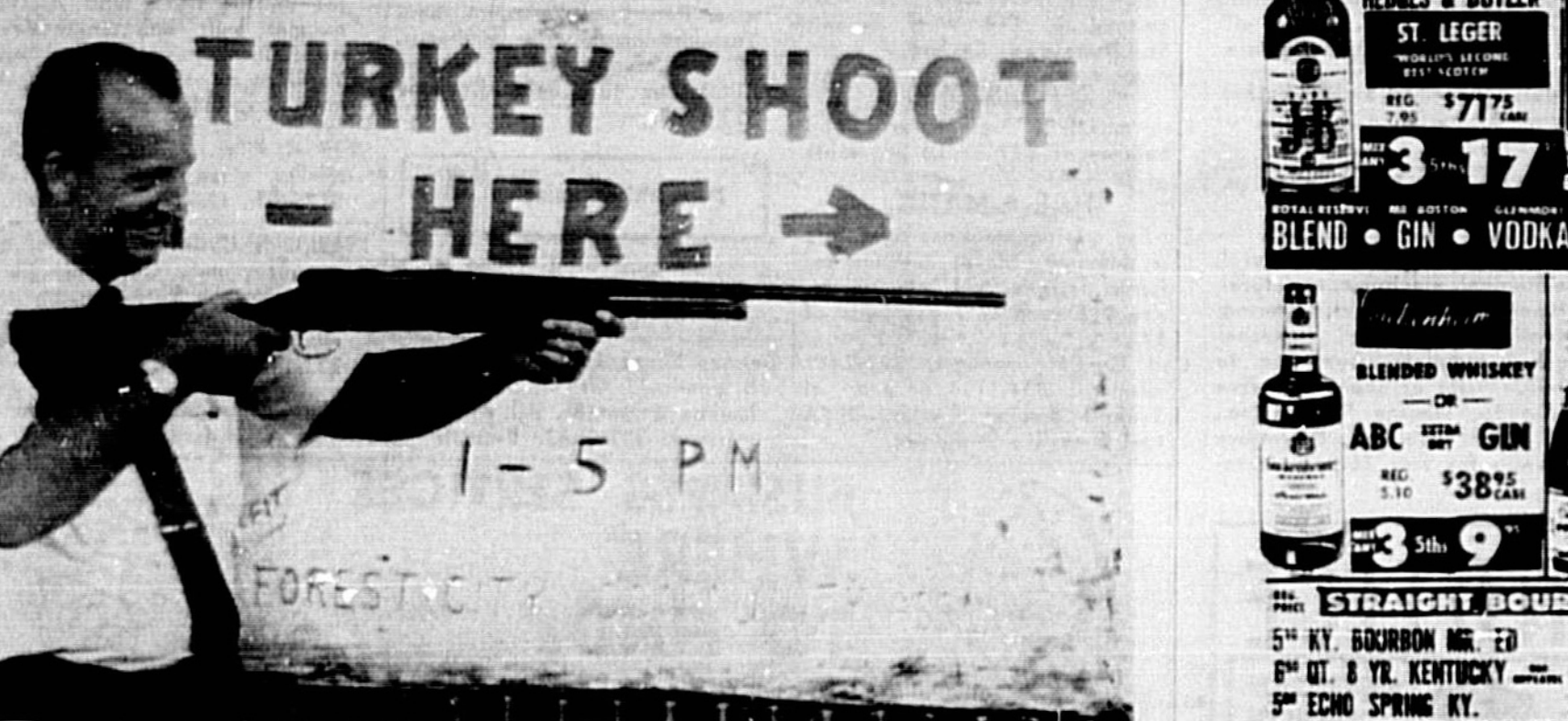

Kelley: Rescind Police Academy Site Proffer

Sanford Industrial Commission (SIC) Director David P. Kelley, reflecting on the Tuesday decision by the State Cabinet to hold off selecting the site for a state police training academy until the U.S. Supreme Court can rule on an appeal of a state surcharge, said today he personally favors ad-

vising the state that the proposed building at Sanford Airport is no longer available. Kelley said two other groups are interested in the facility due to the publicity generated in the press over the attempt by Seminole County and Sanford people to lease airport building 310 to the state for use as a training facility.

Kelley lamented that Mayor Lee P. Moore and Sheriff John Fulk, as well as other city-county persons, had spent time and money in efforts to persuade Cabinet members to give their support to Sanford, since the local facility is centrally located and is available at a tremendous savings to the taxpayers of the state.

