American dream is elusive

WASHINGTON - For 27 million households, owning or renting a home doesn't mean they are any closer to fulfilling the American dream because they cannot afford to buy other necessities, a study released Wednesday said. The study's author, Michael Stone, a professor

of community planning at the University of Massachusetts in Boston, noted that 50 years ago. President Franklin D. Roosevelt said one-third of the nation lacked adequate housing.

'If President Bush were to be so candid, he would have to acknowledge that we are now one-third of a nation 'shelter poor," Stone said in his report issued by the Economic Policy Institute, a liberal think tank in Washington.

Space odyssey bull's-eye

Magellan to hit Venus today

By WILLIAM MARWOOD UPI Science Writer

CAPE CANAVERAL -Streaking through space at 24,600 mph, NASA's Magellan radar mapping probe, launched 15 months ago from planet Earth. sailed over the north pole of Venus

this morning and plunged out of sight behind the cloudy planet.

At exactly 12:45 p.m. EDT, while the spacecraft was out of contact with controllers at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, Calif., an onboard computer was to execute a command that would fire a 4,721-pound solid-fuel braking rocket bolted to the base of the solar-powered probe.

Blazing with white-hot fury. the compact rocket motor was to push against Magellan with 17,750 pounds of thrust. slowing the space probe by

PASADENA, Calif. - NASA's Magellan radar mapping probe of Venus is the sixth American spacecraft built to explore the cloudy planet, the target of 24 Soviet space probes.



Bush reports war not imminent; gas prices still rising

By ROBERT MACKAY **United Press International**

WASHINGTON - President Bush officially notified Congress today that he does not believe involvement of U.S. forces in Persian Gulf hostilities is imminent as Iraq continued to build up its forces along the Kuwait border.

In a letter to House Speaker Thomas Foley of Washington and Senate President Robert Byrd of West Virginia, Bush also said that the U.S. forces "are fully prepared to defend themselves" and will remain in the region as long as they are required to maintain the security of Saudi Arabia.

Bush sent the report consistent with the War Powers Act, which the administration contends is unconstitutional.

There were these other developments:

•A group of 35 Americans, mostly military wives and children evacuated from a Saudi Arabian air base, returned to the United States early Friday as more U.S. troops reached the troubled Middle East.

A C-5 transport with women, children and four U.S. diplomats arrived at Dover Air Force Base from King Abdul Air Base in Daharan, Saudi

Arabia, about 4:30 a.m., officials said.

• Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak convened an emergency Arab League summit Friday in a last-ditch diplomatic effort to defuse the Persian Gulf crisis and said there can be no solution unless Iraq pulls out of Kuwait.

Shortly before the summit began, Iraqi Foreign Min.ster Tariq Aziz called for an immediate withorawal of U.S. forces from the region to allow

"the Arabs to discuss their problems freely."

• The average price of gasoline soid at self-service pumps in Florida has risen 8.6 cents to \$1.241 a gallon since Iraq invaded Kuwait and sent the price of oil soaring on the spot market, the AAA Clubs of Florida said Thursday.

The automobile association also said its daily spot check of prices in Miami. Orlando and Tampa indicated that self-service prices jumped an additional 1.3 cents a gallon Thursday.

The most recent price hike pushed the average retail price of self-service regular gasoline in those markets to \$1.141 a gallon, AAA Clubs said.

Plastic surgeon uses fat leeches to save woman's mangled fingers

FORT LAUDERDALE - A plastic surgeon turned to an ancient technique - 35 fat. black leeches — to successfully restore blood circulation in a Fort Lauderdale woman's mangled fingers, a newspaper reported Thursday.

The surgeon, Dr. Frank Lomagistro, has been using leeches for about a year with good results, according to a report in the Fort Lauderdale

index finger "looked like a pencil that had been run over by a car" when she was taken to Broward General Medical Center in late July, the doctor said. Giordanno, 27, injured her

fingers when her boyfriend ac-cidentally slammed a door on her hand. "I didn't think that I would

ever be able to use them again," Giordano said. At the hospital, she was in-troduced to Lomagistro, nicknamed "The Magician" by

the hospital staff.
"Before I went into surgery, he

asked me how I felt about bugs. He told me that leeches might save the life in my fingers," Giordano said.

