Economy Continues To Make Advance

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Commerce Department said today the nation's economy was continuing its comeback from the recession.

"Production, employment and income continued strong" in the first month of the final quarter of 1958, the department said, and rising demand generated an increase in new factory orders.

The department noted, in an article in the November issue of "Survey of Current Business," that the business upturn has been accompanied by relative stability of retail and wholesale prices.

It said consumer spending was maintained at a high rate in September and October. Except for autos, sales of both soft and durable goods topped last year's levels.

Hearing Scheduled On Juice Dilution

WINTER HAVEN (UPI)—A hearing is scheduled Dec. 11 for Osceola Fruit Distributors charged with adding water, sugar, and artificial coloring to chilled orange juice.

The State Agriculture Department ordered the hearing Tuesday after the Connecticut Food and Drug Commission charged that the Kissimmee company's shipment of juice had been "watered down."

If found guilty, the company's license to operate in Florida could be revoked, forcing it out of business in Florida.

Leater Ivey, plant owner, said, "We deny it all."

Ivey said the company makes other products, such as "juice drinks" to which both sugar and water are legally added, but said neither sugar nor water was added to its chilled orange juice.

A special committee of the Florida Citrus Commission was named two weeks ago to investigate the case. It has not yet reported.

However, the Commission at its November meeting resolved to do everything possible to prevent "the good name" of Florida citrus products being damaged by inferior products.

Osceola Fruit Distributors' alleged violation occurred last month.

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Thor Is Launched; Test Is Success

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla.—The Air Force sent an intercontinental range Thor on a scheduled 1,500-mile flight early today in the 20th test of the versatile combat rocket.

The blunt-nosed, 63-foot weapon lifted off its launching pad at 1:09 a.m. east, and its glow reflected from a long hanging harp, lighted the missile test center for 160 seconds.

Its powerful engine generating a force equivalent of 1,500 sticks of dynamite every second, the Douglas-made weapon roared out toward the edge of the earth at 4,000 m.p.h. and it started the coasting phase which was to end with separation of the nose cone.

In a combat situation, the nose cone would be equipped with a hydrogen warhead the size of a football.

The test was one of a continuing series of advanced research and development flight tests of the Thor weapons system," the Air Force said.

Something New Told For Club Luncheons

If you are looking for something out of the ordinary for your next club luncheon, Cheese Puffs with Bacon Cheese Sauce, may be just the answer.

The puffs are made like standard cream puff shells, except for the addition of cheese and hot pepper sauce for flavoring.

Cheese Puffs
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup boiling water
1/2 cup sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
Dash cayenne
Few drops hot pepper sauce
1/2 cup grated process American cheese
2 eggs

Add butter to water; stir until butter melts. Add flour and salt all at once. Stir vigorously until mixture is smooth and forms a ball. Remove from heat. Stir in cayenne, hot pepper sauce and cheese. Add eggs, one at a time, beating vigorously after each addition until mixture is thick and shiny.

Drop by teaspoons onto a lightly greased cookie sheet. Bake at 400 degrees for 20 minutes. Cut a small slit in each puff to release steam. Cut off tops; fill with the following sauce. Replace tops and serve.

Bacon-Cheese Sauce: Melt 2 tablespoons butter. Blend in 2 1/2 tablespoons flour. Add 1 cup milk gradually and cook until smooth and thickened, stirring constantly. Add 3 slices diced, cooked bacon and 1 cup grated process American cheese. Cook until cheese melts.

Pat Boone Has Book For Teens

NEW YORK (UPI)—Crooner Pat Boone, at age 13, suddenly lost interest in sling shots and such things.

A game called "spin the bottle" was one of the reasons. It happens that way, growing up, writes Boone in a book to teenagers, "Twist Twelve and Twenty" (Prentice-Hall).

The book is sprinkled with snatches from Boone's life teenage jargon, and preambles about how teenagers can understand themselves, one another, parents, teachers, life, love and even money.

The singer wrote about April love, puppy love, and the real thing. A kiss, said he, is a beautiful expression of love—real love.

But he warned that a kiss also is a powerful stimulus of emotion and that kissing real long, real often — for fun alone — is like playing with a "beautiful candle in a roomful of dynamite."

The beauty of a kiss, as Boone sees it, ceases when kisses lose their rare quality. Then, they lose their basic value.

"I really think it's better to amuse ourselves (from age 12 to 20) in some other way. Go bowling, to a basketball game or watch a good television program.

You can tell if you're really suffering from teenage fever if you feel insecure, restless, inconsistent, and undecided, Boone explained.

A cure: Get your sense of values straight. He suggested that teens do this by answering such questions as, Who am I trying to impress? What is important to me? What is important about what I have or what I am? Do I judge others by the kind of house they live in or by their smile?

In the big picture, don't forget about God, Boone said. "I am trying to tell you that to love God, to know His will and way, as revealed in the Bible, and to feel loved by Him, is to set your compass for the journey through life on a true course.

"It ensures your safe passage, your destination, and the greatest of all Companions on your travels. This is why we say to our friends when it is time to part, 'God go with you every step of the way.'"

He added: "Have fun now. Jam today! Lay a solid foundation and step up here into the adult world tomorrow. I'll be waiting for you."

War Dead Honored By Queen, Britain; Chapel Dedicated

LONDON (UPI)—Queen Elizabeth II personally led the people of Britain today in paying tribute to the 28,000 American servicemen who died while serving in Britain during World War II.

Vice President Richard M. Nixon served as President Eisenhower's personal representative at the dedication of an American memorial chapel in centuries-old St. Paul's Cathedral.

The chapel, complete with the names of the 28,000 American sailors, soldiers and airmen, was built by money subscribed by the people of Britain.

More than \$100,000 was raised from the pockets of people ranging from wealthy businessmen to children who remembered the presents given them by the GIs during the war.

It was for this dedication that Nixon arrived in Britain Tuesday. He will be here for four days during which time he will talk with British political leaders and eat Thanksgiving dinner with the Queen.

