Senators Assert Congress Will Not Repeal T-H Law

Johnson, Brewster Predict Revision Of Labor Legislation

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—(AP)—A Democrat and a Republican predicted today that Congress will revise—but not repeal—the Taft-Hartley labor law.

Senator Edwin C. Johnson (D-Colo.) said he thinks the probable outcome will be "a sort of a mixture of the Wagner and Taft-Hartley acts."

Senator Brewster (R-Me.) said in a separate interview that he thinks about all of the 1948 labor law that will be repealed "will be the name."

President Truman has indicated he will ask Congress to repeal the Taft-Hartley Act outright and substitute a measure along the lines of the Wagner law. Just what form the proposed substitute will take has not been disclosed.

Brewster said he doesn't think that returning Congress members generally will be willing to reverse the position they took in overruling Mr. Truman's Taft-Hartley veto.

But he conceded the administration may be able to force some changes through Congress. "They may be able to knock out the ban on the closed shop and (Continued on Page Four Sec. 2)

11 Other Persons Killed In Wreck; Forty-three Injured

TOOELE, Utah, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Authorities still sought the identities today of two of 13 persons killed in a western Utah bus collision.

The crash of two Burlington railroads buses occurred Saturday on fog-shrouded U.S. Highway 40 about 63 miles west of Salt Lake City. Forty-three persons were injured.

"Billie" Ybarbo Says Husband Had Often Beaten Her

Sergeant Threatened To Kill Her On Nite Of Fatal Shooting

MARBURG, Germany, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Mrs. Wilma "Billie" Ybarbo told a U.S. military government court today she shot her war hero husband because he was beating her up and had threatened to kill her.

The pretty 27-year-old mother from Marburg, Mass., added that a family quarrel involving sexual incompatibility and her husband's attention to a woman girl led up to the fatal night.

"He had told me he was going to kill me and had beaten me up terribly before," the defendant declared.

"I just couldn't go through that again," she said. "I reached into the wall boxes and got the gun where I had put it after taking it away from him the other night, when he was going to kill us both."

The court today ruled out a possible death penalty for Mrs. Ybarbo. The court held the prosecution had failed to show any premeditation in the shooting of Sgt. John Ybarbo of World War I.

At the same time the court ruled an American woman can be tried for murder under German law, which authorities are leading for murderers. There is no possibility, however, that the penalty would be applied in this case.

Speaking in a low, but firm voice, the defendant described the night of the shooting.

After hearing her in the bed room, she said Ybarbo went to the bathroom saying "now you stay right there and when I come back I am going to black both of your eyes, bust your nose and knock out all your teeth."

Mrs. Ybarbo said she grabbed a gun and followed him to the bath room, pushing open the door.

"He came toward me, so I fired the pistol," she said. "He came after me again. He sprang at me. I was backing away down the hall. He grabbed my arm. The gun went off two more times."

It was on Friday, Sept. 18, two weeks after the shooting. (Continued on Page Four Sec. 2)

Five Scientists Nearly Blinded As Result Of Atom Cyclotron Work

NEWTON, Mass., Dec. 20.—(AP)—Deadly radiation from atom cyclotrons has nearly blinded several American scientists, according to Dr. Shields Warren, head of the Atomic Energy Commission's medical department.

He said yesterday that "about five" scientists, whom he did not name, have apparently developed cataracts of the eye as a result of the effects of radiation on the lens.

However, he stressed, "there is no evidence at the present time that they were working on the immediate problems of atomic energy."

For safety's sake, Dr. Warren declared, the commission is checking to determine if any of the scientists had been engaged in work other than university or similar projects which might involve proximity to atomic piles.

He emphasized there is considerably more danger of radiation leakage in research involving cyclotrons than in the atomic projects of the government and its contractors, where he added, "The hazards, as far as we can tell from present experience, are extremely slight."

In San Francisco, Dr. J. G. Hamilton, director of the Crocker Laboratory of the University of California's cyclotron is quoted as referring to the scientists.

"None of these individuals received these exposures when working on the Manhattan project or for the Atomic Energy Commission. There were all cyclotron exposures, a type of work in which there is a calculated risk."

Dr. Hamilton said one scientist was exposed before the other four during the war, with the exposure being detected a year or more later. No one at the moment, he added, had been found to be affected by the cyclotrons in operation there.

Ordinary precautions taken by the scientists in question were exposed, however, "The cyclotron abnormalities in blood counts which have been considered a reasonably sensitive index to radiation injury, according to Dr. Hamilton.

Blindness need not be the result of exposure to radiation, he noted, since eyesight may be restored through appropriate glasses after the damaged lens, cataracts and all, has been removed surgically.

