Southern Conference Grid Teams Face Games Which Affect Championship Rank

Florida-Clemson, Golden Tornado-Alabama And Vanderbilt-Tennessee Hold Dixie Football Spotlight

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 17.—In at least five amphitheatres Southern conference eleven are involved today in throbbing gridiron duels that will materially affect the championship race.

Georgia Tech will attempt to repeat the most determined invasion it has faced this season, Billings with fury is not attainable until November, Alabama's Crimson Tide is keyed for the Tech game as never before, and an upset with its consequent thumping of the championship ranks is quite possible. The game will probably result into a battle of line plunges. The Yellow Jackets will, with such men as captain Funn, Frank Spear and Raleigh Drennon, be looking among the best lineups in the conference this season, will be matched, many believe, by Florida's state wall.

Experts choose Tech to win the game, but reserve the right not to be astonished at an upset.

Clemson, pitting its flaming line against Tech's line in the annual battle at Nashville, will be expected to keep its record clean and unblemished by the heavy Commodore machine. Defeat at the hands of Tech last week hurts the Commodore, and it will be a fighting outfit that meets the Tech team.

Florida, third undefeated member of the conference first rank, meets a second determined Clemson eleven down at Jacksonville, in a fierce attraction second this season only to the battle with Georgia last week.

Clemson is capable of defeating Florida if it can again rise to the high standard when it wreaks the mighty "lumber" punch at Jacksonville early in the month. Florida should win, if it has not gone stale after the Georgia melee which it had pointed all season. Tennessee is also undefeated in the conference circles, and Georgia's Bulldogs, stung by last week's loss, will be straining to stop the Yellow Tornado.

Such attention is centered on the South Atlantic region at Dixie Stadium. Neither outfit has gained a conference victory this season. Auburn has shown marked improvement in its last two starts, however, and some critics are of the opinion that the one-time home of championship teams will again lead the way to the national championship like a score of straight wins.

Actually, Yale has looked the part of a slight mistake this season and, while Princeton has survived the year without a defeat, its tie with Virginia is nothing to show over in private. The game did rise on its hunches for the only big game of the campaign to get another tie with Ohio State but otherwise the record is somewhat unimpressive.

Against any other team, Princeton would be almost a prohibitive favorite. There aren't many teams that can beat Princeton consistently. It merely happens that Yale is one of them. In the games played to date, Yale has won 27 times, Princeton 19 and nine have ended in a standoff.

