CHIEF ENGINEERS **GIVES REPORT ON** ST. LUCIE CANAL

Over 20 Million Cubic Yards of Earth Excavated From Principal Control Waterway From Lake Okeechobee

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., June 5. thousand cubic yards of earth and rock have been excavated from the St. Lucie canal, the principal control waterway for regulating Lake Okecchobee, says a statement by F. C. Elliot, chief engineer of the Everglades Drainage District, in which he says this canal is nearing completion. The principal part of the work remaining to be done is the excavation of about one million cubic yards of earth and rock from the canal proper and about five hundred thousand eubic yards of earth and rock from the river section.

In an effort to finish the work as quickly as possible the drainage board has leased the rock digging dipper dredge Governor Herrick, which has a capacity sufficient to fill the ordinary gondola car by emptying its dipper twice. This dredge is to be slightly altered to fit it especially for the work in the St. Lucie canal. After fin-ishing there it will be transferred to other parts of the district where it will continue operations for a period of two years, on a 24-a-day


