Gangs kill two year old boy

COMPTON, Calif. - Semioutomatic gunfire from a speeding car killed a 2-year-old boy, the "pride and Joy" of his single mother and the youngest victim of gang violence this y ar, officials said Sunday.

According to Johnson and other neighbors, Philip Fisher, 2, had toddled out the front door of his family's modest home with his uncle, Rodney Jackson, Just after 9 p.m. Saturday.

Jackson was talking to four other men in front of the house and holding the boy when the burst of gunfire erupted from a speeding car, killing Fisher and wounding five men, Lt. Gary Anderson said.

The quake occurred at 9:06 MST about 140 miles south of Salt Lake City and 16 miles southeast of Salina, and measured 5.4 on the Richter scale, said Karl Newman of the University of Utah Seismological Stations.

The quake was felt in parts of Wyoming. Artzona and Colorado, as well as in Ogden, Utah, about 200 miles to the north.

Woman may have stabbed husband in self-defense

MIDWAY - A 26-year-old Midway woman may have killed her estranged husband early Sunday when trying to defend herself during a beating, Seminole County sheriff's deputies reported today.

The investigation continues. No

arrests have been made.

Wilbert Williams Jr., 27, of Lincoln Lane. Sanford, was found dead with a bleeding chest wound outside 2008 Sipes Ave., Midway, when Seminole County sheriff's deputies arrived at about 3:14 a.m. Sunday. He died as a result of having been stabbed

Shelta Dorinda Williams, of 2004

Sipes Ave., Sanford, is suspected of fatally stabbing Williams, Sgt. Greg-Barnett said. She has not yet been charged, he said, investigators will try to establish if the homicide was in self-defense, Barnett said.

Sheriff's deputies had been valled to Mrs. William's house Saturday because she said her estranged husband had battered her. Williams had already left when deputtes arrived at that time, Barnett sald

Williams apparently returned early Sunday and tried to enter Mrs. William's house.

Sanford plans for possible St. Lucia feast

SANFORD - It's been more than 100 years since this city has thrown a party for a virgin martyr.

A newly-formed group in Sanford wants to celebrate St. Lucia's feast day, just as the Swedish immigrants who helped build the city once did.

The Future of Sanford committee is beginning work for a St. Lucia festival to be downtown in December.

Mayor Bettye Smith created the Future of Sanford committee, a "dream-big think tank" for the exchange of ideas and energies to get community projects underway.

Smith decided the city needed

such a committee before Christmas. Then Kay Bartholomew of Central Florida Regional Hospital approached her with the idea of hosting a St. Lucia festival in the downtown area to stress Sanford's Swedish roots.

The ideas seemed to naturally merge, Smith said. So the two met to discuss their ideas over breakfast in December, then they urged others to share ideas.

A group of 15 met last week to brainstorm. They swapped ideas for projects, and for people to help them out on the committee. Smith hopes to up the numbers to 35 people when she solleits the brainpower of at least 18 civic groups.

Olympic diver Kimball faces up to 22 years

TAMPA - Former Olympic diver Bruce Kimball faces up to 22 years in prison when he is sentenced Monday for drunken driving-manslaughter in the Aug. I death of two young people.

Kimball, 25, will be sentenced by Hillsborough Circuit Judge Harry Lee Coe, before whom he pleaded guilty Jan. 11, the day after a jury was scatcal to hear his trial.

Kimball pleaded guilty, without any sentencing agreement, to two counts of driving under the influencemanslaughter and three counts of DUI resulting in sectous injury.

State sentencing guidelines call for a sentence of 7 to 22 years on the charges

Kimball was free on bond prior to his trial but after pleading guilty was jailed without bond to await sentencing. He has been kept in a one-person call and checked every 15 minutes because his attorneys told Coe before the guilty pleas that they were concerned about his "self-destructive behavior."

The state dropped two counts of manshinghter by culpable negligence which had been filed in case a jury declined to convict Kimball on the DUI

charges Investigators said Kimball, who won a silver medal in platform diving in the 1984 Summer Olympics at Los Angeles. was driving his sports car at 70 to 90 riph when it slammed into a group of young people. The accident occurred at a popular gathering spot along an unlit dead-end stretch of road near Brandon. a bedroom community 12 miles east of

Kumball admitted he had been drinkting earlier in the day and prosecutors sald a blood-alcohol test administered that night recorded 0.02, twice the level

Romance writers promote genre on state-wide jaunt

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - Yesterday was the final stop for a crew peddling their happy endings

The 20 Florida romance writers autographed volume after volume of girl-meets-boy romances with

lust leaping off paperback covers. The group spent the weekend traveling by chartered bus across the state. By proclomation of Governor Bob Martinez, the weekend jaunt was called Romance Writers Days.

