Girls Molestation Probed; Hunt Man

By BILL SCOTT. The abduction at gunpoint and rape-molestation of two Longwood girls, ages 12 and nine, is receiving the full attention of the Seminole County sheriff's office today.

Chief Deputy Duane Harrell said county investigators are probing reports that a middle-aged man, driving an old model car, forced two girls into his car as they walked along a Longwood street Monday on their way to school.

Harrell said the man, wearing a gray-black shirt, drove in an area of the Mayfair Country Club on Country Club Road and forced the girls at gunpoint to lay down on the car seat while he proceeded to molest the younger girl.

Harrell said the 12-year-old was later taken by her parents to an Orlando doctor for a physical examination to determine whether rape had been committed.

The chief deputy said the older girl reported the man at one point either raped or attempted to rape her.

After the incident, the abductor drove the girls to an area near Lake Mary School where he released them.

Other than the reported old model red car with green seats, no other information concerning the incident is available.

Longwood authorities are expected to take precautions immediately to patrol roads leading to schools which are used by walking children.

Mayor Ken Brown announced, after conferring with Longwood Police Chief R. E. Sweat, that an unmarked patrol car would be used to protect children going to and from school.

Vs. Pro-Politicians, Newspapers Kirk Opens All-Out Warfare

By FRED VAN PELT. Open war was launched against "professional politicians" and "big city newspapers" by Gov. Claude Kirk Jr. last night at the Seminole County Republican executive committee's fund-raising Lincoln Day dinner.

Each and a dozen joined the "family circle" at \$500. Declaring that he has followed the philosophies of President Abraham Lincoln during his three years as governor, Kirk charged that "the professional politicians have used every trick in the book to wear us down."

He continued: "I can only say that for three years we have been concerned only with the opinions of the people. And we have not the slightest interest in what the papers or the politicians think of us."

Kirk directed his attack primarily against Floyd Christian, state education commissioner, and Earl Faircloth, attorney general, and the St. Petersburg Times and Tampa Tribune. He was equally emphatic that he exempted the Orlando Sentinel from his attacks.

"Historically," said the Chief Executive, "the professional politicians have downgraded the people as nothing more than a mass of unknowing humanity to be tolerated on election day."

He continued: "In the last few months, you and I have been witnessing a revolution. It is our revolution, and it is a quiet one. It is the revolution of the silent majority, in which you and I are active participants."

"Because the professional politicians for so long ignored the people, and because for so long the newspapers catered to the whims of those who rant and rave and roll around on the grass, the great majority of Americans — and Floridians — who normally remain silent until they have had enough, are telling the big city newspapers and the professional politicians: 'We've had it with you.'"

"And the politicians and the newspaper people are wandering around in a daze, wondering what strange fate cast them together as bedfellows."

Kirk dwelt a bit on newspaper makeup and charged that "photos and placement he and his family had been placed in a 'bad light.'"

The Governor also blasted television news: "Television newscasters have managed to develop their own weapons and their own credibility gap."

"Again, in my mind, this is a tragedy that need never have happened. But it is the tragedy of a media system that thinks its duty is to interpret and to fashion and mold opinions, rather than to report. The tragedy is that the great bulk of those who do the interpreting — and the criticizing — are ultra-liberal while the vast majority of Americans are not."

Kirk continued: "We are the people, and because of that, we don't fool ourselves. The professional politicians, and most of the newspapers in Florida, need to come back and get with the people. As Lincoln was right: The people are right. The politicians and big city newspapers are wrong. Today, the people are doing just fine thank you, and the quiet revolution of the silent majority is real, relevant and, best of all, it is effective."

Hobby Trial Opens

By CHARNER LEONE. Trial of ex-Sheriff J. L. Hobby got underway this morning before a jury in the Circuit Court of Judge Tom Waddell.

Hobby is being prosecuted for unauthorized compensation. That is, he is alleged to have been paid for performing services for compensation, when those services were part of his duty as sheriff.

The charge is set on bribery as has been generally misinterpreted. Hobby is alleged to have set up a guard and security service for the Sanford Orlando Kennel Club and to have accepted payment for this service during his term as sheriff. He was sheriff of Seminole for 10 years, 1957-67.

Three checks for \$1,600 (written in the years of 1962, 63 and '64, each made out to W. R. Brown, a deputy, and cashed by Hobby) have been accepted as evidence. These checks are alleged to be the payment to Hobby for the guard services, which included transporting the nightly gate receipts to the bank.

