Pentagon officials are puzzled why the Russian command sent a Y-class nuclear-powered submarine to cruise within 350 miles of Cape Cod, Mass., and later about the same distance off Norfolk, Va., last week.

WASHINGTON (AP) — With President Ford expected to make public the Rockefeller Commission report on the CIA, the Senate Intelligence Committee continues its investigation of alleged CIA assassination plots.

White House Press Secretary Ron Nessen said during the weekend he assumed the President would make public the Rockefeller report dealing with allegations of domestic spying by the CIA. Sources said the announcement could come at a Ford news conference scheduled for 7:30 p.m. EDT this evening.

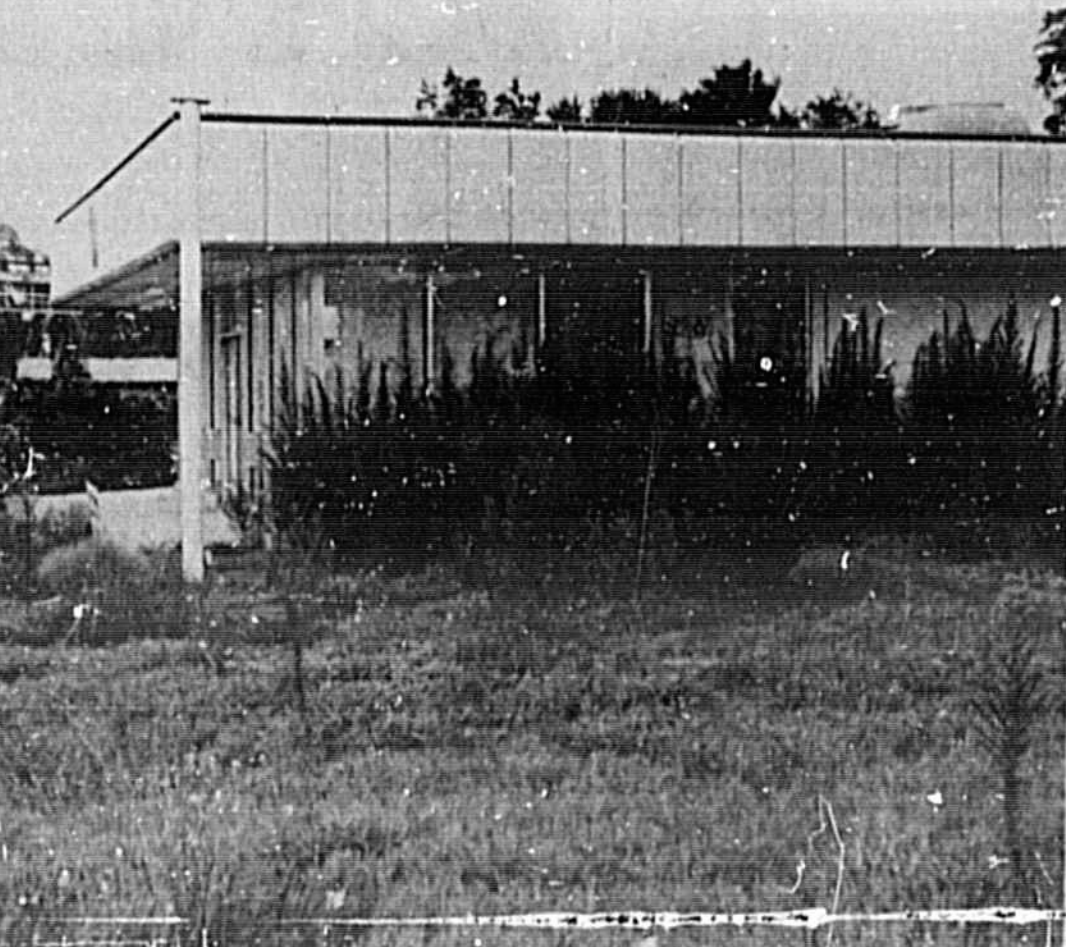

FORT MYERS (AP) — Two of six inmates were wounded in a hall of gunfire shortly after midnight this morning as deputies broke up what was described as a well planned jailbreak, officers said.

Breastfeeding Mothers Tossed Out Of Park

MIAMI (AP) — Three Miami mothers have been tossed out of a public park for allegedly violating the city's decency ordinance by breastfeeding their infants.

Luanne Reiclar, Penny Watt and Jane Donally said Sunday they were asked to leave a city park last Thursday by a ranger who told them he had received complaints about the breastfeeding.

