JONES SCORES BRILLIANT 69 IN OPEN PLAY

Pride of Atlanta Sets Record on Difficult Winged Foot Course While Others Falter

**WINGED FOOT GOLF
CLUB, NANTUCKET, N. Y., June 27.**—Hobby Jones, the golfer incomparable, shot record winged foot in a sensational 38-31-69 to break the competitive course record today and take the lead by three strokes over the field competing in the first round of the national open golf championship.

The performance, an event which Jones' name, magnitude of stature and the answer to those who predict a weeks ago that 70 would be his score, came without a hitch. He took it today without a mistake, extending himself; in fact he did it the hard way by concealing two strokes to par on the outgoing journey and then leaping five strokes from perfection for the final nine, the greatest score ever made on this particular stretch of the course.

It was his first time in a career in which Jones' name was able to break it in an American open championship, although this distinction is far from a rarity as far as tournaments are concerned.

Anyhow, he just trilled with one of the greatest comes the world over on that final nine holes, a course that drove Johnny Farrell, the 1928 champion, out of the running today with an 87, which was a 20 stroke lead. In fact, it was a 20 stroke lead in the case of Willie MacFarlane, Mac Smith, Hutton Smith, and Walter Hines, British champion, who were over par, at the turn and faced the necessity of spending Jones' nine holes last seen in Jones' title. S. C. Jones at this point was Charlie Henson, a hero of a most prominent brand of golf.

He had a 72 to beat a 54 and Charlie Henson, Chicago, and Billy Burke, Westport, N. Y., with a pair of 70, Herton Smith, Arthur Andrews, Denver, and Arthur Andrews, Denver, followed with 76 each.

In brief, the tournament started to be Jones and Jones seemed to be the tournament. He started badly enough, being a few holes four over par for the first three holes. Whereupon he quit kidding the nobility and began playing golf as only Jones can play.

Only twice did he fail to hit his tees, shot far and straight down the fairway; struck out at all did he fail to sink his shot to the green, and the pen and his putting was a marvel to behold.

In consequence he got eagle 70 on the fifth and tenth holes, pars on the fourth, sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth, thirteenth, fifteenth, seventeenth and eighteenth and birdie on the eleventh, fourteenth and sixteenth. It is doubtful if that sequence of 27 between the tenth and fourteenth holes has ever been bettered in a national open championship.

NEW YORK, June 26.—Nobody had the faintest idea which of two things is going to land first—Schmeling's punch on the chin or Schmeling's chin on the floor—until everybody seems to be betting it one way or the other today while Paulino and Schmeling, their week done, try to out-wait the last 12 hours before what Pat Dempsey calls the battle of broken glass at the Yankee Stadium tomorrow night. This pair may fail to sell the house out, although they figure to furnish New York with the first good heavy-weight fight since Dempsey and Sharkey. They even may fail to come near recently abrupt 10 rounds with each other, but the following are things that will sell:

There will be thousands upon thousands of dollars being bet on the result; they will be viewed by an assortment of people as a strange contrast to the occupants of the average "feeder."

As for the former, even money was in order today with a slight leaning toward Paulino, the latter getting the play from most of the professional gamblers who, after all, make the odds. They tend to lean heavily on the lighter side for the frankly Schmeling over the 16 round distance and their hold is likely to swing the odds to Paulino's favor after he reaches town for the weighing in to show up tomorrow at 165 lbs. by means of an airplane trip from his camp at Hot Springs.

The gamblers, however, are not with the public but over the main in question. The odds are 10 to 1 in favor of Paulino. It was for this reason that one of the biggest bookmakers in town announced today that he had \$100,000 in Paulino commitments to be met in "the paper price." This, he admitted, would be 5 to 6, although actually he probably was putting out 10 to 1 for every \$100 he was "locking up" in the "paper price."

As for the crowd, it has been a good big fight, looking as in the drawing a personal opinion of a banker and bookmaker who rub elbows at the ringside. This time, the thing is as level as the sole of a paragon's foot. In the lot of professional gamblers, it is today the names of Coley Madden and Thomas Shaw, any are bookmakers at the race track. It is noted that the Tom Shaws will be there; also Evelyn Lewis and the Marquis. They are front page stuff in the social register.

"In your vast country I saw the romance and the adventure of spending," Mrs. Naidu said in an exclusive interview with I. N. S. here.

"Riches we can acquire, but to spend them afterwards in a wise and generous way is another matter. Therein lies the great romance of the new world in my opinion. In the history of the world, a greater or nobler example of such extraordinary, fantastic, almost philanthropic generosity has been shown by the America of today.

