







# Sanford Naval Academy Warned By Fire Marshal

The State Fire Marshal's office slapped Sanford Naval Academy last September with 18 violations of fire codes, and a state official yesterday gave school officials 90 days to get the deficiencies cleared up. Following a tour of the senior school, Deputy Fire Marshal E. V. Fretwell warned school officials to get both the senior and junior schools into compliance with state

If not, Fretwell told The Herald that a "notification of violation" will be submitted, the school will be allotted a certain number of days to get in compliance and operations will be closed down if safety deficiencies aren't brought up to existing standards.

The school's administrator, Jesse Harry, told Fretwell and Fire Chief George Harriett that school maintenance crews "are working" on correcting the violations and that he hopes to have them cleared up within the time

allotted by the fire marshal's office.

Harry presented Fretwell with a 17-item list of measures already completed by school officials in an effort to comply with Fretwell's September recommendations, which were presented in writing and copies mailed to the parent corporation - Bernard MacFadden, Foundations, Inc., of Larchmont, N. Y. The senior facility is attended by about 140 students,

according to Harry. And Harriett said the facility's rating was "poor, a very poor rating." The saving element at the senior facility, Harriett said, is an automatic sprinkler "Without the sprinkler system - you'd strictly have a fire hazard," the chief said. One reason is the building

was constructed in the mid 1920s and wasn't built to comply with the stringent fire codes that are in existence Over at the junior school on Celery and Mellonville Avenues, it's a slightly different situation since that

facility was constructed with fire resistant material.

Harriett said. The junior facility also got a number of black eyes from the fire marshal's office. Yesterday, police arrested a 14-year-old juvenile on

arson charges after a fire was set for the second night in a row at the junior facility. The fire was the second at the facility after a fire in the school's cafeteria destroyed draperies on the second floor. Damage estimates were about \$4,000, Harry said. Deficiencies listed by Fretwell at the junior school included:

-Hasps are provided on certain exit doors. Fretwell recommended they be removed. Harry says that item has been complied with. -No doors are provided for the sleeping rooms.

Harry, calling it "a big money item" said no action has been taken vet. -Open stairways are provided for exits in the

-No fire alarm is provided for the facility. Dormitory is not equipped with automatic sprinkler system. Fretwell recommended an automatic sprinkler system or a

manually operated, electrically supervised fire alarm system. Harry promised one in 90 days. -The north-west exit door was stuck and could not be opened. Harry says all exit doors are now repaired. At the senior school, 1000 E. First St., Fretwell listed

-Automatic sprinkler system is not electrically supervised. A maintenance contract has not been provided by a properly qualified company. Harry says sprinkler company has completed survey and a contract is in the making.

the following deficiencies:

-All exits were not properly marked with approved exit signs and no emergency lighting was provided. Harry says fire exit signs have been installed.

-Doors to sleeping rooms are provided with metal louvers. The louvers should be removed. Harry said louvers have been replaced in some instances.

-Stairs are unprotected at each floor level and the

## 'Abortionist' Doctor Returns To Hospital

BOSTON (AP) - Dr. Kenneth C. Edelin, sentenced to one year's probation on a manslaughter conviction in the death of a fetus after a legal abortion, returns to work at Boston City Hospital today. Suffolk Superior Court Judge James P. McGuire stayed execution of the sentence Tuesday pending the outcome of an appeal filed later in the day by the doctor's attorney, William P. Homans. Edelin could have received a maximum 20-year sentence in the case. The hospital immediately invited him to return to his job today as head of outpatient obstetrical and gynecological care, and Edelin accepted

## Permanent Cut Planned

DETROIT (AP) — Chrysler Corp. officials say they plan permanent operational cutbacks this year that could spell still more layoffs and possibly some plant closings. "We are going to have to cut back until we're profitable, Chrysler Chairman Lynn Townsend told reporters Tuesday. A record fourth-quarter loss of \$73.5 million in 1974 was the worst performance in Chrysler history. Chrysler directors were to decide today whether to eliminate the 35-cents per share quarterly dividend. The firm reported Monday that 1974 losses were \$52 million, while revenues of \$11 billion were off from \$11.8 billion in

HERMANSVILLE, Mich. (AP) - Ron Schmidt raises calves and chickens for a living and rides a bike for recreation. But his wife doesn't think he's exceptional. even though he's blind. "Living with Ron, I don't think he's special," Bonnie Schmidt says. "I get so tired of hearing people say, 'Look at the blind guy.... Where's his Superman suit?" Schmidt, who lost his sight as a child, grew up on his father's 650-acre farm near Springport. Mich. He earned a degree in physics from the University of Michigan but turned to his "first love," farming and raising animals, when jobs in physics dried up. Schmidt and his wife have two children.







# U.S. Freedom Weathers Crisis

From the amount of political upheaval and the number of changes of leadership around the world in 1974, we might have expected a brighter report from Freedom House on the status of mankind's historical struggle for freedom. However, the organization which keeps track of changes in the political and civil rights enjoyed by citizens of different countries has issued a summary showing that gains of freedom for some people tended to be canceled out by losses of freedom for others. Freedom House sees a bright spot in the move

back to constitutional government in Greece. On the plus side it also notes a continued trend toward more political rights for the people of Spain, and more freedom of dissent in Brazil and Egypt.

Portugal threw off its dictatorship and is granting independence to its African colonies, but Freedom House commentators point out that people in the colonies may only be exchanging one form of tyranny for another. Portugal itself remains ruled by a military junta leaning toward the left. Ethiopia deposed its authoritarian emperor, but now appears to be even farther from constitutional government than it was before. Last year seemed to dramatize how revolutions and coups d'etat can change governments but not necessarily improve the lot of the governed. Of course, 1974 came and went with a

significant part of the world's population still being denied the most basic political and civil rights under Communist governments of the Soviet Union, Eastern Europe and mainland China. In all, 2.5 billion people were living at the end of 1974 under conditions which Freedom House characterizes as unfree or only partly free.

In historical perspective it is discouraging that free democratic government remains a privilege enjoyed by a minority of the people on our planet. This should remind Americans of the precious nature of their own political with their own

Indeed, Freedom House takes note of the fact that the United States of America-weathered the constitutional crisis of Watergate in 1974 with no damage to its free political system. "That the system endured these strains and pressures without any structural damage testifies to the resilience of the institutions as well as the firm adherence of all branches of government and sectors of society to the disciplines of their constitutional compact," wrote Freedom House secretary Philip van Slyck. "The experience was a powerful reaffirmation of the principle of government by laws rather than by men."

This frosted meat loaf may be company fare. Offer it with a cooked vegetable, good bread, a crisp calad, dessert and coffee or tea. The meat loaf is flavorsome with its addition of tomato sauce, onion, chili and garlic so there's no need to serve a sauce or relish with it. FROSTED MEAT LOAF
