

LANSING HOTEL BLAZE TOOK OVER SCORE

Many Other Bodies Believed Buried In Ruins, Or Lost In Nearby River

LANSING, Dec. 12.—(A.P.)—As the fire-blackened ice-shrouded ruins of Hotel Kerns began giving up their dead today, state police announced 22 persons have been listed as victims of the flames that trapped guests yesterday morning. Others that many other bodies would be found in ruins prevailed.

With the list of known dead standing at 21, state police announced last night they had accounted for 160 of the 190 persons known to have been in the hotel. More than 30 persons were in hospitals and the condition of many was reported critical. At least 20 bodies are believed to be buried in the ruins with the possibility a number of others may be under the ice of the Grand River which flows past the rear of the hotel.

The known dead: Representative T. Henry Howell, Gregory; Representative John W. Goodwine, Marlette; Representative Donald W. Sias, Midland; Representative Charles D. Parker, Otaville; State Senator John Ledford, Saginaw; Representative Vern Voorhes of Albion, Mich.; David Monroe, assistant manager of the hotel; R. S. McFarland, Dayton, Ohio salesman; Kohn (first name and address unknown); I. Weishneff, Lansing, formerly of Los Angeles; unidentified woman, about 60; James Gratz, 50, Chicago, Abraham Bosman, 37, Grand Rapids.

The fire broke out about 5:30 A. M. and within a few minutes had made its way throughout the four-story structure, the interior of which was wooden although the exterior was of brick. Early arrivals at the scene of the fire shuddered in horror as they told of the bedlam of screams that sounded for 20 minutes. "The silence that followed, after the flames collapsed was even worse," said one witness.

Total damage to the four homes and St. James colored church involved in the blaze did not reach the extent of the damage to the Tuggle home at Third Street and Laurel Avenue, now occupied by Mr. and Mrs. E. S. Rigney.

A blaze believed to have started in the kitchen of the Rigney home brought out the Department at 11:45 o'clock this morning, causing damage estimated at around \$200.

State Motor Vehicle Board Reports Unusual Amount Of Calls For Odd Tag Numbers

By JAMES A. HODGES, Associated Press Staff Writer, TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Dec. 12.—(A.P.)—Names and numbers would be a suitable title for the annual flood of requests to the State Motor Vehicle Commission for special figure combinations on automobile tags.

This year, hundreds of Florida car owners asked the commission for certain tag numbers, either because they had received the same tag number before, because they were superstitious, or for some reason they did not tell. Most of them got the numbers they requested.

The No. 1 tags in each weight classification went to Governor Dave Sholtz, as usual, Michael

Sholtz, the governor's father, received No. 2 in the \$10 class and W3 in the \$20 list.

J. P. Newell, executive secretary to the governor, was given D2; J. A. Cormier, state beverage commissioner, D3, and J. B. Sullivan, state hotel commissioner, D4. All three tags were in the \$15 class. The governor's brother, Carl Sholtz, took D5 for his car.

The sevens and thirteens all were bid for long before the tags went on sale Dec. 1. C. E. Carmichael of Silver Springs took two of the sevens, one plain and the other, D7. The car of Harry Duncan of Tavares will bear W7. Walter Lynch of Jacksonville (Continued On Page Four)

State's Responsibility For Repairs Must Be Settled

R. Oscar M. Johnson, TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 12.—All speculation as to the major problems to be confronted by the forthcoming session of the Legislature has failed to take into account one major issue which has just come to light.

It is the proposition of the state's assuming the responsibility for the maintenance and betterment of all county roads.

Many legislators who have recently visited Tallahassee have expressed themselves as favoring the idea, and every probability is that because it is highly controversial, passage of an enabling act promises to afford one of the most interesting contests of the session.

Road Department Made Defendant In Highway Suit

TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 13.—(A.P.)—A suit seeking damages from the State Road Department for alleged trespass on private property, filed in Levy county circuit court, was said today by C. O. Wright, attorney for the department, to be the first suit of this kind ever brought against the state department.

Proceedings in the case were brought by Harry H. Wells of Tallahassee, former road department chairman, as counsel for P. Rosenbaum of Meridian, Miss., and M. F. Little of Wetumpka, Ala., property owners.

Wells in his bill of complaint claimed the road department in constructing State Road Five through Levy county used property owned by Rosenbaum and Little without obtaining their permission. The road was started in 1930 and completed in 1932. Wells was a member of the road department while part of the road was being constructed. Afterwards, he was appointed chairman.

POLITICAL PRESSURE EXCORIATED

Edgar Hoover Scores Interference Of Certain Groups In Fight On Gangsters

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—(A.P.)—Elimination of "political pressure" was described yesterday by J. Edgar Hoover, head of the Department of Justice's bureau of investigation, as a necessity if gangs are to be permanently exterminated.

Neville Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer, said in common the government, felt it useless and unwise to initiate debt negotiations at present. He revealed that the United States had sent its customary note calling attention to the Dec. 15 installment on Nov. 22, adding in routine manner that Washington was ready to discuss through usual diplomatic channels any British proposals for settlement.

SLIGHT RELIEF PROMISED U. S. FROM ICY BLASTS

Still More Cold Is General Forecast For Entire Nation

Slight relief was indicated today from the frigid blast which has brought death and suffering to various parts of the country.

Rising temperatures were expected in the Rocky Mountain states and warmer weather was predicted for the South Atlantic area.

Heavy winds forecast for the eastern part of the country left that section with little prospect of a break in the bitter cold.

EARLY CELERY ESCAPED SERIOUS DAMAGE IS VIEW

Sub-Freezing Weather Low As Official 23 Killed Tender Crops

Despite unofficial thermometer readings as low as 18 on the West Side and official government readings ranging from 23 to 27 degrees, local growers were able to report this morning that their early celery and hardier vegetables came through December's coldest weather in many years in splendid fashion.

However, all tender truck crops and flowers which were spared death at the hands of Sunday morning's heavy frost are wiped out, and from all around the county come official and unofficial reports of frozen oranges and tangerines.

Fully 25 Percent Of Oranges Destroyed As Thermometer Hits All Time Low

JACKSONVILLE, Dec. 12.—(A.P.)—Virtual destruction of all tender crops and widespread damage to citrus from last night's severe cold wave in Florida were indicated in unofficial surveys today.

In many sections the temperature dropped to all time lows for December, freezing weather extending into semitropical Miami and vicinity.

JACKSONVILLE, Dec. 12.—The local Weather Bureau predicts 26 to 30 degrees tonight for northern Florida, freezing or slightly below for the central interior, and frost with local freezings for the southern interior.

Freezing again was predicted for tonight as far south as the southern interior of the state. The Florida Citrus Exchange at Tampa tentatively estimated the loss to oranges at 25 to 35 percent and tangerines 60 to 65 percent. Grapefruit generally escaped.

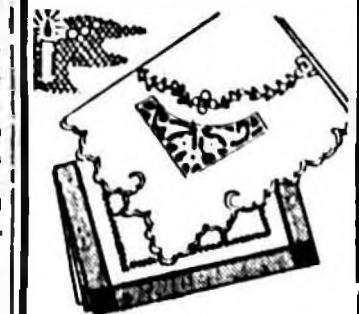
James told officers the men refused to take checks and escaped after forcing several waiting customers into the rear of the building and warning them against giving the alarm.