So far the vice president's trip has been marred only by the weather — fog that delayed arrival of the Nixon party for two hours.

A threatened Communist demonstration Tuesday night turned out to be more comical than dangerous, with Moscow Radio adding to the amusement by reporting a "mass protest demonstration" on the eve of Nixon's arrival — 24 hours before the demonstration occurred.

Washington Calling

 WASHINGTON—If the showdown over Berlin fails to materialize, American military planners will almost certainly claim that it was because preparations to meet it were so thorough and so complete.

The plan long in readiness calls for an air lift of American, British and French military outposts in Berlin. The estimated 600 to 700 planes required would be readily available. They have been designated in detailed planning for an attempt by the Communists to force the Western allies out of Berlin.

If the transport planes should be attacked as they fly between Frankfurt and Berlin in the air corridors provided under the four-power agreement, Communist attackers will be knocked down by American fighter planes. But the belief here is that the East German Communists will not go that far even if they are given full authority by the Russians when—and if—they carry out their promised withdrawal from the city. At the first sign of resistance the transport planes will be provided with a fighter escort.

The cost of supplying the military outposts with a 600-to-700-plane airlift is put at about one-tenth that of the Berlin lift of 1948-49. Then the entire city was supplied by air. Today Berlin's civilian population, under the agreement signed last week between East and West Germany, will get normal supplies by surface transportation. The conviction here is that such an airlift for the military garrison only could go on indefinitely.

The Communist powers in Moscow and their puppets in East Berlin unquestionably know in detail the carefully worked out plan to insure that the Western allies are not forced out of the city. They have been waiting for any show of irresolution which might indicate that the will to put that plan into effect is lacking.

Those signs have not been forthcoming. There have been hints that the Kremlin might be testing the Berlin situation in the light of the American election re-

turns on November 4 when overwhelming Democratic majorities were elected in Senate and House.

Several prominent Democrats have in recent days affirmed the right of the West to remain in Berlin.

While it may be premature, the conviction is growing that a firm stand, together with a carefully detailed plan to be put into effect at the first indication of a blockade, has caused a change of plans in Moscow. The Russians may go through with the ending of their share in the four-power occupation, but they will keep the East Germans on a tight leash to insure that nothing is done which could seriously endanger the peace.

The parallel with Quemoy and Matsu is already being suggested here. Because Administration policy was to hold firm and back Chiang Kai-shek on the offshore islands, despite widespread doubt among America's allies and in public opinion at home, the Communists gradually retreated from their defiant position, and comparative peace again prevails in the Formosa Strait.

It is quite possible, of course, that this supposition will be proved wrong day after tomorrow. Moscow may merely be working out a new tactic to keep the Berlin crisis boiling.

But while that earlier airlift occurred a decade ago the tremendous impression it made is still strong. In a year and a half British and American planes arriving at Tempelhof Airport at Berlin on the average of one every three minutes carried 2,348,315 tons of food and coal in 277,264 flights. The blockade ended with the arrival of a C-54 carrying two and a half tons of coal on September 30, 1949.

But while the military measures prepared to defeat a blockade may have forestalled a showdown, the position of the two Germanys appears to have been altered in this latest crisis. By signing an agreement with East Germany the Bonn government has taken at least one short, tentative step toward an arrangement with the Communist

ROAD TOWN, Tortola, B. V. I.—That's a new dateline for a news story, if I do say so, and how I ever wound up here in the British Virgin Islands talking to Millie Hammerley, who was a New York fan dancer in her youth, and Christopher, her British bar-rister husband, I'm not quite sure. Road Town is one of those down-at-the-heels tropical islands you read about in novels. Only way to get here is by boat through some rough seas, and some would say it isn't worth the effort. That's because they don't know Millie.

I vowed she was a girl worth talking to when I learned she scandalized this end of the Caribbean Sea last year by loading her horse aboard a sloop, chugging into the strait-laced American island of St. Thomas, and appearing in the Mardi Gras parade as Lady Godiva.

Millie, I hasten to add, isn't as young as she was when competing with Sally Rand. She's not tall, she weighs probably 150 pounds, and her hair is the shade of a Caribbean sunset. Upon her horse she must have been a sight to see, and I'm sorry I couldn't have been here to give this event the coverage (if that's the word) it deserved.

Millie was modest about it. She said that parade needed living up; the trouble was, those islanders didn't avert their heads as per the original story. They just stared at her, mouths agape. Served 'em right, said Millie.

She and Christopher run here on the hillside the Pink Hotel, which has a saloon in front, a living room in the middle, bedrooms in the rear, and a dining room up

the hill, and is probably the de-goonedest hostelry, bar none, ever to insult a prospective guest.

A drink in the Pink Hotel's bar costs 35 cents for locals, but all they get for their money is liquor. Visitors like myself from far places must pay the tourist rate, posted on the bar, of 75 cents per drink. That sound uncom-forensible when the best rum here-abouts costs only 65 cents a bottle, but at that price comes conversa-tion with Millie in her war paint and pearls.

Drinking this profitable hooch with the guests takes a good deal of her time; the trouble, according to Millie, is that after a few snorts, the customers get hungry and that's when she has to tell 'em off. She feeds nobody except on 48-hour notice, and then they get her version of a Tortola stew, featuring sweet potatoes and meat, except when she's been down to the dock and brought home a fish.

Only a couple of days ago, she said, 15 guests made reservations for stew and never showed up. Millie said she and Christopher will be up to their ears in stew through Thanksgiving.

That brought up the fact that Tortola is the only British island in the world where all business is done with American dollars. No British banker ever thought it important to open shop in Road Town. The British Admiralty

never got around to inspecting the Tortola fishing fleet and, as a consequence, the boats sail under U. S. Coast Guard regulations. The locals don't like this and I can't say I blame 'em. Just one more item to bring to the attention of the Queen.

Another fabulous lady I met is Charlotte Dean Stark, who wrote for many years on the New York Times and returned to St. John Island two decades ago. She and her husband live on top of a hill overlooking the turquoise water, from which rise 14 green islands in their immediate view. They never tire of looking.

