WASHINGTON (AP) — Six administration officials say a curtailment of Sunday driving is being considered as one way to conserve fuel. White House energy adviser John A. Love said Monday the administration may soon require the closing of gasoline stations on Sundays. His deputy, Charles DiBona, told a congressional joint economic committee that a ban on Sunday driving and closing of public parks to automobiles are steps under consideration. "Knocking out Sunday driving is a real possibility," said DiBona, the President's special assistant for fuel matters. Asked about a ban on non-essential Sunday driving, Love said, "I don't think it is to be

# Solon Asks Session On Energy Powers

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Republican leader has called for a special session of the legislature next week to give Gov. Reubin Askew broad powers to cope with the mounting energy crisis. House minority leader Jim Tillman, R-Sarasota, said Monday the nationwide fuel shortage "is far more grave than has been reflected in the news." He said the legislature should go into special session next week to pass legislation that would encourage Floridians to conserve precious fuel. Tillman said the speed of many drivers who passed him when he was motoring at a self-imposed limit of 50 miles per hour on a superhighway convinced him the public is not yet serious about conserving energy. "We must impress the people of Florida with the seriousness of the situation, as it is evident too few of our citizens are working to conserve energy," he said. "This applies not only to fuel for transportation and heating, but to all phases of energy."

# County Study May Hit Longwood Fill

A study which could lead to court action against the City of Longwood was ordered today by Seminole County commissioners. The study would determine if the city's proposed Longwood development projects would flood county roads and private properties in the unincorporated areas. "We face a very real possibility of flooding on our roads and we need to know where Island Lake will 'pop-off,'" Kimbrough said. In ordering the engineering department to find a private firm and solicit a cost estimate on this study, commissioners cited fears that Longwood's development policies could be endangering areas as far west as Crane's Roost in Altamonte Springs. The Longwood City Council Monday night despite a county plea for delay, voted 4-0, approving business district rezoning for the Georges St. Laurent property abutting Range Line Road to permit construction of an office park.

# Kimbrough Voices Doubts Concerning Blistering Letter

Seminole County Commissioner John Kimbrough today said it would be "difficult to evaluate" whether or not he would have written his Nov. 6 letter to State Atty. Abbott Herring demanding details of the building department and electrical board probe if he had known Herring gave such details to Commission Chairman Sid Vihlen Jr. on Sept. 25. Kimbrough said Vihlen did not tell him of the meeting, but that he (Kimbrough) "was aware he had talked to someone down there." "I did not know specific locations until this thing came from Herring, which was what I was after," Kimbrough said. By "this thing," the commission vice chairman referred to Herring's blistering letter, hand delivered to Vihlen Friday, reminding Vihlen of the Sept. 25 briefing and criticizing Vihlen and Kimbrough for statements they made in the past two weeks in demanding details from Herring on the grand jury. Kimbrough, specifically criticized by Herring for statements in releasing his Nov. 6 letter, said that despite Vihlen's failure to inform the board of the details of Herring's blistering letter, he still feels the commission "needed a specific written list of the hazards."

MIAMI (AP) — State Comptroller Fred O. Dickinson has confirmed that Internal Revenue Service agents are checking the banking division of his Tallahassee office and auditing his personal tax returns. Dickinson would not discuss the extent or purpose of the investigation or audit. Miami television station WPLG reported Monday that Dickinson was the subject of both a criminal investigation and a civil audit. WPLG said IRS agents are concentrating the banking division investigation on applications for new bank charters and records involving approval or rejection of such charters by the division. The television newscast said the team of IRS agents started the probe two weeks ago.

# Sports Fan Born Every Minute

NEW YORK (NEA)—The Bobby Riggs-Billie Jean King thing was not the only hustle, harmless or otherwise, played on the sporting public.

However, the glitter and vainglory of that unabashed aberration made it the most obvious of hustles.

In a more subtle fashion are such recent interest types as the splitting into amoebic division of the professional football and basketball and baseball and hockey leagues. In late September it was possible for a team to play under 500 ball and still win in baseball's National League East and perhaps go on to take the N.L. pennant and the World Series, too.

It would have set a record for mediocrity, a substantial

achievement since mediocrity is king today.

We accept readily cars that are manufactured to break down, television fare that is pabulum for the masses, plastic roses, watered-down egg creams, frozen broccoli in good restaurants, fake grass for lawns and football fields. So is it strange that we should also accept — and encourage — bogus events, too?

The leveling down of talent continues. The fabricated stimulation of races increases. Breathless and unabated goes the sports merry-go-round. And we wildly chase after those elusive, illusionary stallions. Excellence is often replaced by either the middling or the bizarre.