"We want people to know this isn't just bodice ripping," publicist Jili Jones said. "We write good love stories. Just like Romeo and Juliet.

The group offered a packet of editorial guidelines established by Harlequin Romance, a major publisher of romance fletion. While the cover letter to the guidelines warms readers, "There is no 'formula' to writing a publishable romance novel," the packet establishes age, sexual experience, setting and length of various lines of novels it publishes.

The guidelines establish that in most novels, the heroine should be inexperienced and naive while the hero is worldly - a re-iteration of traditional double. standards. But that is no reflection of romance writers' ideologies, Maggie Davis said.

Davis, who came up with the idea for the junket. said "I am a feminist. I was a feminist before it was even popular.

Romance novels are kinder to women than contemporary fiction. Davis said. She cited as examples two Sidney Sheldon novels describing self-abortion and violent rape.

"Women don't see sex in an ugly, violent way Men aren't condortable with women writing about sex because we aren't supposed to think about it: they believe it's something they do to women

Publishers of romance fiction require the author's name to be female. Which is why Sydney Clary changed her name to Sara Chance. And that is why Bob and Sharon Bills publish under the name Sara

'Women aren't allowed to write men's adventure fletion; men aren't allowed to write women's romance fiction," Sharon Bills said.

The writing process for romance fletion is vigorous, Brenda Clark of Nakomis said. She and her husband Bob Clark are working on their first novel. Bob Clark comes up with the plot, she said, then she writes the first draft. "Then we fight over every word and See Romance, Page 5A

Odometer fraud in used cars widespread, prosecutor warns

TALLAHASSEE - Widescread odometer fraud means one of every fire used cars sold in Florida may have many more miles on itthan the huyer is led to believe, according to reading state Prosecutor Peter Antonacct

Autonacci said a recent task force in vestigation showed that odometer fraud costs Florida car buyers at least \$215 million a year. A national study says illegally lowering - saidodometer mileage may cost American cost sumers \$4.1 billion annually.

The interesting thing we've found is how simple this is - and how widespread it is Antonacci said

Much of the problem is caused by gross inadequacies" in Florida's title transfer laws. the prosecutor satd.

Florida is known nationally as a 100wash, state where it is easy to obtain a new automobile title that does not reflect important information, including the adopteter

We have a reputation a bad reputation for not doing what needs to be done to preserve the integrity of titles and the odometer reading on those titles. Antonacci-

The problem is most common with care coming off leases. Those cars are purchased and brought to Florida in large numbers where they are transfered to in state dealers. or wholesalers

Three split Lotto jackpot

TALLAHASSEE - Three tickets matched all six of this week's winning Lotto numbers and the lucky players will split an estimated \$9 million Jackpot, Lottery Secretary Rebecca Paul said Sunday

The winning tickets were sold in Port St. Lucie, Pompano Beach, and Hillard, north of Jacksonville in Nassau County.

It is the second consecutive week the Lotto game produced multiple grand prize witners. Last week, cousins from north Florida and a man from Lakeland shared a \$9 million jackpot.

"With double winners last week and triple winners this week. 1989 is starting off, at least, as a year of more large-prize winners." Paul said.

The winning Lotto numbers for Jan 28 are 2, 6, 14, 22, 25 and 40. Next week's jeckpot is estimated. \$9 million. In addition to the three grand prize winners, some 336,000 players won about \$8.9 million in smaller prizes.

-350 players matched five numbers to win \$3,306. -18,394 players matched four numbers to win \$92. -318,674 players matched three numbers to win \$5.

Riots cost Miami, Dade \$2.5 million

MIAMI - The three-day riots in Miami earlier this month will cost the city and Dade County \$2.5 million in unexpected police overtime, vehicle repair and cleanup.

City Managers Cesar Odio said overtime expenses for the Miami Police Department the week of Jan. 15-21 were estimated at \$1.3 million, half the department's overtime budget for the entire year.

