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Surveyor Heads To Moon

Antenna Gives Sign Of Trouble

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—The United States sent a Surveyor robot toward the moon today to attempt a tricky soft landing at a spot Apollo astronauts may visit someday. There was one hint of trouble.

About 50 minutes after America's first lunar-lander began its path-finding voyage, Space Agency spokesman said one of the craft's two far-reaching radio antennas may not have deployed as planned.

Scientists immediately sought to determine the nature of the trouble, and its effect on a crucial mid-course steering maneuver planned for early Tuesday.

"Other than the antenna problem, everything appears normal," the spokesman said. Earlier, a steady stream of optimistic reports flowed in. Riding along in the hopes of U. S. scientists that Surveyor would pave the way for the landing of Americans on the moon by 1969, and flash back hundreds of pictures of likely Apollo landing sites.

The success would also wipe out some of the moon-landing setbacks of the past. The first successful unmanned lunar landing four months ago.

Surveyor's chances of complete success are admittedly slim. But the camera, the 62-hour flight with an unusually smooth countdown that ended with a 10:41 a. m. blastoff.

It is scheduled to set down on the moon at 1:38 a. m. Thursday.

The 113-foot Atlas-Centaur launcher, a high-powered rocket making its first full flight, raced into the sky before a national television audience on a brilliant parade of orange flames and white smoke.

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B.J. Deplores Vietnam Civil Strife

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson today deplored South Vietnam's civil strife as an obscuring of the nation's progress toward a constitutional government, and clouding "the sacrifice of thousands of lives" there.

In a Memorial Day address at Arlington National Cemetery, Johnson said the South Vietnamese situation was a source of confusion because of the nature of the struggle and the "fading regional feelings" — and equally strong religious groupings.

Referring to the Buddhist uprisings which again have produced substantial body burnings by monks and repeated clashes with government forces, Johnson said:

"It is tragic, in the present turmoil, that some obscure acts of desecration be taken as political beliefs. This unnecessary loss of life only obscures the progress being made in a constitutional government."

"It only clouds the sacrifice of thousands of lives already made for the cause of independence and political freedom in South Vietnam."

Johnson said the South Vietnamese are "moving toward a government that will increasingly reflect the true will of its people."

"That day will come if the South Vietnamese keep their internal quarrels and differences within bounds and continue on their path toward their first steps toward a constitutional government," the President said.

He said the American effort in Vietnam is designed to strengthen "the Atlantic world and show that firm resolve to build bridges of cooperation to the East."

Johnson said American policy is devoted to containing Communism and he cited the late President John F. Kennedy's remarks two months before his assassination:

"We want the war to be won, the Communists to be contained and the Americans to go home," he quoted.

The President specifically addressed with an honor roll of six American men who had "regretted all those Americans who have risked their lives and lost them in the peace building effort since 1945."

The President praised the courage of American fighting men in Vietnam and said "they have not failed us once."

Republicans Hit War On Poverty

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House Republicans say President Johnson's anti-poverty program is a "disaster" and a "complete reversal" of the road of progress and reform.

In a hearing 100-page indictment, House Education and Labor Committee proposed a \$1.44 billion alternative program for 1967 spending. Democrats want \$1.75 billion.

The indictment was in the form of a minority report from the committee's Democratic majority.

They GOP members said they were opposed to the re-authorization because: "It repeats the high promises to the poor and raises their expectations without providing the means of fulfilling them."

"They called for transfer of all the Office of Economic Opportunity's functions, to the Labor, Agriculture, Health Education and Welfare Departments and other federal agencies. They said overall costs could be cut to \$1.44 billion."

The document, which included detailed GOP charges of political influence, sloppy administration, and scandal, is one of the longest congressional minority reports in memory.

Hurricane Season Opens Wednesday ... Weathermen Ready

MIAMI (UPI) — Weathermen are getting ready for their annual job of tracking, analyzing, predicting and — they hope — destroying the hurricanes that bring death and destruction to the Gulf and Atlantic coasts of the United States.

Wednesday is the official starting date for the 1966 hurricane season. On that day, a communications system backed up by satellites, weather buoys and nerveless Air Force and Navy pilots will go into operation.

They will be watching for the season's first storm in the Weather Bureau's system of assigning female names in alphabetical order to each season's hurricanes.

The national hurricane center in Miami will be linked to Puerto Rico, New Orleans and New York, and will put out twice a day reports on weather conditions in the tropical Atlantic and the Caribbean.

Aiding forecasters in taking the element of surprise out of the hurricane's deadly bag of tricks this year will be two new satellites which will transmit pictures and data directly to the hurricane center, showing the doughnut-shaped cloud formations that mean a storm is in the making, and analyzing water temperatures in suspicious areas.

