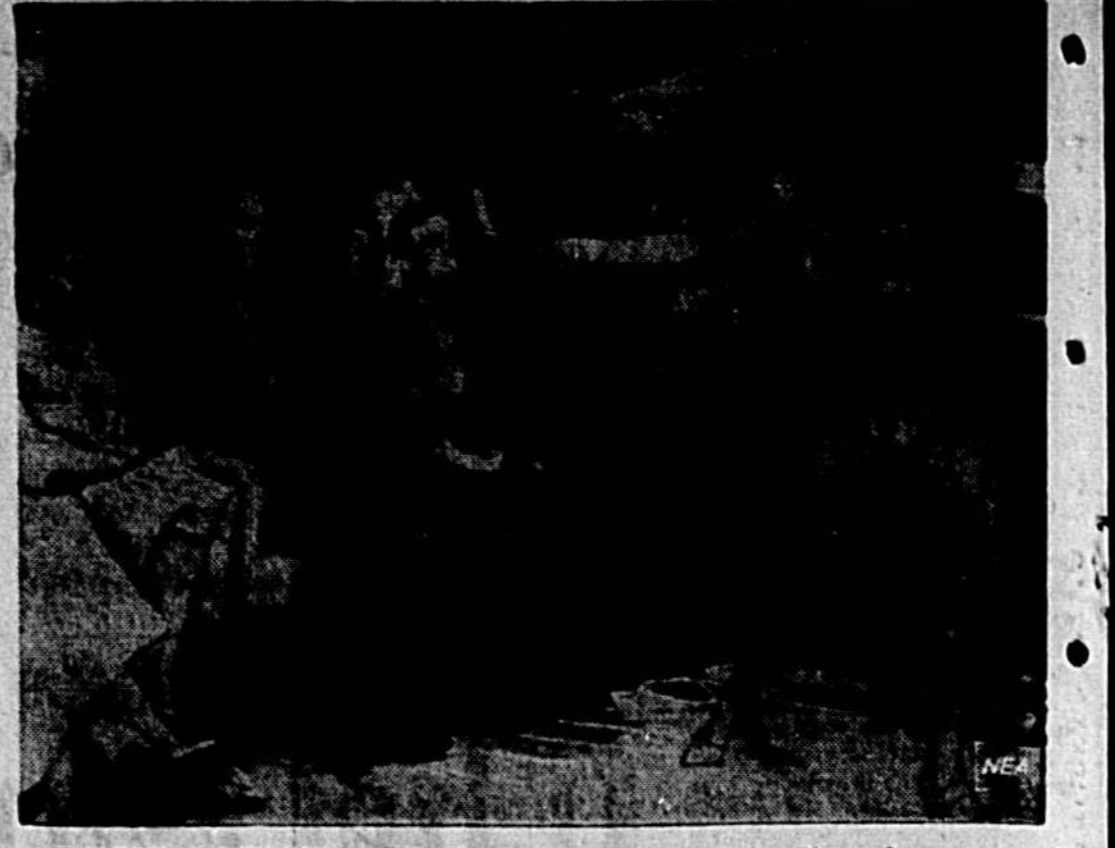

Area citizens are invited to stop by any morning of the week and see the performers at work on the high trapeze or on some of the other exciting acts.