That accounts for most of the estimated \$1.5 million the city must find to pay disturbance-related costs, a published report

Odto said during the weekend he has instituted an informal hiring freeze on all city departments except police, fire and sanitation in order to help offset the unexpected bills.

"We have some vacancies throughout the city and we will not be filling those positions." It told city commissioners "Other than that, I don't know where the money will come from. We didn't count on a \$2 million riot.

Odio said he did not know how long the freeze would last or how much he hoped to save.

County Manager Joaquin Avino estimates Metro-Dade's expenses will reach \$1 million, but a cost breakdown won't be available until mid-February.

Metro's largest expense will be the \$500,000 needed to rebuild Liberty Mart, a county-financed convenience store and daycare center that was burned and looted.

The city's overtime costs soared because the entire 1,000-officer force was called in to work 12-hour shifts for four Police also spent about \$80,000 on emergency equipment.

including \$5,992 for radio batteries, \$20,000 for riot gear, \$18,825 for tear gas and \$24,591 for food. The city will also spend between \$30,000 and \$50,000 to repair smashed windows, slashed tires and dents to police cars

and fire trucks, said motor pool supervisor Alex Johnson. Most of the Sanitation Department's \$21,000 bill is for overtime and heavy equipment used to clean up the streets after the nightly barrage of rocks and broken glass, said

Sanitation Director Joseph Ingraham. The county got involved on a large scale for only one night. and is expected to have much less police overtime. County vehicles also suffered much less.

Demonstrators protest Haitian detention

MIAM! - About 300 people gathered outside the Krome Avenue federal detention center Sunday, protesting the imprisonment of Haitians and others who illegally entered the United States, immigration officials said.

Perry Rivkind, district director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, said it was the largest demonstration outside the detention center since the early 1980s. He said it was "polsterous," and there were signs and chants, but protesters gathered legally and were peaceful.

About 100 law enforcers, including INS agents and U.S. Border Patrol officers were on hand to quell any possible disturbances. But when officials asked the protesters to leave when they blocked an entrance for emergency vehicles, they dispersed without incident, Rivkind said. He said there were no

Gerard Jean-Juste, a Haitian activist who attended the demonstration, said support by the U.S. government of the current leaders in Haiti has forced people to flee the country. and they end up unfairly imprisoned in the United States.

"We need power for the Haltian people," Jean-Juste said. "We want the U.S. government to go to the root of the problem. The U.S. government wants to impose criminal Duvalierists on us," he said, referring to the current leaders in Haiti and their ties to deposed dictator Jean-Claude Duvalier.

Scandal tarnishes sheriffs' badges

TALLAHASSEE - Since 1984, one in six Florida sheriffs has been touched by scandal and removed from office by the governor or by dissatisfied voters.

Florida elected 23 new sheriffs last fall. Fourteen of their predecessors sought another term but were turned out of office. often in bitter and negative campaigns. Nine others retired, sought different Jobs or chose not to seek re-election.

"You're not talking about one or two reform' sherths being elected" last year, said Monroe County Sheriff Allison DeFoor, a member of the freshman class.

(of the sheriffs) in the state."

While not a record turnover, the awceping changes raise questions about how well the system is working and whether the sheriffs are too enmeshed in politics to be good law enforcement administrators, the Tampa Tribune reported Sunday.

Since 1984, the Florida De-partment of Law Enforcement has fully investigated more than a dozen sheriffs. Four were Indicted and suspended from office. Three later were acquitted, and one was convicted and sent to federal prison.

While many shertifs insist they become targets of such probes strictly for political reasons, the

have documented serious problems in the operation of some sheriffs offices.

State law gives sheriffs free rein to spend their offices' money without state audits or direction. While some have adopted tight bidding procedures, more than one-third

Under state law, sheriffs aren't required to have even the high school education or training necessary to become certified as a deputy.

Additionally, election practices have raised allegations that some sheriffs are taking advantage of their own deputies to fill

You're talking about one-third majority of the investigations campaign bank accounts that in 1988 neared a half-million dollars in some cases.

Deputies across Florida gave at least \$100,000 to their bosses or favored candidate last year. sometimes amid allegations that they were coerced into contributing or raising funds.

"We've had some things that have no formal purchasing pollhave happened to the sheriff that have been damaging," admitted J.M. "Buddy" Phillips, executive director of the Florida Sheriffs Association.

