



Hostages To Spend Easter

As Big Losers In Crisis

By United Press International The 50 American hostages seemed certain to spend Easter in the hands of their militant captors, as they have spent Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's - once again the big losers in the political tug of war over their fate.

As a week marked by cautious optimism drew to a close, a new letdown came Thursday with an apparent standoff between the White House and Iran's ruling Revolutionary Council.

After a five-hour meeting in Tehran, the council put off a decision on President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr's proposal to have the government take custody of the hostages - now in their 153rd day of captivity - until Iran's parliament can decide their fate, at least two months away.

Earlier, there had been talk of a possible takeover of the hostages as early as Saturday. The council asked for further clarifications from

President Carter on meeting Iran's condition there be no more U.S. provocations or threats against Iran. It was an apparent victory for the hard-liners and a defeat for the moderate forces of Bani-Sadr. Carter says Iranian authorities should consider the

"full implications" of their failure to take custody of the hostages from the militants. The president flew to Camp David Thursday to spend the Easter holiday weekend after the latest disappointment from Tehran. He planned to return to the

White House Monday, There were no indications he would summon his foreign policy advisers to the mountaintop retreat for consultations on the latest developments in the fivemonth-old hostage standoff.

John Paul To Lead March

VATICAN CITY (UPI) - Pope John Paul marked Good Friday with preparations for a solemn Way of the Cross march through the ruins of ancient Rome in reenactment of Christ's journey to Calvary.

John Paul, 59, who observed Holy Thursday b washing and kissing the feet of 12 elderly men in St. John Lateran Basilica, spent most of the day resting in his Vatican Palace apartments. Tonight John Paul will mark the most solemn event

in Christian history by leading a procession through the towering ruins of the Colosseum to the Roman Forum, stopping to pray 12 times.

In Kapitangan, Philippines, a Filipino woman who said she saw and talked to Jesus Christ was nailed to a cross under the noon sun today in a bloody Good Friday ritual that attracted hundreds of zealots and tourists. With handkerchiefs in their hands, many surged t eatch drops of blood that flowed from the hands of Luciana Reyes, 21, who was impaled on an 18-foot wood cross in front of a centuries-old church in Kapitangan, a farming village 25 miles north of Manila.

Guerrillas May Release 3

BOGOTA, Colombia (UPI) - Leftist guerrillas holding the Dominican Embassy may free three more non-diplomatic hostages, but they are determined to have their demands met, one of the last captives to be released says

Colombian Foreign Ministry official Edgar Hernandez and Dominican businessman Mario Guzman were led to freedom from the embassy Thursday by the grand rabbi of Colombia, who entered the building for a religious service.

Guzman said the guerrillas may free three more nondiplomatic hostages today, Good Friday, but added the siege probably will not end until the government met their demand to release 311 jailed leftists.

The dream house that Terry and Beverly Bennett of Longwood have been trying to build for the past year on their property on Pine Tree Circle, in Lake Mary has turned into a "monstrosity" in the view of at least one Lake Mary city councilman.

"In my 45 years at looking at homes, I have never seen one look as terrible," said councilman Francis Mark to the young couple Thursday night. "I understand what your neighbors are upset about. It looks like some kids went out there and built it. It is a monstrosity that looks terrible."

Mark's comments were made before councilmen denied the couple's request to lift a building ban for bidding a new con- said. struction on the structure. In fact, Mayor Walter Sorenson made it clear that "if even one nail" is placed in the structure as part of new construction, the city may take legal action. City Attorney Gary Massey carefully took down the address of the couple, who are currently living in a motor home in is to be constructed anew. Only deficiencies are to be Longwood, noting he would need the address to pursue legal

action if necessary. City Manager Phil Kulbes told the council three construction deficiencies remain to be corrected on the structure. In addition he said at least one exterior wall is "not plumb," in that it bows outward in the center.

"When you get all those things finished (the deficiencies corrected) you may come back to the council and ask for an extension of time," Massey told the couple and a friend, Robert Davis.

Davis has said he is a building contractor and helping the Bennetts build the house.

The couple more than a year ago acquired the Pine Tree Circle property and pitched a tent there. After a period of time passed, the city council ordered them to remove the tent and the couple began building the house.

The City council two weeks ago warned the couple not to begin any new construction on the house until all deficiencies were corrected. At the same time the council noted the building permit for the structure expires May 1.





Judge Rules No Conspiracy In Bert Lance Bank Trial

ATLANTA (UPI) - In a major blow to the prosecution, a federal judge has ruled the government failed to prove former federal Budget Director Bert Lance and his co-defendants conspired to defraud

U.S. District Judge Charles A. Moye Jr. Thursday said he would throw out the first of 33 indictments in the case and not allow the jury to consider it with the 32 remaining alleged violations of federal banking laws. + Chief Prosecutor Edwin Tomko said the ruling would have no effect on the remaining counts against the men, but legal observers felt it was bound to hinder the government's attempts to win convictions.

