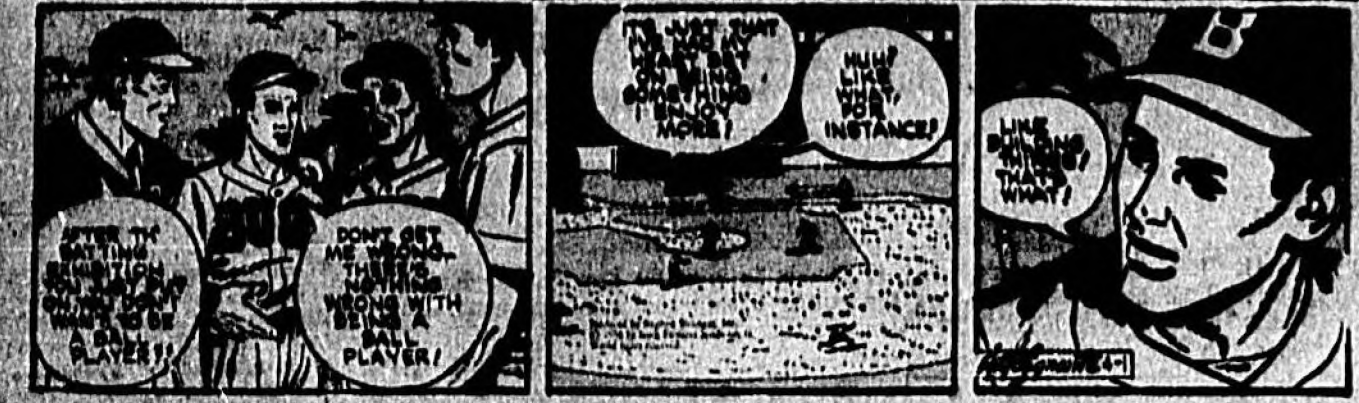
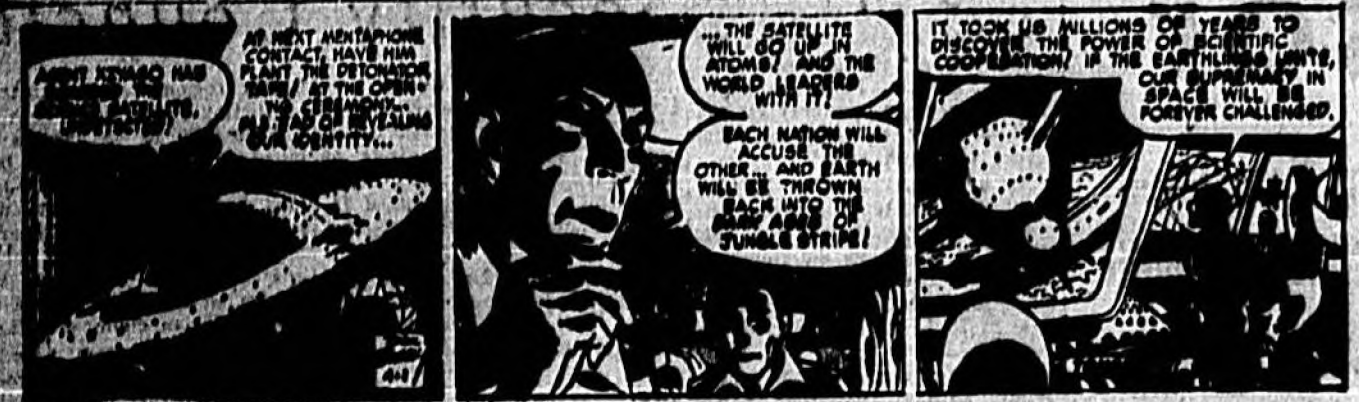
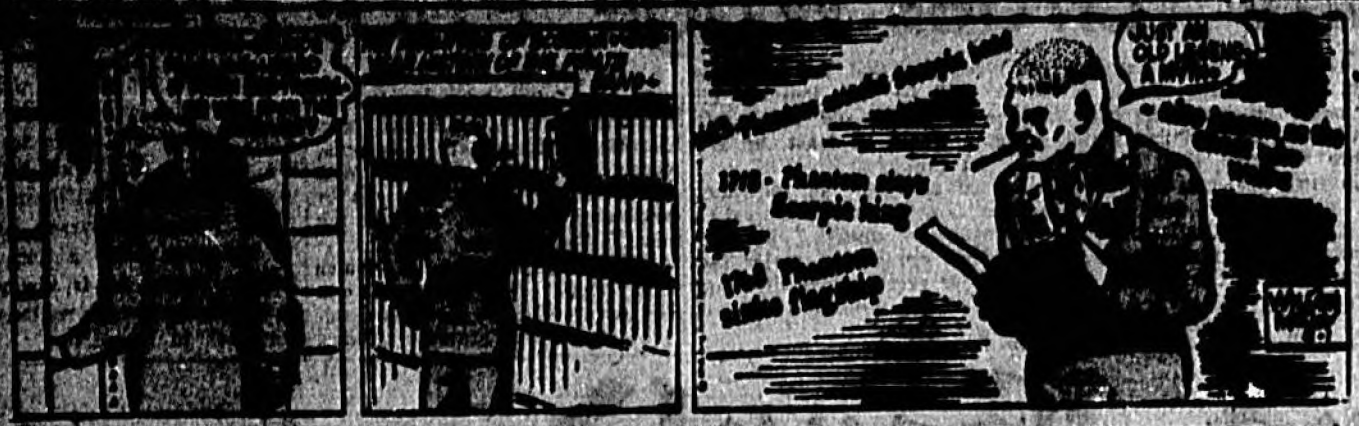

