The Big Hold-up

In northern Ohio a certain night club has long been a stench in the nostrils of decent citizens. Big-time illegal gambling has not been interfered with. The club had no liquor permit. Did it sell liquor? What do you think?

The other night a spectacular hold-up was staged there. Masked and hooded bandits entered at first mistakes b patrons for part of the floor show. They took \$350,000 from the till, from pockets and jewelry of patrons almost as much, including \$2,000 one man had in foose money. An 82-year-old sheriff got around ten hours or so after the event. What kind of American situation is this?

Any American who earns his money honestly in whatever manner, provides properly for his family and pays his just bills has a right to spend his excess coin as he pleases within the law. The fault is that of the citizens who reads his paper, says, "Aint it awful about that club?" and pays no further heed. He should demand, in his press, on the street corner, and especially at the ballot box, that his officials do the job for which they were hired. They are paid to enforce law. It is up to the citizens whose private opinions add up to public opinion to see that they do: It is also up to citizens to keep within the law them-

The U. S. Weather Bureau has issumed an added responsibility by teaming with agriculture officers and fruit growers in their battle against insacts and diseases

Particularly important to growweather, Bernard L. Wiggin, meeorologist in charge of the Buffale weather bureau savs:

"Trees are like babies the growers feed them vitamins, hormones and enzymens. Trees mustn't have wet feet-like a baby, they'll die if they do. If the land is like that, they must have tile drains in the ground."

The most critical period is the spraying season, when detailed weather forecasts assume major mportance.
For example, apple scab fungus

lives over the winter on the old leaves on the ground. In the pring, it develops special pores which are discharged into the air during rain or wet periods. Apple with infection can be completely inhibited if application of sulphur materials are made just previous to or during a rain.

Highly apecialized, weather information is provided daily by the Bulfalo weather bureau during the growing season between April and July. A telephone conference is set up with the agricultural agents of six






