TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Oct. 14 (AP)—Gainesville's Purple Hurricane soared to the top in the Northeast Florida High School Conference football game today after banging up two decisive victories in league competition. Statistics Reveal Castoff Is Sparking All-America Circuit

NEW YORK, Oct. 14 (AP)—A shakeup in statistics in the All-America Football Conference today revealed a new aerial star, the Baltimore Colts Wilson (Bud) Schwenk, who cast off from the Cleveland Browns and the Buffalo Bills.

Schwenk completed 15 out of 24 forward pass attempts for 204 yards in the Colts' protested 24-15 loss to the Bills at Buffalo Sunday. This raised his season's total to 82 good out of 149 for 1,024 yards and placed him at the top of the league in attempts, completions and yardage.

As a result of the juggling brought about by Sunday's games, official league figures released today left the 6-foot-2-inch, 200-pound former Washington University (St. Louis) griddler the top survivor of the trio formerly tied for first place among the passers. Urban (Spee) Sanders of the New York Yankees was dropped to fifth place, while Frank Albert of the San Francisco 49ers fell into fourth.

Otto Graham of the Cleveland Browns zoomed from sixth to second. Graham hit 19 out of 29 for 231 yards as the Los Angeles Rams registered their 13-10 upset over the Browns. His season record is 61 completions in 105 attempts for a total of 895 yards.

Schwenk's accurate flipper lifted him to second place in total offense behind Sanders, with 1,217 yards to 1,063 for the Yankee veteran. In the pass receiving department, Mac Spivey, Cleveland end, grabbed eight for 110 yards to take over first spot with 28 for 391 yards.

On the ground, Chet Nutryn of the Buffalo Bills carried 20 times for 99 yards and was coach downs, adding an extra point to retain first place in rushing and climbing from fourth to second in scoring with 43 points. Sanders tallied one six-point to total 48 and keep the lead.

Ben Arajanjan of Los Angeles booted two field goals to beat Cleveland, one for 46 yards being the longest of the season. Harvey Johnson of New York kicked his ninth three-pointer in a row and fourth this year. Joe Vetrano of San Francisco kicked six out

Many Upsets Mar Grid Slate Over Nation Saturday

NEW YORK, Oct. 14 (AP)—With each succeeding Saturday in this dizzy football season, it looks more and more like Fritz Crisler, who turned down the coaching job at California, and Lynn Waldorf, who also will be looking across the field at each other in Pasadena on New Year's day.

When California went looking for a new coach at the end of a 1946 season in which the Golden Bears won only two games, Crisler was the No. 1 choice. But Crisler took one look at his prospective Wolverine roster and decided to stay at Michigan.

Waldorf, who gave up a comfortable position at Northwestern and took the California post on which Crisler turned his back, returned to the Big Nine country last Saturday and sent his now-famous Bears waiting through Wisconsin to the tune of 48-7.

That was the fourth triumph in four starts for California, which now finds six straight Pacific coast conference opponents in its path to the loop championship and its accompanying role as Rose Bowl host.

Michigan, meanwhile, flattened Pittsburgh, 69-0, for its third straight one-sided non-conference win. Crisler's powerful Wolverines also are ready to launch their Big Nine campaign, with six league foes challenging their right to the Rose Bowl bid.

While Michigan and California were winning with ease last week, such other powers as Notre Dame, Texas and Georgia Tech were more or less hard pressed to keep their records clean.

Notre Dame relied on the passing of Johnny Lujack to turn back stubborn Purdue, 22-7. Texas banked chiefly on Bobby Layne's throwing arm for a 34-14 triumph over an Oklahoma team that covered 363 yards on the ground. And Georgia Tech found VMI tough to take, 20-0.

By the luck of the draw, all five major unbeaten and united clubs appear to have smoothed sailing this week as the accent swings more to conference play, with important tests carded in every loop.

Michigan invades Northwestern to open its Big Nine campaign, while Illinois, held to a scoreless tie by Army, moves in against Minnesota, 37-21 conqueror of Northwestern, and Iowa, which tripped Indiana, 27-14, goes to Ohio State in other conference tilts.

Texas plays Arkansas, which was surprised by Baylor, 17-9, at Memphis, with Rice, 33-0 winner over Tulane, at Southern Methodist and Texas Christian at Texas A. and M. in the Southwest Conference.

Vanderbilt, which kept its record clean with a 10-0 conquest of Mississippi, will be at home in the Southeastern Conference to take on a Kentucky team that walloped Georgia, 26-0. Georgia Tech entertains Auburn, 20-14 winner over Florida, and Tennessee goes to Alabama and Mississippi to Tulane in other loop tests.

Wake Forest, surprise 19-7 winner over North Carolina, goes to George Washington in the Southern Conference, which also has North Carolina at William and Mary, Richmond at VMI and Maryland at Duke, which tied Navy, 14-14. Elsewhere in the South

Charlie Justice May Be Forced To Stop College Ball

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 14 (AP)—Disclosure that Charlie Justice once signed a contract with a professional football club left in jeopardy today the future eligibility of the University of North Carolina's star halfback.

Commissioner Bert Ball of the National Football League said Justice signed a contract with the Philadelphia Eagles while he was playing for the Bainbridge (Md.) Naval Training Station, but added that the commissioner's office did not approve the contract.

Under NFL rules, the commissioner's office must approve a contract before it is made valid.

The commissioner reported he wrote Carl Snavely, Coach of the North Carolina Tarheels, that "according to league records" Justice had signed a contract with the Eagles but that the pact "was made void by Commissioner Elmer Layden."

Layden, now affiliated with a boxcar manufacturing concern in Chicago, said that as he recalled the case he voided the agreement

390,000 Bushels Of Apples In New York

AP. Newfeatures
BUFALO, N. Y.—Did you ever think of blaming the weatherman when you hit into a worm while eating an apple?
 You might, with some justification, if that apple came from Western New York, where 15-18,000,000 bushels were grown last year.
 The U. S. Weather Bureau has assumed an added responsibility by teaming with agriculture officers and fruit growers in their battle against insects and diseases that attack fruit.
 Particularly important to growers is information about the weather, Bernard L. Wiggin, meteorologist in charge of the Buffalo weather bureau, says:
 "Trees are like babies—the growers feed them vitamins, hormones and enzymes. Trees mustn't have wet feet—like a baby, they'll die if they do. If the land is like that, they must have the drains in the ground."
 The most critical period is the spraying season, when detailed weather forecasts assume major importance.
 For example, apple scab fungus lives over the winter on the old leaves on the ground. In the spring, it develops spores which are discharged into the air during rain or wet periods. Apple scab infection can be completely inhibited if application of sulphur materials are made just previous to or during a rain.
 Highly specialized weather information is provided daily by the Buffalo weather bureau during the growing season between April and July. A telephone conference is set up with the agricultural agents of six counties.
 Ralph G. Palmer and Arthur G. West, county agents, broadcast their information by radio at 6:30 A. M.
 "If a scab infection is coming we warn how severe the infection is and what can be done to protect the fruit," says Palmer.
 He reports that the growers "couldn't have done much" without the program this year because "wet weather brings more trouble with disease and rains wash off sprays already applied."
 "Correct timing and detailed knowledge and observation daily are essential."
 "If the growers carry out the advice, we know we can late into a peach or an apple with confidence and know we won't bite into a worm."