Highway 46 Is An Important Link In Florida's Road System

The four-laning of another Central Florida highway calls attention to the fact that Highway 46, an important route through central Florida to the East Coast, needs the attention of our road-minded citizens.

When Highway 441-87 is four-laned during the latter part of this year, as has been promised, traffic making its way into Central Florida will be curved away from Sanford and Seminole County and thereby taken into crowded centers where traffic snarls and congestion add, not only displeasure to traveling, but also takes visitors over a more circuitous route.

The four-laning of Highway 46 from Sanford to the Duval-Mount Dora-Tavares area would provide easy access for visitors coming down through the state to the East Coast by way of both Highway 46 and 416. It is another connecting link for Sanford and its importance in the industrial picture of Florida. Highway 46's present condition doesn't lend to heavy traffic which could well be shunted with the widening, paving, and four-laning of this important segment of Florida's highway system.

Telephone Tax An Out-Dated One

We've always heard that once a tax is imposed it would take a near catastrophe to remove it. That's not the case though when the removal of the already out-dated transportation tax and the tax on telephone service comes up.

Back in the World War Two era, these taxes were imposed as temporary measures to keep down the heavy burden of unnecessary travel and the unnecessary use of the then heavily-burdened communications system. Of course, the income from these sources assisted in the defense cost burden at that time.

In addition, there's another thought we'd like to inject. The telephone tax is an exceedingly bad one. In the first place, it's discriminatory. There's no excise tax on water, gas, or electricity—and they're public utilities just as your telephone communication service is. The telephone is the only essential household utility that is so taxed.

The telephone tax cannot be evaded by the taxpayer, because he has to fork over the bill when he pays his monthly telephone bill. And the funds practically roll in without much effort on the Government's part, because the phone companies do the work of collecting from the people.

Here's another thing, the excise tax is a burdensome surcharge on top of all the other telephone taxes each customer must help pay. It's been figured that out of every \$1 the average user pays for telephone service, 28 cents goes to taxes.

Agriculture Dept. Predicts Cigarette Production Jump

WASHINGTON—The Department of Agriculture expects another jump in cigarette production this year although the tobacco crop is expected to remain about the same as last year's relatively small crop.

The department reported that despite the small crop, cigarette output in 1957 reached a record 14 billion cigarettes, an increase of 10 billion above the record set in 1952.

The department's publication, "The Tobacco Situation," said the big 1957 gain in cigarette output was due entirely to the 40 per cent increase in filter tips which more than offset the 10 per cent drop in unfiltered cigarettes.

Although output rose to a new high, the amount of leaf tobacco used was barely equal to that used in 1956, and about 100 million pounds less than the amount used five years ago.

State Insured Unemployment Up

TALLAHASSEE—Inured unemployment in Florida rose by 489 last week, Industrial Commission Chairman James Vocelle reported today.

