ITALIAN PEOPLE UNITE IN PAYING HOMAGE TO KING

ROME, June 8.—Victor Emmanuel III, at the expiration of the first quarter century of his reign, received Sunday a popular demonstration which left no doubt that whatever party differences may divide his subjects, they still are united in their satisfaction with the present monarchic form of government and with having that monarch personified in the house of Savoia.

The participants in the manifestation were drawn from every part of the empire. Eight thousand natives came from as many cities, towns and hamlets as spokesmen for the millions of subjects who were unable to attend. There were a dozen or more representatives from the various Italian African colonies to bespeak the colonial sentiment of loyalty to "the great white chief."

The program extended almost from sunrise to sunset, the first demonstration beginning at 7 o'clock when troops from various units of the standing army assembled in the national stadium for a royal review.

The king and queen, the queen mother, the crown prince and the Princesses Maria and Giovanna, appeared in the reviewing stand and it required two full hours for all the units to file past. Others in the reviewing stand included Premier Mussolini, various members of his cabinet and members of the diplomatic corps.

In the afternoon a great parade took place, more than 100,000 persons being in the line.

This march was headed by a platoon of royal guards, mounted on snow white chargers, whose riders wore long silver trumpets heralding the arrival of mile upon mile of loyal subjects.

Death Toll Is 481

LAGO, June 8.—Relief came West today from the heat wave, which has taken a toll of 481 lives in the past 24 hours. By Tuesday the heat wave was predicted, cooler weather had progressed to Tennessee and the Ohio valley and lower Michigan.

The result of cloudiness, rains and sections of winds in other sections, did not climb to heights today that it had previously reached. However, relief held out little hope of any desirable immediate relief, the heat for today for the section and showing general continued weather with thunderstorms in some parts.

MINNESOTA TRIP IS ABANDONED BY GIANT DIRIGIBLE

Los Angeles Forced to Turn Around At Cleveland and Return to Lakewood When Weather Threatens Flight

CLEVELAND, June 8.—After passing over Cleveland at 2:30 p. m., Sunday, headed west, the dirigible Los Angeles went to a wide circle at Lakewood, a suburb and turned east, abandoning the flight to Minnesota for the Norse-American centennial celebration.

Los Angeles was forced to turn around at Cleveland and return to Lakewood when weather threatened flight.

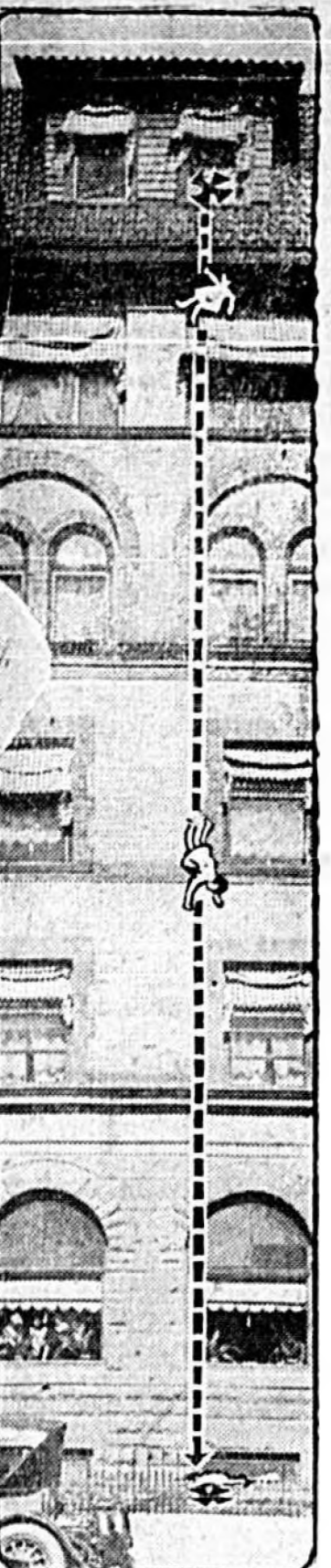
