By RAYMOND E. WARE North Orlando had a successful year, according to reports presented at the August council meeting by Charles McIntosh, commissioner of finance. who showed revenue and expenses of the village for the past three years.

which showed the revenue that comes from permits and licenses, the police department, cigarette tax, utility taxes, fran-chises, and miscellaneous. This totaled to \$9,553.74 for the year 1965, \$8,645.39 for 1966, and \$10,-868.38 for 1967. In 1967 approximately 50 per cent of the revenue was from utility taxes. Exhibit two, which followed, listed expenses. It cost the village \$5,769.19 to operate in 1965. \$8,962.35 in 1966 and \$9,337.85 in 1967. The five most outstanding expenses were wages, the pol-

ance, and legal and accounting, in that order. In 1965, \$3,783.55 was left after expenses and in 1966 the village went \$316.96 in the red as a result of this and the fact that operating revenue was down \$907.35 from the preceeding year while expenses were up \$3,193.16.