Shuttle launch delay grows more likely

CAPE CANAVERAL - The possibility of cracks in shuttle engine pumps was debated over the weekend by top NASA managers with the likelihood growing that Discovery's blastoff on the year's first shuttle flight will be delayed into March.

NASA managers held a cross-country teleconference late Saturday, the third anniversary of the Challenger disaster, to discuss whether cracks found in a pump used by a main engine aboard the shuttle Atlantis iast month could develop in those aboard Discovery, currently set for launch Feb. 23.

The meeting broke up about 7 p.m. EST and while no firm decisions were made, a NASA spokeswoman said: "The likelihood of pulling at least two pumps is pretty high."

Another meeting is planned for 5 p.m. Wednesday, the day before Discovery's scheduled trip to launch pad 39B. Among the options under study are hauling Discovery to the launch pad Thursday and replacing two pumps. Under that scenario, Discovery could blast off around March 12.

But if three pumps have to be replaced, launch probably would be delayed until around March 21, which probably would, in turn, delay a high-priority April

NASA wants to avoid such an impact because the flight after Discovery's is devoted to sending a high-priority science probe to Venus, and that flight must get off the ground during a specific "launch window" based on the positions of Earth and Venus.

Discovery had been scheduled to be hau; I will the Vehicle Assembly Building to launch pad 39H at 12:01 a.m. EST Wednesday - three days behind schedule - for final prepara-

But NASA officials said Saturday rollout had to be delayed an additional day because of time needed to fix a tear in rubber insulation around a group of electrical cables.

In any case, the pump issue is NASA's major concern and a final decision on how to proceed is expected to be made before Discovery's rollout.

At issue is the potential for tiny cracks in critical bearing assemblies like those found in pumps used by Atlantis last month during the second post-Challenger launch.

For the pumps currently installed in Discovery's three engines to be cleared for flight. engineers must prove similar cracks will not develop, based on the assembly history of the pumps and other factors difficult proposition.

Experts disagree about UFO reports

GULF BREEZE - Photographs of an eerily lit cylindrical object drifting through the night sky have sparked debate among UFO investigators on whether the small Panhandle town is being visited by unidentified flying objects.

More than 135 residents of Gulf Breeze, population about 6,000, have reported seeing a strange craft hovering in the skies over the past 114 years. the Tampa Tribune reported Sunday.

One prominent resident, who goes only by "Ed" to protect his anonymity, has produced startling photographs of the alleged UFO. Those pictures, which show a cylindrical craft ringed with lights and what may be windows, lie at the heart of a simmering battle between the two major UFO investigating groups.

The Mutual UFO Network, a 20-year-old group of scientists and layman researchers. believes Ed's pictures are real. But the Center for UFO Studies, a non-profit group found by the late astronomer. J. Allen Hynek, does not.

The network cites a 90-page study done by Navy physicist is a hoax," Rodeghier said.

Bruce Maccabee. Maccabee said Ed could not have made such perfect fakes, and that the pictures are real.

"A professional magician would have a difficult time doing this," he said.

Macqubee also cites circumstantial evidence in Ed's favor, including sittings by other people who described UFOs identical to those in Ed's

The center relies on its own researchers and on Robert Nathan of NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory. Nathan. who conceded he had not studied the pictures as completely as did Maccabee, said the photos show glaring inconsistencies typical of double

Mark Rodeghter of the Center for UFO Studies said the Gulf Breeze case had "deteriorated into a shouting match" because his group was forced to play devil's advocate when the network endorsed the pictures. That endorsement biased Maccabee's study, he said.

"Except those intimately connected with the network. 90 percent of serious UFO researchers think Gulf Breeze





written by someone else. Inman said portions of his book are missing from the screen version, leaving out some of the historical connections and perspectives.



Military cutbacks a boon for greenbacks

The Soviet Union and the United States have a mutual need to reduce the resources devoted to the military sector. The improved relations of the past few months raises the hope that such a reduction will eventually be possible.

America's budget problems have been evident for years. The Soviets now admit that they, too, have been running serious budget deficits. This year's Soviet deficit is estimated at \$58 billion — a huge amount for a country whose gross national product is about half that of the United States.

The Soviets have not been frigal to their national defense. The cost of modernizing America's defenses in the 1980s pales beside the buildup begun by Leonid Brezhnev in the 1970s in which the Soviets made dramatic improvements in virtually every category of military operations.

Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev says the Soviet Union can defend itself with a much smaller military establishment.