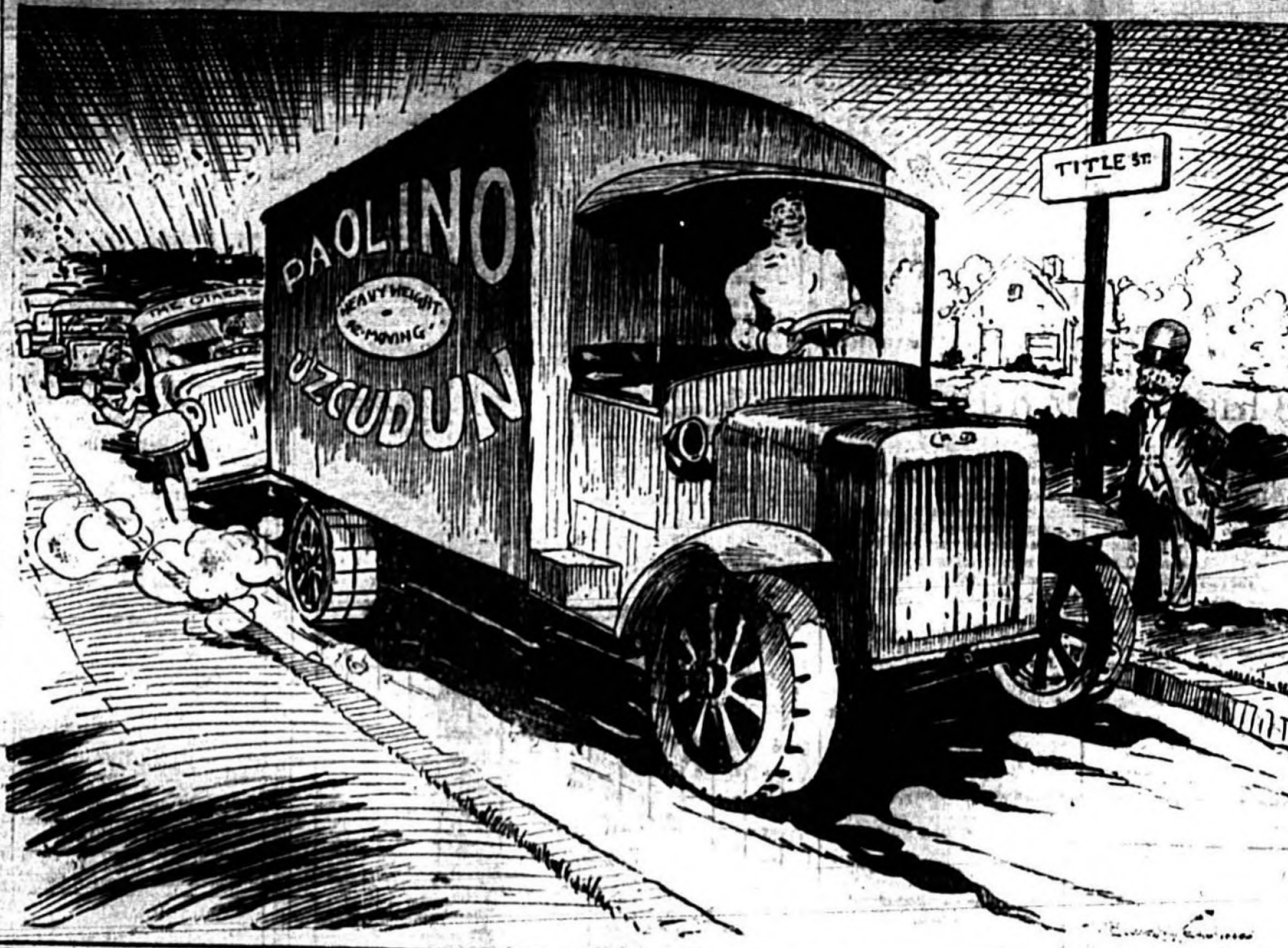

VON HINDENBURG IS ASSAILED BY GEN. LUDENDORFF

War Lord Is Blamed For Kaiser's Loss Of German Throne

BERLIN, Nov. 16.—(INS)—President Von Hindenburg and General Erich Ludendorff, the two German "war lords" who together won the famous battle of Tannenberg and later became commanders-in-chief of all the German armies and virtual dictators of Central Europe, have definitely come to a parting of their ways.

An open attack on Hindenburg has been launched by Ludendorff's personal organ, the "Deutsche Wochenschau," which is the publication of the "Tannenberg League" of which Ludendorff is the patron.

In this attack, coming just before the tenth anniversary of the stirring events of 1918, the paper charges:

Makes Charges
THAT Hindenburg was in effect responsible for the German revolution and for the abdication of the former kaiser by remaining silent in the critical days preceding the revolution and letting events take their course.

THAT Ludendorff did all the work, created all the magnificent strategic plans, and won all the battles, while Hindenburg "silently permitted the world to celebrate as his own work the deeds of Ludendorff's genius which had created Hindenburg's reputation."

THAT Ludendorff's dismissal by the former kaiser October 26, 1918, was the signal for the German revolution; that Hindenburg could have prevented it, but that he preferred to remain silent again.

THAT Hindenburg did nothing to check the attack and "slanders" against Ludendorff after the latter's dismissal, and that just now he has permitting a "new slander campaign" against Ludendorff by a new alliance to the latter's call to "aid Germany in the critical post of the Free Prussians."

President Silent
"His silence is his deed," the paper says.

The attack is the result of Hindenburg's refusal to give any more news releases from Ludendorff in which the latter charged that the Free Prussians had "killed the German flag" and that the war had been won because Ludendorff had revealed all their secrets and "killed the German flag."

The paper also claims that Ludendorff's advice had followed before the war many would not have caught short of troops if the war did come, and that if Ludendorff had been at the chief of the general staff the beginning, "the world would never have permitted the Marne; the great battle would have been a rout for Germany—with Ludendorff's advice."

The paper adds: "The Kaiser's own advice in the life of his Majesty Kaiser had recognized the surpassing qualities of Ludendorff and the influence of the Kaiser's support-cathedral powers among his men."

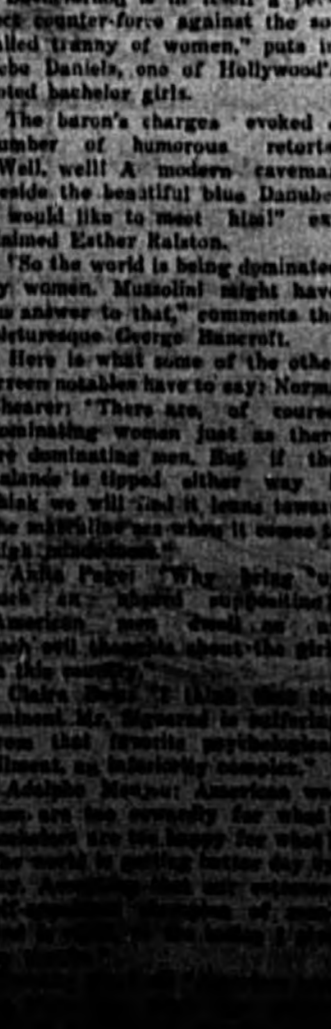

Who Uses Snuff?

Should we come out brazenly and ask you, "Do you use snuff?" you would probably be insulted, and you would have a right to be for it is none of our business, but reading recently a statement from the Department of Agriculture we were forced to wonder if perhaps a great many of our acquaintances were snuff-users and had been holding out on us.