No Military Plans Are Blueprinted For Jap Islands

TOKYO, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Accelerated American plans to build a strategic hubway in the Far East do not include any perceptible move toward making it a military bastion as well.

Instead, the evidence is that military planners here have not changed their long-standing view that Japan would be a military liability in wartime.

A competent allied spokesman reiterated today that reports of a secret plan for building up Japan's military potential are "wholly without foundation." He also denied that any allied blueprint for increasing the size of the Japanese police had been forwarded to Washington.

Headquarters officials said they expected a fresh series of reports and complaints about "over military preparations" to follow the recently strengthened program for economic stabilization in Japan and some of these quarters repeatedly have made the charge. Another source said the Japanese military would be rebuilt into a military force.

Military officials say the only installations that have been constructed in Japan are essential for occupation purposes. They include a network of air bases and military camps. The former Japanese air base at Yokota has been "reconstructed" as a functioning repair base.

Aside from occupation activities, however, the American Army and Air Force are charged with protecting more than 100,000 American troops in Japan and Korea. It is evident that plans to safeguard them have been completed. Air and naval bases would be vital only for evacuation.

Greece Orders Ships Sunk At Peloponnesus

ATHENS, Dec. 20.—(AP)—The Greek Navy has ordered today to intercept and, if need be, sink any unauthorized ships within five miles of the Peloponnesus coast. The order was not issued because of impending major operations in that sector of Southern Greece.

The new shipping ban, broadcast in Greek and English over radio Athens, said exceptions would be made only for Greek passenger vessels, plying between coastal ports.

Some 25,000 Greek troops recently were reported moved to the Peloponnesus for offensive operations. One unconfirmed report said a full-scale attack was scheduled to be launched at midnight.

There have been frequent reports that submarines have been bringing in supplies to rebels in the Peloponnesus. Several weeks ago a 500-ton ship carrying munitions, was sunk off the coast.

United States Secretary of the Army Kenneth Royall will accompany Lieut. General James A. Van Fleet, head of the American military mission to combat areas in Northern Greece today.

Problems From Its Creation Now Have To Be Settled

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—(AP)—The Palestine war is now over and a state solution of problems arising out of the creation of the new state of Israel is all on its way, Dr. Ralph Bunche says.

The United Nations mediator of Palestine said in his return to the United States that the United Nations state is "now established."

He said fighting in Israel now is a matter of local incidents, and although it may continue for some time, "I cannot regard it as a serious matter."

Bunche forecast a bright future for the new Jewish state and a peaceful settlement with friendly relations between Israel and the surrounding Arab states.

New York City Is Struck By 3rd Worst Snowfall

Nearly 30 Inch Fall Interrupts Bus And Commuter Service

CHICAGO, Dec. 20.—(AP)—The merged fury of two storms had left New York City today to dig out of its third heaviest snowfall in history.

The storm which moved up the Atlantic seaboard from the Carolinas coast with mounting intensity had almost reached its peak in New York when it was joined by another storm that had crept eastward from the Pacific coast.

The result was a 19 1/2 inch covering which left some commuter trains and bus service tied up today as the combined storms moved out into the Atlantic. The record snowfall of 29 1/2 inches in New York fell last December 26, and 27 inches the previous record fall of 21 inches had set in 1888.

Washington was covered by 5 1/2 inches of snow by the coastal storm which also hit parts of New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia and New England. Philadelphia reported seven inches, and Hartford, Conn., 10 inches.

The other storm which first hit the coast with heavy snow, originated in California a week ago and moved northward into Wisconsin and eastern Ohio. Chicago, Indianapolis and La Fayette, Ind., received six inches of wet snow.

Temperatures generally were moderate over the weekend and winter clear weather was forecast for most of the nation today.

Deep snow pockets, loosened by rain, closed roads which blocked highway on the Cascade Mountains of Washington state. Ski patrolmen rescued two youths whose car was carried about 200 feet down a steep slope by a snow slide.

Business Stimulated in North By Families Retiring To Florida

NEW YORK, Dec. 20 (Special) Paradoxically, real estate business in the North is stimulated by the retirement to Florida of 20,000 northern farm families annually—stimulated in fact, to the extent of some \$265,000,000 of new business for northern brokers. And the housing shortage up here is being relieved at the rate of shelter for about 75,000 persons each year.

This, according to Fredrick L. Spiro, president of Plantation Estates Inc., of 500 Fifth Avenue, New York City, developers and builders of Plantation Estates, a 3400-acre community along U. S. Highway 17, fronting on Lake Monroe opposite Sanford, Fla.

In this one new community in the Highlands of Florida, which is the year-round section as distinguished from the coast resort sections, Mr. Spiro states that northerners have purchased several hundred homesites at Plantation Estates the past year, that about 60 homes have been completed or are under construction within the past 90 days, and that about 100 more site purchasers are planning to build vacation or retirement homes while spending the winter in Florida.