More people watched that Riggs-King phenomenon than had ever seen a tennis match in the whole history of the so-called civilized world.

A fan pays a scalper \$100 for a \$5 seat near the end of the season to see the Mets play the Expos in Shea Stadium, with the fragile East Division title in the balance.

And like it or not it has its own fascination, even though we can easily peruse the standings and determine that without a split of the league the Mets would have been maybe 10 games behind the Reds in a legitimate National League race.

The promoters and hustlers can do virtually no wrong in the eyes and pocketbook of the fan. There are, for example, 24 teams in the major leagues when once there were 16. That means there are 90 more players, enough for an entire minor league. The players have been infused into the big leagues without much of a plaintive twitter from fans, and the commercial racket of sport grows more bloated.

Manufacturing a situation to make it more titillating is old and common stuff. Why else, for example, are their seedings in tennis tournaments? Handicaps in golf are

similar: they are designed not to determine the best golfer but to fictitiously even out the competition.

Sports, though, has universally appealed to dreams and illusions and the setting up and attempted conquering of unreal situations.

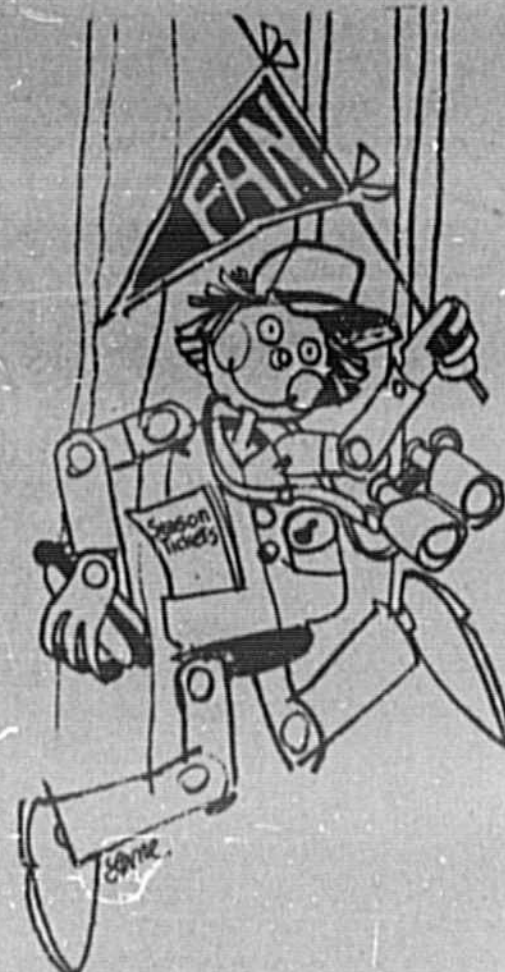
The unreality extends to the so-called selecting of all-star teams, all-pro teams, all-American teams, the college football and basketball ratings. It's all a hustle to whet the interest and twenty appetite of fans, and enrich the promoters and participants. And it succeeds with the sickness of the patent medicine filmflam man, or today's Madison Avenue man.

We are not getting something that we think we're getting. But the wrapping is so much fun to fool with that the contents pale in comparison. If, in fact, we even ever bother to investigate inside.

What harm can there be in this seeming nonsense? Perhaps not much. Possibly, it is helpful. There is a nice assembly-line escape valve in wondering who will win the whooped-up, upcoming match. But there is also the deadening effects of accepting glitter for gold, of making a crass man who can hit a ball a hero. Possibly this extends to other areas of our life. And we begin to make false decisions from false choices.

The idea of a contest, any contest, is of unsurprising joy to many. Mark Twain said that it is the difference of opinion that makes horse races.

However, such stuff was boring hustle to a Shah of Persia. Once when in England he was supposed to have spurred an invitation to attend the races. He said he knew very well that one horse runs faster than another.