Mrs. Stark still pounds her type-writer; her latest book, about to be published, is titled "Souvenir of St. John," an authoritative treatise on the island she loves. I knew she'd be unusual when I inquired the name of the jeep driver who bounced me to the Stars. He said his name was Charles Marshall, but his friends called him Sweet Lime Juice.

Sweet Lime Juice said he surely liked Mrs. Stark, but sometimes he did wonder a little about her cooking. She is an authority on island cookery, and I soon got Sweet Lime Juice's idea. She served me small sandwiches of minced whelk on homemade rye bread.

Sugar Bowl Hopes To Get Mustangs

NEW ORLEANS (UPI)—Clemson may wait at the threshold of a Sugar Bowl invitation today that may or may not materialize depending on the outcome of a traditional game in Texas Saturday.

The field of possible opponents for unbeaten and untied Louisiana State in the Jan. 1 post season game was narrowed to two teams—Southern Methodist and Clemson—Wednesday with the announcement that Washington State's bid for a post season

game was vetoed by the Pacific Coast Conference.

The key to the hardpressed Sugar Bowl selection committee's decision will be the outcome of the Southern Methodist-Texas Christian game in Dallas.

Southern Methodist, although already beaten four times this season, will be the heavy favorite for the bid if it wins over Southwest Conference champion TCU.

Claude (Monk) Simons, president of the Mid-Winter Sports Association which sponsors the post-season game, has already expressed a preference for the Tigers—those from LSU and the Clemson breed.

But he qualifies his personal position with the observation that it is only one man on the Sugar Bowl's 17-man selection committee.

The Washington State Cougars were eliminated from contention from the bid Wednesday when Pacific Coast Conference members voted down WSC's request for a bid. South Carolina SMC got its lumps from the likes of Ohio State, Notre Dame and Rice.

Odds-makers say the point spread between the Mustangs and LSU would be less than the spread between the Bayou Tigers and Clemson.

Brewer 'Arrived' With Good Round In 'Derby' Open

In the 1957 Kentucky Derby Open, played in his backyard, so to speak, Gay Brewer Jr., shot 84-77-101 and then, red-faced and more determined than ever, went home to Lexington, Ky., to practice.

In his next outing, the Kansas City Open, the 25-year-old 1949 national junior king tied for fourth place, winning 1150, his first prize of the year.

The following week, Brewer led the nation's U. S. Open qualifiers with a stellar 123 for 36 holes.

These developments illustrate two points about the drawing Brewer: (A) He's an excellent practitioner; (B) He's about as erratic as a golfer on the PGA tour.

Hot and cold performances have been characteristic of Brewer since he joined the circuit following a brief stint as assistant pro at the Cincinnati, O., C. C. early in '56.

During his two-week practice session after his flop at Louisville, cleft-chinned Gay discovered he hadn't been lining up his left shoulder and hip properly with the hole as he putted. This, of course, pulled his stroke out of line.

Brewer corrected this flaw and has been playing much better since. He was runner-up in the '57 Erie, Pa., Open and missed tying for first place in the '57 West-Florida Open by one shot. In all, he won more than \$5000 in '57.

Fellow touring pros feel the answer to Gay's sometimes erratic play lies in his swing, one of the most orthodox in big time tournament golf.

The 5-11 3/4 170-pounder has a peculiar loop at the top of his backswing.

"This," Gay points out, "is because my right elbow goes out on the backswing. On the downswing I tuck the elbow in closer to my hip."

Gay's top '56 effort was a fifth-place tie in the Miller High Life Open, netting him \$1700. He also tied for eighth in the Philadelphia Daily News Open in '56.

Gay, who started playing golf at eight, has won virtually every amateur tournament in Kentucky. He won a caddy tournament at 73, was competing in amateur tournaments at 14, later won the Kentucky Open as an amateur and also copped the Southern amateur title. Possessor of more than 70 trophies, Gay was runner-up in the National Jaycees Tournament in '50.

This personable bachelor left the University of Kentucky after his freshman year. On the tour, representing Gay represents the Hillerich & Bradbury Co., Dunlop Tire & Rubber Co., the Golf Pride Grip Co. of Akron, O., and also sells Jerry Barber golf gloves to fellow touring pros.

Marquette's Druze Quits; Blackburn Sought As Coach

MILWAUKEE (UPI)—Head football Coach Johnny Druze, whose Marquette teams have won just two games in three years, has resigned and a movement was underway today to return former Green Bay Packer Coach Lisle Blackburn, who gave the university its last winning year in 1953.

Druze's resignation was announced Wednesday by Marquette Athletic Director Larry Mullins and will become effective Feb. 15, 1959, when his three-year contract with the school expires. The Marquette athletic board was expected to act upon the resignation shortly.

Druze, 44, said he was leaving Marquette in the "best interests" of the university and for the welfare of his family. He posted a 2-15-1 record at Marquette, the school's worst in a consecutive three-year period. The two victories came this season after 19 straight losses. Marquette will play its final game of the year Saturday night at Arizona State.

"I just reached the situation point," Druze said, referring to the losses. "There's no remorse. If Marquette can find a better man to do a better job, that's fine for the school."

Blackburn served as head football coach at Marquette from 1950 to 1953 and had his best season the last year with a 6-2-1 record. He quit Marquette to coach the Packers, who fired him after the 1957 season. Blackburn returned to college coaching at Carroll, of Waukesha, Wis., this year and built a green team into a title contender in the Colgate Conference of Illinois, finishing in a second place tie.

Auburn-Alabama Tussle Will Be Rough

ATLANTA (UPI)—Fourth-ranked Auburn, unbeaten in 23 games, and fast-climbing Alabama, seeking to regain its gridiron fortune at the hands of Paul (Bear) Bryant, tangle in Birmingham Saturday in what shapes up as one of the roughest games of the season.

