

# Celery Feds Trounce Orlando Senators In 5 To 1 Tilt

## Howington Pitches Four Hit Tilt; Sanford Meets Saints In Twin Bill

TINKER FIELD, Orlando — Aug. 28. (Special) — The second place Sanford Celery Feds downed the league leading Orlando Senators by a 5 to 1 count last night behind the four-hit pitching of Jodie Howington before slightly more than 1300 fans.

The Senators opened hostilities in the first frame as Jimmy Hester slammed a screaming double into right center field followed by a single to left by Jack Lavelle to score Hester. From this point on the master of the Senators was Howington who allowed but two other base hits throughout the game.

Sanford tallied the first of their five runs in the second frame as Buddy Lacy was safe on an error by Cal Ermer and was sent scampering home on a two base blow by Manager Ed Levy.

In the sixth stanza the Senator infield fell apart without reservation. Four errors by the Orlando boys and a base hit brought three runs across the platter. Two miscues by Les Bergman and one each by Freddie Swindells and Ermer aided by a base hit by Byron Sharpe accounted for the three runs.

The final Fed marker came in the ninth as Levy lined his second two base blow and was followed by a single by Oasie

Glorig to score the Sanford manager.

The special events were dominated by Orlando. The Senator bat boy Charlie Thompson defeated the Sanford stick chaser in a special event. Lou Bevil and Bud Burns finished in a dead heat to take the 50 yard dash honors and Bevil returned to the Mike Dominguez for fungo hitting honors. Manager Ted Madjeski won the accuracy throw and Mike Dominguez tossed the ball farther than the other contestants.

Davey Bride of Sanford circled the bases in 15.1 seconds to tie Lou Bevil of the Senators. Bride was the only Fed player to place in the special events.

Levy and Glorig tied for hitting honors during the game with two safeties in four trips to the plate. Levy poled out two doubles.

The Sanford Feds meet the St. Augustine Saints in the ancient city tonight in a twin bill. This promises to be an exciting three series because the Saints are trailing the Feds "but one" and one half games.

In acting on the Yugoslav incidents the United States government has affirmed its faith in the United Nations as a real power in world affairs.

The State Department's note to the Yugoslav government regarding the two American planes shot down in Yugoslavia stated that unless demands regarding occupants of the planes were met within 48 hours, the United States would turn the problem over to the Security Council of the United Nations for appropriate action.

By regarding the United Nations as the supreme authority from the start, instead of attempting to handle the incidents alone, the United States puts the interpretation of world importance upon the Yugoslav situation. Thus it can become the concern and responsibility of all the member nations to deal with the problem.

Our government called the Yugoslav action in shooting down two unarmed planes close to the border "an offense against the law of nations and the principles of humanity."

By threatening to take such an offense before the whole United Nations, the United States has set an example to the world of open, public international dealings and of belief that international conflicts should be put before the world organization without hesitance.

Housing Headaches

People without homes are not the only ones with housing troubles. A coast-to-coast survey conducted by the Wall Street Journal reveals that many houses which have been built recently are on the verge of falling down around their inmates.

As small an item as nails, for instance, can cause a lot of trouble. Stingy use of them makes the whole house weak. Green lumber, too, causes a multitude of flaws in buildings. Roofs buckle, presenting a wavy appearance, floors have the same tendency, and sap has actually been seen to run from siding not properly seasoned before using. Plumbing made from rough castings leaks through floors and ceilings, and plastic faucets sometimes snap off. Careless reading of blueprints results in missing closets and windows and no roofs on porches.

There seems to be no end to the unpleasant surprises which may be in store for home builders, whether they put up a small cottage or a more elaborate residence, as long as good materials are so scarce. Good builders do the best they can, but it is almost impossible to get both quick building and quality results these days.


Circus Homes

It seems now that the issue in the elections this fall will be liberalism against conservatism, or progressive as against reactionary policies.



The Old Guard of the Republican Party bitterly resented Wendell Willkie taking a liberal position. They severely condemned Dewey for becoming a "Meat" supporter of the New Deal. From now on they are obviously going to insist on safe, dyed-in-the-wool reactionary candidates and platforms. That means that in 1948 Stassen will not be nominated by the Republicans. Neither will Dewey be the nominee unless he can convince the Old Guard that he always had his tongue in his cheek when he supported liberal policies and that his record as Governor of New York and lately his purge of Representative Baldwin liberal Republican in his own Congressional District of New York show that he is really safe for big business.

The Republicans would really like to have Taft as their nominee because they know that he, like his father, is a reactionary and that a liberal sentiment can no more live in his philosophy than the malaria germ can survive in quinine. It might be, however, that the Republicans would take Governor Warren of California, for he has made an apparently good record in California and

Blind Patriot's Citizenship Is Up To Next Congress

NEWARK, N. J.—A blind former member of the French underground is waiting for the next congressional session to decide his permanent home and possible U. S. citizenship.

Paul Boulanger, who fought with the Free French forces after escaping from occupied France and was later blinded in an industrial accident at New Brunswick, N. J., would be permitted to remain and earn his coveted U. S. citizenship under a bill to be introduced in Congress by Representative Fred A. Hartley, Jr.

The bill had been introduced previously but could not be acted upon before Congress adjourned. Immigration authorities, however, have extended Boulanger's temporary authorization to remain until Congress acts.

Boulanger, now trained as a masseur, is employed at the Essex House Health Club. If Congress permits him to remain, he plans to open an establishment in New York where he can devote much of his time to relieve crippled people who can't afford expensive treatments.

He was brought to America after being wounded while working for the American War Shipping Administration.

