going to get fired. A shift in political wind usually blows someone bad news. New governors always bring into the state capital their own men for the prime "Little Cabinet" posts. Changes at lower levels of

government are always not so certain, which in a way, causes even more worry. It's the suspense. Miami Mayor Robert King

High, who won the Democratic gubernatorial nomina-tion over incumbent Haydon Burns, has assured everybody he does not plan wholesale firings, if he wins election in November.

But the fear remains. Man employes feel naked in their knowledge they supported Burns in one way or another. Efforts were made in recent years to hold down the number of job losses due to politics. The merit system was created. This is sort of a state civil service program to protect the jobs of most state workers. But there are many employes who are not covered by provisions of the system. Most of these people work in the middle level of government.

The new governor will have one less Little Cabinet job to fill. The 1965 Legislature reorganized the Motor Vehicle Commission and made the agency responsible to the full Cabinet. Thus, the director, Arch Livingston, no longer works at the pleasure of th governor.

Other Little Cabinet post will change with the incoming administration, unless there is a break with tradition.

James T. Talmadge Jr., ex- + WEDNESDAY executive director of the chamber, said he was investigating the possibility of the redwood experiment after

contact with the University

of Florida agricultural extension service. He said he had been advised that redwood growth in Florida has met with "fair success" and told that H. T. Davis, farm forester, would assist with the establishment of an experimental redwood plot to supply seedings.

Talmadge said Forest Service nurserys might be willing to grow the seedlings if the seed is supplied.

The similiarity between the redwood and the bald sypress which grows in this area is close, Talmadge said he was informed. He said the trees are within the same "family."


Redwood seedlings can be germinated in Florida with fair success. The trees are fairly fast growers but as it gets older needs wet winters and foggy summers. A drained lake bottom beween swamps has been suggested as a likely spot for the experimental plot, Talmadge said.



It has been estimated it would be cheaper to build a causeway across Lake Monroe than to four-lane Highway 17-92 around the lake . . . and it would reduce the distance by 31/2 miles. Right now a dredge is operating in Lake Monroe in the construction of the site for the multi-million dollakefront project.