At the present rate of selling, Mr. Spiro estimates his 1949 business at 900 homesites and at least 150 homes in addition to those now built and building. "The approximately \$3,000,000 total of this completed and estimated business," says Mr. Spiro, "is infinitesimal as compared with the \$265,000,000 business that northern real estate brokers will do as the result of 20,000 families moving to Florida each year."

About half of our domestic purchasers are buying for retirement very shortly, the rest for vacation purposes first and retirement later," he revealed. The great majority are home owners up north. Almost invariably a home owner in retirement has been a home owner previously. Our average retirement home builder is in the 4 or 5 room, \$5,000 to \$5,000 house brackets at Plantation Estates where construction costs are very low, but he usually moves out of a larger home of six to eight rooms that would easily bring from \$12,000 to \$20,000 at today's prices up here.

FRIDAY FARE

If you are planning to serve for a Friday meal choose its partners on your menu carefully so that they will really help to give a flavor to this pleasantly bland food. You might start with a tangy tomato bouillon and crisp crackers. Then with fish fillets or fish steaks serve baked sweet potatoes, green peas and the following nutritious and good-tasting salad. Dessert might be a delicate lemon pudding.

CAULIFLOWER, SPINACH AND CARRIOT SALAD

Ingredients: 1 cup coarsely shredded spinach; 1 cup bite-size pieces raw cauliflower, 1 1/2 cup coarsely grated carrot, 2 table-

spoons mayonnaise or creamed salad dressing, 2 tablespoons sour cream, salt and freshly ground pepper (to taste).

Method: Be sure that spinach is well washed (to remove sand and dirt) and dried carefully on a towel before shredding with a sharp knife. Cauliflower should be washed and dried, or wiped off, before dicing. Mix spinach, cauliflower and carrot; add the salad dressing and sour cream, salt and pepper and fold in lightly. Makes 4 servings.

SWEET POTATO AND DATE PUFF

Ingredients: 3 cups mashed sweet potatoes, 2 eggs (separated), 2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup orange juice (not strained), 1/2 cup cut dates.

Method: Add the beaten egg yolks to the potatoes along with the fat, brown sugar, and salt and mix well. Gradually add the orange juice, beating as you do so, until light and fluffy. Add the dates and mix. Add the stiffly beaten egg whites and fold in. Pipe lightly into a greased baking dish and bake in a moderately hot (375F.) oven about 30 minutes or until puffed and browned. Makes 6 servings.

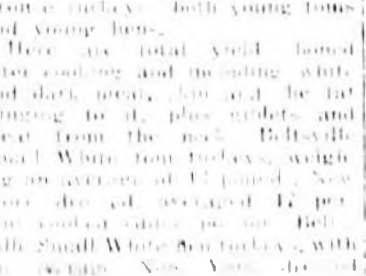

"He was drunk and angry and I was afraid to say anything then. I knew from experience my best course was to just keep quiet. But he kept talking. He said he should kill himself. "But before he killed himself, he said he would get me first. He put his right arm around my neck and started to choke. "See how easily I can kill," he said.

That would force a senate vote on each issue. Senator Ball (R-Minn), meanwhile, called a meeting tomorrow of the Senate House watchdog committee to consider its report

to Congress on the labor law's operations. Ball was defeated for re-election and the recommendations of the GOP-controlled group are expected to attract little attention from the new Congress.

Armaments have been immobilized and the vast array of coastal defenses smashed. The predominate military viewpoint here is that Japan would be too vulnerable and too dependent on a military base in case of hostilities involving an Asiatic force. The Japanese islands are within fighter distance of Siberia, for instance. The islands could be blockaded easily.

Negro Convicted

(Continued from Page One Sec. 2) between white persons and those with at least one-eighth negro or Mongolian blood.

Knight, whose marriage was performed in April, 1946, by the mayor of this south Mississippi town of 3,000, filed notice of appeal.

The maximum penalty under the law is ten years. Miscegenation has been a crime in Mississippi since reconstruction days. Under the present law, a conviction involving miscegenation automatically voids the marriage and any children resulting from the union are illegitimate. The Knights had no children.

Knight was arrested when "people started talking" and told his employer in Laurel that he was a negro. Defense Attorney Quitman Ross explained.

The main issue in the trial was the ancestry of Knight's great-grandmother, who was known as Rachel and who lived on the plantation of Captain Newt Knight, a picturesque character in Mississippi history.

Rachel, the state contended, was a negro, and witnesses were introduced who testified that she and her children were known as negroes. Among these witnesses was Tom Knight, 88-year-old son of Captain Newt, who said that the young Navy veteran's grandfather was a son of Rachel.