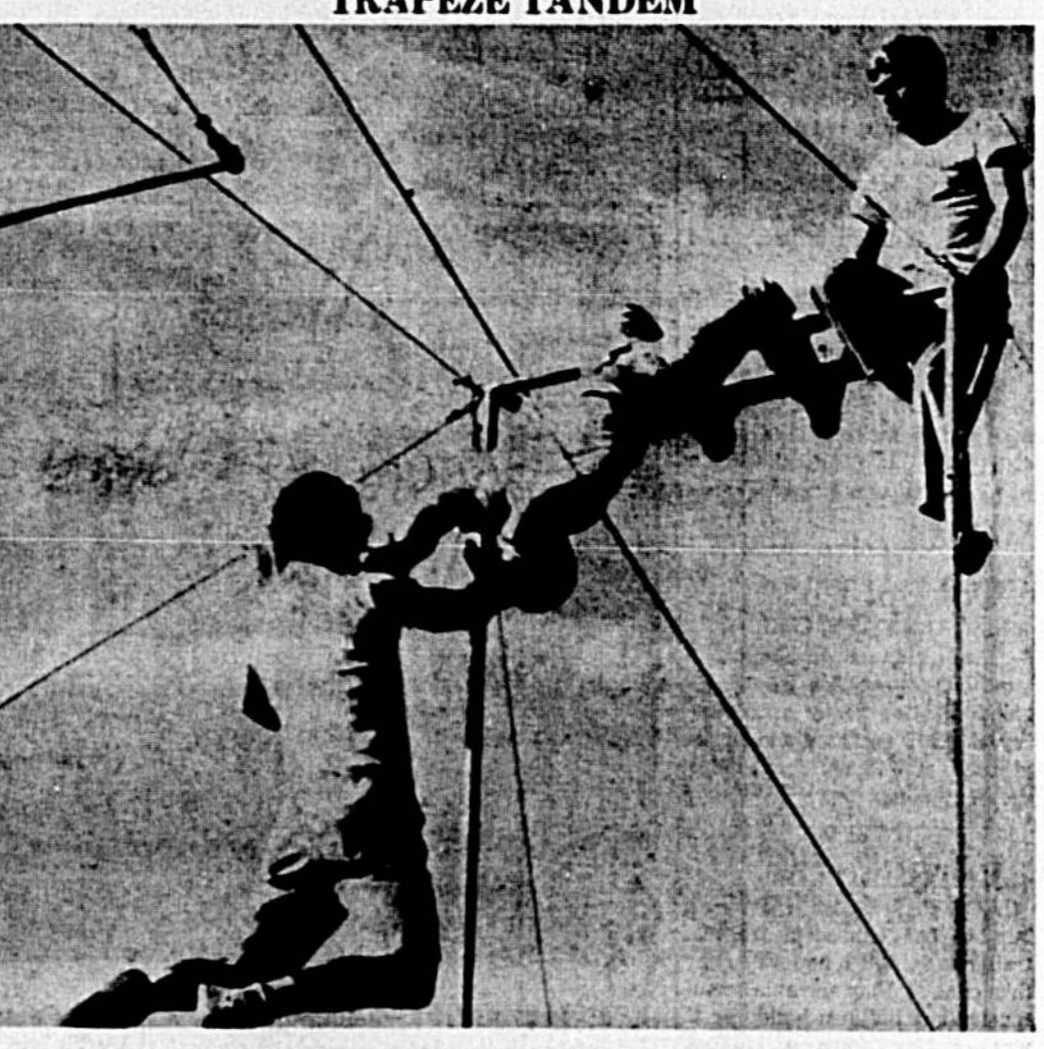

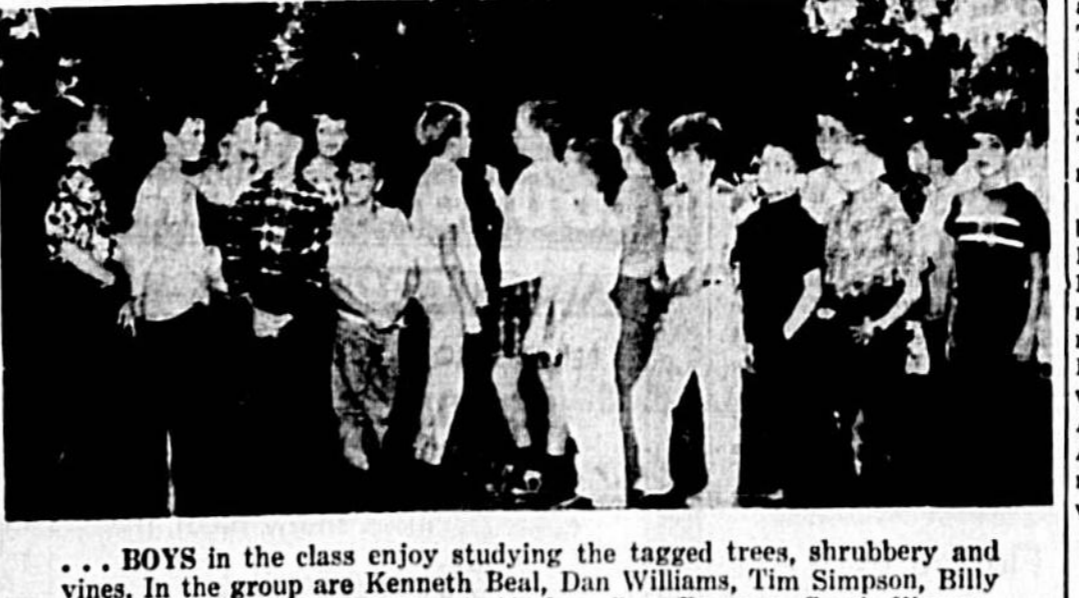

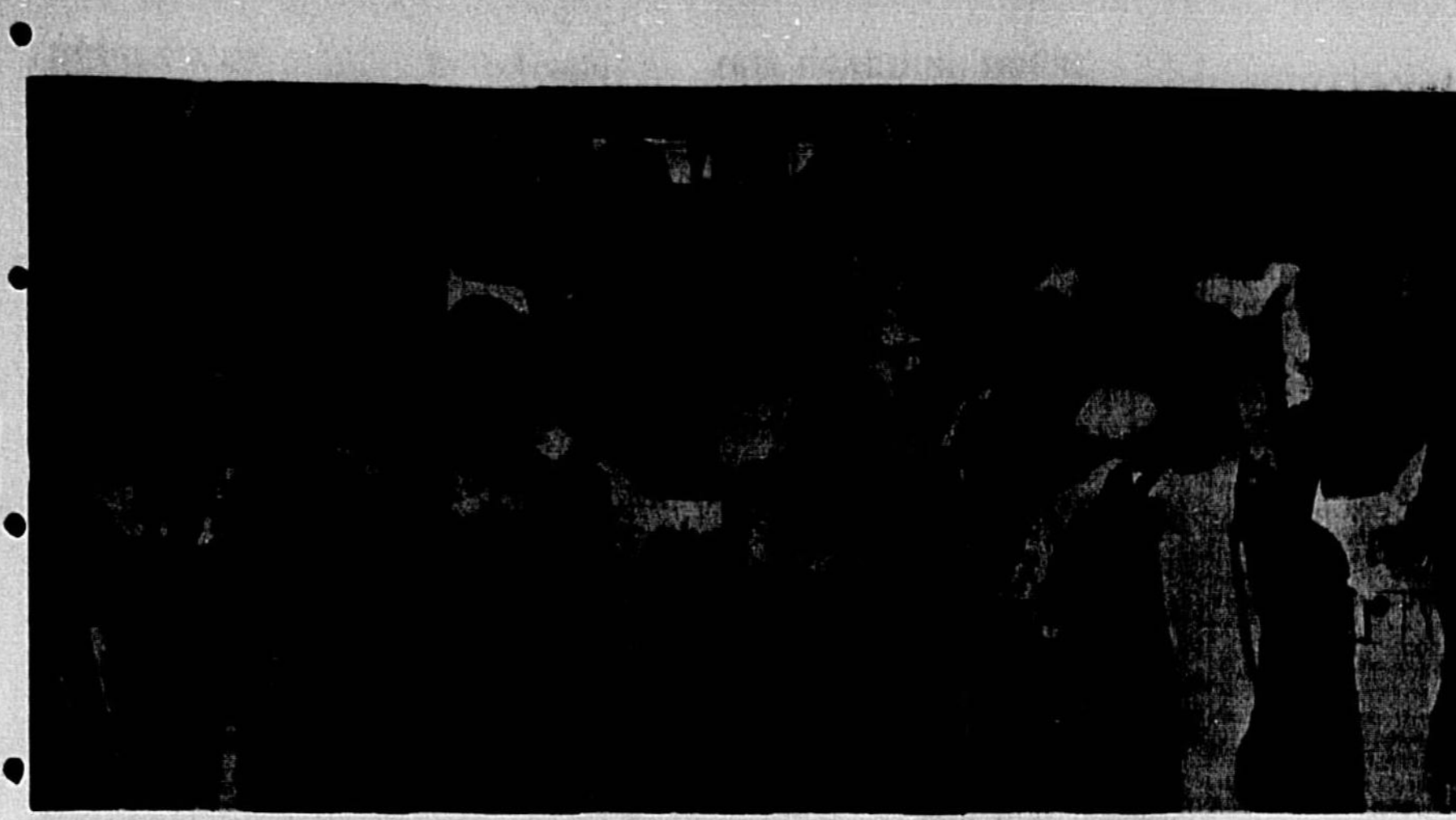

## No Center -- Planners We Stand Firm: Baker

The City Zoning and Planning Board last night unanimously agreed to ask the City Commission to change its mind about building a Goldboro Recreation Center and instead use the money to improve the drainage, lights and streets in the area.

At the same time, the Kiwanis Club Board of Directors agreed to appear before City Commission Monday night asking the board to reconsider its stand on building the \$100,000 facility.

Dr. George Starke, a member of the city's Bi-Racial Committee appeared before the Kiwanis Club Wednesday appealing to them to work toward stopping construction of the community facility and put in needed lights and streets first.

The board agreed to the request as there were no objections in the audience and chairman Clifford McKibbin emphasized the future plant would not be located near any residential areas.

In other business, the board heard County Planner Jack Goodin report the workable program making Sanford eligible for Federal funds would be ready for state approval within two weeks.

The Board authorized Goodin to "hand-carry" it to Atlanta for federal certification. Gave its support for a citizens leadership workshop sponsored by the Department of Urban and Regional Planning of Florida State University.

The two day seminar would be held in Sanford in early November and the board said it would attempt to interest some 60-80 people to attend.
