A change in date and suggested donation for the polio immunization program being sponsored by the South Seminole Jaycees has been announced by Mrs. Hal Gettings, of Deer Lake, publicity chairman. The oral vaccine now is scheduled to be given Nov. 1 and Jan. 6, 11 a.m. until 4 p.m. Vaccine has been obtained at lower than expected costs and suggested donation now is 50 cents. Proceeds will benefit the Edgewood Boys Ranch, Jaycee project for the year.

There will not be any station set up in Orange County this year, Mrs. Gettings reported. Stations in Seminole County will be at Forest City, Altamonte Springs, Seminole Plaza in Casselberry, and in Longwood.

This method of polio immunization, Mrs. Gettings advises, has been approved by Medicare Association and Health Center.

Announcements of the program will be distributed in schools, churches, and business establishments and Orange County residents are urged to visit one of the Seminole County centers to take advantage of the immunization.

Candidates Differ On School Supt. Job



Concern that "we are unable to provide our children with a faculty that is 100 per cent certified" was expressed by Allen F. Keeth, Republican candidate for the School Board, Wednesday.

He appeared with other School Board candidates — Mrs. Jean Bryant, Republican, and incumbent Donald J. Bales and Dr. John Darby, Democrats — before the Sanford Woman's Club.

"Merely spending more money will not provide a better education for our children," Keeth said, "but we must be assured that we are getting the most for our money."

Keeth stated his position that he "favors the minimum of Federal intervention in the operation of our school system and the maximum control over local operations and expenditures must remain in local hands."

He further declared, "I favor an appointed superintendent of schools, appointed by the school board and answerable to it and thus to the people who have elected them."

Mrs. Bryant also agreed that a superintendent should be appointed.

Bales and Darby disagreed with the position, wishing to "keep the choice of a superintendent of public instruction in the hands of the people."

"Please in Mrs. Bryant's platform as reported by her, an open bidding and open board meetings, county-wide kindergarten and expansion of the vocational department, and an expanded remedial reading program."

She further declared, "I believe as Dr. (Louis) Perez has suggested that patriotism and love of country should be emphasized in the curriculum of our schools against communism and the other items that are out to destroy our free country and most of all we need a Mother on the school board."

Darby stated the school board "has under its jurisdiction over 20 teachers with good standing and a junior college staffed in part with personnel with doctor's degrees. None more than ever before we need highly qualified school board members just as we need highly qualified teachers."

Bales stated, "Voters are electing a negative view in elections rather than a positive one. They should investigate the candidates," he said, "and make their views clear to their own and then support the candidate of their choice."

Bales, in stating his qualifications for the office and after explaining the millage structure declared the board is "sorry we had to raise the taxes and relief in the future must come from the state."

"One of the causes of the raise in taxes was 'we were committed to raise teachers' salaries,' he reported.

Strict partisan lines were noted in answer to prepared questions submitted to the nominees.

Mrs. Bryant and Keeth were in favor of students purchasing their own textbooks and eliminating millage elections for schools while Democrats Bales and Darby took the opposing position.

Solon Cites Pollution Problems

Half our tax dollars are wasted due to correcting mistakes we have made by poor planning or no planning.

This is the opinion of Rep. William Reedy of Easton, who spoke to members of the Sanford Kiwanis Club Wednesday afternoon at air and water pollution in Florida.

Reedy said more and better planning is needed and state planning laws are necessary to insure better location of roads, subdivisions, schools and other facilities in order to avoid greater costs later.

"All the way back to the days of Teddy Roosevelt we have been hearing about the mismanagement of our water and air, but little has been done about it and the problem has grown more complex," Reedy declared.

He cited facts showing that in 1960 Floridians used five gallons of water per day per person; that has now increased to 1,500 to 2,000 gallons per day. The individual uses 2,200 tons of water per year compared to 1,200 tons of all other things he uses.

On the subject of trash, Reedy said Americans used two billion tons of toothpaste last year. Qui Nhon.

"The toothpaste is gone, but all these empty tubes are still around somewhere," he declared.

"Florida has used and is using to ninth in the nation, but it is very immature in development and protection of its natural resources."

"Good planning, both state and local, with good zoning backed by political muscle and enforcement of zoning is a must. In the past several months announcements of over \$500 million of new industry coming in to the state have been made. We are talking for granted the protection of our environment and public health."

"We must plan for protection as well as growth," he concluded, "people and recreation. Water."
