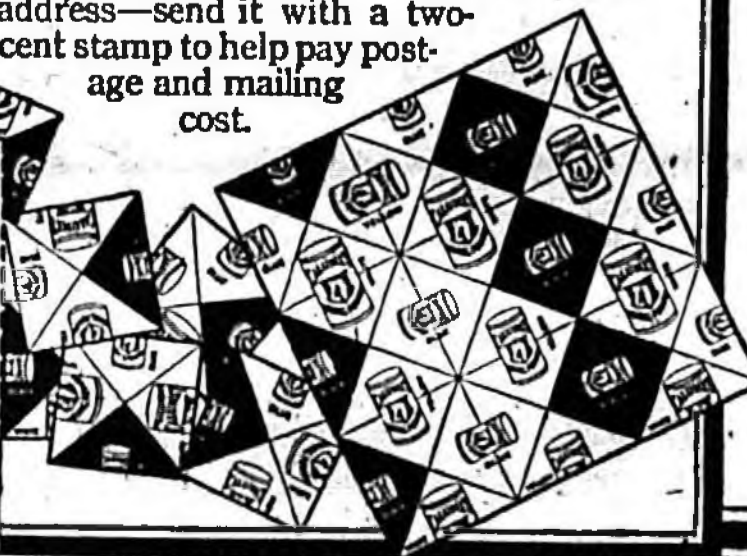

ARMISTICE DAY

What a thrill it has always carried from the time of its inception, born in blood and sacrifice to be finished in joy and praise and thanksgiving, and from that great day four years ago, when the bells and whistles first proclaimed the glad tidings of the end of the World War until today, the people of America are thrilled at the very mention of Armistice Day, and the boys who were in the conflict will never forget it, and we hope they will never let the rest of the nation forget it. It is not a memorial day in the full meaning of the word, because we have our national memorial days in April and June. Armistice Day today is just what it was four years ago when the day was born—a day for rejoicing, a victory shout, a glad awakening from a troubled sleep, to see the bright sun of peace shining through the clouds of war. So today let us rejoice, let us bury all our troubles and our sorrows, and let us help the boys to celebrate what the world calls and will always call one of the greatest victories in history. It means so much to all of us, and even though it is behind us and nothing left to recall it except the sacrifices and the vacant chairs in the homes, we should always celebrate Armistice Day, the fairest and make it one of the greatest days in the year.

This does not mean that everybody goes away with the idea of going beyond the limit and becoming a nuisance. It does not mean that we have to spend the day in partying, Armistice Day for the noise makers. It means that we have a day of celebration of the greatest day in our history, a day when we should be proud to have our boys back to us, and in the joy of this thought to those mothers and fathers who had sons over there the day will be a benediction without any celebration.

The driver is always right and the cop is always wrong. There is nothing for the officer to do but pull every man, woman and child who is exceeding the speed limit and let them know that they are in the bad. We are sure that the drivers here are not so careless but there are a lot of them that drive up and down the streets at 30 miles an hour every night and many times during the day. We know there are other fellows who are driving at 15 and 20 miles an hour at the risk of human life. There have been a lot of accidents lately and we are sure that the boys who are driving at 30 miles an hour are the cause of them.

Enforce these laws regardless of who it hits!

Subscriptions are secured unfairly on the reputation of two national publications. They employ house to house solicitors who display credentials which are apparently bona-fide, but have been proven fraudulent. These solicitors advance the plea that they need funds for college education. If you are solicited immediately phone the writer at 51 so that we can take necessary action to see that they are apprehended.

In fact it is always advisable to refer all outside advertising or charitable schemes of outsiders to this organization for investigation. We have a committee for that purpose and it was organized to protect you along these lines. It is your fault if you do not make us of it.