She underwent three-hour surgery to reattach the finger and thumb, but 24 hours later complications set in.

"The thumb was turning blue. which meant that there was a venous congestion, when the blood can't freely flow from the finger to the heart to replenish itself," Lomagistro said.

He brought in his fat, black leeches, an acquatic parasite known to science as Hirudo medicinalis. The insects sucked the blood through Giordano's hand to the end of her thumb.



Pelham. The buildings, built in 1953 and used previously for physical education classes, including an old gymnasium and changing facilities, were condemned last

year. The cleared site on the north side of the school, along Lake Avenue, will be where new administrative offices will be

built. On the site of the present track and field area, five new academic houses will be constructed.

"Our present buildings won't come down until next summer." Pelham said.

He added that the construction might cause some visual distractions for the students, but. said education will continue on the same as always. The same

Ges lesk seens into groundwater on Eighth Street

SANFORD - Seepage under gasoline tanks excavated from near the Sanford police station house on Eighth Street last Friday has entered the groundwater, but is no threat to city water supplies, City Manager Frank Faison said today.

The two 3,000- and 2,000-gallon tanks were uncarthed for routine replacement with a 10,000 gallon tank, and tank contractor Florida Petroleum Services of Apopka, noticed fumes at the site, Faison

said. Jammal & Associates, enviromental consultants called in from Winter Park, have found gasoline residue in the soil and ground water. The city will now pay \$1,800 a day for the contractor to begin pumping out the contaminated groundwater next week to aerate it for removal of gasoline residue. The cleaned water will be returned to the city drainage system. Faison said. The operation could take from three to five days, making the cleanup cost more than \$10,000 with related expenses added, he said.

Faison said he doesn't know if soil from the site will also have to be removed. That will depend on the amount of residue found in the soil. Testing continues, with the "outer circle around that area" being checked, he said.

The seepage is believed to have been left in the ground 15 years ago when the recently removed tanks replaced others that are believed to have leaked. Faison said.

The routine tank removal was contracted for at a cost of "hundreds of thousands of

Change deposit insurance rules

A \$100 billion bill for next year's payment by taxpayers toward the savings and loan belieut underscores the need to see that such adebacie never happens again.

L. William Seidman, chairman of the

rederal Deposit Insurance Corp., told Con-ties that the government needs \$100 billion ar next fiscal year for the ballout, which will rentually cost taxpayers half a trillion. reasury Secretary Nicholas Brady suggested hanges in federal deposit insurance rules at are at the crux of the S&L scandal. Brady aid the Treasury Department may limit the mount of federal deposit insurance to 00,000 per account.

The Treasury Department also may charge for deposit insurance to banks and alla that have risky investments.

And Brady suggested requiring bank and S&L owners to invest more of their own oney in their institutions through higher

dapital requirements.
Such measures are needed to reduce expayers' liability for bailing depositors out failed thrifts and banks. Limiting federal deposit insurance would limit S&Ls ability to a tract large depositors by promising high interest rates. That would reduce deposits, nce depositors likely won't put more money an account than can be insured. That, in tirm, would cut down the hyper-growth that characterized many failed thrifts of the 1960s, when deposits ballooned and loans flewed freely. When risky loans turned bad, he S&La didn't have the capital base to cover

Unfortunately, the Treasury Department is moving too slowly on deposit insurance reform, promising an exhaustive completed next spring. Congress should move ahead amartly on such reforms, instead of proposing an unnecessary commission to

study the problem. Federal deposit insurance began during the Depression to protect people from losing their silvings when banks failed, and to protect blinks against disastrous runs by depositors. The Banking Act of 1933 originally set coverage at \$5,000 per account. That amount was increased over the years to adjust for iriflation, most recently from \$40,000 to \$100,000 early in the 1980s, but there never his been a limit on the number of accounts an individual could have at different banks or thrifts.