A complete floor of the center is devoted to a project that aims at knocking the wind out of hurricanes before they can do any damage. One method, still unproven, concerns the use of silver iodide crystals which are to be dumped into storms from aircraft and possibly cause a heat exchange that would throw the storm off balance. Scientists will search this season for a hurricane that is moving clearly away from land and if conditions are right will go to work on it with the crystals.

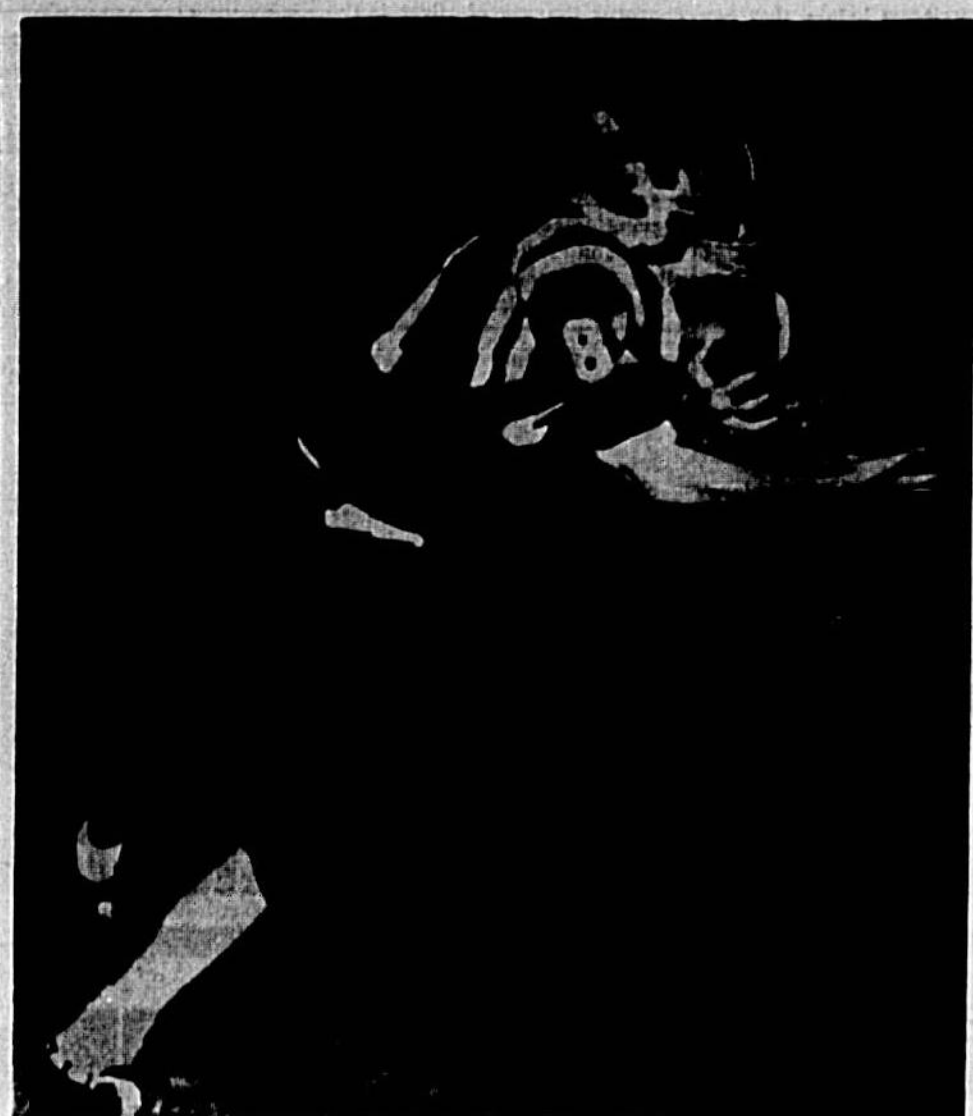

Chicken is one of the least expensive meals and at the same time, its protein content is higher than almost all other meats.

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Families living in communities that do not have a fluoridated water supply may now protect their children's teeth by giving the youngsters daily doses of a vitamin-D-calcium combination.

This is the good news reported by the Indiana University School of Dentistry scientists who studied the effect of this combination on 218 children who took it for three years. They were compared to an equal number of children who did not take the combination.

The results showed that, without the fluoride, and here is what the doctors found: In the first group there was a reduction in dental caries (decay) of 63 per cent in first teeth, and of 43 per cent in permanent teeth.

The doctors wrote in a recent issue of the Journal of Dentistry for Children that the fluoride-vitamin "appear to provide an effective and practical method of supplying fluoride."