Both Auburn (8-0-1) and Alabama (5-2-1) feature defenses which begrudge every yard of yardage. This similarity of purpose gives promise of an outstanding show for an expected turnout of 64,000.

For many years the Alabama Crimson Tide was one of the greats of southeastern football; Auburn a poor relation. But in the past six years Auburn has been a powerhouse while Alabama has

been down and out. Since 1953, Auburn has won 47 games, lost only nine and tied three. Over that time span Alabama has been 19-31-8.

Since mid-1956, the only blot on an otherwise perfect record for Auburn was a 7-7 tie with Georgia Tech early this season.

But the folks at Alabama don't like playing second fiddle in their cross-state rival. This year they brought in Bryant, a coach with an amazing record for reviving football teams. The results are already evident as Alabama has assured itself of its first winning season since 1953, including a 17-6 win over Tech which tied Auburn.

However, Auburn is a definite favorite. The Tigers have added an offensive note to their play of late and two previously injured stars, quarterback Lloyd Nix and halfback Tommy Lortino, have returned to duty. The Auburn line will have a 20-pound-per-man advantage.

Traditional intrastate rivalries like the Auburn-Alabama game dot the Southeastern Conference scene this weekend, the curtain-closer for 1958. Others are Georgia

in Georgia Tech at Athens, Ga.; Mississippi-Mississippi State at Oxford, Miss.; Vanderbilt-Tennessee at Nashville, Tenn.; and Florida-Miami at Jacksonville, Fla.

Tech (5-3-1) isn't a probable bowl team but a win over unpredictable Georgia (3-6) would mean a successful season. Tech has the edge in defense and speed; Georgia has the power, passing and kicking.

Mississippi (7-2) could get a Gator Bowl bid with a win Saturday. Mississippi State (3-5) gets the conference booby prize with a loss, ending up in the basement for only the second time in its history. Vanderbilt (5-1-1) is another Gator Bowl prospect and an expected win over up-and-down Tennessee (3-6) coupled with a Mississippi victory would probably pair these two at Jacksonville on Dec. 27.

Florida (3-3-1), also a Gator Bowl prospect, has a wide defensive edge and is favored to hand downtrodden Miami (1-7) another beating.

Renn Establishes 3 Career Records

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Florida State's Bobby Renn set three new career records this fall as the surprising Seminoles finished one of their best football years in school history.

The talented senior left halfback ended with 44 points for the three-year scoring total of 99 points. He rolled up 442 yards on the ground to run his career rushing record to 1,455 yards.

And he averaged 38 yards on 82 points over three campaigns for another career marker.

Florida State closed out the season Saturday with a 21-7 loss to the University of Florida in the first of a series between the two arch rivals.

Altogether, the Seminoles won seven games, including upsets over Tennessee and Miami, and lost three.

Renn, an honorable mention choice for UPI All-America, was drafted choice of the Cleveland Browns. He and senior quarterback Vic Princi of Waverly, N.Y., were 1958 co-captains.

Princi completed 40 of 71 passes this season, giving him a career pass completion record of 91 good out of 178 throws.

Princi and junior quarterback Joe Majors teamed up to set a single game Seminole team record of 30 pass attempts against Florida. Majors attempted 26 for an individual single-game record. Kicking specialist Johnny Shepard figured in a couple of records.

The Tallahassee senior kicked 19 of 21 points after touchdown to run his career record to 49 of 55. He kicked a field goal against Georgia Tech this season, later added goals against Tennessee and Miami for a perfect three-for-three.

Alaskan Can Keep Tabs, Easily, On His Officials

JUNEAU, Alaska —(UPI)—When it comes to keeping tabs on state officers, Alaskans will have an easy time of it.

Alaska's unique constitution, which will take effect when the territory becomes a state early next year, provides for only ten and vice president are in national elections.

Virtually the entire responsibility for administration of the state elected executives, the governor and the secretary of state, who will be tied together on the ballot the way candidates for president government will rest with the governor, who will appoint all department heads and commissions. Thomas B. Stuart, Juneau attorney who was secretary of the 75-day convention which produced the constitution, says the delegates wanted a strong governor and believed "a responsible executive should be master in his own house."

Another gubernatorial power lies in the system for reapportioning the new state's legislative election districts as the population grows or shifts. Each 10 years, the governor must provide for reapportionment on the advice of a board representing the state's four major districts. The legislature has no say on reapportionment, but changes in election districts effected by the governor are subject to review in the courts.

Santa Is Preferred On Yule Cards

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI)—Santa Claus is a one-to-eight favorite in the 1958 Christmas card derby.

At first glance, such odds wouldn't accord the old gentleman preferred status. But, considering the thousands of other designs against which he will compete, Santa's position is strong.

St. Nick occupies the pinnacle this year because that's where the American public has placed him, said a spokesman for Hallmark Cards, world's largest greeting card publisher. And public preferences are always honored in the Christmas card business.

The 300 artists who create the company's 11,000 new greeting card designs each year are guided by experience, research and an alertness to changing consumer tastes. This knowledge has ranked brightly colored ornaments, candles and floral designs, in that order, behind Santa Claus as customer favorites this year.

Although familiar symbols of the holiday lead, the cards are distinguished by many new styling touches. Santa Claus, for example, wears a beard fashioned of stand-up plastic granules on

some of the cards. On others, his traditional red suit is reproduced in luminescent ink for a glowing appearance.

Elegance is imparted to other greetings through a new process of foil embossing. The metal is sculptured to form Biblical tableaux, portraits of the Wise Men, wreaths and the like. Another new technique creates designs printed on foil, giving a deep-dimension appearance.

Fabrics, too, play an important part. Paintings are reproduced on

silk panels. Elaborate designs and messages come embroidered in colorful thread as miniature tapestries. The texture of linen has been duplicated in another series of designs with the flavor of oriental prints.

Color is used in unusual ways. Black is combined with gold and silver for striking results. "Off-beat" shades for Christmas cards—pink, gray and pale blue—are used extensively. Red and green also are popular, often in distinctive new tones.