These receipts amounted up to \$150,000 a night, testified John (Jack) Ledoux, manager and partner of the SOKC. Ledoux, his youthful appearance belied by his gray and balding hair, said that he did not detect any corrupt intent on his or Hobby's part.

The checks, one each year, were signed, and cashed within hours of their presentation to Hobby, according to the testimony.


Brown, who was on vacation at the time of the cashing, testified that he had authorized Hobby and Wade Singleton, another deputy, to use his signature in his absence. He said that he did not receive any money from the checks and that he did not even know of the checks until recently.

County Ponders Dogs And Dumps

Mayor Ken Brown, of Longwood, apprised the board of the fact that the municipalities of North Orlando, Longwood, Altamonte Springs and Casselberry have no facilities in which to place animals since the Humane Society Animal Shelter has closed.

Brown requested use of the county shelter. Chairman John Alexander stated that he had been in contact with Mayor Clifford Jordan, of North Orlando, in May of last year regarding the matter. Alexander continued that it would be necessary for the municipalities to advise the county what type of animal program they wish to enforce, whether rabies control program or leash law and how many animals the county would have to accommodate.

The matter of county liability would also have to be considered and disposal of the animals.

Hero's Arrest Explained

Seminole County Chief Deputy Duane Harrell today made available more information concerning the arrest of a returning service man for swimming in the Wekiva River near the "bridge to nowhere."

Harrell said the 21-year-old ex-GI was arrested by Deputy W. E. Robbins while in the company of another 17-year-old youth and a 15-year-old girl.

Harrell said the girl was absent from school and the young boy had been in county jail several times and at the time of the incident was under indictment for car theft.

While not implying the older youth had been involved in any nefarious activity, the lawman pointed out that both youths could have been charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor since the girl should have been in school at the time.

Harrell pointed out that a sign prohibiting diving in the area was posted for all to see and that under the circumstances, the deputy was within his rights in charging the ex-GI and his companion.

'Will Benefit Special Interests'

Solon Seeks To Cut Off Canal

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Claiming the Cross — Florida Barge Canal will benefit special interests, a Miami legislator has filed legislation aimed at Congress to cut off funds for the project...

No money means except that needed to clear debris and weeds from the existing canal system and the Oklawaha River should be obliterated, said Rep. Gerald Lewis, a Democrat.

The construction of the canal will exploit our natural resources only to benefit special interests at the great and wasteful expense of the nation's taxpayers," he said in his proposed memorial to Congress.

It was among a spate of newly proposed legislation filed this week for consideration by the 1970 Legislature, which convenes in April.

Lewis said the canal has caused serious damage to Florida's ecology and water supply, impaired the supply of game and fish and obliterated forests.

Hands Off Schools, U. S. Told

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Two Broward County Republican legislative aides said forcing federal officials to keep hands off Florida schools as Gov. Claude Kirk again went to court Monday.

And Education Commissioner Floyd Christian called a meeting of school officials in Tallahassee Wednesday to ensure that "everything be done at this time to make certain that the possibility of disruption of schools next year be eliminated."

Reps. Arthur Rude of Fort Lauderdale and Joseph M. Martinez Jr. of Hollywood filed a proposed resolution calling for an amendment to the state constitution.

It would provide "The state shall have sole and exclusive jurisdiction of the organization and administration of all public schools and public school systems within the state. . . . (and) no officer or court of the United States shall have the power to impair or infringe any rights herein specifically reserved to the state."

New Avalanche Buries 50 Swiss Soldiers

RECKINGEN, Switzerland (UPI)—An avalanche so powerful it swept away a stone Swiss army barracks full of soldiers and the outskirts of this alpine village before dawn today and buried 50 persons.

By midmorning, rescuers had recovered two bodies and pulled 30 persons out of the barracks, many of them seriously injured. Police and army spokesmen put the number of missing at between 28 and 30, mostly soldiers.

The petitioners withdrew their request. Attorney for the plaintiffs, William Hutchison, gave a scathing denunciation of the publicity afforded by an "insignificant incident." Hutchison maintained that withdrawal proceedings would minimize embarrassment to all concerned. Hutchison contended that as a result of the issue being magnified, persons were observed in the area of contention dumping trash, having picnics and even digging worms. The attorney claimed that whether the right-of-way was abandoned or not, the area is not a recreational one but private property. He maintained that the property owners had rights in the matter, too.

As Hutchison left the room, he gave a parting aside . . . "now maybe the press can devote its time to the really important issues in the city and county."