Defense Spending May Rise

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Senate Budget Committee has agreed on a balanced budget for 1981, but its \$612.9 billion spending plan bears little resemblance to the budget proposed by President Carter only four

days ago. The committee voted, 11-7, Thursday on figures that brrespond with Carter's, but it raised military spending and made drastic cuts in domestic programs to pay for the higher defense budget.

When Carter announced his revised budget on Monday, he spoke highly of the "extraordinary way" he and congressional leaders had worked together "to reach general understandings in advance on reduction

proposals."

Bush Woos Louisiana Voters

AAA Objects To Plan To Boost Gasoline Tax

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI) - Gov. Bob Graham has recommended raising the state gasoline tax by nearly 12 cents, and the American Automobile Association doesn't like

Graham made his long-anticipated pitch for a boost in the eight-cent-a-gallon levy Thursday. He proposed an indexing plan providing for automatic increases as the construction price index goes up. The tax would go up 1.9 cents Jan. 1, rise another 2.1 cents in 1982 and rise still further reaching 19.5 cents a gallon in 1985.

"Imposition of such a tax would represent an abdication of the Legislature's tax-fixing responsibilities to foreign powers," said Keith Leslie, executive secretary of the AAA clubs of Florida.

Leslie said Graham's tax proposals are viewed by AAA members as "both politically unacceptable and unfair." More than one million Florida motorists are members of

AAA.

"We find it incredible that a new gas tax should be seriously proposed on top of the 10 cent gas tax imposed by the Carter administration, and in the face of a surplus of hundreds of millions of dollars in the state's general revenue fund." Leslie said.

"Motorists already overburdened by the forces of inflation are already paying more than their fair share of transportation taxes," the AAA executive said. "Further taxes would be most harmful to those on a fixed income and lower economic levels who can least afford it."

High Insurance Rates Stay For Men, Singles

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI) - A state hearing examiner says insurance companies can charge men drivers more than women and singles more than married folks despite the objections of Insurance Commissioner Bill Gunter.

Chris Bentley, Department of Administration chief hearing examiner, struck down on Thursday Gunter's order requiring a halt to the companies' 20-year-old practice of considering sex, marital status and academic achievement when determining rates.

Gunter plans to appeal to the 1st District Court of Appeal, saying he still believes the discrimination is unjustified and unfair.

"Consumers seeking equity in the pricing of auto insurance in Florida will share my disappointment in the opinion." he said. "However, the question of equity in the pricing of this important product is too critical an issue to be decided at the administrative hearing level.

State law allows the use of the factors in rate-setting as long as it is consistent, Bentley said. And there is no evidence insurance companies aren't applying the criteria uniformly. Gunter's order was to take effect March 1, but Circuit Judge Victor Cawthon blocked it indefinitely to allow the administrative challenge to be heard by Bentley.

Fighting Gunter's order are the Insurance Services Office. a New York-based rating service representing 342 companies; State Farm, Florida's largest auto insurer; Allstate, the second largest; Government Employees Insurance Co.; Lumberman's Mutual Casualty; and United States Fidelity and Guaranty.

The insurance companies have argued that use of the factors is a valid insurance technique.

The argument between Democrats and Republicans on economic policy is coming down to this: Should the federal budget be balanced by cutting spending or raising taxes?

The division along party lines became clear in the Senate recently when Republicans lined up **BOB WAGMAN** solidly behind Sen. William Roth of Delaware in his effort to expose the budget balancing act of the Democrats, as a "smokescreen" for a massive tax increase. The Republicans were voted down. as they inevitably are on party-line votes in the present Senate, but Roth made his point.

The point is that the cries of anguish from Democratic leaders over cutting \$10 billion to \$15 billion in spending in 1981 are diverting attention from what is happening on the other side of the budget - the revenue side. Cuts of that amount are no big deal, says Roth. Even if they are made, the Democrats will be relying on tax increases of nearly \$90 billion to keep the budget in balance in

The revenue side of the ledger looks like this: An economy supercharged with inflation will increase income tax revenue by \$35.7 billion. That includes the effect of "bracket creep," which gives the government a bigger bite out of incomes even though higher wages and salaries leave Americans with less buying power than they had

Social Security taxes will rise by \$25.2 billion under increases voted by Congress in 1978 and taking effect next Jan. 1. The new "windfall profits tax" on domestic oil

production will bring in \$13.9 billion. If Congress adopts President Carter's proposal

withhold tax from interest and dividend payments, this will produce an extra \$3 billion. Finally, the \$4.60 a barrel import fee Mr. Carter is imposing on foreign oil - passed on to motorists as a 10-cent-a-gallon " "conservation tax" on gasoline - will produce an additional \$10 billion in federal revenue.