The Department of Agriculture, which is probably the only group of people in America who had not thought that snuff using was almost extinct, boldly declares that ten times as much snuff is used nowadays as was taken forty or fifty years ago. In 1869, some two thousand tons of snuff was used in this country; in 1900, seven thousand tons, and in 1928, twenty thousand tons. Twenty thousand tons of snuff is a lot of snuff, especially when it is generally regarded as a dead issue.

Speaking of snuff, the New York Herald Tribune said recently: "Snuff taking is still common among the Indians of Colombia and Venezuela and among some of the Southern Indian tribes, though these do not make their snuff from tobacco; in Asia snuff is taken by the Chinese, who still make the most beautiful snuffboxes in the world, by the Japanese, abundantly by the filthy Tibetans, and by the upper-class Brahmins in India, where religious makes it improper to put back in the mouth a cigar or cigarette that has once been moistened with saliva, but it is unknown in Persia and is rare in Turkey."

Chinese dainties obtain enormous prices for snuff which is said to be a century old. In Europe snuff first obtained its vogue in France, where until the nineteenth century it was regarded as the only respectable way to use tobacco. In Scotland it is a working class habit, but it is as early as 1650, when Howell wrote that "one shall see the serving maid upon the washing block and the swain upon the ploughshare, when they are tired with their labor, take out their boxes of snuff (snuff) and draw into their nostrils with a quill; and it will beget new spirits in them and fresh vigor to fall to their work again."

Snuff began to rise in the British social scale during the plague of 1665, when it was used as a disinfectant, and in Queen Anne's day, when French customs were the vogue, the snuff-box almost displaced the pipe in polite English society. The process of taking snuff was a ritual, the gentleman produced his snuffbox with his right hand, passed it to his left, tapped it, opened it and offered it to the company before taking a pinch himself. To grimeace while taking it was to betray profound reverence; the box must be closed before the user sneezed and spat.

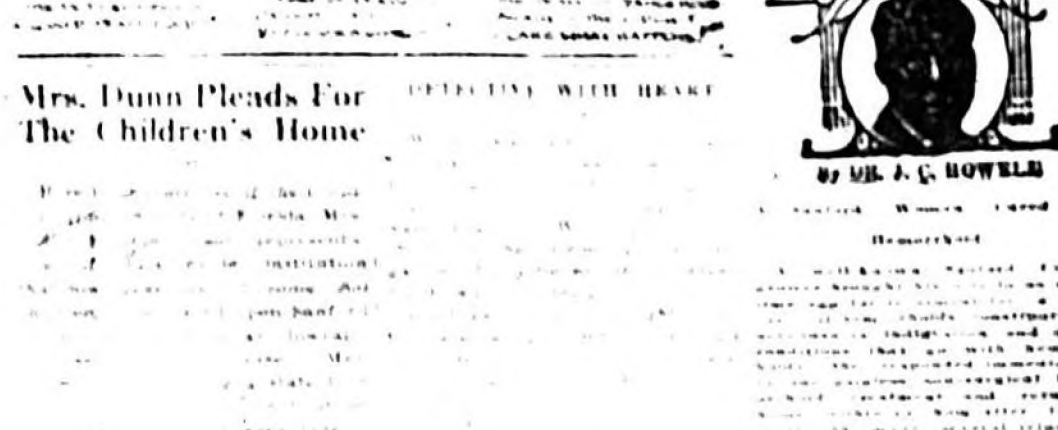

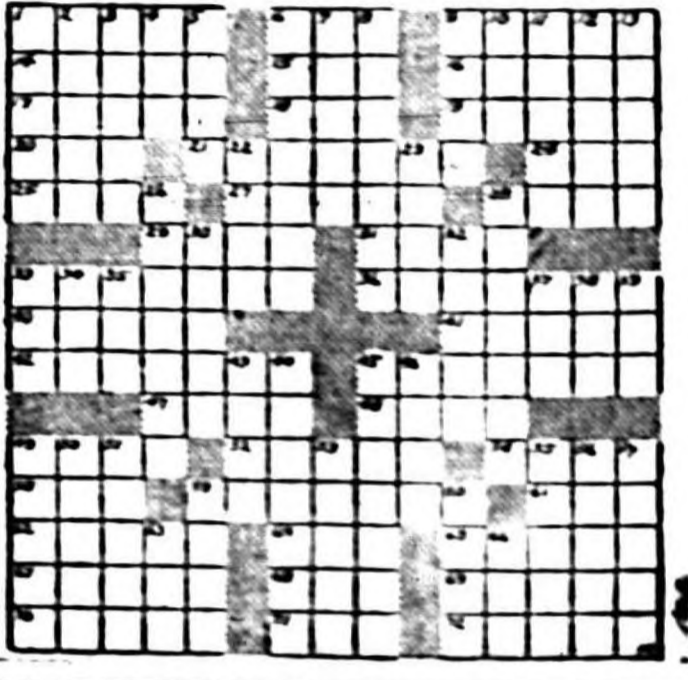