The mothers said they were enlisting the support of local women's rights leaders in their fight against the ban.

"What we do when we nurse a child is anything but indecent," said Mrs. Reiclar. "It doesn't involve removing any clothing and we are very discreet about it."

"I've nursed at church and in restaurants and in restaurants too," she added. "The people who complained, if anyone did, probably raise their kids to think that breasts aren't for anything other than the Playboy Magazine."

Trains Strike Continues

MIAMI (AP) — No negotiations are scheduled as a strike by 350 drivers and terminal workers against the Trailways Bus Co. goes into its second day today in Florida and southwest Georgia.

Federal mediator Robert Leitner had huddled with negotiators for the company and the Amalgamated Transit Union last Thursday and Friday in an effort to avoid the strike, which began at early Sunday.

"It's not close," Leitner said Sunday of the positions of the two sides on wage and benefit terms for a new three-year contract. "The parties are at an impasse."

He said he hoped to resume negotiations this week. Company officials said the strike has shut down Trailways operations in Florida and routes between Florida cities and Atlanta, Albany and Columbus, Ga. Officials said other routes in Georgia were not affected.

Trial Awaits Groot Testimony

TAMPA (AP) — James L. Groot, who once campaigned for votes for former Sen. Edward Gurney, has now lost his own right to vote.

In a dramatic turn of events, Groot, 32, pleaded guilty last week to reduced charges in an alleged slash-fund conspiracy and was excused from the lengthy federal trial of Gurney and three others.

Groot, Gurney's chief aide in 1971-73, is expected to take the stand as a prosecution witness during this 18th week of the bribery conspiracy trial. Prosecutors have been in recess since Thursday.

Gurney, ex-aided Joseph Bastien, plus former federal housing officers Ralph Kozmin and K. Wayne Swiger, are charged with conspiracy to build an illegal campaign fund from builder

tax or election-law violations. No date has been set for sentencing.

Thunderstorms Spawn Tornadoes

(Second of a three-part series)

The tornado — earth's most extreme wind force — spawns inside severe thunderstorms. The Latin derivative means "to turn" and tornadoes do just that. Their 300 mile an hour winds can destroy a house or vacuum exploding closed structures like bombs in the wake of the worst thing to hit the South since Sherman's blue coats.

Spring time's spinning local disasters don't always warn of their approach with slack winds and coppery skies, says the Insurance Information Institute. They can drop suddenly out of any storm front, following detection by observers or radar almost until they strike. If you hear a Weather Service Tornado Warning flashed on your radio or television, or if you see the distinct silhouette of a twister bearing down upon you, you may have only minutes to save your life.

There's just one life-saving measure available as a twister bears down upon you: the Institute. That's shelter, preferably below ground and away from windows or glass walls.

A storm cellar or cave with an outlet to bleed off the pressure drop caused by a twister provides the best protection. An unsecured house trailer provides the least. Even small storms have tossed mobile homes about like cars on a toy train, crushing inhabitants in the aluminum and plywood wreckage.

To prevent loss of life and minimize destruction in the event that a tornado strikes a mobile home park, the Insurance Information Institute recommends that mobile homes be positioned so that they're turned into prevailing winds, with the least possible amount of wall area exposed to the wind's force. Trailers should be secured with anchors or tie-downs. Trees should be planted as wind breakers, or the units positioned to take advantage of other natural windbreakers. Even with these precautions, mobile home occupants are well advised to seek shelter in more substantial dwellings if a twister approaches.

If you're out, take shelter in the nearest, sturdiest building. A steel-framed or reinforced concrete structure is best. Avoid structures with large area roofs such as warehouses, theaters or gyms, safes place to be, the institute notes.

If your home has no basement, seek nearby shelter. Otherwise, stay in the center part of the dwelling against inside walls. First-floor closets are sometimes safe if standing when a house or apartment complex is struck, may provide protection.

