State Department Asks Closing Of Italian Consulates

Order Is Follow Up Of Similar Edict Against Germany's Staff Last Week

Consul Employees Will Also Leave Break Between Germany And America Is Debate Topic

WASHINGTON, June 21.—The closing of all Italian consulates in the United States was ordered today by the State Department as a follow up of a similar edict against Rome's Axis partner, Germany, earlier this week.

Officers and employees of Italian consular offices were ordered removed from the United States by July 15. An authorized German spokesman declared yesterday Germany has proof of "dozens of cases" of espionage in which he said United States consular officials in Germany rendered information for the British secret service and passed it on directly or through a certain central office in Washington.

The question of whether closing of Italian consulates would be a break in diplomatic relations between Germany and the United States was a matter of lively discussion in both German and American newspapers.

Usually when nations come to parting of the ways they first are irritated by each other's diplomatic activity. That is, the break comes from the top down.

Submarine May Be Left On Ocean's Floor

Cause Of Sinking Of O-9 May Be Left Unsolved, Admiral Edwards Declares

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., June 21.—(AP)—Possibility that the sunken submarine O-9, and her crew of 23 dead might be left on the ocean floor, entombed under the compression of 440 feet of water that has crumpled the craft's steel shell, was sounded today by the Navy's high command.

Admiral Richard S. Edwards, commander of submarines of the Atlantic fleet, intimated the cause of the sinking might go unsolved. The death of all 23 officers and men of the sunken submarine O-9 was indicated late last night by the Navy after wreckage from the craft shot to the surface from the tremendous depth of 402 feet.

Rear Admiral Wainwright announced that efforts to place a line aboard the submarine would be suspended until this morning and this apparently sealed the fate of the men trapped on the ocean floor.

Speaking of the rescue fleet, which showed a blaze of lights about 18 miles east of this port, Admiral Wainwright added: "Only if a line was placed aboard the O-9 could the Navy's rescue bell be used and without the line to the surface the men below could not hope to use their Meissen lungs in trying to come up. Despite the wreckage, the air bubbles and an oil slick, the exact location of the submarine had not been established."

The O-9, one of the nation's oldest submarines and only recently recommissioned after a decade of idleness, went onto a deep trial dive at 7:50 o'clock this morning. About two hours later a smoke bomb distress signal came to the surface.

A frantic search followed, but no sound came from the O-9, nor any direct contact made, until the rescue ship Falcon, one of a dozen navy vessels which rushed to the scene, radioed shortly before 8:00 P. M. "We have picked up painted cork pieces of the O-9 grating, oil slick, air bubbles, depth of 67 fathoms."

The submarine previously had been reported at a depth of 370 feet, although it was built to stand only the pressure of a 200-foot depth. The Falcon report placed her at 402 feet.