"Although I am unable to see I can sense the freedom in this country—our country," he asserted.

Potables Problem Perturb Polish

WARSAW—AP—Proposals from Polish dry organizations that the sale of vodka be restricted with "vodkaless days" have drawn the fire of the state alcohol monopoly.

A statement said such action would cause an increase in production of "moonshine vodka"—in Polish, "bimber," made principally of rye flour and sugar. Monopoly alcohol is produced from molasses and potatoes regarded unfit for public sale.

Comic-Book Dilemma Wasn't Funny To Him

RALEIGH, N. C.—AP—A comic book caused 12-year-old C. S. Royal of Raleigh to spend many long, worried hours in the Raleigh Police Station.

C. S. was among schoolchildren who toured the state capital. Enroute back to the school bus, he stopped off to buy a comic book and got so interested he forgot the bus. Police called his relatives and arranged for them to meet him on a later bus.

Said he, "I never want to see another comic book."

BROCKTON, Mass.—AP—How many straws can a woodchuck duck? "Two—because that's all I had with me," ruefully confessed Archie, Ralph Valentine, who drew his bow on Mr. Chuck from a bedroom window. The first arrow plunked harmlessly into the burrow the groundhog dug in Valentine's garden and the second hit the mound, just above the creature's head. Then, added the bowman, "That pecky woodchuck grabbed the arrow between his paws and started to chew the feather on the end of the shaft!"

Sugar, Not Frost, Gives Fall Color

WASHINGTON—It's sugar and not Jack Frost that tints the foliage of autumn with reds, yellows and browns, says the forest service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Popular belief to the contrary, trees actually change color before cold weather begins as part of the plants' preparation for winter.

"All during the spring and summer," says a booklet just released by the service, "the leaves have served as factories, where foods necessary for the tree's growth have been manufactured. In the fall when the cool weather causes a slowing down of the vital processes, the work of the leaves comes to an end. The machinery of the leaf factory is dismantled. Whatever food there is on hand is sent to the body of the tree to be stored for use in the spring."

"All that remains in the cell cavities of the leaf is a watery globules and crystals, and a small number of yellow, strongly refractive bodies can be seen. These give the leaves the yellow coloring. It often happens that there is more sugar in the leaf than can readily be transferred back to the tree. When that is the case the chemical combination with other substances produces many color shades, varying from the brilliant red of the dogwood to the more austere browns of the oak."

Luntz On Loose Outsmarts Students

AUCKLAND, New Zealand—AP—Two Dunedin University student brothers sitting in their automobile were asked by a passerby to put a price on the vehicle.

"They did, the deal was clinched and the buyer drove off. Each brother thought the other had received payment, but sold police when they found neither had.

The police soon found the buyer—he had escaped from a lunatic asylum and just wanted the car to return there. The vehicle was found parked outside the institution.

Million Consumptives Die Annually in India

BOMBAY, India—(AP)—Dr. A. C. Ukil, tuberculosis expert for the All-India Institute of Hygiene and Public Health at Calcutta, says 1,000,000 persons a year die of tuberculosis in India and the incidence is growing.

He said statistics indicated that up to one percent of all inhabitants in rural areas, one to three percent in small towns and three to seven percent in larger communities had active tuberculosis, half of them in a communicable stage.

Dr. Ukil said India had only about one hospital bed for each 1,200 cases requiring isolation. Public health workers, he said, hope to obtain government grants of about one rupee per capita, compared with two to three rupees per capita expended for tuberculosis control in Western countries.

Why He Knows All The Answers

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo.—(AP)—Everyone knows no one is expected to make a perfect score on the Army's classification tests so when J. F. Price did just that when seeking entry to an officers' candidate school, the officer in charge made him take another test while the supervisor watched.

The result was the same, and fast, too.

So Price explained to the puzzled officer:

"I've been checking these test papers as an enlisted man for three years. All I have to do now is look at the question number and I know the correct answer."

# Swiss Citizenship Costs Thousands

BY BELEN

BELEN Twenty-nine Swiss, mostly residents of Germany, have lost Swiss citizenship because they were accused of conspiracy against Switzerland's security.

In addition, 56 persons lost Swiss citizenship in 1945 because they had made false declarations to obtain Swiss nationality or because their conduct was prejudicial to Switzerland.

Loss of Swiss citizenship in many cases is a financial loss. It costs a lot of money to become a Swiss citizen. Government statistics showed that in 1943 in 1,624 cases of naturalization, individuals paid the equivalent of \$361,000 to the communities and \$170,000 to the cantons of their residence.

Individual fees for naturalization vary among the various communities and cantons. The authorities of the communities and of the cantons decide whether citizenship can be granted, but the Federal Justice and Police Department is the final authority.

The procedure is long and rigorous.

"We do not want anyone to become a Swiss citizen who has worshipped foreign ideologies or has taken an active part in foreign politics," a spokesman of the Justice and Police Department said.

### Smoking-Car Story: Air Will Be Clean

(By Associated Press)  
 NEW YORK — Railroad cars free of odor despite tobacco smoke, spilled drinks and the other incidents of long-distance travel are promised as another transportation improvement by a New York firm of air research engineers.

Apparatus developed for installation with ordinary air-conditioning equipment, which controls only temperature and humidity, is a sort of enlarged gas mask. Principal ingredient is carbon, which has a long-known affinity for absorbing gases (all smells are gases) and other air impurities.

According to W. B. Connor Engineering Corp., 80 percent of the several thousand new passenger cars under contract include carbon air purification in their design. When materials can be obtained in sufficient quantities, manufacture of carbon air purifiers for home and office is promised.




