Fire Officials **Probe School Building Blaze**

State Fire Department officials today are probing the ruins of one story classroom building on the Rosenwald Negro Elementary School property in Altamonte Springs that was destroyed by fire early this morning.

County School Administrative Assistant Walter Teague said officials have not yet determined the cause of the fire but that "it looks Suspicious."

Teague estimated damage to

the building at about \$35,000 and said that school officials are considering starting double sessions at the school until that building can be replaced.

It was the second fire at the achool in less than a week. Another frame building on the site was burned Sunday night, Teamus added. It contained one class-

Teague said the fire started around midnight and was brought under control about an hour later by volunteers from the Altamonte Springs Fire Dept. There are 309 pupils attending

PHILALELPHIA (UPI) — Quadruplets were born to a former beauty contest winner Wednesday night just as the doctor predicted-but the father still can't believe it's true and the doctor himself was reported as "all shook up."

The calmest person in Delaware County Memorial Hospital in suburban Upper Darby was the mother, Mrs. Arlene Cutaiar, 24. Malvern. Pa., who gave birth to the four girls within seven minutes.

The girls were temporarily named, A. B, C, and D by hospital officials since the parents had been counting on having boys.

The hospital said the four bables were in satisfac-

tory condition and "their color good" nearly 12 hours after their premature birth.

The attending physician, Dr. J. Vernon Ellson, said the first 48 hours were the most critical in cases of premature births.

The girls were born six weeks premature and weighed from 234 to 312 pounds. They were "doing fine," Ellson said. The first was born at 7:17 p. m. and the

The father, William Cutaiar 3rd, 26, who maintains a fleet of trucks for his father's mushroom transportation company, said the whole thing was "like a dream." "I still can't believe it," he said. "I don't feel like I'm in reality."

"We don't have names picked out for them," he added. "We thought we were going to have four boys." The Cutaiars had been told to expect quadruplets on

New York Assembly Turns Down Stadium Bid

Officials Surprised

NEW YORK (UPI) - Mayor Robert F. Wagner told a stunned baseball world today that approv-Oal "can still be obtained" of a New York state bill essential to the National League's plans to expand to 10 clubs in 1962.

The bill, empowering New York City to construct an \$18 million atadium for a new National League club, failed to achieve the necessary two-thirds majority in the New York State Assembly Wednesday and was tabled by Assemblyman Anthony P. Savarese

Jr. (R-Queens), the sponsor. "It is important to realize that the resolution was not killed." said Wagner, who was caught completely by surprise along with baseball officials by the assembly's action. "I am confident that next time there will be enough votes favoring it to pass it."

But the stunning effect of the assembly's action was evident in the reaction of Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick, president George Weiss of the new NL club and even co-owner Dan Topping of the New York Yankees who has bitterly opposed the construction of the stadium for the new

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)-Federal district Judge Harold Carswell today ordered the Escambia County (Pensacola) school board to submit a plan for gradual integration of the Escambia school system. He ruled in a class suit by the NAACP which sought

the immediate integration of the entire county system. Carawell ruled that applications for admission to public schools in the northwest Florida county were acted upon by the board on racial considerations in violation of

the 1954 U.S. Supreme Court desegregation decision. Carswell ordered the board to submit to the court within 90 days a plan whereby Negroes would be given a "reasonable and conscious opportunity to apply for admission or to transfer to any schools for which they are eligible without regrad to their race or color and to have that choice fairly considered by enrolling authorites." The suit, first in Florida seeking desegregation of an entire county school system, was brought by the NAACP on behalf of 12 Pensacola Negro children and all others similarly situated.

SANFORD, FLORIDA

The principal plaintiff was Karen Augustus, daughter of Dr. Charles A. Augustus, whose home is located less than a block from the all-white Oliver J. Semmes Elementary School which serves the swanky northeast section of Pensacola.

Augustus claimed his daughter was assigned to the Negro Brown-Barge School solely because of her color. He withdrew her and enrolled her in a private school, pending settlement of the suit which has been hanging for more than a year.



TALLAHASSEE (UPI)-Federal district Judge Harold Carswell today ordered the Escambia County (Pensacola) school board to submit a plan for gradual integration of the Escambia school system. He ruled in a class suit by the NAACP which sought

the immediate integration of the entire county system. Carawell ruled that applications for admission to public schools in the northwest Florida county were acted upon by the board on racial considerations in violation of

the 1954 U.S. Supreme Court desegregation decision. Carswell ordered the board to submit to the court within 90 days a plan whereby Negroes would be given a "reasonable and conscious opportunity to apply for admission or to transfer to any schools for which they are eligible without regrad to their race or color and to have that choice fairly considered by enrolling authorites." The suit, first in Florida seeking desegregation of an entire county school system, was brought by the NAACP on behalf of 12 Pensacola Negro children and all others similarly situated.

The principal plaintiff was Karen Augustus, daughter of Dr. Charles A. Augustus, whose home is located less than a block from the all-white Oliver J. Semmes Elementary School which serves the swanky northeast section of Pensacola.

Augustus claimed his daughter was assigned to the Negro Brown-Barge School solely because of her color. He withdrew her and enrolled her in a private school, pending settlement of the suit which has been hanging for more than a year.