Deregulation of S&Ls early in the Reagan alministration allowed the thrifts to offer high interest rates and gave them a free hand ir investing. But federal deposit insurance was left intact, thus indemnifying depositors against S&L failures. A grain of gunpowder thus was laid that eventually razed the S&L iridustry in this country.

Deposit insurance originally was intended to protect the life savings of the little guy. But in the high-flying 1980s, it protected millionaires who deposited \$100,000 in each of many thrifts and benefited from federal protection for huge sums on which they collected the S&Ls' high interest rates.

Now you can be sued just in case

What do unhappiness, drugs, boose and a 12-gauge shotgun have to do with the suicide of a young man and the attempted suicide of his friend? If you answered "everything," you obviously do not practice law.

What ruined these kids, their families' lawyers insist, was a faulty product, namely rock music recorded by the group Judas Priest. If the two friends hadn't listened to Judas Priest on a fateful day in 1905, they'd probably be alive today (the second died in 1906, reportedly after another descent into drugs).

second died in 1900, reportedly after another descent into drugs).

This is hardly a novel argument, of course. Rock music, TV shows, even horror stories have all been accused at one time or another of provoking suicide or mayhem in the unstable or depressed. So far, fortunately, writers, artists and musicians have shielded themselves from these shift-the-blame lawsuits by invoking the First Amendment. But whether they can continue to dodge the legal builet remains to be seen.

That's because liability law has been taking some weird turns of late. As The Wall Street Journal reported recently, more and more people are suing for events that haven't even happened—events they only fear will occur later in their lives. Some lawsuits even complain about events that almost certainly will never occur. To be blunt, they're imaginary incidents.

before the U.S. Supreme Court, 25 passengers and their apouses sued Eastern Airlines after a pilot warned them that

their plane might creek - a reason iction, one might think, considering that all engines had failed at the time. Through Herculean effort, the crew managed to restart one engine and safely land the plane. Rather than applaud this effort, spiteful passengers sued for mental distress.

What the Supreme Court should do, but probably won't, is issue a clear-cut ruling to the effect that courts may compensate people for effect that courts may compensate people for emotional distress only when they've also been actually injured. Close calls and imaginary events

Some lawsuits even complain about imagi nery incidents. shouldn't be good enough, because if judges can award damages for anxiety alone, the sky's the limit for liability. There is simply no way to sprove someone's avowal of distress.
For that matter, there is no way to weed out ainly irrational fears from sensible worries.



Recall the lessons of Munich

WASHINGTON - The anesthetising tranquility of the post-Cold War world has suddently been driven away by Iraq's em-phatic reminder of the nature of the pre-Cold War world. This echo of the preceding 30 or so centuries suggests how much like the past the future may be.

It is tempting, but misleading, to compare the strutting Saddam Hussein to Mussolini, and thereby diminish Hussein, making him seem, as Mussolini now does through the obscuring mists of history, more about than menacing. Mussolini was the very junior partner in the Axis, and was last seen hanging from his heeis at a Milan gas station. Hussein, too, is unlikely to the old, venerated, in dignified retirement, or in his aloep. But he is unlike Mussolini in two significant particulars. Hussein radiates a more virulent and

Hussein radiates a more virulent and personal viciouaness than Mussolini did. [Muscolini's internal-security apparatus was evil but not as brutal as Hussein's and it is unimaginable that Mussolini would have used poison gas against Italians as Hussein has against Iraq's Kurds.) And Hussein disposes of far more military might, relative to neighbors. than Mussolini did.

However, Hussein is a very 1930s figure. He issues ultimata. He masses troops on interna-tional borders estensibly to give weight to the diplomacy of ultimata but actually to demonstrate, with contemptuous clarity, that ultimata are perfunctory preludes to the crossing of borders.

