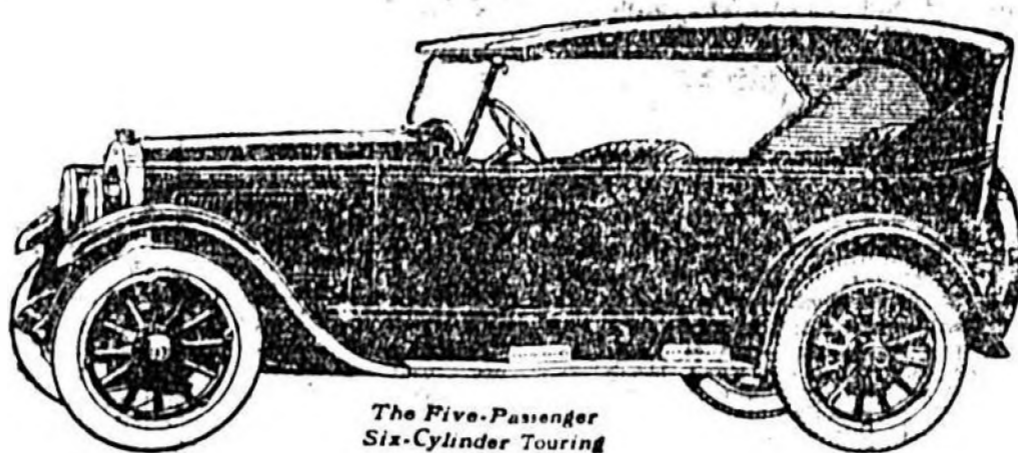

PUBLICATION OF FALL ELECTION IS UNDER WAY

Notices Have Been Mailed To All Sixty-Three Counties With Written Instructions

TALLHASSEE, Fla., Aug. 28.—Publication will begin sometime this week, it is expected, of the notice of the general election to be held on Tuesday, November 4. The notices have been mailed to all of the 63 counties in the state by Secretary of State Crawford, with instructions that they be published for sixty days prior to the date of the election, in compliance with state laws.

In addition to local offices to be filled at the election, all state house officials, two justices of the supreme court, and two state railroad commissioners are to be voted upon. Only one of the latter will have opposition in the general election. J. O. Price, of Hillsborough county, has been nominated by the republicans to oppose either Commissioner A. S. Wells or Eugene S. Matthews, both of whom were nominated in the democratic primary.

The republican state convention, which met at Palatka some time ago, also named candidates to oppose all democratic nominees for state offices, and in some of the counties the county organizations have named opponents for nominees for county offices.

Abbyssinia Is Poor Field for Men Who Traffic in Arms

GENEVA, Aug. 28.—Prince Tafel-Mekonnen, heretofore the throne of Abyssinia, who is expected like Premiers Mas-Fiorali, Herriot and Mussolini, to attend the September session of the League of Nations, has forwarded to Geneva a copy of a new Abyssinian code concerning the traffic in and possession of arms and ammunition. Some idea of the scrupulous manner in which the North African state intends to meet its league obligations is had from the tenor of the preliminary communication to Sir Eric Drummond, the secretary general of the League.

"Hence be with you," the note begins, and then proceeds: "Desirous of observing faithfully the engagements which it entered into on becoming a member of the League of Nations, my government has now issued new and more explicit regulations regarding arms and ammunition. Experience will show whether the provisions of these regulations are adequate, if they are not, it is our intention to amend them when necessary."

The new law consists of an order and detailed regulations and they forbid all persons to enter or leave Abyssinia if in possession of "weapons of war, or to import or export weapons, unless they have previously obtained authorization. Similarly the sale of weapons is prohibited without specific authority, and penalties are provided.

Fifty Miles of Track Laid By New Railroad

WEST PALM BEACH, Aug. 28.—Approximately fifty miles of track has been laid by builders of the Florida Western and Northern railroad, between here and Calhoun, it is stated here. This is one-fourth of the road's mileage which totals 204 miles. Ninety-six per cent of the road, it is said, will be without curves. One stretch of the road extending 57 miles, between West Palm Beach and Okeechobee City—will be straightaway.