Many processes and techniques are carried outside the cards to the envelopes. In some cases, a segment of the card's design, perhaps a Christmas tree or a cluster of bells, is reproduced on the envelope. Other envelopes are bordered in red, or bear a stripe that repeats the card's basic color scheme. Some envelopes have a simulated "lining," actually printed—a feature adopted from Christmas card envelopes of the 1920's.

 - 1/2 lb. brown sugar
 - 1/2 cup molasses
 - 1/2 cup marmalade
 - 1/2 cup molasses
 - 1/2 cup marmalade
- Four batter into loaf cake pans lined with heavy waxed paper. Fill each pan in within 1/2 inch of rim. Bake in oven at 275 F for 2 to 4 1/2 hours, depending upon the size of fruit cakes. Cool thoroughly. Wrap each cake in cheesecloth soaked in Danish wine.

Christmas Arrives Early For Those In Club Plan

Christmas will start early for over thirteen million Americans this year... when they receive the check from their Christmas Club savings.

Christmas Club, for those not familiar with the term, is a formalized savings plan whereby the depositor commits himself to fifty equal payments and is rewarded a year later by the amount, between Nov. 4 and Dec. 2, of a predictable amount of cash. Usually it is exactly the amount put in.

Some financial institutions, offering this type of savings program, however, pay interest, some charge penalties if the saver falls short of his goal, and others merely guard the funds.

The Christmas Club method of thrift originated, not surprisingly, in Scotland. The Frugality Banks of that country first set up special accounts of this type in 1798.

The idea didn't penetrate the New World until after the Civil War when it began as a paternalistic arrangement, with employers rather than the financial institutions themselves "accepting" weekly deposits for repayment at Christmas time.

Soon the institutions saw there was a place for them in this scheme, and by 1914 there were some 3,000 banks which had Christmas Club savings plans.

Actually, only about a third of the savings will be spent on holiday gifts and such. Another third will go back as permanent savings and the remainder will go into payments for taxes, mortgage payments, year-end bills, etc.

The average Christmas Club saver is more than pleased with the method and is delighted that at least one regular payment isn't going to a creditor.

