Sanford product, right-hander Bobby Callahan started for the locals but managed to last only four innings, retiring for a pinch hitter. The big moundsman struck out two and walked three in his brief appearance. He gave up six hits.

Leadoff man Fred Chadderton leveled off on a second pitch in the first frame to drive the ball over the left field wall for his second home of the campaign.

Joe Simonian and Pete Pichan gathered homers for the visitors, while Davis managed to scoop across the platter in the fourth frame after banging a triple to centerfield, and scoring on a delayed infield relay.

The Giants take on Orlando tonight at Municipal Ball Park. Manager Levy said either This or Lake will see hurling action.

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

Memphis Pitchers Setting Hot Pace In South League

At Roosevelt Park in Memphis June 5 a big league team watched professionals but without pride. The opposition that day was Atlanta, and that team's pitcher, Memphis' pitching was spotty—sometimes great, occasionally pitiful and once in awhile polished.

That night Memphis pitchers gave up 16 runs. The next night it was 12 and the next night 12 again. The words of the team sounded better each game since Memphis' total season run production was the best in the Southern association.

Then suddenly John Perovich came through with a five-hitter against potent Birmingham, Mary Rothblatt and Ruth Ophelia came through to win the next night against the older It girls.

Little Mary Rothblatt put out Mobile 10-0 last night with a five-hit game and the hicks moved half a game closer to second place Birmingham. Only one game separates them.

Nearly all of Memphis' recent winning pitchers have been chicks for most of the season. No new "good" pitchers have turned up. It has been a case of the chicks race yet but the winning looks strong.

The victory was the sixth in seven games and tonight young Guy Hamlin goes for the seventh in eight. Hamlin, a \$25,000 bonus boy, won the only game he started but has pitched only 12 innings since joining the chicks. He meets veteran Pete Wojas (2-4) of Mobile in Memphis.

LEESBURG, June 20.—The Leesburg Panthers set the DeLand bats to bow down last night, 6 to 3, behind the thirteenthinning of George Cave.

Bob Minak pitched one-hit ball but the Panthers hit in the clutch to score their five runs. Alexander, Joe Facker catcher, will three for four and driving in two runs, and Mills with two for three, one a triple and driving in two runs were the big guns for the Panthers.

## Brooklyn Dodgers Possess Knack Of Snapping Streaks

Tip to the National League clubs—don't bring a winning streak into Ebbets Field. Those unsympathetic Brooklyn Dodgers are sure to crack it.

Really, it's uncanny the way the devil-may-care Dodgers cool off the "free hot" club.

First, it was Philadelphia. The young, eager Phillips stormed into Ebbets Field on Memorial Day in first place as a result of winning five of their previous six starts. The Brooks immediately polished them off twice to knock them off the top perch.

Then it was St. Louis. The Cards came into Brooklyn last Friday leading the league by three and a half games. The Dodgers thrashed them three straight times to send them limping away with only a half game lead.

Last night it was New York. The Giants moved into four wins in the last five starts. Another triumph would have thrown them into a fifth-place tie with Chicago.

But it was not to be. Led by Jackie Robinson and Carl Furillo, the Dodgers dusted them off, 8-6, for their fourth victory in as many meetings with their archrivals.

The victory, Brooklyn's fourth in a row, moved the Dodgers into an exact first place tie with the idle Redbirds. Each team has won 32 and lost 20.

The Braves fell three games off the pace last night when Cliff Chambers of the Pittsburgh Pirates bested lefty Warren Spahn in an old-fashioned 10-duel.

A two-hitter single by Danny Murtaugh in the second inning, a poor throw by Shubie Stasi, and Earl Turner's one-bagger brought Murtaugh with the only run of the game.

The game was enlivened by a skirmish between Chambers and Boston's Earl Torgeson. The latter rushed Chambers in the third and called him "shambles."

Chambers allowed only four

hits to Spahn's five. He stopped Stan Jethroe's hitting streak at 16, horse-collaring the Negro centerfielder four times.

In the only American League game, the Chicago White Sox nipped the Washington Senators, 4-3, in 11 innings. Outfielder Harry Ricker's home run in the 11th enabled Randy Gumpert to gain his first victory of the season. He pitched two scoreless innings of relief. The Sox tied the score at 3-3 in the ninth when Nelson Fox, who scored the first Chicago run, fled to send in Ricker from third.

Ralph Branca pitched his first complete game for the Dodgers since Aug. 1, 1948, although he was tagged for 12 hits by the Giants. Four errors helped Brooklyn pick up as many unearned runs to win. Branca started with a rush, striking out 10 Giants in the first five innings. But he was lucky to finish.

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