The Soviets' acknowledgment that they are in financial trouble because of excessive defense outlays, combined with their pledges to dismantle and destroy some missiles, tanks and chemical weapons, is a promising development. If the Soviets cut back sufficiently, the door could eventually open for measured cutbacks among the nations that have, for more than 40 years, maintained a military deterrent to Soviet attack.

Speed up payments

Congress approved and President Reagan signed legislation last year authorizing up to \$1.2 billion in paymen's of \$20,000 each to an estimated £0,000 Japanese — American survivors of intermment camps set up in this country during World War II. The gesture, which was accompanied by a formal apology, was, as the president said, overdue action "to right a grave wrong." Now, however, the president's Ollice of Management and Budget is taking its sweet time to make good on that promise for reasons that are, to be charitable, nit-picking.

OMB proposes to budget only \$20 million for the internee compensation program for the fiscal years beginning next October, enough to compensate only 1,000 people. Why? Because, OMB says, identifying eligible recipients and processing claims is a "complex adminsitrative job" for which the Justice Department, which will run the program, is not yet geared up. Until Congess authorizes supplementary funds, a spokesman said, Justice can't begin hiring the added personnel needed.

The explanation might be reasonable if this were a program to build a new dam. But as Rep. Robert Matsui points out, the law requires that the oldest people eligible for compensation must be paid first, and those people are now in their 90s. Besides, Matsui says, Justice has already compiled a long list of people, far more than 1,000, and he sees no reason why things can't move a little bit faster.

Neither do we. Given the gravity of the wrong, and the short time left to those at the top of the list, surely ways can be found to expedite matters. If OMB or Justice are disinclined to do so, Congress should step in and make things easier for bureaucrats whose command of figures seems not to extend to those numbering the days of people's lives.

Great expectations from a new man

Abraham Lincoln's inaugural wish that the Union be touched "by the better angels of our nature" has been reunited with fellow Republican George Bush's yearning for "a kinder, gentler nation."

The parallels are irresistible.

Lincoln inherited a nation divided by geography. Bush inherits a nation further segregated

by his immediate predecessor.

A strong-willed Lincoln forged unity out of a mean-spirited divisiveness. A resolute Bush has pledged an enlistment of his energies against the remnants of that national schism.

"Bigotry and indifference to disadvantage...

will find no safe home on our shores, in our puble life, in our neighborhoods, or in our homes." Bush declared tour days before his inauguration. "It will, I promise, be my mission as president of the United States."

That George Bush would group "indifference to disadvantage" with bigotry is especially encouraging because this nation's moral bearings have been momentarily sidetracked.

As MIT educator John S. Wilson observed, "The Reagan years made people feel more comfortable expressing intolerance."

The Bush years are expected to be the opposite. So much of Bush's philosophy, defined in his warm-hearted inaugural address portends

a new national climate.

Ironically, Americans have been snugly burrowed in the old climate. How else to explain a 68 percent approval rating for a departing president with an eight-year record of naked hostility to racial equality, contempt for human suffering and senile oblivion to

Ronald Reagan was never a class act. Unlike Lincoln, he never rose above his humble beginnings. He wallowed in their

Instead of gracefully turning over the nation's stewardship to a faithful subaltern, the Liliputian-minded actor stalked out of the White House ... defending resigned-in-disgrace Attorney General Edwin Meese from a Justice Department censure ... blaming black leaders for the contumely of the nation's black citizens ... scolding the homeless to read the want ads

Reagan was

never a class

shrugging off responsibility for the deaths of 241 Marines in Beirut ... and defending an unconscionable plot to exchange hostages for arms.

cionable plot to exchange hostages for arms.

With his 68 percent approval rating after a record like that, the Great Communicator will be remembered by posterity as the Great Preatidigitator.

George Bush arrived at history's doorsteps not a moment too soon.

In many ways he should excel. For starters, he's capable of staying awake through cabinet meetings and being a president de facto in charge. Even when he pauses and seems to grope for an answer, he does something Reagan never did. He thinks.

He also has surmounted contradictions with grace. After denouncing Dukakis for his "Harvard yard boutique" obsession, the Yale alumnus appointed four Harvard men to his cabinet. Promising an administration of new faces, he instead borrowed liberally from both Reagan administrations. Opening his presidential campaign in Texas with a plea for racial tolerance, he later allowed aide Lee Atwater to orchestrate an insidiously racist campaign. Bush's biggest problem will be finding a way to restrain Atwater from routinely referring to blacks as "niggers" in conversations.