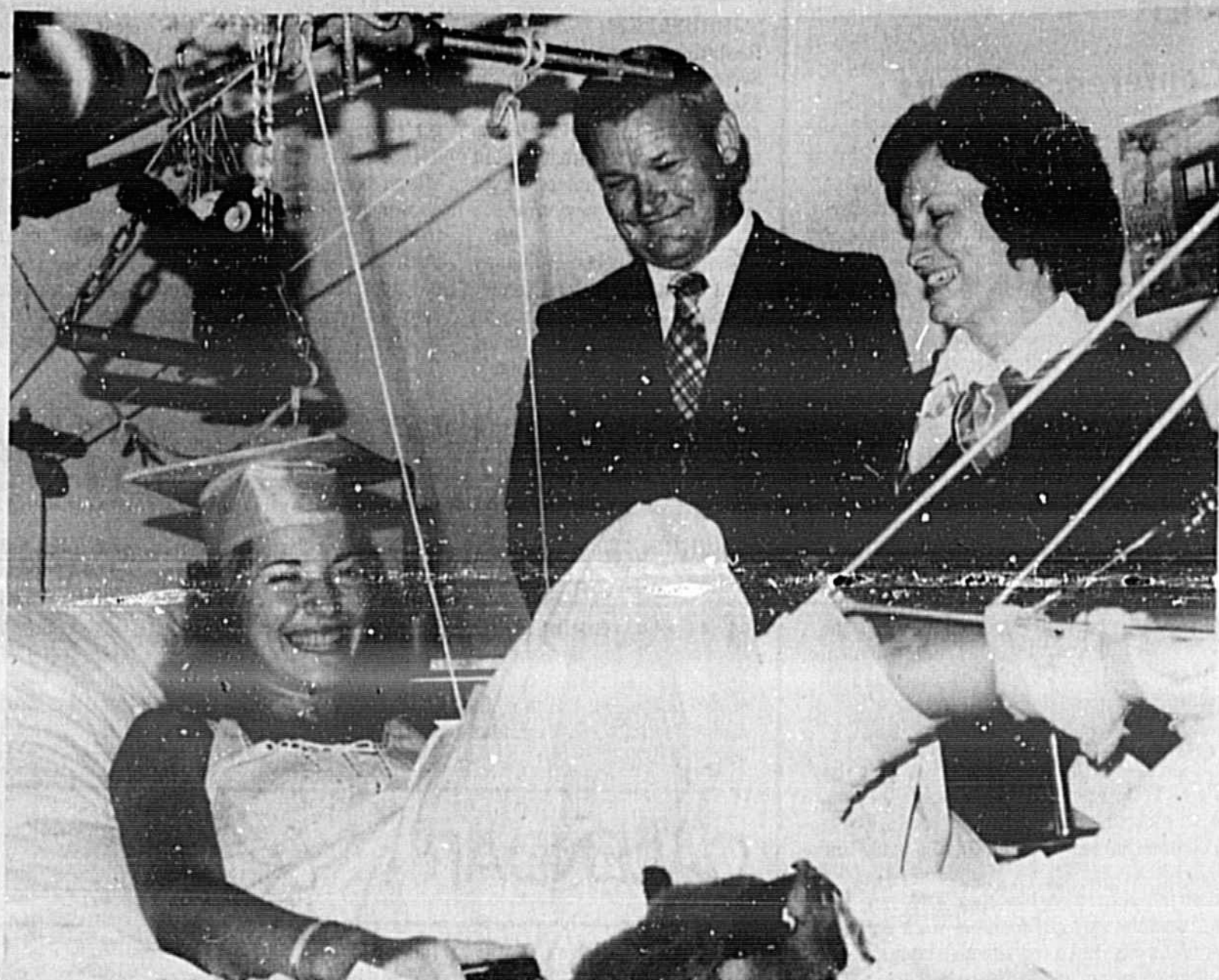

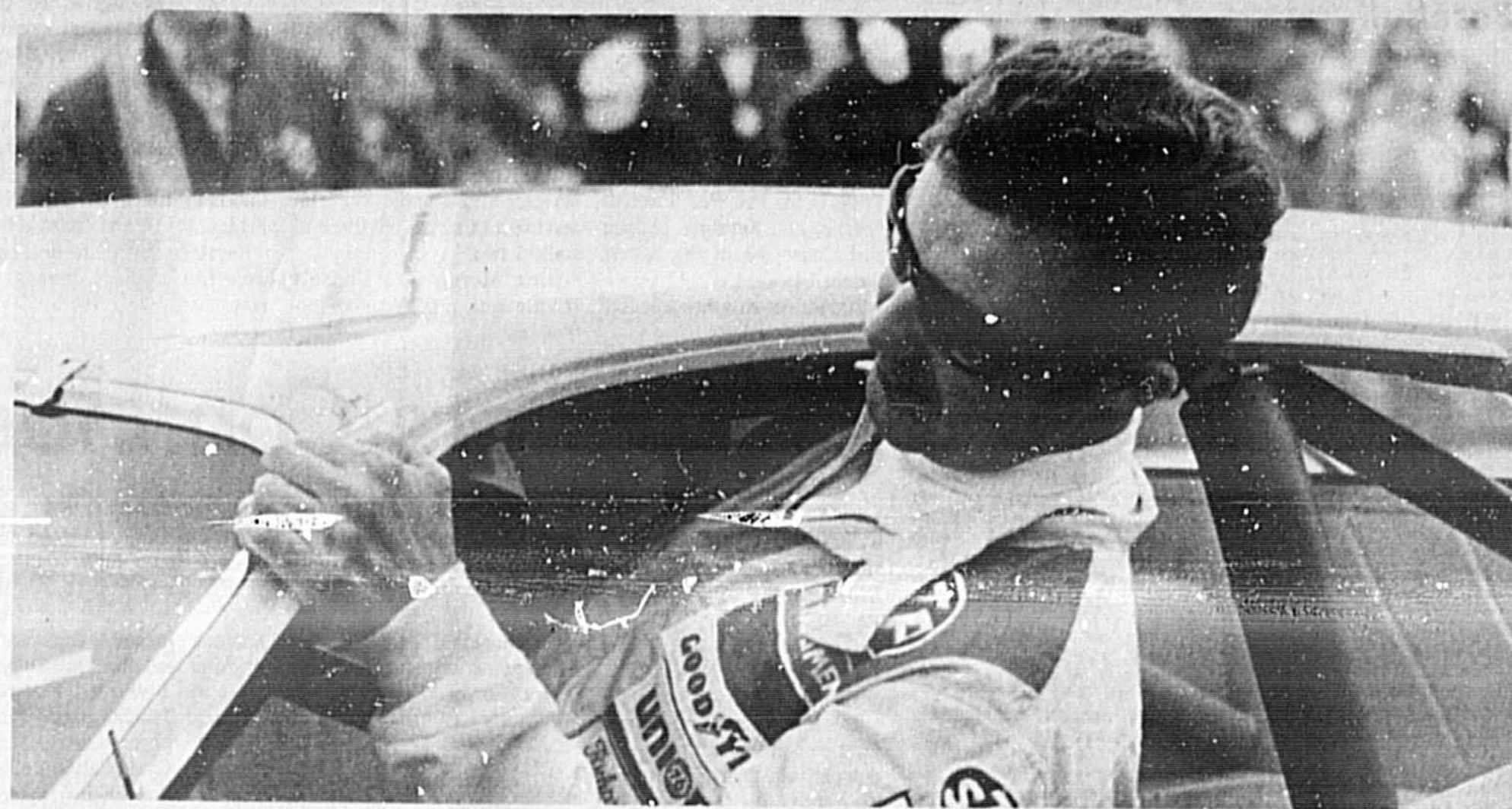