Negro Moonshiner Is Wanted For Murder

SHREVEPORT La., Aug. 28.—The capture of Freeman C. Adams, a negro moonshiner who Friday killed Sheriff Rantz of Jackson Parish, was believed imminent as bloodhounds followed a hot trail in Claiborne Parish early today. Willie Washington, one of the trio who overpowered the sheriff while enroute to the jail, was captured last night near Athens.

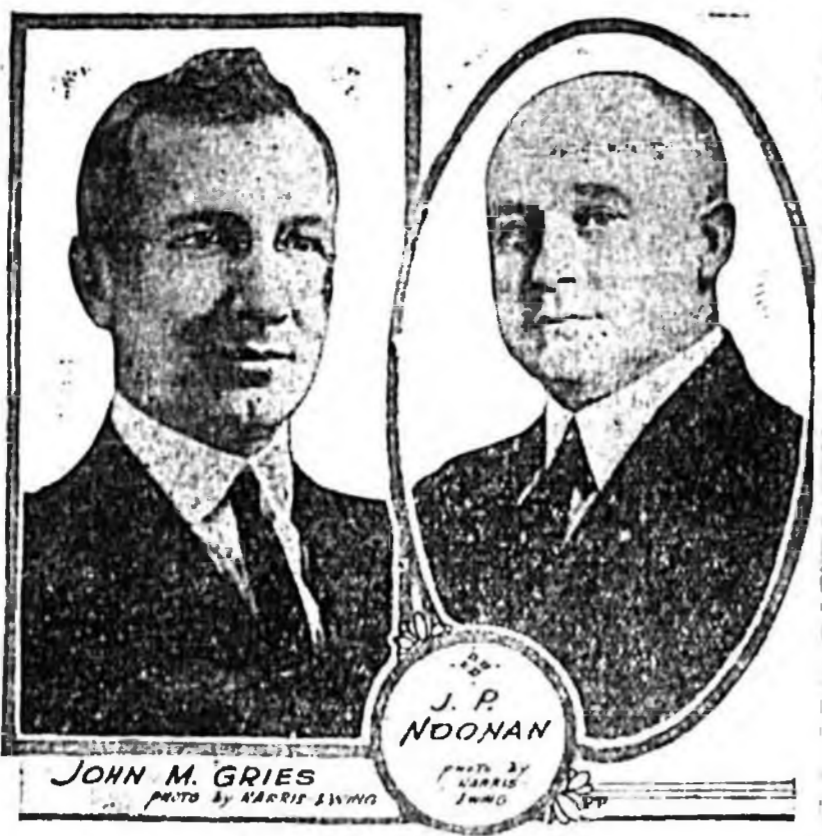

Experts Find Custom, Not Climate, Responsible For Failure To Build And Repair During Winter Period



