Police Chief Uses Hypnotism In Case

Casselberry police have used hypnotism to help a stabbing victim to recollect a Dec. 7 attack near a bar and the identity of his alleged assailant.
Officers were beginning to think they would never really know what happened to Oscar Wade. But then detective John Hendy remembered Julian Arroyo, the Tavares police chief who learned hypnotism back in 1926.

For three weeks investigators had worked with Wade trying to get him to describe his assailant, but he had no recollection of the 1 a.m. incident that sent him to a hospital suffering stab wounds.
Casselberry Police Chief George Karcher said Arroyo was contacted and Wade was taken to Tavares.

Wade had absolutely no memory of what happened to him or who did it," said Arroyo. "But under hypnosis, he remembered it all in detail. He even knew the man who did it. It was his boss."

Food, Wine Books Greet New Year

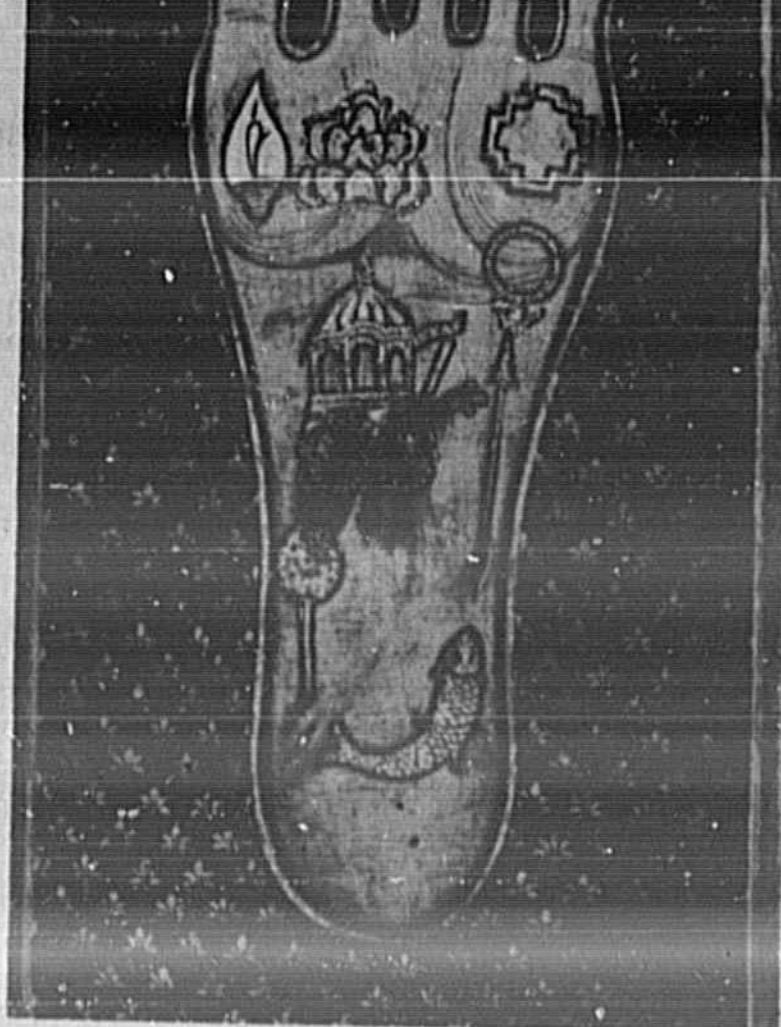
Food and wine books make handsome New Year presents. Or, if there was money for you under the Christmas tree, you may want to give yourself one of these.

"Cooking of the Maharajas: The Royal Recipes of India" by Shivaji Rao and Shalini Devi Holkar (Viking, \$14.95) has a stunning cover and illustrations, a plenitude of love and beautifully worked-out recipes. Mrs. Holkar, an American who married the son of a former Maharaja, is as gifted in making clear the intricacies of Indian cooking as Julia Child is in presenting French cuisine. Although "Cooking of the Maharajas" has, of course, an exotic aspect, its recipes can be followed with pleasure by any cook seriously interested in some of the fine cooking of India.

"The Joys of Wine" by Clifton Fadiman and Sam Aikron (Abrams, \$15) is one of the most sumptuous of books. Its color illustrations, cover and format are indeed a joy. The mix of excellence in literature and wine-making that the authors of the book represent makes a happy blend.