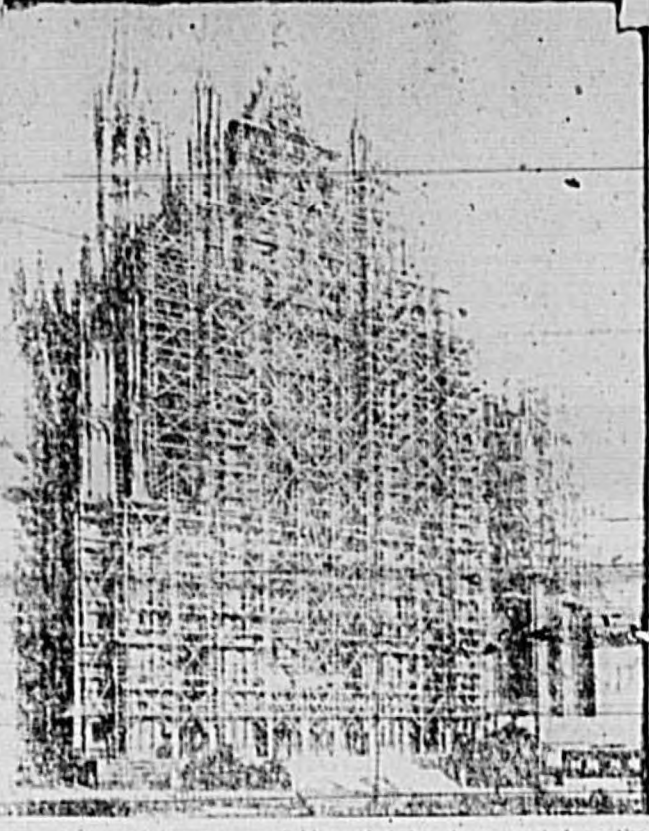

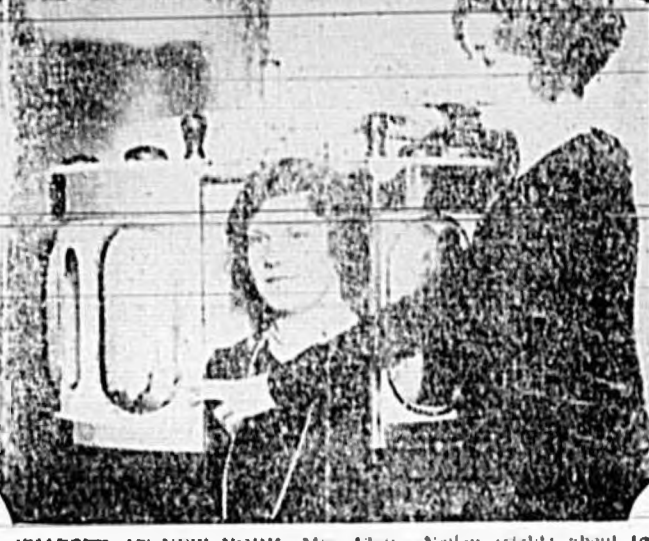

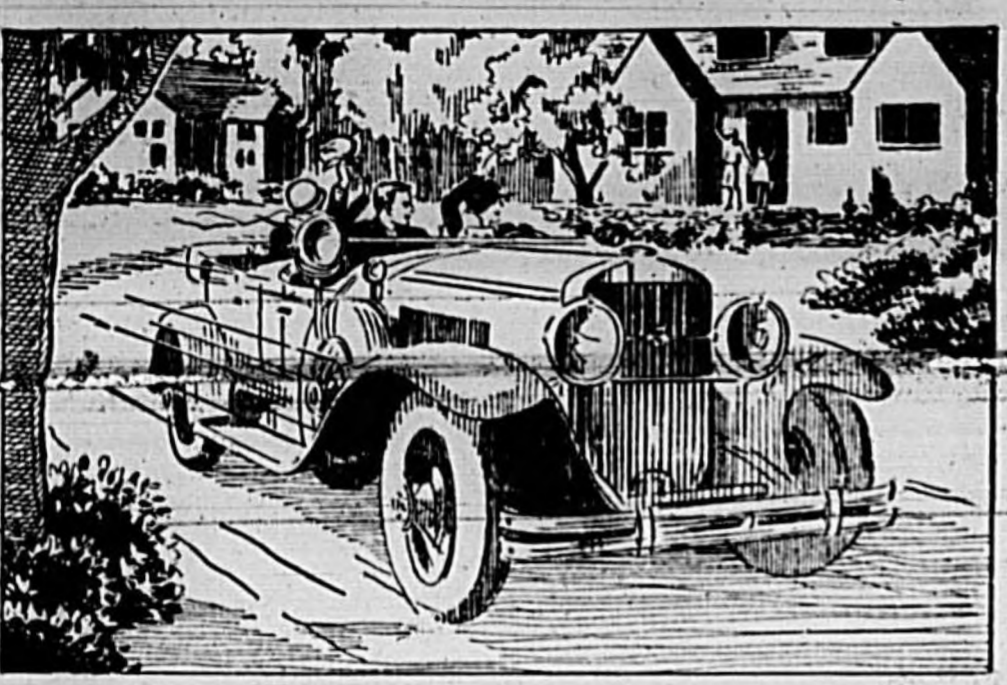

FOR THAT MOTOR TRIP



When we'll pack up our troubles in the old kit bag, and smile, smile, smile! Don't that old song typical of the joy that accompanies the motor tripper of today? Who doesn't feel a lightness of heart as he bundles sleeping arrangements, cooking utensils and food into the good old bus and starts out a happy vagabond?

Regardless of whether your ultimate goal is a fishing shack in the woods or the Ritzier hotel imaginable, you are part of the fellowship of the road from the time you start.

Real Camping

And regardless of whether you plan to camp out at night or spend your resting periods in the comfort of a hotel, there is one thing that you will take, if you are wise—food. The haughtiest motorist may refuse to move when it reaches a particularly deserted stretch of road around noon-time. Then isn't it nice to know that in your car you have the makings of a meal? A can of beans, a can of tomatoes, some peaches or pineapple, and perhaps a can of Boston brown bread take up very little room, and are they welcome! Also they can be replaced at any town through which you pass, so you never will be stranded away from food.

But if you and your family prefer to be real campers, spending your nights out and doing your own cooking, the supply of canned foods will be greater. By carrying well chosen supplies, the supplementing

by fresh foods from villages may be done quickly and satisfactorily. Also you can get the same brands of food in most towns and so know exactly what grade you are purchasing. Flour, fat, sugar, salt and pepper, and evaporated milk are the fundamentals on which the food supply is founded. With the aid of a can of bacon and a box of baking powder, flapjacks and bacon may appear on the menu. Coffee is another essential, and this should be vacuum-packed coffee carried in airtight Mason jars. Many campers prefer to carry condensed milk with them and use it in the coffee, rather than to bother with fresh cream and sugar.