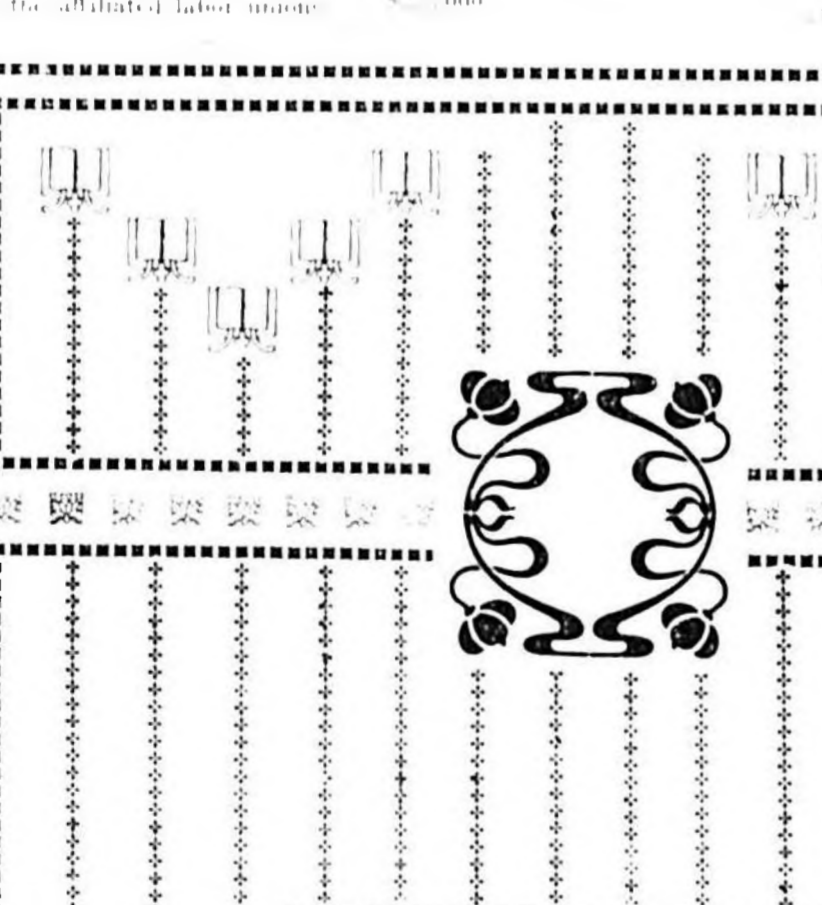
J. P. Noonan, president of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, and president of the Guardian Savings and Trust Company, is a member of the committee appointed by Secretary Hoover in his capacity of chairman of the President's Conference on Unemployment to investigate the seasonal fluctuations in the building trades. Dr. John M. Gries of the Department of Commerce, conducted the investigation for the committee.

The committee has practically completed its work and its report shows that by the exercise of foresight in planning building enterprises to conform with local conditions any community can distribute its construction activities in such a way as to reduce the seasonal employment of the building trades mechanics and secure the economic advantages that accrue from a stabilizing of the business of its building material manufacturers, its architects, contractors, real estate operators and supply dealers.

Its investigation has shown that the winter slump in building activity is not a matter of climate, but of custom, that anywhere in the United States building can be done in the winter and frequently at a lower cost than in the summer.

Miami Arranges Big Labor Day Program

MIAMI, Aug. 28.—An elaborate program has been arranged by the local sports committee of organizations here for a Labor Day celebration. A long list of events, starting shortly after noon, will include track and field contests, dog races, a truck and automobile race and a double header baseball game. The program will be under the direction of the American Legion and the affiliated labor unions.

French Deserters Begin To Return Under Amesty Act

PARIS, Aug. 28.—The amnesty bill just passed by the Chamber of Deputies is expected in some quarters to result in a general resurrection of French soldiers who had passed into history as "killed on the field of battle."

Already, though the senate has still to pass on the measure, deserters are crossing the frontiers and breathing the air of France for the first time in six years or more. One of them, a soldier named Robin, given up for dead after the battle of the Chemin des Dames in April, 1917, started his brother who keeps a wine shop in Paris, by suddenly appearing before him the other day.

"You don't know me," remarked the deserter, who had grown a beard during his exile.

"No, I don't know you," was the reply.

"I am your brother," replied the deserter.

"My brother was killed at the Chemin des Dames," was the rejoinder.

"No," insisted the deserter, "there were not so many butchered as was supposed. A lot of them deserted to the enemy and I was among them. Now that the Chamber has passed the amnesty law I have come back and I need money to start me off."

The brother agreed to give him funds on condition that he never show his face in the neighborhood again.

The deserter walked off with the money to celebrate his return at a public ball in the Boulevard de Grenelle. There he picked a quarrel and within half an hour was carried out with a fatal stab in the abdomen.

Church Dresses Are Defined by a Bishop

PARIS, Aug. 28.—The length of the sleeves of a woman's dress which is suitable wear for the observance of church services, has been laid down by the Bishop of Clermont-Ferrand, in a notice which he has asked the trustees of his diocese to bring before their flock.

Wearers of dresses wanting in modesty, the circular states—with the explanation that decency forbids low cut necks and sleeves that do not reach below the elbow—should be asked to leave the church, and if they persist in doing so they should be asked to leave the church, the priest should pass them by. Their own priests later should give them "a paternal warning" on the subject.
