Carter: Resources Limited, Must Restrict Programs

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Carter today asked Congress to approve a \$500.2 billion budget for fiscal 1979 that ignored new programs in favor of restraint and conservation — except for energy conservation and research.

Carter's first budget included cutting the Pentagon's share of total spending and reducing social benefits to individuals including Medicare, Social Security and school lunches.

Resources are limited and government must discipline its choices and its scope," Carter said in sending his spending proposals to Capitol Hill.

The 9 percent budget expansion — 2 percent after adjustment for inflation — for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1 almost cut in half the 15 percent rise from President Gerald Ford's budget last year which raised current spending to \$490 billion.

Since the late 1960s, spending by the federal government has grown at an annual rate of about 10 percent.

Carter proposed spending of \$383.2 billion, at the same time estimating that receipts from income and corporate taxes and other sources would be \$308.4 billion. The deficit of \$74.8 billion

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Carter today asked Congress for \$2.8 million to finance major navigational, beach erosion and other Army Corps of Engineers projects in Florida for fiscal 1979.

The Corps' budget request also includes \$6.5 million for flood control construction in Central and Southern Florida, \$2 million for beach erosion in Duval County and \$3 million for flood control in the Four River Basins.

There were no surprises in Carter's first budget, which he said was every president's "most important."

"It is the administration's first full statement of its priorities," he told lawmakers.

Carter insisted his proposal "meets essential national needs" and appealed to Congress to respect "the need for careful and prudent management of the taxpayers' resources."

Of the \$28 billion in proposed increases, he said \$20 billion was necessary to maintain current services because of inflation. Carter ticketed another \$8 billion in new spending for energy research and conservation, and suggested modest rises in spending for education and assistance to the jobless.

In terms of real spending on new or enlarged programs, a measure that includes the effect of inflation, energy programs grew by about \$2.1 billion — the largest single increase in the new budget. There was another \$1.3 billion for fuel conservation tax rebates.

Carter asked for \$12.2 billion to more than double spending for energy conservation, to substitute wood and other fuels for oil and

gas, and to step up research on all energy sources except nuclear reactors.

But a White House forecast of future spending showed the years of rapidly growing energy budgets are about to end.

Carter, who had proposed increases to cut Pentagon spending levels, proposed a \$1 billion increase above the current services amount of \$118.8 billion. But administration spokesmen said this was \$10 billion less than Ford had projected.

The Pentagon would commit more air and army forces to defend Europe, while cutting funds for strategic weapons and new Navy ships.

Despite the gain, the Pentagon share of each \$1 in federal expenditures dropped from 26 to 24 cents. Social security, welfare and other benefits for individuals dropped from 27 to 26 cents.

Making up most of the difference was an increase in the cost of financing the federal debt, which is projected to rise in a record \$74 billion, federal payoffs, energy research and development.

Carter said he wants to cut back the space shuttle program by making funds for a fleet of four orbital transporters instead of five as originally planned. The shuttle is a reusable ship that will haul satellites to and from orbit and carry manned laboratories to conduct space research.

The president created 75,000 public service jobs in fiscal 1978 as the backbone of his jobs campaign. The new budget would continue to fund those jobs, plus 50,000 more through a welfare reform demonstration project.

Three youth programs — including the Job Corps — would be expanded to create 1.3 million youth jobs.

Carter sought \$181 million, including a 15 percent hike for elementary and high school aid, the largest education increase proposed by a president since the early days of Lyndon Johnson's Great Society.

He also asked for expansion of health and birth control services for low-income, a boost in health funds to improve immunization levels among children under 15 against such communicable diseases as polio and measles, and nearly \$20 million to convince Americans to abandon cigarettes.

Reading Becoming Fundamental At Hopper Elementary

Some students come to school in Seminole County without ever having opened even one book.

That's what Hopper Elementary School Principal Ken Bovio discovered in the first year at the little elementary school.

In Bovio — with the help of the Federal government's Reading to Fundamental (RIF) program is doing something about it. The 200 students, kindergarten through fifth grade, at his school will soon be receiving free books, books to take home and keep.

Bovio talked with a spokesman at the RIF program in Washington, D.C. late Friday and found out his school's application to participate in RIF has been approved.

"This will be the first time this program has been in Seminole County," Bovio said. "It will provide three free books for each child in the school," he explained.

The books come from a list of publishers approved by the U.S. Office of Education and RIF officials, Bovio explained.

"The books may be stories, reference books, books about science, history or anything else that might be of interest to the students," Bovio explained.

Once the books are received at the school, "which takes a maximum of four weeks," the children must be allowed an opportunity to choose the book they want, without interference from teachers, Bovio explained.

"The program rates specifically state that the children may select their books from those which we buy, without any interference from adults," he said.