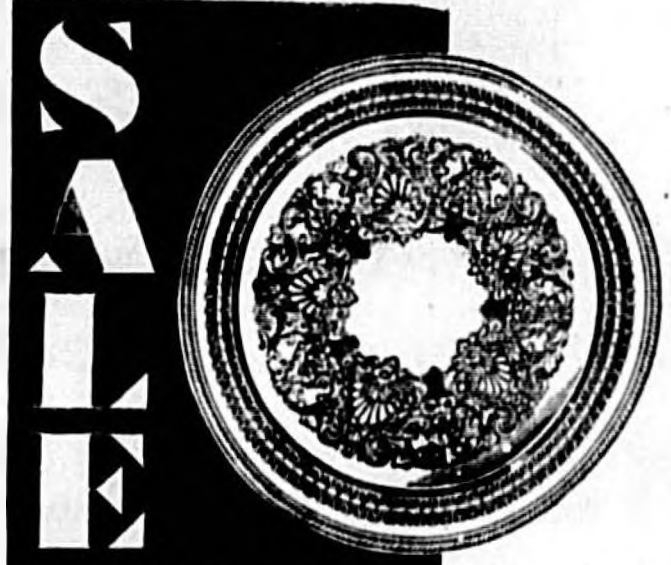

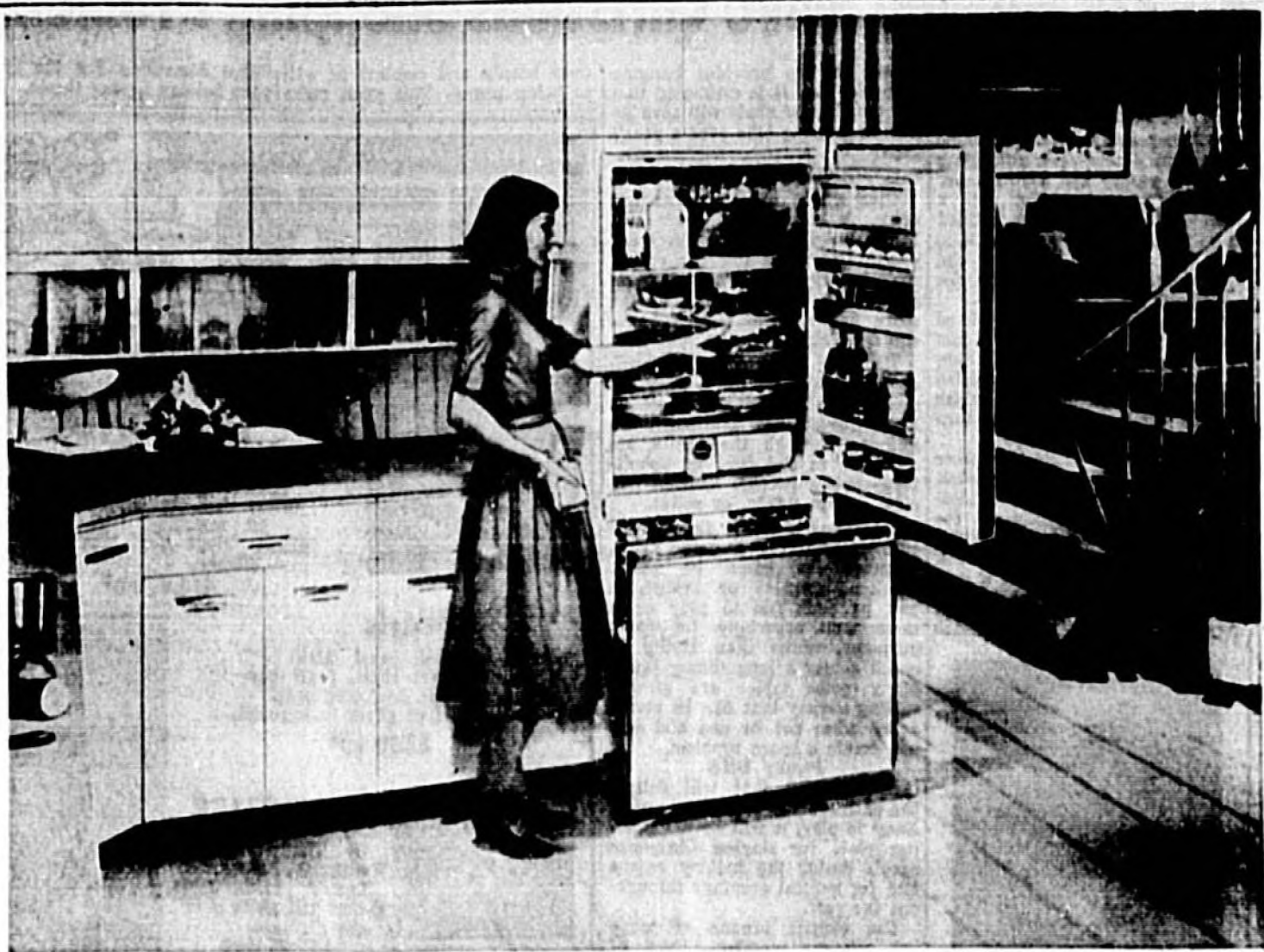

Nothing is more appreciated by a wife than a "White Christmas," a major appliance to make her daily chores easier the year-round.

40 Years Ago: Penguin, Vosse, Zicer Or Germanic

Forty years ago you might have given her a Penguin to symbolize a White Christmas. Or it may have been a Vosse, a Zicer, or a Germanic.

These are brand names of electric refrigerators which have long since disappeared. But back in 1916 they were the pioneers in the field. The Germanic, in fact, is said to have been the first nationally advertised refrigerator.

More than mere names have changed in household refrigeration, however. Those 1916 models, of course, bear only a faint resemblance to current beauties. As a matter of fact, today's electric refrigerator differs radically from what was being sold as recently as five or ten years ago.

The primary change has been in the direction of convenience and automation. While you hear considerable talk about dramatic new inventions like the electronic refrigerator, such things are a good few years away. What really distinguishes today's refrigerators, however, are the extra convenience features and reliability built into their performance.

Eliminating the chore of manual defrosting is but one of these conveniences which means a great deal to the housewife. Just as automatic defrosting represented a major improvement in refrigerator design a few years ago, now emphasis is being placed on designing units in which frost never accumulates. Several brands incorporating this advantage are on the market today. No woman who has ever tottered across the kitchen floor with a tray filled with defrost water is likely to underestimate the importance of this development.

Less dramatic perhaps, but every bit as important to the housewife are trays which roll out and trays which revolve. There are egg racks and cheese keepers and butter conditioners.

Years ago you had to hold ice cube trays under a running faucet to get the ice out. Now there are a whole variety of trays with easy release features. And there are electric refrigerators which automatically maintain a constant supply of ice cubes so that no matter how many you use, more always will be on hand.

Most important of all, designers have taken heed of the housewife's desire to have a ready supply of frozen food on hand. The original refrigerator-freezer combinations have given birth to a whole family of new types, some with the freezer on the bottom, others with it on top and each with enough space to satisfy the requirements of any family, large or small.

Aware of the growing popularity of the home freezer, one manufacturer is marketing a unique pair of matching electric refrigerator and freezer. The refrigerator has no frozen food storage space at all since the matching twin freezer provides the space.

While this approach appeals to some families, others have found that limited floor space forces them to choose a single unit in which both refrigerator and freezer have been combined. This can be conveniently restocked from a freezer located in the basement, breezeway or garage.

These practical improvements have resulted in today's refrigerator which is almost as different from yesterday's as today's brand names are different from the long lost Vosse-Zicer, Germanic and Penguin.

One jet airliner innovation is automatic oxygen masks. If pressurization falls below the equivalent of 10,000 feet, a panel containing the mask flips open automatically.

Today, McVicker heads his own toy company, Rainbow Crafts Inc., a firm expected to gross three million dollars this year.

The firm produces a modeling substance, not a clay, that doesn't stain clothing or furniture and is harmless if swallowed. It's called Play-Doh.

Joe invented it after watching his daughter, Julie, play with samples of dough-like wallpaper cleaner compound. With a little work, thought McVicker, the compound could be developed into a modeling substance.

Since he learned the toy business the hard way, McVicker has a number of tips for anyone else who comes up with a hot game or toy idea and wants to put it on the market.

"Find out who sells what you make and learn how and when they do their buying," said McVicker.

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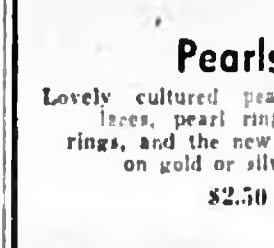

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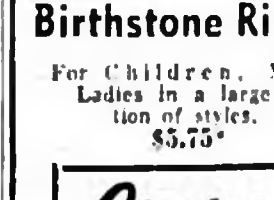

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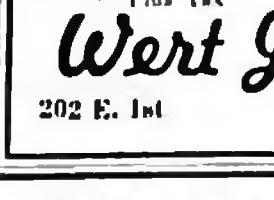

Santa Is Attacked As 'Pagan Goblin'; Storm Stirred Up

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (UPI) — A Copenhagen clergyman who called Santa Claus a "pagan goblin" has stirred a storm of protest throughout Santa-loving Denmark.

The furor caused by the Rev. Paul Nedergaard's remark has not been equalled here since the day 10 years ago when Canada's Dr. Brock Chisholm broke the news to Denmark that there is no Santa Claus.

Nedergaard's wrath was aroused by the appearance of a picture of St. Nick on Christmas cards which are being sold by a Danish children's welfare organization.

"These seals bear a symbol of a pagan goblin," he said. "You should refuse to buy them. Find some other way to aid the welfare organization."

The outbreak of protest that resulted inspired a strongly critical editorial in the Copenhagen newspaper.