The U.S. response to this, particularly regarding reassurances to Saudi Arabia, will probably be influenced, and for the better, by the fact that today's President is the last of a well-schooled line. Unless Lloyd Bentsen, the former bomber pilot, runs and wins in 1992. George Bush, the former fighter pilot, will be America's last President from the World War II generation. For that generation, war was the enveloping, formative experience and the word "Munich" is freighted with warning when it

denotes analogies. The leason of Munich was: When it is necessary to confront an expansionist dictator, sooner is better than later. As Douglas MacArthur said, in war all tragedy can be summarized in two words — "too late." Too

late perceiving, too late preparing for danger.
Democracy is not, as Ronald Reagan and others seem to sesume, the certain solvent of danger. Democracy does not necessarily render a society pacific, just as a dictatorship (for example, Franco's Spain) does not necessarily manifest aggressive dynamism. But democracy does generally help domesticate nations. Therefore it is well to note the following:

Democracy has recently been sprouting here, there and, it almost seems, everywhere between the cracks in the crumbling concrete of despotisms. It has been sprouting not only in the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe, but in Latin America, too. However, the world still waits and watches, without grounds for near-term hope, for the first democracy in the

ao-called "Arab world." In the 42 years since largel was established on onesixth of one percent of the land in "the Arab world," the reaction in the region to the existence of laruel has been unanimously hostile, and this unanimity has obscured the fact that the phrase "the Arab world" is only a geographical, not a political expression. The most envenomed and bloody relationships, and most volatile confrontations. do not involve Israel.

Today it is especially apparent that Israel is the all-purpose but implausible alibi for the various pathologies that convulse many Arab nations, and relations between

History will record more clearly than did contemporary journalism the fact that in the 1980s Iraq and Iran fought one of the major wars of this century of big wars. The war raged most of the time outside the range of television cameras and therefore largely outside the consciousness of the West.

This week, however, the West should remember with gratitude recent history's single most effective and beneficial act of arms control, Israel's 1981 bombing of Iraq's embryonic nuclear-weapon program. And this week it is wise to acknowledge that the world became more dangerous because nothing much happened after Iraq used poison gas against fran. The regime of international restraint, sometimes called international law. was significantly weakened by the weakness the virtual invisibility - of the world's

Libyan terrorism rose after raid

WEST BERLIN - Former President Ronald Reagan got plenty of mileage out of his 1986 bombing raid against Libya's Moammar Gadhafi, his "mad dog of the Middle East." Reagan had blamed Gadhafi for the bomb-

ing of a West Berlin disco, La Belle, that killed two U.S. servicemen. And the United States retaliated with a strike against Gadhafi's headquarters in Tripoli. But the raid, de-

spite Reagan's bonsting, was a failure in both of its missions - to end Libyan-sponsored terrorism and to kill Gadhafi. West European and American intelligence sources confirmed that there has been mare Libyan. sponsored terrorism since the raid than before it.

The lesson for Presthat he already privately knows — that military action against terrorists only escalates the violence.



able to strut his victory over Gadhali.

Reagan was able to strut his victory over Gadhaft because Gadhaft covered up his tracks when he made terrorist strikes after the Tripoli raid. He simply hired foreigners to do his dirty work. The classified history of Libyan-sponsored terrorism reveals that until 1988, Gadhafi made few serious moves to harm Americans. But that changed after Reagan sent 18 warplanes to bomb Tripoli. Their mission was to bomb Gadhaft and his family. When they failed, he came out fighting.

Libya has attempted to kill hundreds of Americans since the raid, beginning on the day of the raid, April 15, 1986, when Libyan agents shot a U.S. Embassy communications officer in 'Khartoum, Sudan. Top secret reports indicate that it was Gadhafi who paid a Lebanese group as much as \$1 million to kill American hostage Peter Kilburn two days later. Three days after the raid, Turkish police caught two Libyans with hand grenades on their way to a U.S. officers club in Ankara, Turkey, where a wedding reception was going on.