The U. S. Public Health Service estimates that almost 65 per cent of the population live either outside dental water supplies or in communities that do not fluoridate their water.

The maximum benefit from this method of getting fluoride is derived when it is given from birth through eight or ten years of age, the scientists noted. However, there was a noticeable reduction in decay in first teeth after only 16 months of use, and in permanent teeth after 28 months.

Gray discoloration of teeth is often caused by a build-up of detergent. It's sometimes possible to return the fabric to its original white by washing the clothes in warm or hot water and a cup of Calgon water conditioner. Don't add soap. The whole idea is to let the Calgon solution release soap film.

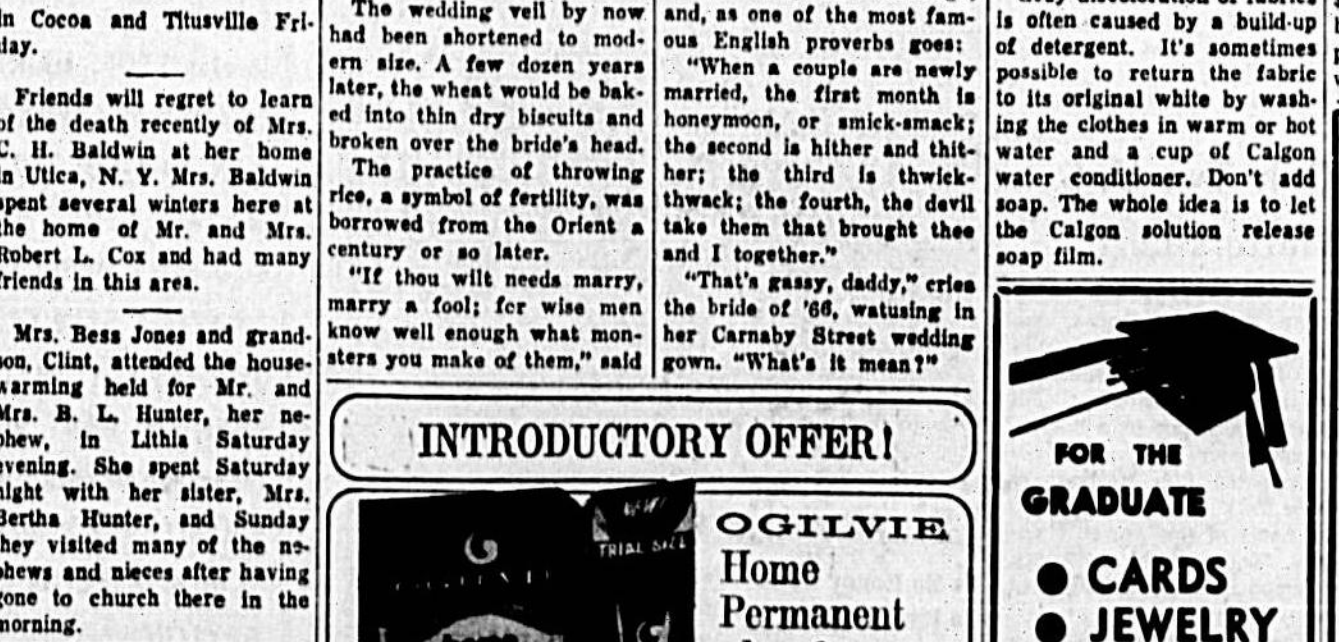
The wedding veil by now had been shortened to modern size. The wheat would be baked into thin dry biscuits and broken over the bride's head.

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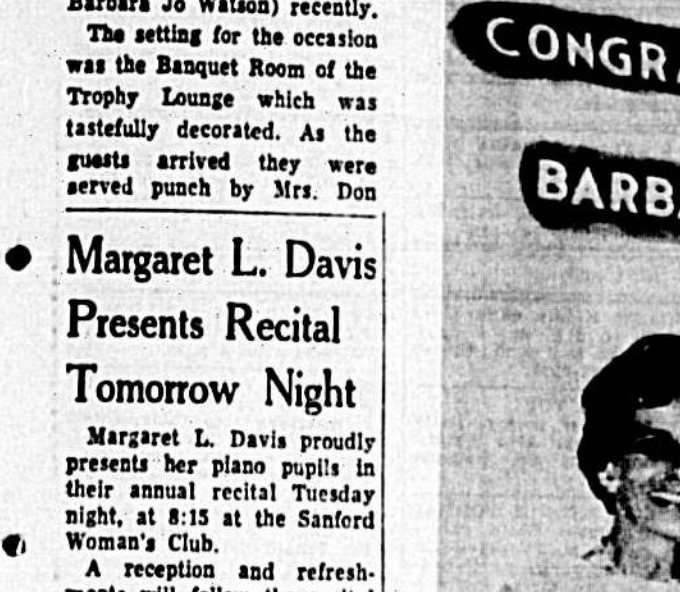