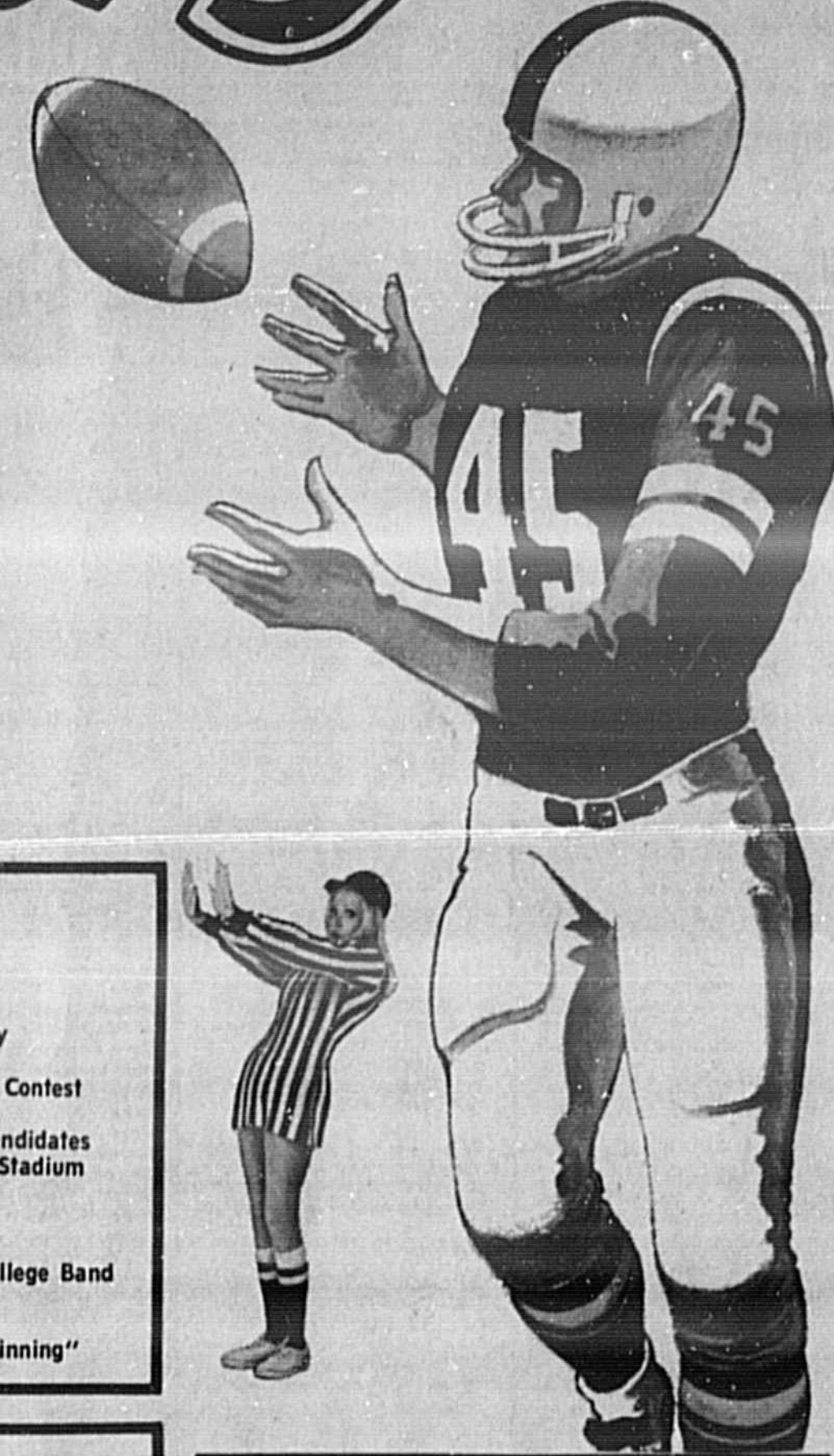

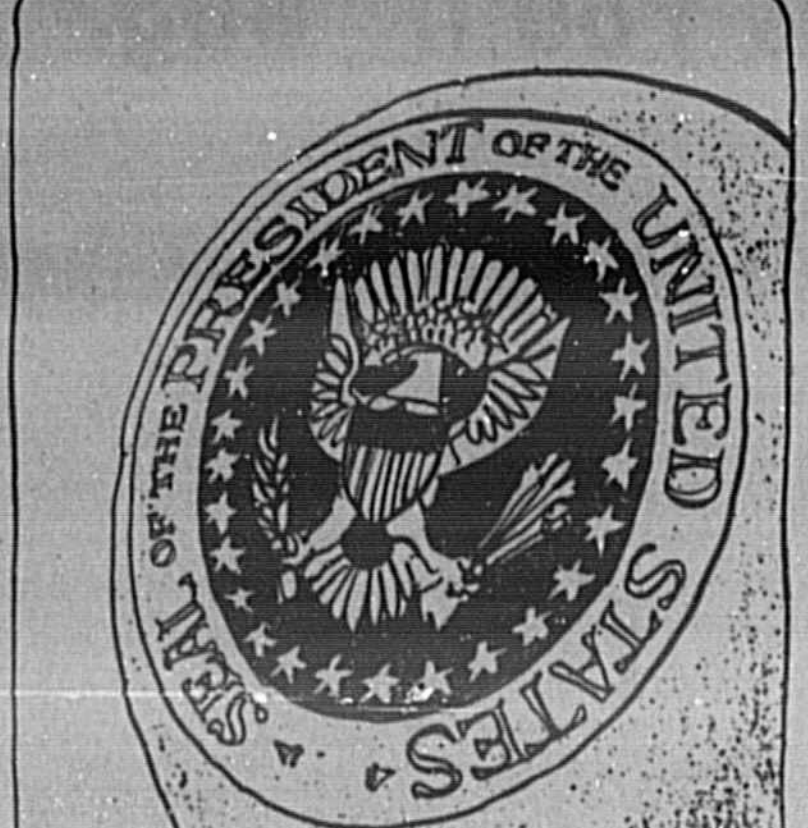

# Some Fear Military Takeover in U.S. It can't Happen Here --- Can't?

"It is a symptom of what is happening to our country that it could even be suggested that the U.S. would alert its forces for domestic reasons." —Henry Kissinger, October 28

**WASHINGTON**—(NEA)—It is probably another symptom of what is happening to the country that some people are suggesting the energy crisis could turn out to be more than an energy crisis.

"Suppose," suggests a congressional aide, "the oil shortage becomes so acute that disorder breaks out. Suppose riots start and people begin looting the storage areas. Suppose names are called and old people get sick and ghetto folks burn down blocks to keep warm. If it really came to that, it is a military situation. Military rule: Could it happen here? Accelerating, sometimes shocking, recent

forces have made the question more than academic.