Stop posing, show substance

WASHINGTON — New Presidents serve up rich sauces of symbolism, high in political cholesterol. George Bush has begun with a blizzard of words and gestures communicating high-introduces.

high-mindedness.

We are at the English-mulfin phase (folks swooned when Jerry Ford popped his own mulfin into the presidential toaster), which also has been a cardigan sweater and jellybean phase of young presidencies. This humanizing — perhaps miniaturizing — of Presidents is a recurring skit for a public that periodically pretends it wants ordinariness in that

extraordinary office.

The Bushes — up with horseshoes, down with designer clothes — are quite traditional in their ostentatious unostentatiousness. Their carefully choreographed "simplicity" projects the image of indifference to image. This is Carter Redux, as in the religiosity (Bush's first presidential act was to lead the nation in prayer), the walking on Pennsyvianta Avenue, the country music, the open house, the stern talk about ethics. Carter's presidency confirmed this law: Frenetic reliance on symbolism indicates uncertainty about what you

Amidst the familiar metaphors (breezes blowing, pages turning, doors opening) of Bush's inaugural address there ran a vein of familiar moralism. It equates recititude with right, and assumes that having the right attitude is tantamount to doing the right thing. Bush's feet may be in cowboy boots, but his head is in New England, home of right-mindedness and (not coincidentally) Abolitionism.

The Abolitionists were not much help in ending slavery while preserving the union, but they were pure in thought. The Abolitionist mentality was visible in the one specific vow in Bush's inaugural, concerning cocaine: "This scourge will stop."

It won't, but Bush has struck a pleasing pose, as he did in the compaign when he said. "If I'm elected President, if I'm remembered for anything, it would be this: a complete and total ban on chemical weapons." Bush's national security adviser, Brent Scoweroft, speaking last Sunday, said he supposed a verifiable ban to be "impossible." That is the unvarnished truth. But Bush has an arresting attitude, if not a practical position.

Bush also stood foursquare for rectitude when he came out against "bickering" and for bipartisanship in foreign policy. Bush, like many who came of age politically during the Second World War, assumes that bipartisanship is the American norm. That is a misreading — perhaps a nonreading — of American history.

The flercest dispute of the 1790s — some

raised the specter of civil war - swirled around the Jay Treaty with Britain. The War of 1812 stirred semisecessionist sentiment in New England, which became almost a neutral zone. The Mexican war (1846-48) was denouced by Whig crittes (including Congressmen Lincoln) as, among other things, unconstitutional. The war with Spain (1898) and the acquisition of territories brought bitter debate about the

very nature of the nation. Between 1914 and 1917, modern isolationism found its voice, heard again in the lie 1930s. Advocates of a "Pacific first" strategy troubled FDR's conduct of the war. They had an ally in Gen. Douglas MacArthur who was heard from again during the angry debates about Korea.

Much has been made of the fact that Bush's inaugural address contained the word "sacrifice": "Are we enthralled with material things, less appreciative of the nobility of work and sacrifice?" But one reason he was inaugurated was his pledge not to ask a central sacrifice of citizenship — taxes. "No new taxes" was a pledge not to let public needs impinge upon private materialism. Bush's pledge does mean a sacrifice — of national security. Scowcroft, when asked if Bush's tax pledge and his promise of a strong national defense are conflicting goals, said: "Of course. Of course they conflict." But, as attitudes, each is popular.

After praising sacrifice, Bush said, serenely: "We have more will than wallet, but will is what we need." However, in government will without wallet is usually ineffectual. And willing an end without willing the means to that end is mere attitudinizing. Bush was praised for saying at the Republican National Convention, "I don't hate government." That is an admirable attitude, but actions count.

Bush has hit the ground running in place, promising rectitude — handsome attitudes — and raising anew this question: Beyond "serving." is there something he wants to do?

Former Navy surgeon again is under fire

WASHINGTON — The Defensive Department is pressing an investigation of an anonymous tip that former Navy surgeon Donal Billig bribed a military panel to let him out of Jail. Federal investigators recently subpoenaed Billig's bank records.

In one of the most sensational courtmartials of the century, Billig was convicted in 1986 of involuntary mensional aughter and

in 1986 of involuntary criminally negligent homicide in the deaths of three patients. Billig had been chief of cardiothoracic surgery at Bethesda (Maryland) Naval Hospital. Details of botched heart surgery and Billig's legal blindness in one eye were among the evidence at the court martial.