Maybe Santa Claus is a pagan goblin, but the Christmas tree and mistletoe are not mentioned in the Bible, and yet they have been depicted on the stamps," the editorial said.

"Who says their motif has to be religious? The purpose is to collect money for children's welfare. We don't believe a goblin will hurt the sale of Christmas seals—but a clergyman can harm the good cause."

No one appeared to be paying much attention to Nedergaard's call for a boycott of the seals. Business was reported brisk.

Chisholm, a physician who was then director of the World Health Organization, touched off an uproar here by remarking that Santa Claus doesn't really exist.

Dances of all ages sprang to the aid of the "jolly old elf," declaring that of course he exists.



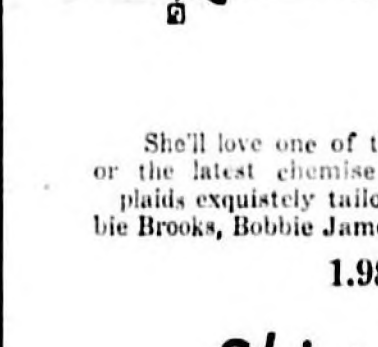

Storms, Blizzards Grip Mid-Nation; Death Toll Climbs

Snow accumulations of one to three inches sifted across the nation's midsection from Texas to western Illinois today in a gathering storm centered in the Southwest.

The new storm, coupled with an earlier blizzard across the northern plains, brought a wintry cast of white to much of the nation over the Thanksgiving holiday.

Weathermen warned of heavy snow from Oklahoma and Kansas northeastward into Iowa and the lower Great Lakes and Ohio valleys.

A mound of Arctic air draining southward from the Yukon plunged readings to 13 below at International Falls, Minn., and brought sub-freezing temperatures as far south as Virginia.

A rash of fires erupted in the cold air belt. The victims included five children killed in their beds in a fire Thursday at an Oklahoma City convalescent nursing home, and a mother, father and four of their children killed in a blaze that destroyed their home at North Little Rock, Ark.

Among other fire victims were a 3-year-old Illinois, Conn., girl whose four brothers and sister perished in a fire seven years ago, and a 70-year-old man who died in a Vermont blaze.

At least four children drowned while testing thin ice formed by the coldest weather of the season in Chicago. Jerry Melnyk, 12, and Roman Klowaty, 12, drowned in a park lagoon Thursday, and two 8-year-old Stoughton, Wis., girls, Tarry Ann Anderson and Jackie Berndt, drowned the night before in a municipal swimming pool.

Grandpa Ike Has Dull Carving Knife

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI)—Grandpa Ike grumped about the carving knife. It couldn't cut butter, much less a 35-pound turkey. Besides that, the knife didn't want anything but white meat and when it came time for dessert, they turned down the pumpkin pie and yelled for ice cream.

So it went Thursday at Thanksgiving dinner in thousands of American homes—and particularly at the transplanted White House here where the grandpa was President Eisenhower.

In not many American homes, however, was the turkey carved under the glare of movie floodlights, or the mashed potatoes ladled out before the lenses of the new camera. The President and his family bore up cheerfully, however, under the few minutes of public attention and gaily went about the tradition of Thanksgiving.

When the President started to carve the turkey he had difficulty in hacking away one leg from the main turkey carcass, clutching the other drumstick for maximum leverage. His son, Maj. John S. Eisenhower, came to his rescue while Mrs. Eisenhower and John's wife looked on patiently.

Berlin Vice Tightened

★★★

Reds Won't Budge From Position On Troop Withdrawal

MOSCOW (UPI)—The language of the Soviet note on Berlin struck Western observers today as laying down a tough line from which Russia is not prepared to budge.

Russia delivered notes to the Western Big Three and to West Germany Thursday, demanding the West quit Berlin within six months and that West Berlin be made into a demilitarized "free city."

Premier Nikita Khrushchev's press conference statement said, "We are not deciding the question on the basis of an ultimatum" softened some of the Western apprehension.

But observers also noted his remark that "those who are in favor of continuing the cold war" will oppose the proposal.

The note said any act of aggression against any member of the Warsaw Treaty "will be considered by all of its members as acts of aggression against them all, and will immediately invoke an appropriate retaliation."

On the basis of the Soviet statements, any showdown would shape up for May 27, 1959—six months from Thursday. The Western Big Three could then:

- Agree to pull their troops out of West Berlin and leave it a free, demilitarized city. The initial condition among Western observers here was that this was unlikely.
- Run convoys into West Berlin across East German territory by force. Russia said such "violations" would be met by counterforce.
- Modify the Western refusal to deal with the East Germans and try to come to some arrangement with them over Berlin. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles has said the United States might agree to deal with East German "agents" of the Soviet Union. But the Russian note appeared to exclude any arrangements other than those within a framework of clearing West Berlin a free city, making all troops.

★★★

Berlin Demands Allies Remain, Fight For City

BERLIN (UPI)—Isolated West Berlin demanded today the Western Allies use military force if necessary to save it from absorption by the Communists.

Leaders and citizens alike rejected the Soviet proposal to establish a "neutralized free city" in West Berlin and called it a cunning Soviet power attempt to swallow another part of the free world.

West Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt warned the Western powers: "Do not put your head in the sand. The naked existence of 2,300,000 people who live in West Berlin is at stake. The Soviet goal is absolutely clear — all of Berlin is to be incorporated into the Soviet Zone."

Brandt said the United States, Britain and France must back up the city with their military might and announced he would fly shortly to Washington to discuss the situation.

Glee Solesma Pledge

He said the Allies have given their solemn pledge to defend the city and "we cannot release our Allied friends from this responsibility."

Brandt's warning was echoed by Ernst Lemmer, top representative of the West German government in Berlin. He said West Berlin would never agree to become a man's-land in the middle of Germany and Europe.

Most Berliners immediately conjured up a vision of the free city of Danzig which was annexed by Adolf Hitler the moment he saw fit.