Ten days after the raid, Libyan agents wounded a U.S. Embassy communications officer in North Yemen. Three months later. nine people were arrested in a Libyan-sponsored plot to blow up the U.S. Embassy in Lome, Togo. Four months after the Tripoli raid, Libyan-sponsored terrorists hijacked Pan Am Flight 73 in Karachi, Pakistan, killing 21 people, two of them Americans. In May 1967. Egyptians with ties to Libya tried to murder three U.S. Embassy workers in Egypt. Two days before the second anniversary of the raid, a Japanese Red Army terrorist was arrested with a bomb on the New Jersey Turnpike. He was on his way to blow up the United Nations. Other anniversary attacks in 1988 included a car bomb that killed an American outside a USO club in Naples and bombings of U.S. government facilities in Colombia, Spain, Costa Rica and Peru. A Libyan-backed group remembered the third anniversary last year by trying to bomb the U.S. Information Service center in Peru. Gadhafi announced last October that he was weary of the terrorism business and worried that he couldn't control his hired help anymore. In an interview with a Catro magazine, Gadhafi blamed Reagan for "muscle flexing," and said Libya was now more inclined to negotiate. "We are prepared for relations based on mutual respect and common interests," he said.

Mutual respect" is the correct term. Gadhafi has about as much respect for America as America does for him. Intelligence experts say he is really driven by changing world alliances. The warming of relations between the superpowers has left him feeling more left out than he wants to be.

One question from the floor asked how they felt about certain crusades

against such matters as drug pushers and money laundering.

One of the four, Robert E. Miller, said, "As judicial can-Miller, said, "As judicial candidates, we cannot speak about specific individuals or issues during a campaign." Candidate Ned Julian clarified the issue even further by saying, "The people would not want to know that a judge has pre-determined ideas on a subject or on a case before he hears it."

Newman Brock agreed, saying, "A Judge's race should not be issue orientated."

From the other side of the 18th judicial circuit, one candidate, Glenn Craig of Melbourne, who is opposed by Charles Holcomb of Cocos, appeared alone and gave a brief outline of his qualifications. The race for the Group 18 seat would be run in both Brevard and Seminole Counties, athough they would

normally operate from Brevard. in all, only about sixty people were in attendance at the Casselberry Senior Center for the forum, including the judicial candidates and their supporters.



"If I won this tournament, I would probably retire and go fishing," said Wadkins, often a challenger but never a winner on the PGA Tour. "There was nothing I did during practice or on the front nine today to indicate I would shoot a 31 on the back nine."

Wadkins duplicated his first-round effort at the 1987 PGA - where his opening-day 68 gave him the lead. But, as has been the case so often when he has had a good start, he eventually tied for seventh with a final-day 77.



space. We hoped it would work." Work it did when the audience giggled, oohed and aahed in surprise as they became in-


volved in this monumental production of competent players who executed every line and action to perfection.





British writer Clive Staples Lewis (1886-1983) was secholar who taught at Cambridge and Osird. He gave the ortho-dex belies of Christanity a modern intellec-tual respectability they hadn't enjoyed

hefore.

He was the Bill Graham to the erudite. An evangetical eggend.

But some of his current biographers are finding other way to describe him. Their words read like smething you might have seen in the 1940 in a gossip column by Walter Winchell - who, incidentally, is the subject of a new neel: "Walter Winchell."

All of us took more seriously the words of the old hymn, "Let each his brother's failings hide," and the adage we learned from our mothers, "If you can't say something nice about somebody, don't say anything."

Today's writers, with their eye on the marketplace, have changed that to "If you can't say something nice about somebody, say something bad."

It was often different a generation or two ago. Two of the most highly paid journalists of the Winchell era were newscaster Gabriel Heatter and columnist O.O. McIntyre.

Heatter became famous for the line with which he opened many of his nightly network broadcasts during World War II. "Ah, there's good news tonight." He looked for and often found something in the news from the war fronts that would keep the American people's spirit up.