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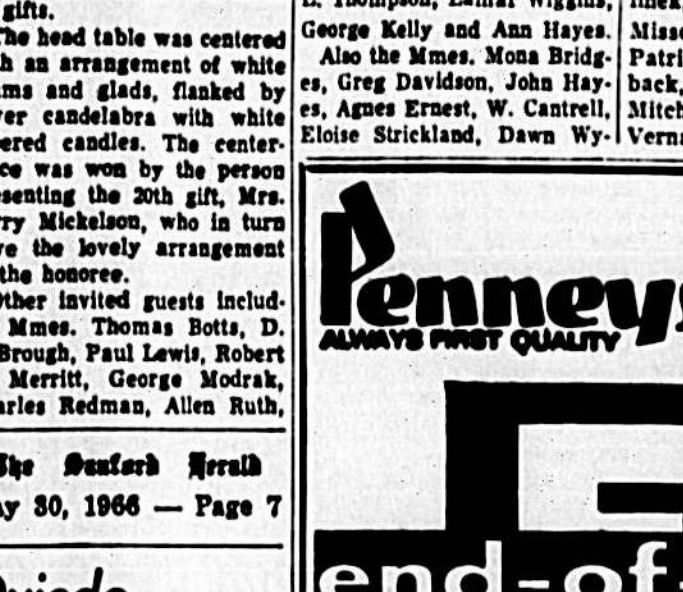

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Everybody is worried about who is going to get fired.

A shift in political wind usually blows someone bad news. Now governors always bring into the state capital their own men for the prime "Little Cabinet" posts.

Changes at lower levels of government are always not certain, which means, why, causes even more worry. It's the suspense.

Miss Mary Robert King, who won the Democratic gubernatorial nomination in December, has assured everyone she does not plan wholesale firings, if she wins election in November.

But the fear remains. Many employees feel naked in their knowledge they are supported by Burns in one way or another. Redwood Study For Seminole Is Pondered
An attempt to establish an experimental plot to grow redwood trees in Seminole County may be undertaken by the Sanford Chamber of Commerce.

James T. Talmadge Jr., executive director of the chamber, said he was investigating the possibility of the redwood experiment after contact with the University of Florida agricultural extension service.

He said he had been advised that redwood growth in Florida has met with "fair success" and told that H. T. Davis, farm forester, would assist with the establishment of an experimental redwood plot to supply seedlings.

Talmadge said Forest Service nursery men will be willing to grow the seedlings if the seed is supplied. The suitability between the redwood and the bald cypress which grows in this area is being studied. He said the trees are within the same soil type as the bald cypress. Redwood seedlings can be germinated in Florida with fair success. The trees are fairly fast growers but it gets older needs wet winters and foggy summers.

A drained lake bottom between swamps has been suggested as a likely spot for the experimental plot, Talmadge said.

The columns this week will take up declarer's problems at trick one. The East and West hands won't be shown most of the time because declarer does not get to see them.

You start with the code word "ARCH." Analyze the lead and note that West has probably led from a queen-jack combination. You hope that it wasn't a five-card or six-card suit. Florida Tech Needs Roads . . . Now Is The Time To Act

Editorial Comment

Two years ago the State of Florida saw fit to select a site for Florida Technological University right on Seminole County's doorstep. And for these last two years the State had done much in planning . . . curriculum, buildings, utilities, landscaping, zoning in Seminole and Orange Counties.

The Sanford Herald has learned that an extensive roadway system can be built criss-crossing Seminole County . . . north to south and west to east . . . to provide suitable access to Florida Tech WITHOUT INCREASED COST to the taxpayer.

The Herald emphatically recommends to the Seminole County Commission to act NOW so that these two highways will be completed when Florida Tech opens its doors in September 1968, two years hence.

Florida Tech is scheduled to open its doors to its first students in September 1968. . . . Little more than two years away. Judging from State action these past two years, only action to Florida Tech when it opens will be the same little county road SR 820, which serves the area between Oviedo and Highway 50.

It is proposed . . . and the Herald highly recommends . . . two four-lane, high speed arterial highways be constructed NOW to serve Florida Tech.

The first would be an extension of Highway 435. It would serve as an east-west highway for our residents in South Seminole County. Now four-laned from west of Altamonte Springs to a point east of Casselberry, the proposal is to swing a road east and north from the point where 435 bears south.