But a Court of Military Review overturned the conviction last April and freed Billig from a four-year prison sentence on the grounds that the prosecution had not proved its case.

one of the most sensational court-martials of this century

One month later, the Defense Department hotline received four anonymous calls from someone believed to work for the military. The tipster told investigators that Billig used another person to pass bribes to one or more judges on the Court of Military Review, according to court papers filed by the Defense Department.

Initial attempts to confirm the anonymous allegations met with "mixed results." according to Defense Department papers filed in court. That may explain why investigators want to look at Billig's bank records.

The Defense Department inspector general's office wants Billig's records dating from August 1982 — the date when investigators say Billig first met the person who allegedly passed the brite, according to an affidavit signed by Richard Messersmith, an agent for the Defense Criminal Investigative Service. The subpoens does not indicate who is accused of acting as the bag man.

August 1982 is also the month that Billig first walked into a Navy recruiting office looking for a job, just days after the Air Force refused to recruit him because of his eyesight, according to evidence presented at the court-martial. The Naval recruiter who accepted Billig was later convicted of misconduct for concealing information about the doctor's record as a civilian surgeon.

Federal District Court Judge Herbert Maletz granted the subpoena for the bank records over the protest of Billig's lawyer, Joseph Levin. Levin told our associate Stewart Harris that Billig opposes the subpoena because the government's investigation is based on anonymous telephone calls. In court papers he calls them "poison pen telephone calls."

The Defense Department is also attempting to subpeona the bank records of Billig's wife Bonnie, but the judge has not yet ruled.

After the Court of Military Review learned of the bribery sivestigation, it appointed its own "master" to investigate the circumstances surrounding the decision to overturn Billig's conviction. An interim report filed with the court by the master, Judge Walter T. Cox III, says, "To date, no one has revealed any information that causes me to believe that judicial misconduct occured."

Since his successful appeal. Billig has won the right to practice medicine in Texas.

The Canadian C-130, carrying 18 people and aretic combat gear, landed in severe ice fog and split in half on Ladd Army Airfield, said Capt, Jim Rodgers of Fort Wainwright.

"It broke apart in two major portions," he said. "The tail section snapped off, and the two sections are relatively intact one-quarter mile apart.'

Rodgers said six died at once, a seventh died at the hospital. and two were in very serious condition. The remainder received only minor injuries. Rodgers said, but Canadian officials said three were seriously victims were members of the eight-man crew and which were among the 10 troops riding as passengers

Canadian Forces spokesman Maj. Luigi Rossetto in Edmonton confirmed that seven died. He said the plane had left Edmonton at 4 p.m. MST and that an investigation team would be formed as soon as possible.

The St. Lucia festival, named for a celebrated saint in Sweden, would bonor that Swedish community who helped build the town.

General Henry Shelton Sanford brought nearly 100 Sweden to the United States under the Contract Labor Law to man experimental clirus groves.

Gen. Sanford, considered to be the founder of the citrus industry in Central Florida, built the city on the St. Johns River according to a vision of a New York City of Florida, Sanford Museum and Library curator Alteia Clarke said, Gen. Sanford came to the area from the north in 1870, and by 1881 the population of Sanford reached 4.000.

The Swedes settled in New Upsala, what is now Upsala Road. Although Gen. Sanford gave each of the Swedish laborers who stayed five-acre tracts. hard freezes in 1895 brought the citrus industry an economic crisis, and the New Upsala community came to an abrupt

In Sweden, St. Lucia is honored on Dec. 13 as a saint of light who is thought to end long. cold winters with the warm light of spring. The St. Lucia celebrations are tled in with rituals of light during the Yuletide season

St. Lucia was beheaded by sword at Syracuse in the third century. In the Oxford Dictionary of Saints, she is called "one of the three great 'girl

The St. Lucia festival could also celebrate Sanford's Italian heritage. Clarke said memoirs indicate that a community of Italian settlers in Sanford dates approximately to the same period as the New Upsala community. St. Lucia, or Santa Lucia, ta also a saint celebrated in Italy.





Before the rain, patch the roof

"The time to repair your roof is before you have water pouring in on your head," says Bill Speigle of Dixie Roofing in San-

That may sound silly, but people sometimes fail to inspect or do maintenance on their roof until it is too late. By the time a leak has developed, what may have been a relatively inexpensive problem to correct is suddenly a major expense.