Americans, used to watching the banana republics of the world succumb time and again to martial law, used to almost laughing at its regularly in-fifty-rate nations, now would do well to consider the possibility that the United States — and could again.

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# Consumer Prices Rose In September, Fuel Crisis Blamed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Consumer prices rose sharply last month following September's slowdown, owing partly to the energy crisis and higher prices for fuel oil and gasoline, the government said today.

The Department of Labor reported that the cost of living climbed eight-tenths of one per cent in October and pushed consumer prices up 7.9 per cent above a year ago. It marked the largest jump in any 12-month period since the 8.7 per cent inflation rate recorded in the June 1950-51 period at the start of the Korean War.

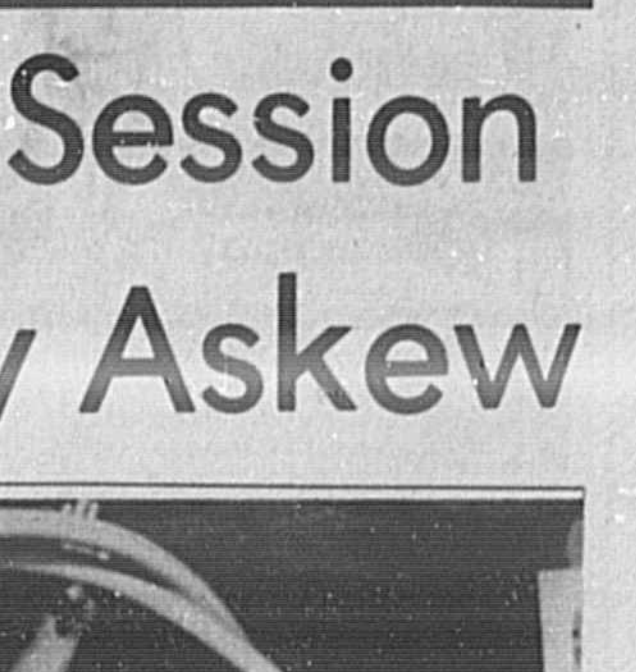

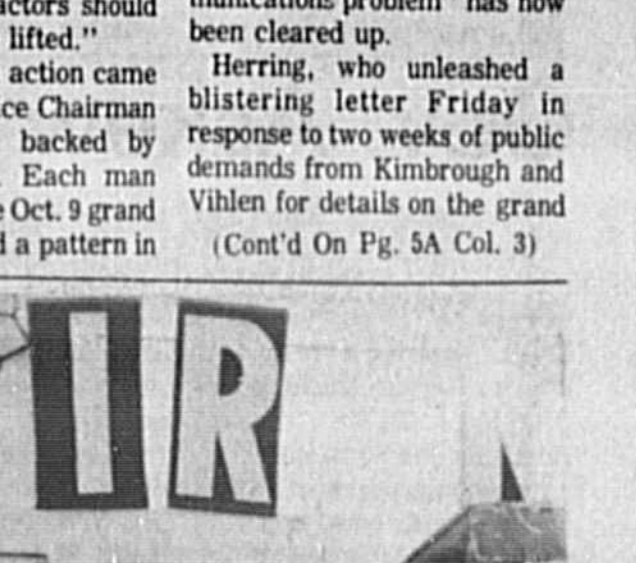