Among the vegetables which will surely appear in the food list are peas, stringless beans, corn and tomatoes; they may be combined with each other or with fresh foods to make delightful combinations, or any one served alone is most attractive. Baked beans, kidney beans and lima beans are filling foods which are easily prepared. Other foods which may be bought occasionally, or more often if your carrying capacity is large, are sauerkraut, bonnies,okra, sweet potatoes, spinach, turnips and carrots.

Fruits for Freshness

Canned fruits may be eaten just as they come out of the can. Another good method is to heat the pieces of fruit in the fat left from cooking meat and then serve the hot fruit with the meat. Peaches, pine apple and peaches are particularly well adapted to this use. Pineapple slices or crushed pineapple may be ranged on a thick slice of ham and cooked in a covered skillet. In purchasing fruits don't forget that the berries and cherries are among those obtainable in cans, as well as figs, grapefruit, grapes, apples, and apple sauce. Surely with such a selection and with the fresh fruits on the market in the summer, to one need lack their sweet freshness.

Plan for Variety

Salmon, tuna, mackerel, codfish cakes are among the standard canned fish for the trip, and many meats are carried in such a way as to make a meal only a matter of opening a can and heating the contents. Did you know that beef may be purchased canned in eight different ways: sliced, boiled, corned, dried, roast, stew & hash, or steak with onions? Chicken may be boneless, curried, deviled, & à la King, or in tamales. Veal in loaf or roasts, lamb, deviled or half of whole, liver with bacon or onions.

In planning camping meals, variety must be considered carefully, for it is easy to fall into a routine. By buying fresh salt vegetables such as lettuce, radishes, coleslaw, tomatoes, chickpeas, and the way having fresh eggs and meat occasionally, and fresh vegetables, especially those in bean cans, or the beans through which you pass, the family will stay in good health. It is important to drink plenty of pure water and eat plenty of vegetables, fresh or canned, whole or in tin.