Roofing experts agree that roof replacement is not a job for

"Roofing is more technical than people think." Speigle said. "It isn't just pulting up

Lucile Trentham of Expert Roofing, also in Sanford, concurred. "There are a lot of structural aspects to take into consideration when doing roof work," she said. "Sometimes people make things worse by

attempting to do it themselves." Both agreed that a botched patch job can create more problems than it may solve. Professional attention to the job may save you money and avoid undue anxlety for the homeown-

Other experts feel that while roof replacement should be left to the professionals, a patch job is well within the capabilities of the average handyman.

A little rust may not mean one needs to replace the flashings-those devices that carry water away from the Joists between the gables and the roof or between the roof and vents or chimney. Properly maintained, they can be repaired with a minimum of effort and usually with nothing more than caulk-

Before calling in a roofer, give your roof a little going-over to get a better idea of its overall condition and to spot any problem areas.

Begin your inspection in the attic. Examine the ridge beams, rafters and sheathing. Look for water stains, dark-colored areas of wet wood, moisture and soft spots that may indicate dry rot.

Next, go outside and evaluate the condition of the roof structure, surface materials. flashings, caves and gutters. To check the roof structure,



rafters. The ridge should be perfectly horizontal. The rafters, which you can see by looking at the plane of each section, should be straight.

If there are any sags in either of these places, you may need to call in a professional contractor. There may be serious structural problems.

Check the surface of the roof. Don't stand on the roof any more than necessary. Walking on a damaged roof can easily cause more damage. Instead, use binoculars to assess the condition.

Check the flashings for rust spots and broken scals along the edges. Look for rust spots on the gutters. Be on the lookout for signs of wear, loose or broken natis, or curled, broken or missing shingles.

If you spot any problems, call a roofer to come to your home to offer a professional opinion. Many companies will do this free of charge

Bear in mind that if a roof has standard shingles and is 15 to 20 years old. It will more than likely need to be replaced.

The most common type of roof is the apphalt shingle, also known as the built-up roof. The asphault roof is made of a porous fiberglass mat that is bonded to a layer of asphalt-saturated felt. This type of roof often blisters and cracks in the hot Florida

That can result in small leaks. If you eatch the leak early, it can be patched with asphalt cement. Clean out the crack, fill it with cement, cover it with a felt patch and cover the patch with cement.


"Don't let the leaks get too big," Speigle warned. "Once a hole develops. It's too late to try to patch It.

Speigle suggested that homeowners do a roof inspection soon. Repairs are more easily and more quickly done before the summer ratny season begins. Replacing a roof varies de-

Society, states that canes should be cut to open the center of the plant to air and light. This is the most important principal in rejuvenation pruning-to strive to develop a bush that is open in the center. This helps to prevent disease and promotes correct growth.

Wherever possible, Lesadvises, look for the dormant bud (eye) and try to find one that opens toward the outside of the rose bush. This will promote the spreading, open growth you want

After the rejuvenation pruning is completed, fertilize with about a cup of a rose fertilizer or similar fertilizer like a 6-6-6 with minor elements plus fron. Besure to keep the fertilizer at least 6 inches from the base of the bush and broadcast it out slightly beyond the dripline of the plant. Expect flowers in eightor nine weeks.







I discourage the use of sleeping pills for more than a few days; your "several years" has probably set the stage for a potential problem of involuntary drug abuse. You couldn't have known the medicine was 20 Shoelace tip dangerous unless you had been 22 Time period told. I blame your doctor for having rewritten the Haleton prescription, without placing limits on its use. Although you may experience some uncomfortable nights while reducing and eliminating your Halcion. you will be healthier if you don't have to rely on medication for sleep. You may choose to find another doctor who, in the process of helping you, will be more cautious about prescribing drugs

DEAR DR. GOTT: Does eating plant plankton help osteoporosis?

DEAR READER: To my knowledge, plant plankton will not help osteoporosis, a loss of calcium from the bones that makes them brittle. Osteoporosis occurs with age, particularly in women past the menopause.

Experts believe that a deficiency of estrogen, a female hormone, is an important factor in this common allment.

Therefore, doctors often preand encourage continuing

exercise to prevent osteoporosis. calcitonin, a hormone that are useful.