Defense witnesses testified that they believed Rachel was a Cherokee Indian. The state's law places no ban on marriages of white persons with members of any colored race except negro and mongoloid.

Swartzfager said no charges were planned against the white woman who married Knight under the impression that he was of all white blood.

Knight was drafted as a white man at Camp Shelby in 1943 and his discharge papers, Swartzfager said, listed him as white.

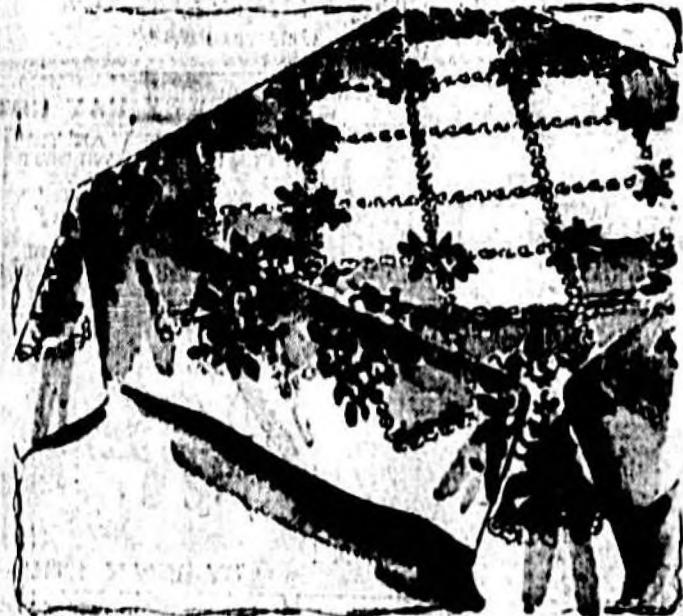

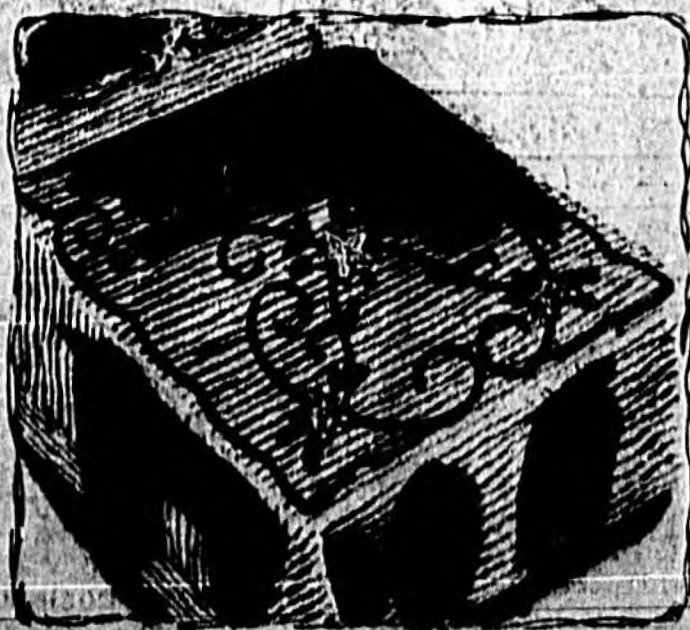

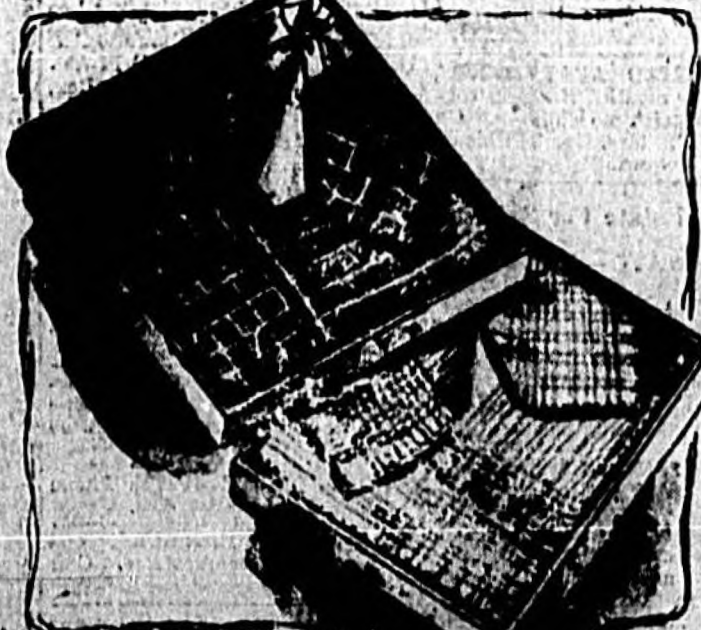