Throughout his broadcasting career, Heatter avoided stories of scandal or gossip - or news that might injure someone's

Southern Baptist news executives fired in purge

Fundamentalists in the Southern Baptist Convention. secure in their control of the nation's largest Protestant denomination, are now moving to choke off any official recognition of dissent in the church body.

In late July, at a closed meeting - with armed guards at the doors - of the church's top leaders in Nashville, Tenn., the fundamentalists engineered the dismissal of the two top officials of Baptist Press, the denomination's official news agency.

The two fired editors, Al

Shackleford and Dan Martin. enjoyed widespread respect among both secular and re-ligious journalists and, along with Shackleford's predecessor, W.C. Fields, had build Baptist Press into one of the most credible institutional news

agencies in organised religion.

But that credibility did not sit well with the fundamentalists, who began a campaign more than a decade ago to win control of the denomination's boards But that credibility did not sit well with the fundamentalists, who began a campaign more than a decade ago to win control of the denomination's boards and agencies, which they charged were infected with creeping liberalism.







Justice Department sues Georgia to end majority vote requirement

ATLANTA — The Justice Department filed a lawsuit to overturn Georgia's law requiring candidates to receive a majority of the vote to win primary or general elections, joining a group of black plaintiffs who allege the state's election process

is racially discriminatory.
Assistant U.S. Attorney General John Dunne said Thursday that the majority vote requirement "was adopted and has been maintained for racially

discriminatory purposes."

The complaint, filed Thursday in U.S. District Court in Atlanta. contends the majority vote re-quirement violates the Voting Rights Act of 1965 and the 14th and 15th Amendments to the Constitution.

The suit asks that the state's runoff system for federal, state and county primary and general elections be eliminated, and that

candidates be selected by a plurality in "those jurisdictions or for those elective offices where the use of the majority vote requirement continues to produce discriminatory results."

A majority system forces the winner to take more than 50 percent of the vote, while a plurality system makes the person with the most votes the winner. In the majority system, a runoff between the two top candidates is required when no candidate receives more than 50 percent of the vote.

The suit alleges Georgia's ma-

jority vote requirement is dis-criminatory because it forces black candidates who might win a plurality of votes into a runoff, where they possibly would have to face the combined voting efforts of those who supported the defeated candidates and the other runoff candidate.

A group of black political leaders sued the state with almost identical demands, and that case is before U.S. District Judge Richard Freeman.

"I'm clated," said state Rep. Billy McKinney, a Democrat who was one of the plaintiffs in the original suit. "We had communicated with (the Justice De-partment) and saked that they support our position. But I had no idea it would take the form of another suit.

"It means we have the weight of the federal government behind us," McKinney said. "It's exactly what we want."

Germany unified, Kuwait undecided on world atlas

UPI Science Editor

WASHINGTON - The National Geographic Society printed pages of a new world atlas that shows East and West Germany united, but delayed printing the Middle East map because of the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait.

R.R. Donnelly & Sons in Willard, Ohio, printed 240,000 pages containing the map of a unified Germany that will be in the sixth edition of the National Geographic Atlas of the World even though the unification is incomplete.

"We've had to look into our crystal ball and see that the unification of Germany is inevitable." John Garver, National Geographic's chief mapmaker. said Thursday. "However, it was not without much handwringing and deliberation that we decided to change the world before it actually happened."

The unification of Germany is not expected to be complete until December, although some officials have been pushing to unify by October.

Regardless, the new 410-page National Geographic atlas will be vailable in Novembertat \$59.95 and contain only a listing for "Germany" — nothing for "East Germany" or "West

Both Bonn and Berlin will be hown as the capitals, and only the West German flag will be shown. Germany also will be unified on 21 other maps, such as regional, political and world

maps, Garver said. The one Germany will be surrounded with a green border and the red line that has separated East and West Germany in previous editions of the atlas will be gone.

Meanwhile, Garver ordered the map of the liddle East to be printed last - probably in about two weeks - because of the Aug. 2 Iraqi invasion of Kuwait.

Garver said there was little chance Kuwait would be eliminated from the map because the situation is so unstable.