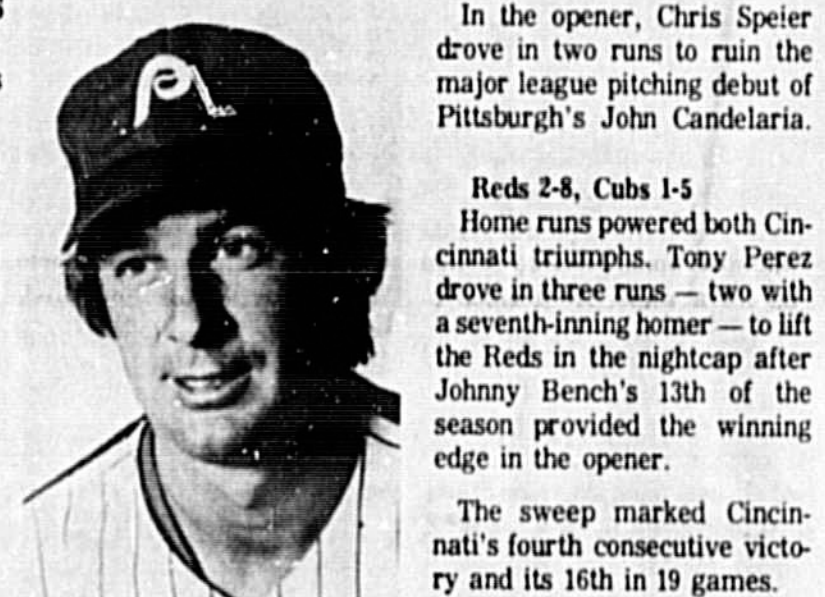


Richard Petty squeezes into his Dodge for the Riverside start yesterday.