The number out of work covered either by state insurance or by insurance or the benefits for former federal employes program totaled 31,805.

That is 1.8 per cent above the previous week and 127.9 per cent above the same period a year ago.

Inside Washington

WASHINGTON—The Republican administration is holding to the hope that a series of measures already taken or soon to be taken will put the national economy back on an even keel without resort to a tax cut.

Members close to the White House feel that a tax reduction would serve to further unbalance the budget while the economy should be able to right itself without one. The heavy use of "red ink" in government financing, they say, would then touch off new inflationary pressures—cutting the value of savings, life insurance and reducing real income of persons on fixed dollar incomes.

Continued relaxation of Federal Reserve bank discount rates and reserve requirements, stepped-up highway and public works spending and more defense spending and the expected increase in unemployment compensation payments should, it is hoped, do the trick.

However, a tax cut will be recommended, or approved, if the Democratic side's initiative and push through Congress should the slump continue into May.

REPUBLICANS WARY—GOP leaders have decided to take no chances on losing any more congressional seats than necessary, with the political tides running against them as of now. They have taken two steps to maintain their House majority: 1—Not to call special elections to fill vacancies; 2—To hold up appointments of GOP congressmen to federal judgeships.

The party leadership was particularly concerned over the narrow squeak of the GOP candidate in the recent special election in the normally rock-ribbed Republican first district in Minnesota. Rep. Albert Quie defeated Democrat Eugene Foley by 655 votes out of nearly 80,000 cast to fill the seat of the late August Anderson (R), who used to win by margins of from 25,000 to 50,000. The seat has been Republican since 1893.

Two other vacancies resulted from deaths of Republicans—Hens, Lawrence Smith of Wisconsin and Russell Kealey of Illinois. Although Smith had served several terms, there is a heavy union vote in that district and it is considered a toss-up. Kealey's district is more safely Republican.

Nevertheless, neither Wisconsin Gov. Wern, nor Illinois Gov. William Straton, call for a special election to fill the vacancies. And scheduled appointments as judges for Reps. Henry Latham (R), New York, and Frederic Coudert (R), New York, are being held up. Both are in "touch-and-go" districts.

EASTER PRESENT?—Congressional sources believe it to be a certainty that Democrats will introduce a tax-cut measure in the House before Easter. Democratic leaders in the Senate are privately saying "keep an eye on the House" on the tax question.

Cuban Rebels Continue Hunger Strike; Others Join Protest

BROWNSVILLE, Tex. (UP) — Thirty-five captured Cuban rebels carried a hunger strike into its second week today, joined in their starvation protest by rebel groups in New York, Chicago and Miami. The men have vowed to starve to death if necessary to protest their imprisonment following the scuttling of their heavily-armed expedition to support the forces of Cuban revolutionary Fidel Castro against the government of President Fulgencio Batista.

They and the other hunger strikers are protesting also continued shipment of U. S. arms to the Batista government. In Florida Tuesday, 23 Castro supporters were arrested after a demonstration at a railroad station where they believed a del-

egation of Batista emissaries was passing through on the way to Washington for more arms. Two Cuban nationals were arrested at Key West as they tried to smuggle arms to Castro's forces in an outboard motorboat. Arrests in Virginia. At Winchester, Va., three men arrested in an allegedly stolen car with a cargo of knives, bayonets and a sawed-off shotgun, said they were part of an army of 1,500 to 2,000 men being trained here to join the Castro forces.

They gave their names as Forest Lipscomb, Patrick Patterson and Harry Voelker. Fourteen of the 25 men held in Brownsville since their ship was rammed by a Coast Guard cutter last Thursday have been transferred from jail cells to Mercy

Hospital beds and are being fed intravenously, U. S. Marshal James W. McCarty said. Although the formal hunger strike began only after their capture, doctors said the men actually hadn't eaten for two days before that — they were too busy or too excited. Most of them are U. S. citizens and residents of New York. The

wife of their leader, Arnaldo Barron of New York, said "most of them fought for this country in World War II or Korea. Now they thought they couldn't stay in this country and do nothing." Mrs. Barron, who came to Brownsville after her husband's arrest, said many of the men had good jobs in New York. They saved \$20,000, she said, to buy arms and ammunition in Mexico and charter the 76-foot freighter in which they sailed.

