Bear Succumbs To Spring's Appeal And Takes Hike

NEW YORK, 26. (Special) — Tuffy, a four-year-old Russian-brown bear, succumbed recently to whatever appeal a Spring like day has for Ursus arctos, and went for a mile-long stroll through the streets of Roosevelt, Queens.

The bear's adventure was tame as he was censored, but his unexpected appearance in the quiet city street provided excitement for hundreds of Queens residents, a problem for a score of police, and trouble for his owner, who got a summons.

Tuffy lives with his parents, Bill and Rose, in a cage at the rear of the home of Stanley George, son of a Romany chief, at 146-32 231st Street, Rosedale. At 2 P. M. the gypsy children of the George clan opened the cage door to feed the three bears.

His elders accepted the food with becoming gratitude, but the smallest, a steady, six-year-old first bear to stretch himself without bumping into his parents.

Before he reached the park, however, he was overtaken by an automobile driven by a neighbor of the George family whose aid had been enlisted in the absence of Stanley and his father, Gus. The gypsy, however, had no check on Tuffy's progress by edging in front of the bear and forcing him to the curb.

These antics availed nothing, since Tuffy simply outflanked the car and continued on his way. The park was full of people enjoying the sunshine and the Saturday daylight alert Mayor F. H. LaGuardia would have been pleased by the speed of the dispersal.

The neighbor in the automobile continued his harassing tactics, so Tuffy forsook the park and continued the jaunt along Mayday Road, followed by a throng of several hundred people who stayed a cautious 200 yards to the rear.

At 2:14 Mayday Road Tuffy gave up and entered an empty two-car garage owned by Henry J. Macdonald, Mr. Macdonald promptly and fearfully closed the sliding doors, and Tuffy just as promptly put one huge paw through the glass window in the upper part of the door.

Five police arrived from the Queens Village station and fifteen more came from the Ozone Park station. These officers, some of them armed with rifles, deployed in front of the garage and debated their next move.

Before they could agree on a plan of attack, Gus George, the 80-year-old Rommany chief, arrived on the scene with an apple, a nose-ring and a chain. The gypsy offered the apple through the shattered window, and Tuffy, apparently having overcome his disinclination for such titbits, accepted it in his non-retractable claws and munched it thoughtfully.

Tuffy then poked his nose through the window to see if there were any more apples where that one came from, and Gus spoke to him sharply in the gypsy tongue and affixed the ring in Tuffy's nose. He opened the garage door, attached the chain to the ring and that was the end of the adventure. The old gypsy led Tuffy quietly back over the "Mingling" route to his cage.

Police followed and gave Stanley George a summons to appear today in Flushing Magistrate's court on a charge of allowing a wild animal to roam at large in the streets.

Censor Uses Six Tongues In Work With Service Men

LONDON, Feb. 26. — They're not the only ones who are censoring their letters home start "Dear Mom" but not all of them.

In this Eastern Theater of Operations of the United States Army, hundreds of good soldiers have difficulty speaking English and can write it little or not at all. They are encouraged to write in their mother tongues since the Army feels that this is just one of the fundamental rights of a democracy.

These letters in foreign languages are censored personally by Lieut. Col. Ferdinand A. Hirsy or his foreign language staff scattered throughout ETOUSA. Hailing from Stevens Point, Wis., Lieut. Col. Hirsy speaks six languages and his staff can handle twenty handily.

While letters in foreign tongues usually require less blue pencil than others—because men of other backgrounds are very careful not to break security regulations—they are read very carefully if they criticize lack of furloughs or late pay or health conditions. If these men write many complaints about relations with their fellow soldiers or their allies, or if they criticize lack of furloughs or late pay or health conditions, prompt investigations are made with a view to removing ground for the complaints. Officers have found they are less likely than their American comrades to grouse just for the sake of grouching.

Most of the foreign language letters read much as those in English. The men say they are getting along fine, army life isn't

so bad and the rest of the things that sons write their mothers the world over; but occasionally Col. Hirsy runs into a problem. Like the case of the soldier who was determined to continue his education along with his military service and took a correspondence school course in Russian. The colonel had to wade through page after page of deductions.

Japs May Try To Introduce Bogus Bills Into U. S.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26. Suppose you owned a department store and that your competitor hired 500 people to go into your store and buy everything you had in stock, giving you counterfeit money. You can guess the result.

Put a nation, the United States, for instance—in your position as the store owner, and put another nation, Japan, say, in the place of the competitor. The effect on the economic structure of the United States would be devastating.

The enemy would have you believe that it could never happen in your country. That is a foolish thinking, because throughout the ages kings, statesmen and warriors have circulated counterfeit money to the great loss of those they were anxious to injure.

Napoleon Bonaparte was a counterfeiter as well as a conqueror. Counterfeit notes were used in purchasing supplies for his invasions of Russia and Austria.

Following the signing of the Declaration of Independence, the Continental Congress issued Continental currency. The British set about producing deceptive counterfeits and dumping them into circulation. This strategy contributed extensively to the downfall of the colonial money, and the expression "not worth a Continental" is in common use to day.

A story of the Japanese occupation of Tientsin, China, tells of a neat trick employed by a patriotic Chinese engraver. The Japanese seized him and forced him to engrave plates for counterfeit Chinese one-yuan notes.

Part of the design of genuine notes depicts an old Chinese, the Imperial Taino, holding the scepter of his office in his hands. The engraver, however, changed the original design to show the scepter held under the arm of the figure, and the index finger of the right hand protruding from a circular opening made by the thumb and index finger of the left hand. The nose is humorous and symbolizes a form of contempt.

The use of bogus currency as an implement of war is an old Japanese custom. In the Russo-Japanese War the treacherous Japanese established in Kobe, Japan, what was probably the most elaborate counterfeiting plant in history, costing approximately \$100,000.

There has been much talk of secret weapons. Is it unreasonable to assume that one of these much-heralded aids to Axis victory may be a veritable mountain of counterfeit money? It is not only possible but probably true that one or more of the Axis powers holds such a weapon and is awaiting the psychological moment to loose it in an avalanche.

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