"American Food: The Gastronomic Story" by Evan Jones (Dutton, \$18.95) is a splendid contribution that's right on time for the Bicentennial. A large, handsome book, it's a delight — from its jacket reproduction of Susan Merrett's painting, "Fourth of July Picnic" (courtesy of the Art Institute of Chicago) through its delving into America's gastronomy and its generous clutch of recipes on which Judith B. Jones, a much-respected cookbook editor, collaborated. The recipes are a personal gathering from various periods in U.S. history, various regions, and various ethnic influences — and are delicious to choose from for everyday and company use.

The publication of "Flarens Lin's Chinese Regional Cookbook" by Florence Lin (Hawthorne, \$12.95) is an event. During her 15 years of teaching Chinese cooking at New York's China Institute, the author has gained a loyal following. Some of her pupils are themselves

High Bulk Diet Recommended

As anyone who's ever been on a diet knows, it's one thing to lose weight and another to keep it off. In fact, more than 90 percent of dieters gain back every pound they worked so hard to lose.

But a maintenance diet high in bulk and low in processed foods can take weight off safely and easily and keep it off for good, contends David Reuben, well-known author-doctor.

A high-roughage diet says Reuben, takes longer to eat — compare a cabbage salad to a gelatin salad — and the very process of slow chewing makes you feel fuller faster. Another benefit from chewy foods is that the chewing process generates saliva and gastric juices that swell food fibers in the stomach. This also helps produce a feeling of fullness.

There's no room for alcohol in this diet, nor for sodas, refined sugars and ultra-processed flour. There is room for whole-grain flours, raw fruits, nuts and vegetables. Dr. Reuben says that your desire for alcohol and fatty meats will decrease after you've been on this diet for a short time.

Obesity, life insurance companies point out, shortens your life span. A person over 45 who carries as little as 10 extra pounds cuts his life expectancy by 8 per cent.

By adding food fiber to your diet, you may be able to decrease your chances of falling prey to colo-rectal cancers, heart disease and appendicitis. On top of this, Dr. Reuben writes, "A high-roughage diet seems to induce tranquility. After a week or so, that compulsion to rush and worry seems to diminish. Most people find it easier to fall asleep at night."

Beware 'Earn Easy Money At Home' Pitch

If you are wondering how you can make extra money in your spare time, you may be attracted to those ads in some newspapers or in major magazines that beckon you to "earn money at home."

But if the ad sounds too good to be true, that may be because they are not true. According to the Postal Service (PS), offers that promise money at home can be one of the devices used to defraud the public.

How do you get "taken" by advertising in magazines and newspapers, companies can entice you to send them money to be "registered" for such kinds of work as addressing envelopes, sewing small items like baby booties or selling merchandise by phone or letter.

If you are interested in specific programs that you saw advertised, see if the company will send you any free literature. If you have to put down money before you even learn about the program, it might be wise to stay away from that company.

Be suspicious of claims that you will need documented proof of how much money you sent the company and what took place after that.

If you lose your money or are not paid for your time, contact the postal inspector at your local post office for help. PS will probably not be able to get you a refund, but it will investigate the matter and prosecute the company if postal inspectors can prove mail fraud.

To avoid these problems, Postal Service advises that before you sign any forms or send any money, you should take some precautionary steps:

Social Security Taxes To Increase For Some Next Year

WASHINGTON (AP) — If you earn more than \$14,100 a year, the Social Security tax will be higher for you next year. The reason is Social Security taxes.

The reason for the fluctuation of Social Security deductions is that the tax is levied as a flat 5.85 per cent of gross wages per pay period. But there is a ceiling on the amount of Social Security taxes anyone pays in a single year.

For 1975, the maximum tax was \$624.85. Since the figure represents 5.85 per cent of \$14,100, employers stopped deducting Social Security taxes from paychecks when workers' salaries hit that level.

A worker earning \$300 a week, for example, will find his or her take-home pay reduced by \$17.55 from the weekly paycheck. And that same worker will have reduced take-home pay for a longer period of time this year.

Workers earning less than \$14,100 — or about \$270 a week — won't notice any difference. And the economy will be helped by some of the spending power which has helped pull the nation out of recession.

Last year, for example, the suspension of Social Security withholding in January meant about \$2 billion more flowing out of corporations and individuals' pockets into government coffers.

Meanwhile, Herring's office today was seeking a court order to have Binnard's grand jury testimony transcribed also.

Best Diet For The Elderly

DEAR DR. LAMB — We are residents of a so-called life care center. The head of our medical staff tells residents that after age 70 they should throw away their diet sheets and eat anything they please. Dr. Paul Dudley White stated people should not wait for the doctor to prescribe a low cholesterol diet but start it at age 20.