That's \$87.8 billion in additional revenue in sight for 1961 - an increase of more than 16 percent over what the feds are collecting in 1980. This will push the federal tax burden to nearly 22 percent of the gross national product. The Republican position set forth in the Senate debate is that a responsible fiscal policy does not begin and end with a balanced budget. Government borrowing to finance budget deficits is only one aspect of our economic problem. Overall, it is the ever-increasing federal claim on our national wealth, both through borrowing and taxation, that is working against the formation of investment capital and leading to a decline in productivity.

Yes, Washington should balance the budget. But what the Republicans are pointing out is that the Democrats are proposing to balance it with a thumb on the scale — with tax increases, not meaningful cuts in spending.

Budget Cuts...Vote Counts

WASHINGTON (NEA) - The fiscal year 1981 federal budget will have to be slashed drastically to meet the inflation crisis, says the White House. Although the administration vows to slash without regard for political consequences, stories already are leaking out that tell a different tale. Here is one small

Approximately 7 million federal workers are not covered by Social Security. And for good reason. They have their own pension plan and retirement system, funded by tax dollars, with benefits substantially higher than under Social Security.

True, they pay more of their salaries into the system than they would be required to BUSINESS WORLD back much more. It is estimated that the federal government could save several hundred million dollars each year if these workers were part of Social Security.

This has been a bone of contention in Washington for years. Advocates of eliminating the federal-employee pension system include those interested in cutting federal expenses as well as those desirous of infusing the ailing Social Security system with substantial federal-worker contributions.

However, federal employees and their unions bitterly oppose any such move. In fact, federal-employee unions reportedly have raised a \$3 million-plus war chest to fight any such attempt - and any presidential candidate who dares to advocate it.



TAMPA, Fla. (UPI) - Lee Rose, who has the third-best winning percentage among active, major college basketball coaches, has passed up the final two years on his contract at Purdue to try to lead littleknown University of South Florida to national prominence.

Rose, whose Boilermakers finished third in the NCAA championships last month, agreed to a four-year contract with USF Thursday at an annual salary of \$41,000. In addition to the salary, the contract provides an opportunity to develop local television and radio programs

and a summer basketball camp. Published reports have pegged the overall financial arrangement at between \$65,000 and \$86,000, with help from wealthy USF supporters, including New York Yankees' owner George Steinbrenner.

Rose has a record of 282-93 in 13 years, trailing only Jerry Tarkanian of the University of Nevada-Las Vegas and Denny Crum of NCAA champion Louisville.

At USF, he will inherit a young team that went 6-21 last season. All but two of last year's players will be back, including guard Tony Grier, Sun Belt Conference sophomore of the year and leading scorer in the conference.

The hiring of Rose was announced by Athletic Director Richard Bowers about the same time Purdue Athletic Director Dick King announced at West Lafayette, Ind. Rose had been released from the final two years of his contract with Purdue to accept the USF job.

"I consider Lee one of the finest coaches in America and a true gentleman," Bowers said. "We are fortunate in having someone of this caliber to guide our future basketball destiny."

"It is with reluctance that I have accepted Lee Rose's resignation as head basketball coach at Purdue," King said. "He has given us two great seasons of basketball and I maintain Lee Rose is one of the finest coaches in the college game today."

"There are several reasons why I have decided to accept he head coaching position at South Florida - the three and important of which are climate, the new Sun Belt onference and relatives living in the Tampa area," Rose

"I also look forward to renewing my working relationships with Dr. Dick Bowers, South Florida's athletic director." he said. "The two of us wrote the constitutional bylaws when the Sun Belt was formed. Together we look forward to moving into a \$10 million facility."

He referred to the 10.500-seat Sun Dome under construction on the USF campus and scheduled to be ready for the start of the basketball season this fall.

There likely will be 14 more races, combining the CART and USAC schedules. The unified schedule will be announced later.

Because plans already were finalized for the 1960 campaigns in USAC and CART, each organization will sanction its own races with 25 Indianapolis 500 and Pocono 500, will be run with USAC boost restrictions of 48 inches on eightcylinder and six-cylinder overhead camshaft engines, 58 inches for turbocharged stock blocks and 60 inches for fourcylinder engines. "You have to blame the owners. They started it. They could have said 'no.' " Rinker said. "They're gullible. They figured they could make a fast buck. They're the culprits that started it and the ones that are eating it."

One person not after the quick buck, however, is Twins' owner Calvin Griffith, who Rinker regards very highly for the way his operation is run.