★★★

Soviet On Notice That Threats Nor Tricks Will Work

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Soviet Union was on notice today that the United States and its allies can be neither tricked nor threatened in turning free West Berlin over to "hostile domination" by the Communists.

The Western Allies began consultations which foreshadowed virtually certain rejection of Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's forceful proposal to force Britain, France and the United States out of West Berlin and turn it into a "demilitarized free city."

The Russians said that if the Western Big Three refused to agree to the plan within six months, the Soviet Union would withdraw from its sector in East Berlin and force the Allies to deal with the puppet East German Communist regime, which they refuse to recognize.

U. S. Lashes Back

The United States lashed back in a sharp statement declaring that the Russians apparently want to "keep their grip on East Berlin" while tricking the Allies into leaving West Berlin "in favor of what is called a 'free city'."

"If we accept even a single point in this complicated arrangement," one official said, "we will have taken the first slippery step leading inevitably to the communization of Berlin and perpetual division of Germany."

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (UPI)—The Florida Gators, with a steady 5-3-1 record, will be host team in the Gator Bowl if they top Miami Saturday, it was announced today.

"It looks as if Florida will be one of the teams in the Gator Bowl," selection committee chairman Sam Wolfson told United Press International. "But we won't definitely decide which two teams will play until 7 p.m. Saturday."

The Gators have impressive wins over UCLA, Tulane and Florida State. They lost by one touchdown to Mississippi State and dropped games to top-ranked Louisiana State and unbeaten Auburn by three and one point, respectively.

Wolfson said the list of teams was narrowed this morning to six teams—Mississippi, Florida, Vanderbilt, Georgia Tech and Alabama, if it beats Auburn, and South Carolina.

Dropped from the list were Pittsburgh which lost a 25-21 decision to Penn State Thursday, and Texas which indicated it would decline an invitation to play in a bowl game.

Coach Bob Woodruff and his Gators, who also topped Georgia and Arkansas State and were tied by Vanderbilt, haven't gone to a bowl since 1932 and are hungry for a post-season appearance.

It was believed they would accept the invitation without hesitation if they down rival Miami. Florida is favored by 14 points over the oft-beaten Hurricane.

Most observers believed Mississippi will get the bid to play the visiting team post if the Rebels stop Mississippi State Saturday.

At Least 153 Dead Due To Accidents

A United Press International count at mid - morning, showed at least 123 persons killed in traffic since the four - day holiday began Wednesday evening. In addition, 18 persons died in fires, one in a airplane crash and 23 in miscellaneous accidents for an overall toll of 153.

Ohio reported the heaviest traffic toll with 11 dead, followed by California and New York with nine each, Illinois, Alabama and Pennsylvania with eight each and Virginia with six.

The National Safety Council, as is its custom, declined to estimate the nation's Thanksgiving holiday traffic toll. However, it said that an average of 470 persons are killed in traffic during non - holiday periods of the same length, from 6 p.m. Wednesday to midnight Sunday, at this time of year.

Taxpayers Given Gentle Reminder

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) reminded taxpayers today that maximum income for filing the "short form" tax returns for 1958 has been boosted to \$10,000.

The revenue service said it was issuing the reminder because about 53 million 1958 W-2 forms (statements of earnings and tax withholdings, incorrectly carry a maximum figure of \$5,000. The forms were printed before the income limit was doubled.

Some taxpayers who changed jobs this year have already received W-2 statements showing the old limit.

An IRS spokesman said the forms printed before the change would be used. That they amounted to about half the total W-2 printing.

Under the new rules, taxpayers may use the short form, Form 1099A, if their wage or salary income was less than \$10,000 in 1958 and other earnings did not top \$500. Married couples may file a joint return on Form 1099A if their combined income did not exceed these limits.

City Is Spraying Mosquitoes Again

For the first time in the recollection of Sanford residents, the city is spraying for mosquitoes in November.

The spray equipment was moved from the truck in September, and replaced last Monday when numerous complaints and an obvious increase in the insects forced the sprayer from winter storage.

According to City Manager Warren E. Knowles, it will take nine days to cover the entire city. The work was begun last Monday.

Sanford Soon Will Have Putt-Putt Golf Course

Sanford soon will have a Putt-Putt golf course, one of 80 miniature golf courses located throughout the U. S.

Construction on the 18-hole course started last week. It will be next to the Burger-King on 17-92.

Owner Harold H. Hardester of Altamonte Springs plans a December opening for the course, which will feature a clubhouse, green felt fairways which give a true roll to the ball, and a parking area for cars. Two rest rooms have been built on the north side of the property.

Each hole will be constructed to facilitate a hole-in-one. A system has been devised for free passes for each game and anyone getting a hole-in-one on each hole during a 45-day period will get 15 free passes. The price will be 40 cents per game, for men, women and children. Initial club and scorecards will be kept in the clubhouse.

Hardester will operate under a franchise from the Putt-Putt Golf Course, with headquarters in Fayetteville, N. C. National tournaments are held, with local winners standing. Last year prizes of a Cadillac for men, a Pontiac for women and a \$1,000 bond for children under 14 were copped by national winners. This year, two-week paid vacations to Paris and Mexico will be added to the list.

Putt-Putt will be open from noon to midnight, excluding Sunday. The orange and white color scheme will be highlighted by brilliant fluorescent lights. A huge neon sign will attract transients.

Hardester formerly operated the 30-hole Putt-Putt on Highway 50 in Orlando. He spent five years with the First Infantry Division, and six years with the Army Corps of Engineers, building air bases in Labrador and Iceland. His wife is a native of Reykjavik, Iceland. They have two children, Siggy, 6, and Nellie Mae, 10 months.

The Putt-Putt Golf Course was located in Sanford through Stepan Real Estate. Local contractors are Sanford Electric, Harper Nease, and B. L. Harvey, plumbers.

Hardester is enthusiastic about his business, and Sanford in particular. "All of my dealings with local business men and city officials have been very pleasant, and their co-operation has been much appreciated," he said.