New York Hunger Strike In New York, 14 men and four women members of the Orthodox Committee, headed by Barron, began a hunger strike at 7 p. m. Friday and were still on it today. Of 10 members of the rebel Revolutionary Labor Directorate, only two remained on a similar hunger

strike today. Two became ill Monday night and four more were forced to begin eating again late Tuesday night. Another group of Cubans pleaded the U. S. Court House at Chicago with signs protesting the Brownsville capture. Nine more rebel sympathizers were conducting a "sit-down hunger strike" in the lobby of a Miami television station.

President Urges Careful Study Before Tax Cut

WASHINGTON (UP) — President Eisenhower sounded another gong warning today on cutting taxes. The President told a news conference he must stop and look very steadily at proposals to cut taxes. He said we must really make sure that we are right and that a tax cut would have a beneficial effect upon the economy in future years.

He was asked about New York financier Bernard M. Baruch's congressional testimony Tuesday that it would be "folly" to cut taxes. The President replied he had known Baruch for 30 years, had a great respect for his opinions, and believed that they warranted serious consideration.

In other news conference highlights, the President: Said his Defense Department reorganization plan, which he probably will submit to Congress Thursday, is based on the necessity of the defense secretary having central authority as to the size, composition and strategic planning of armed forces.

Disadvantages Outweighed Explained that despite his objections, he signed the anti-recession housing bill Tuesday because he believed its advantages outweighed the disadvantages. Said he decided against a unilateral suspension of nuclear tests because he didn't believe it would be for the good of the United States.

Down Payment Rate On FHA Loans Lower

WASHINGTON (UP) — Starting today, homes, financed by FHA-insured loans, can be purchased with lower down payments. This reduction is one of the principal provisions of a \$1,500,000,000 anti-recession housing bill signed into law Tuesday by President Eisenhower. The legislation is designed to speed the building of 200,000 homes this year and to create 500,000 new jobs. Eisenhower gave his approval to the bill somewhat reluctantly. He conceded it will create new jobs, but said in an unusual message to Congress that it will also saddle the taxpayer with "a wholly unnecessary burden of up to one percent to assume obligation which rightfully belongs to business."

Here are the major provisions of the legislation and when they will take effect: Federal Housing Commissioner Norman H. Mason ordered the lower down payment rate on FHA-insured mortgages into effect immediately. The reduction will apply not only to new applications, but to those already on file and not yet processed.

WASHINGTON (UP) — The United States may schedule a new series of nuclear tests next fall or in 1959 unless the Soviet Union agrees to mutual inspection under an international test ban, administration officials reported today. The possibility of more tests to perfect nuclear defensive weapons was raised as President Eisenhower faced questioning on administration nuclear policy at his regular weekly news conference today.

Criticism of U. S. nuclear policies erupted following Moscow's unilateral cutoff of nuclear tests and disclosure by Secretary of State John Foster Dulles Tuesday that the President and his National Security Council on March 24 considered but rejected a move to halt the forthcoming American nuclear tests in the Pacific. Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.), chairman of the Senate Disarmament Subcommittee, called Dulles' disclosure of the decision to continue testing "nothing short of shocking" and said it had been better left unsaid.

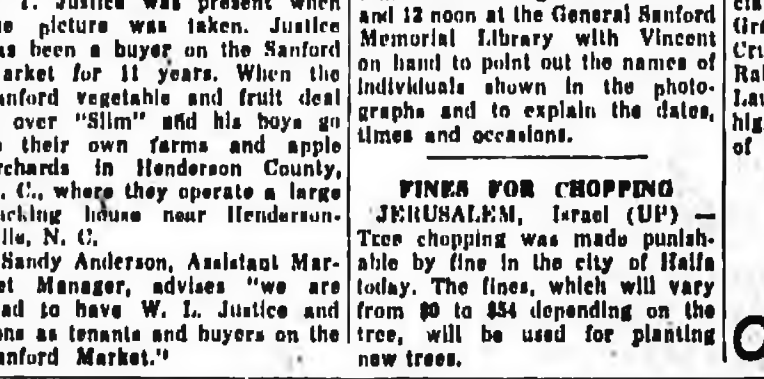