"A lot of people ridicule him (Griffith), but I respect hi mid Rinher. "He's not in debt, like a lot of them are. "He developes ballplayers for a very few dollars. It still can

As legislation advances in Congress to bring the Central Intelligence Agency and the Federal Bureau of Investigation under statutory control, it has become evident that various proposals would seriously undermine the Freedom of Information Act...

One bill now under study would let the FBI keep secret its records for 10 years after the end of an investigation or prosecution. Another would permit the FBI to destroy all PRESENT ZONING CLASSIFI- County, Florida, upon receipt e criminal-investigation records 10 years after the end of an investigation or prosecution. These two bills combined would bevelopment to C-1 NEIGH-notice, to-wit: FOREST CITY BORHOOD COMMERCIAL PUR-BORHOOD COMMERCIAL PURvirtually exempt the FBI from disclosure under the information act.

No one doubts that the two intelligence agencies must have sufficient power to accomplish their assigned functions, and that power must include the authority to maintain essential secrecy. But the CIA and the FBI now have broad exemptions from disclosure. Some modification of present law may be necessary, but there is no evidence to show that these agencies should be given virtual exemption from the Freedom of Information Act.

Congress should proceed cautiously, and not permit the frustrations over the crises in Iran and Afghanistan to outweigh a judicious judgment of current legislation.





The spiritual eyes of the Christian World are on Jerusalem at the Easter season. Many pilgrims will be in the Holy City to follow the Way of the Cross, where Jesus walked on his way to Calvary, and to visit the many sacred shrines on Good Friday.

The Via Dolorosa, the traditional pathway Jesus followed carrying the cross, has 14 stations commemorating the sorrowful events. Nine are related to the Gospel and five in tradition. The first two are located in the site of the Antonia or pretorium of Pilate (see cover photo), seven are located in streets and the last five in the Church of the Holy Sepulchre.

Each Friday at 3 p.m. a procession is led by the Franciscan Fathers along the Via Dolorosa from the arch that marks the beginning, which tradition says is built over the site where Pontius Pilate said "Behold the Man," as Jesus came forth bearing a crown of thorns and a purple garment.

Although the Church of the Holy Sepulchre is built over the traditional site of calvary and the tomb where Christ's body was buried, many Protestant Christians view the Garden Tomb and Gordon's Calvary as the authentic sites, discovered by British General Charles Gordon in 1883.

Area Christians follow the Way of the Cross in their hearts at special Holy week observances culminated by joyous Easter services that begin with the rising of the



Jury Subpoenas Kelly's Psychic

Jamie Jameison, have been subpoenaed to appear Friday morning before the federal grand jury hearing evidence in the FBI undercover "Abscam" probe.

"The grand jury wants us to bring all records we have regarding Congressman Kelly and any other individuals involved with Kelly in Abscam," Jameison said. early as October with Rep. Richard Kelly, R-New Port Richey,

documents before U.S. District Judge William B. Bryant in couple said. Washington D.C. Jameison said the subpoenas were brought to their home by two Orlando FBI agents at noon Friday. Kelly's lawyers first requested Mrs. Jameison's memos, her husband said. They were provided, Jameison said, and copies were also given to the FBI

The memos, copies of which were obtained by Herald reporters, show Mrs. Jameison also warned of the dangers Kelly faced in dealing with the FBI.

The Orlando office of the FBI was closed Saturday, but a special agent with the FBI's Tampa office said the FBI could tot comment on the matter at this time "The FBI is unable to either confirm or deny that anyone has

been issued a subpoena regarding this case," said special agent Richard Johnston.

In her memo of Dec. 1, 1979, Mrs. Jameison wrote: "I attempted to explain to C-5 (her code name for Kelly as Congressman from the 5th District) that the FBI and the CIA have been responsible for destroying many lives and planting false documents, spreading lies, and committing varied forms of character assassinations against Americans right here in the good old U.S.A. As an example I told him although the players were different at Chappaquiddick, Teddy Kennedy had also suffered a political assassination that C-5, being a public official, should be able to identify with.

"C-5 ended our conversation by informing me he prayed was wrong in what I had seen psychically, and that he would keep me apprised of further developments."

Mrs. Jameison said her knowledge of the police, FBI and CIA stems from working with them on many investigations. She told the Herald on March 29 that Kelly was prepared to pay her \$1,000 a day plus expenses to come to Washington to "tune in" on Abscam bribe money. She said she, her husband and Volusia County Sheriff's investigator Gordon Lefavour were preparing to fly to Washington just before the story of Kelly being videotaped taking the bribe money was revealed.

About three months after the disappearance, Wilson said, he and a Seminole deputy took some of his wife's clothing to the