Cabinet members were invited to be guests of the city during regular intervals the past four months and toured the airport building while at the same time doing some last minute politicking. FAIRCLOTH'S MOTION

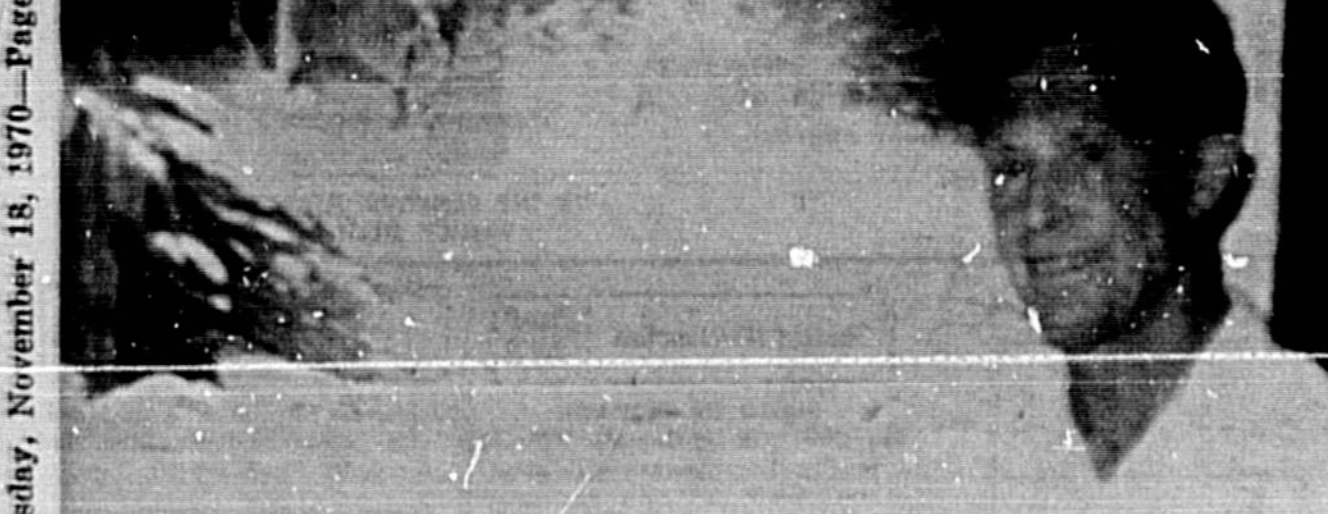

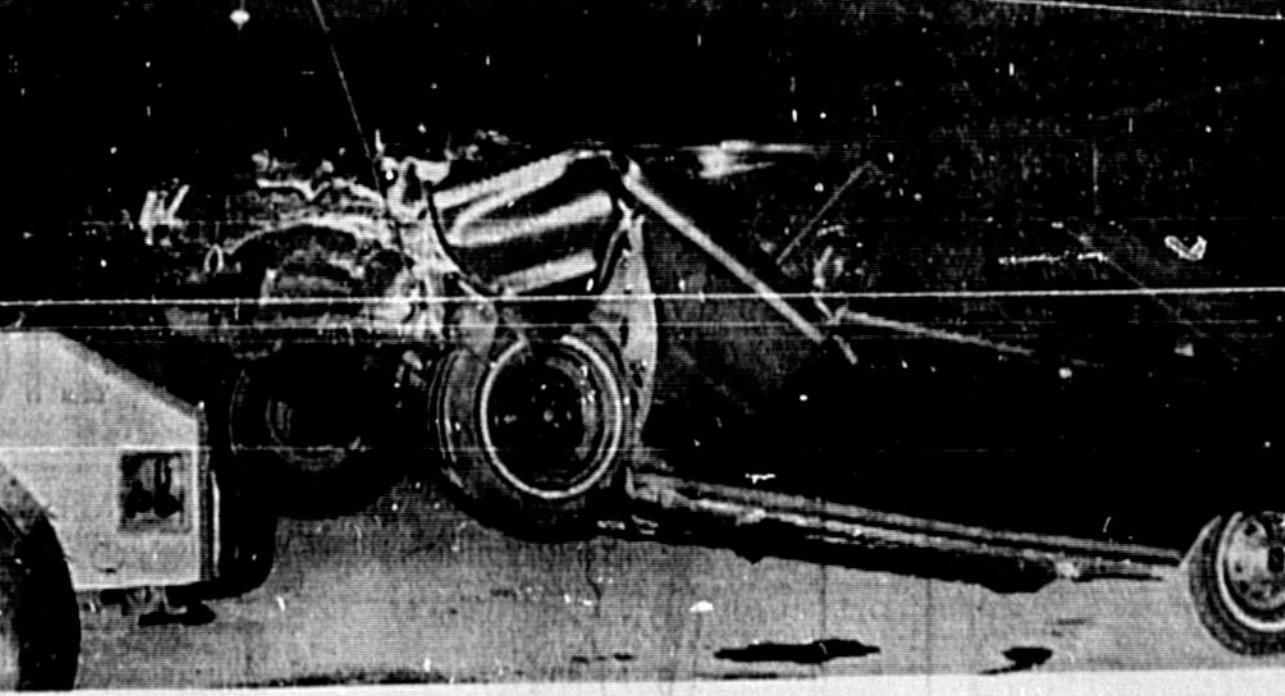