Bovio said the RIF program

is provided on a federal grant and that matching funds of \$50 have been raised for the school by the Kiwanis of Sanford.

The grant will provide about 600 books, which will be chosen so that there are enough duplicates to prevent the school from running out if one title is especially popular, he said.

"We will be ordering some classics, such as the Little House on the Prairie set, or Black Beauty, or Heidi," he said.

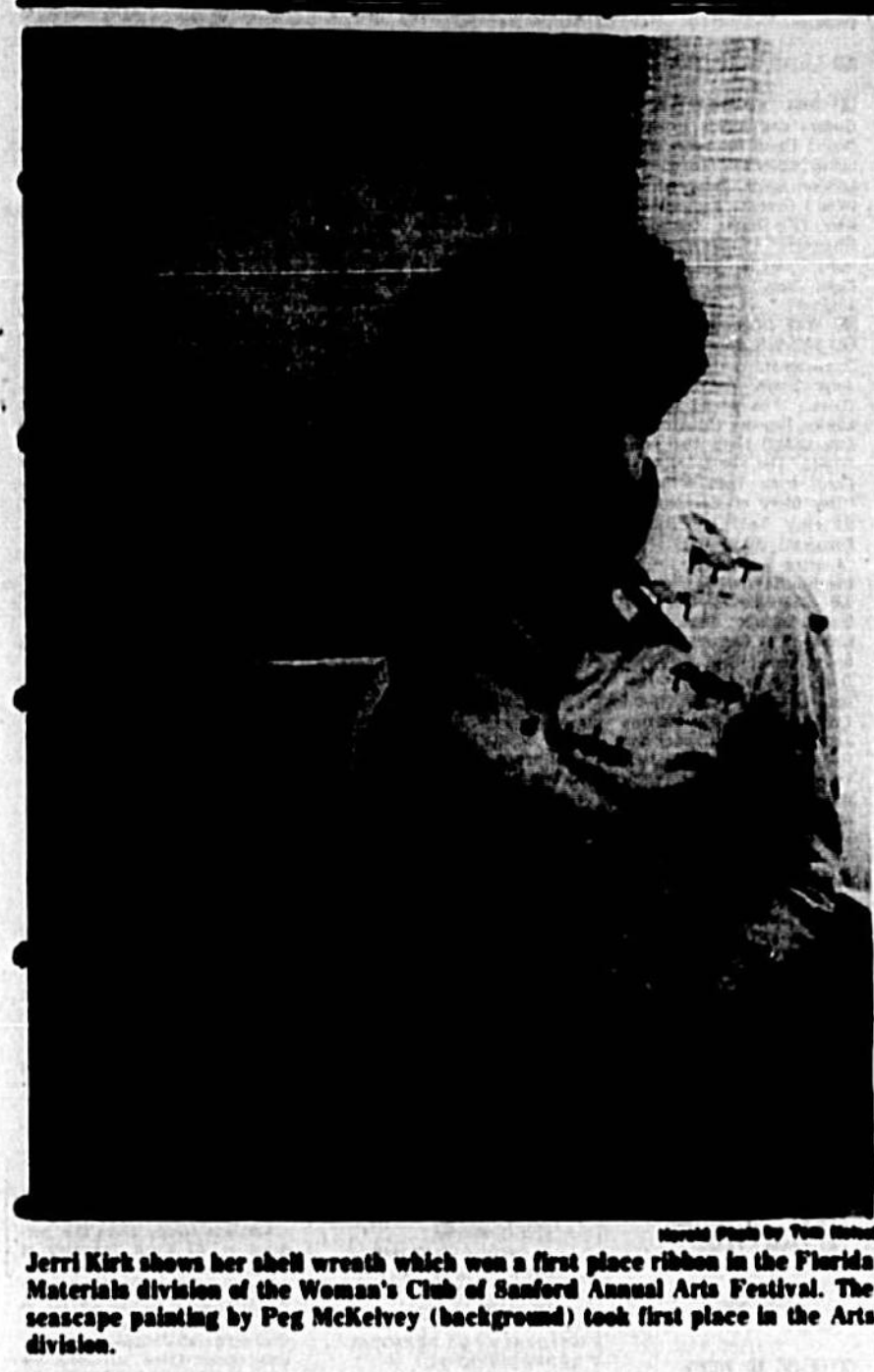

Garden Gate

'Wait A Bit'

Don't start pruning back your yard and looking pointless yet - at least if you feel you simply can't stand the ugly brown leaves, then cut them back a short distance only.

When danger of frost is over is the time to cut them back almost to the ground. Very often after a few warm days, if you scrape the bark, you will find it is still green.

Although some believe it is better to wait, it may be advisable to wait (as with pruning) so that your tender new growth won't come out only to be killed by late cold weather.
