslems and the Hindus by refusing to join the constituent assembly.