My wife comes from a family that inherited arterial weakness. At age 61 an aneurysm was removed from my wife's aorta and a low cholesterol diet was prescribed for her. My wife is now confined to the nursing pavilion and has been placed on a regular diet by order of the head of our medical staff.

Is the doctor guilty of attempted genocide as a matter of business expediency? The faster apartments are vacated, the greater is the income for this retirement center.

DEAR READER — I understand your concern, and I do prefer for people to follow the recommendations of the Inter-Society Commission for Heart Disease which does recommend restrictions on both fat and cholesterol (they are not the same thing).

In older people the problem often is getting them to eat at all. I would presume that your staff doctor is more interested in taking care of the immediate problem of being sure that everyone gets a well balanced diet or will eat enough than he is with the problem of overeating and the special considerations that might be helpful for some.

Many investigators wonder how much good you can accomplish with diet after age 70 in the prevention of artery disease. There is also a general tendency to gloss over medical problems in the

elderly with the common assumption that when you are that old you should expect to have some problems, or it is natural to be in poor health.

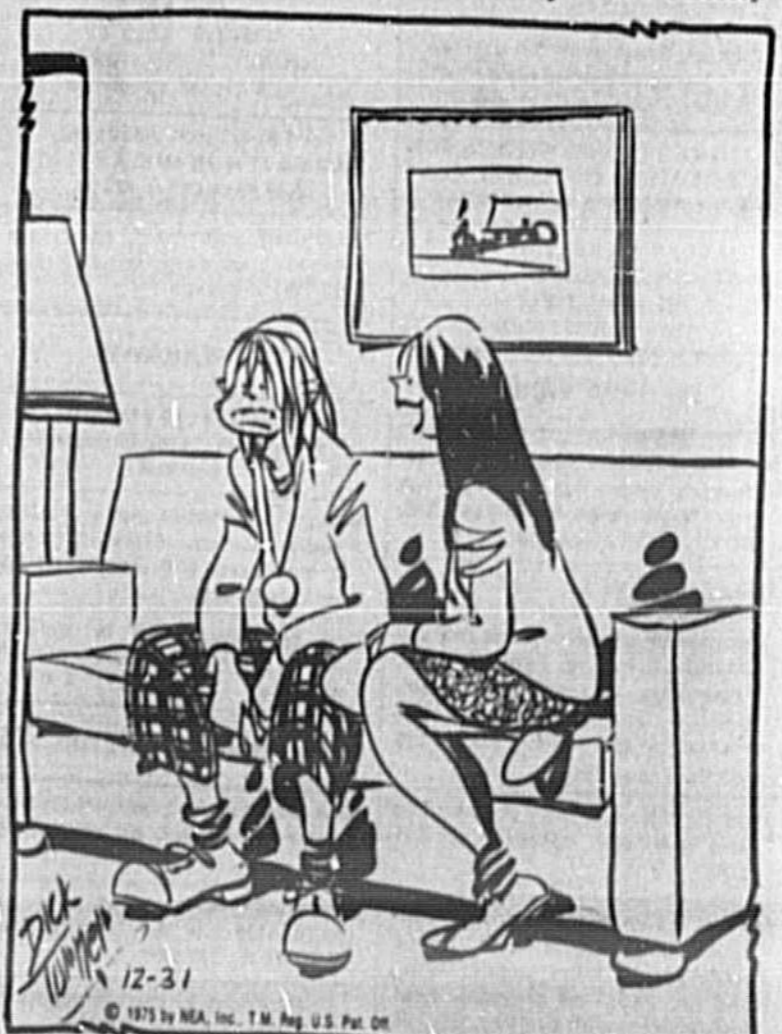
Many of the changes commonly called old age are really illnesses and deserve treatment just as much as illnesses in children do. It discusses the factors related to aging and some of the things that can be done to prevent these problems.

It is entirely possible that a healthy person with good living habits can usually expect to live past 100, rather than the current life span of about 68 for men and 74 for women. We have a lot to learn about stretching the middle years of one's life and enjoying a vigorous life for many more years. Many of the factors that influence aging, though, are the things we do in terms of living patterns.

You should discuss your wife's problem with the staff doctor. If she is not overweight and if her blood tests show she has a normal cholesterol level she won't need a diet for those problems.

In any case I'm sure your doctor is not practicing genocide. He is probably very busy and is trying to do the best for her present condition.
