As confusion grows as Washington and criticism of N. R. A. becomes more vocal we think it important to insist that whatever doubts of the blue eagle as individual American, whether employer or employee, may feel, his first duty here and now is to support President Roosevelt to the limit of his ability.

We have endeavored in these columns to discriminate between what we considered the sound and the unsound measures adopted by the administration. To make this criticism fairly and impartially we conceived to be our first duty both to our readers and to the country.

But fair and outspoken criticism is one thing. Refusal to co-operate is quite another. The war metaphor has been overdone in the present crisis. But, in peace or war, the country can have but one president.

Only one remedial plan can be applied at a time. Whether Mr. Roosevelt and his advisers were right or wrong in their twin policies of currency inflation and industrial inflation will be known in due course—perhaps sooner than later.

We are confident that such is the attitude and such will be the response of the overwhelming mass of Americans. It will be their attitude not because of hysterical threats of a spy system, or of boycotts, or of violence. Indeed, the introduction of such Russian methods would only stir an uprising of old-fashioned Americanism that would sweep every feather out of the blue eagle's wings.

It is not too much to say that hysteria is the first immediate peril that N. R. A. faces today. Support of the President in his policy comes from no small fears.

It comes from a sense of good citizenship, of loyalty to the President and the government of the United States. It is in the name of simple, old-fashioned patriotism that we urge our readers to support the President's plan to the utmost of their ability.

State Is Granted Prompt Increase In Its Allotment
MIAMI, Aug. 17.—(AP)—Marcus Fagg, state director of the federal emergency relief administration, yesterday announced the state had been granted an immediate increase in its allotment of funds.

The increase, Fagg said, probably will be sufficient to bring the state's average of \$4.50 per family a month to \$10. The state now is receiving \$618,000 monthly for relief of more than 400,000 individuals, and an additional \$276,000 had been requested for August.

Whether the full amount of the additional funds requested and been granted was not known by Fagg. The state director has requested \$1,250,000 for September and following months.

The state director announced a series of five regional conferences for the more than 800 relief workers, the first to be held next Monday at Jacksonville; at Orlando Wednesday; Tampa, Friday; Miami, Aug. 28, and Marianna Sept. 1.

At these meetings provisions, rules and regulations of the emergency relief act will be explained to the workers.

Timothy Reardon, the governor's mediator, then a workers' strike had been settled with a promise of higher wages. Pickers went back to work with the assurance they would be paid from 25 to 27 1/2 cents an hour, instead of 20 cents.

Stabilized Milk Prices In State Provided In Act
TALLAHASSEE, Aug. 17.—(AP)—George Weems, state milk control director, yesterday reiterated a previous statement that the Washington action including Florida in the agricultural adjustment act, provided for federal enforcement of stabilized milk prices in this state under state supervision.

The purpose of the Senate bill creating the milk control board, Weems said, was to tie in with federal regulations on the same subject.

"The national congress and legislatures in milk producing states," Weems said, "have declared an emergency exists which makes it necessary that prices to producers and prices to consumers of milk be stabilized at some figure which will enable milk producers to stay in business and thereby preserve for the people the source of supply."

The purpose of milk boards, Weems continued, is to supervise and regulate the milk industry and stabilize prices so that no producer or distributor shall be forced out of business through inability to engage in an economic war with competitors through cutting the price of milk below cost of production.

LONDON BUSINESS IS REPORTED TO BE ON UPGRADE

Statistics And Public Spirit Both Substantiate Condition
LONDON—There can be no doubt about it, business here is on the upgrade. It can be proved by statistics pictured in graphs and, better indication still, in the general bearing of the people.

There are still black spots, as, for instance, in the coal trade, shipbuilding and export business. But these are, exceptions, not the rule as was the case a year ago.

A graph entitled "Index of Business Activity," published in the latest issue of the Economist, Aug. 5, shows the tide began to turn in the third quarter last year. Since then there has been a steady upward trend—slow certainly, but unflinching.