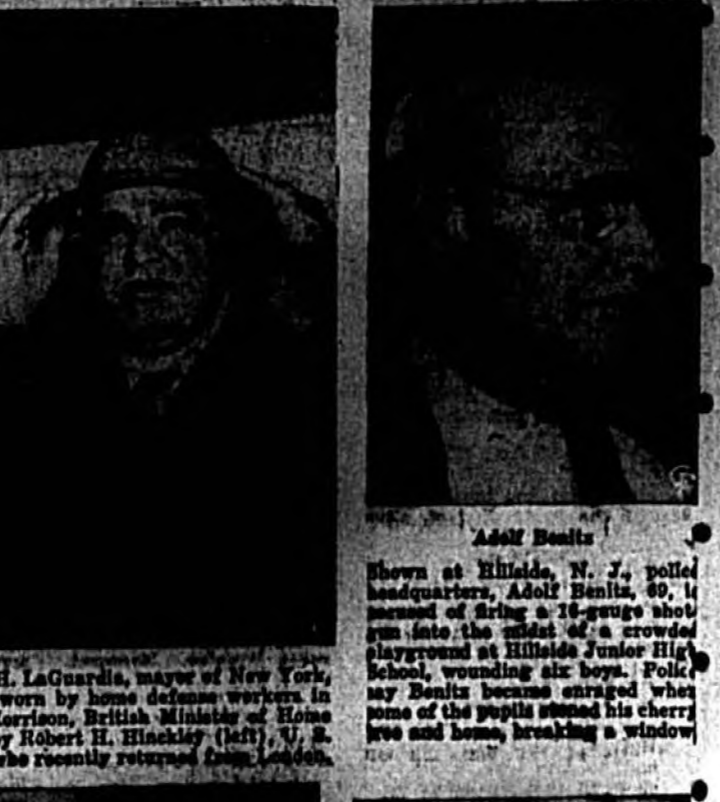

Britain's Shipping Loss Shows Decline

LONDON, June 21.—(AP)—Britain announced today a drop in her total shipping losses in May, but authoritative sources said that sinkings in the battle of Atlantic were growing and the number of Nazi submarines apparently is increasing despite the fact that we have taken a heavy toll.

The total from May was given as 461,322 tons, a reduction of 118,223 from April.

Corrected figures for Britain's April losses made that month the most disastrous month of the war with a total of 581,251 tons destroyed. It was asserted authoritatively that tonnage sunk in the Atlantic had increased in May over April.

United States Senator William M. Smith said that, based on the figures, the British fleet is being replaced at a rate of 100,000 tons a month.

Japan's Reaction Is Watched By Observers In Far East

The Baltic bastion which Soviet Russia created as a buffer against German attack was reported today to be giving way as Nazi panzer units pushed 10 miles into Russian territory and the Luftwaffe pounded the bases and communications of the Red Army.

Reports from Kaunas said Lithuania declared her independence from Russia at noon today—the second day of war between the Reich and the U. S. S. R.

The conflict ranged from continued maneuvers for position in the far north where, in Finland, the 2,000-mile front touches the Arctic Sea, to a fierce encounter of men and machines, aloft and ground, in the central and southern sectors.

The Nazi High Command asserted Adolf Hitler's legions have driven ahead "on schedule and successfully" in the first lunge against Russia.

The clash of military titans who now have east side the presence of friendly troops in its train a series of hurried conferences in world capitals.

Far Eastern observers keenly watched Japan's reaction, Tokyo is bound by the three-power axis pact to go to the assistance of either Germany or Italy in the event of an "attack" by a new belligerent.

Germany reported quick and destructive success by air today for the thunderbolts which Adolf Hitler loosed Sunday in a variation of war on his one-time ally, the Russian of Joseph Stalin.

Hapless Finland, weary from her 1939-40 war with Russia, but disengaged into a clash of great powers along with Rumania as an ally of Germany, suffered some of the first of Russia's counter-blows.

The Finnish High Command told of Russian air raids at several points, including Alkari, and of attacks on two Finnish armored vessels. Helsinki's radio suddenly went dead this morning, indicating a raid on the capital.

But the Finnish press, making the best of matters, printed flaming dispatches comparing German successes in the first day of the titanic conflict with the biggest victories in the course of the entire European war.

The smoke of burning Russian towns and oil and munitions dumps delineated the sprawling border, these stories said.

The 2,000-mile battlefield, from the Arctic to the Black Sea, was lined with 5,000,000 fighting men—the might of Red Russia arrayed against that of Germany and of Germany's little new allies, Finland and Rumania.

It was in scope and in its meaning for the world the development of perhaps the greatest war in history.

But primary news from the fronts dealt almost exclusively with air raids. D.N.B. official German news agency, and the German radio, told of strong assaults on Sevastopol, Russian Black Sea base; on Kiev, capital of the rich Ukrainian wheat region; on Zhitomir, also in the Ukraine; and on Kaunas, capital of the old Lithuania which Russia seized last year.