Latest post office returns, which always correspond closely to business conditions, tell the same story. The number of letters posted began to increase the moment the trade tide turned, namely, last September, after going down month after month from October, 1930. The estimated post office surplus for the current year is the largest in its history.

Unemployment returns as of July 24 published here Aug. 9 show steady improvement since month since February. On July 24 there were 500,000 fewer unemployed than during the previous month, and more than 550,000 more actually in employment, which is taken to mean that 50,000 boys and girls leaving school found jobs during this period.

Figures are all the more satisfactory because there is generally a big seasonal rise in unemployment about this time of the year. In the corresponding period last year, for example, the total rose by more than 44,000. This year the rise June 26 to July 24 was only 5,000, although 25,000 workers on vacation were techni-

ORLANDO IS MADE FOCAL POINT FOR LOAN APPRAISERS

District Headquarters For State Will Be Located There

ORLANDO, Fla., Aug. 19.—Orlando has been designated district headquarters for appraisers working in Florida. The policy of zoning each state in the Third Land Bank District has been adopted by the Federal Land Bank of Columbia in order to augment the speed with which applications for loans may be handled. Thirty appraisers are now working in Florida, assuring prompt appraisal of farm properties upon which loans are requested.

Applications for loans should be made direct to the Land Bank at Columbia, specifying the amount of money a borrower wishes to obtain. The Land Bank appraisal fee must accompany each application, together with a plat of the property offered as security for the loan. After appraisal, the type of loan which may be made, will be determined. This loan may be in the form of a first mortgage by the Land Bank, a first or second mortgage by the Agent of the Land Bank commissioner, or a first mortgage by the Land Bank, supplemented by a second mortgage by the Agent of the Land Bank commissioner.

Where the Land Bank can make a loan in the territory served by a national farm loan association, the secretary-treasurer will be notified and upon approval by the association, the loan may be made. In other cases the loan will be made directly by the bank.

Borrowers securing Land Bank loans will be required to purchase stock to the extent of 5 per cent of the amount of their loan, either in the local national farm loan association or in the bank. This stock is not subject to double liability if issued after June 16, 1933. Land Bank loans are made in the form of first mortgages and on a basis not to exceed 50 per cent of the normal appraised value of the farm, plus 20 per cent of the appraised value of the buildings necessary to a complete farm unit. They are payable in annual or semi-annual installments which will amortize the loan over a period of 5 to 33 years. Where the loan is obtained through a national farm loan association, the interest rate will be 4 1/2 per cent; loans direct from the bank will be at the rate of 5 per cent. Borrowers who meet interest, insurance and taxes promptly when due and so desire, may postpone payments on principal until July 12, 1938.

Loans made by the agent of the Land Bank commissioner cannot be for more than \$5000, to any farmer. They may be in the form of a second mortgage and under certain conditions may include livestock and crops. Principal payments on a commissioner's loan may be postponed for the next three years by the payment, when due, of interest, taxes and insurance.

Where the total amount of a loan which may be granted by the Land Bank and the commissioner's agent, is not equal to the total amount of secured and unsecured indebtedness of the farmer, it may be possible for his creditors

General Assembly Of Virginia Opens Special Session

RICHMOND, Va., Aug. 19.—(AP)—Virginia's general assembly Thursday opened an extra ordinary session for legislation on legal beer, repeal and public works.

Bills on two of the big three objectives before the legislature were well on their way toward legislative deliberation before Governor Pollard completed the communication of his message.

The measures placed on the clerk's desk at the opening would afford emergency legislation legalizing S-B beverages and set a referendum on state and national prohibition Oct. 3.

Both of these were sanctioned by the chief executive in a 7500 word message to the assembly. Patrons of the beer bill demanded beer would be legal in Virginia late next week.

A referendum on the Eighteenth Amendment will be held in 1934.
