Officials Cry: More Space But, Can We Foot The Bill?

County officials, in an extraordinary three hour session Tuesday afternoon, cited the need for more courthouse space but some were wasive when hit by county commissioner questions on whether the taxpayers would be willing to pay for a new facility.

The meeting was called by Chairman J. C. Hutchison for the purpose of seeing what courthouse officials needed in the way of more space and if they felt the need for a new courthouse.

The day before, Circuit Judge Volie Williams asked the board to consider building a new facility and to have it ready for occupancy by 1965.

After the board listened to officials spell out their individual department needs, District 3 Commissioner James P. Avery declared that only 60 percent of the courthouse was being utilized and that an inspection was made and that the building was structurally sound and had 15 to 20 years of life.

Avery also said that the interest alone for a new courthouse would be \$100,000 per year.

Here's the way officials felt about courthouse needs:

Supervisor of Registration Camilla Bruce: "I agreed with Judge Williams. I need more space. There just isn't any place for records in the chamber building."

When questioned by District 3 Commissioner John Fitzpatrick on whether she felt the taxpayers would favor a new courthouse, Mrs. Bruce replied: "I doubt it."

Tax collector John Galloway: "Need more space to serve the public especially during the rush period. I'll probably need double the amount of space by 1970 and don't see how the building can be remodeled to take care of these needs."

Galloway said he would be willing to pay his share of the tax load but suggested that it be left up to the people by referendum.

"You can't have decent facilities unless you are willing to pay for them," Galloway said.

Probation officer James Lee: "I'm going along with Judge Williams."

County Prosecutor Karlyle Housholder: "Don't envy your position but facilities are inadequate. We should have a new courthouse but don't have all the facts on taxes on whether we can afford a new facility. Couldn't say if the people would be willing to pay for

new facility but I'll be ready to." County Judge Vernon Miser: "I will need double the space in 10 years. Have no vault now—which the law requires."

Tax Assessor Mary Earle Walker: "I'm crammed for space but don't know if the taxes will increase as much as the population.

In my opinion I favor a new court house if we can afford it." Circuit Court Clerk Arthur Beckwith: "Need more space. More space needed for state auditor court reporter. Repairs needed now, but can't see dumping hundreds of thousands of dollars to remodel if a new facility will

be more feasible in 15 years." County Engineer Carlton Bliss: "In 10 years will need three times the present space."

Zoning Director Robert Brown: "Crowded—no private office." The Commission thanked the officials and said a decision would be reached in the near future.

Plaques Ruled Out In County

Bronze plaque makers in the central Florida area were given a setback Tuesday.

The County Commission, after debating for more than an hour and by a 3-2 majority, voted to eliminate all plaques from public buildings and structures in Seminole County.

As a result of the ruling, there won't be any plaque on the new county jail as well as none on the rebuilt Lake Howell and Upala bridges.

Two weeks ago, the board agreed to place the 1960 county commission as well as the present board on the plaque outside the new jail.

At Tuesday's meeting, District 4 Commissioner Vernon Dunn cited a letter to the Herald from former Commissioner Homer La-

ple protesting the names of the two boards on the proposed plaque.

In his letter to the editor, Little said "The accepted custom has been to place the names of those responsible on the building as recognition and honoring those with the initiative and the courage to plan and carry out the project."

Dunn asked that only the 1960 board be placed on the plaque.

After a discussion of more than an hour, with motions flying left and right, District 3 Commissioner John Fitzpatrick declared, "It's about time we stopped all this foolishness," and added "we should stop putting plaques on any building and put aside those funds for a new county courthouse."

It also came to light that plaques had been ordered for the Lake Howell Bridge as well as the Upala Bridge.

But, the commission by a 4-1 vote, quickly voted them out.

District 3 Commissioner James Avery opposed doing away with the bridge plaques saying that the road department and engineer deserve some sort of recognition.

The 3-2 vote to eliminate the plaques on the jail as well as on future buildings showed Fitzpatrick, Williams and Avery favoring the removal, and Hutchison and Dunn opposed.

Citing the new jail, Hutchison said there should be some kind of plaque there to show who was responsible for this impressive building.

The board, however, authorized the clerk to write to James Gamble Rogers, jail architect, advising him "that no plaque will be needed by the jail."

The commission authorized Knowles to take whatever police enforcement action is necessary to stop outside dumping.

FAA Opens Probe In Air Disaster

DENVER (UPI) — Nancy Guyer and her three children were a vacation from home after a vacation in the East. Bernard Neff, just out of medical school, was a few miles from his first assignment as an Air Force doctor. They had just buckled in for the DC's landing at Stapleton Airport when pilot John Grosse's voice calmly sounded through the intercom:

"There was some trouble in the hydraulic system. It might be a rough landing."

The DC's, carrying a capacity 122 persons, blasted down from the cloudy sky, touched the runway and rolled along. Suddenly dust flew from the wheels. The plane silted into a ground loop. One wing hit a parked truck and in an instant the huge craft was a flames.

Nancy Guyer and her three children and 13 other persons were killed a death toll of 37. But Capt. Bernard Neff and 105 persons escaped with their lives. It seemed a miracle.

County Plans HHFA Appeal On Project

The County Commission will go to Atlanta, Ga. the week of July 24 to appeal the Housing and Home Finance Agency's ruling turning down planning funds on a \$9 million county wide-water control program.

The board, Tuesday afternoon, agreed to make the trip after Harold Scott of Reynolds, Smith and Hill, Jacksonville engineers, urged the board they have a better chance for appealing by meeting with Federal authorities and "laying their case on the table."

The county had asked for a planning grant of \$37,000 with the initial phase in the long range program estimated at \$3,620,000.

Scott pointed out Tuesday that the HHFA was not in favor of advancing the money for such a long range program because it felt the county did not have the necessary funds to finance the program.

Scott said that perhaps the county could get planning funds for a five year "modified" program and by the time it can be undertaken the county could get legislation in 1963 to raise the necessary funds.

The Jacksonville firm had been hired to conduct a survey of water control needs. Among the phases in the long range program was Howell Creek, the Little Wekiva and the Neelockhatchee River.

Czech Airliner Crashes; 82 Die

CASABLANCA, Morocco (UPI) — A Czechoslovakian airliner flying into Africa from behind the Iron Curtain crashed and burned while trying to land early today, killing all 82 persons aboard.

One man survived for a few hours but died later in Casablanca hospital. He had been badly burned. His nationality could not be determined immediately.

Five of the victims were reported to be children.

The plane, a four-engine turbo-prop Ilyushin 18, was believed to have hit a high tension wire in fog. It crashed in flames at Bouakoura, 10 miles from Casablanca.

The flight carried 73 passengers and a crew of nine. The passengers were said to be Russians, Czechs, East Germans and Moroccans.

The flight, which left Prague and made a stopover in Zurich, Switzerland. It had been headed for Rabat, Morocco, but was diverted to Casablanca because of fog.

When the plane got near Casablanca the tower here also reported fog and waved it on to an airfield at Nouaceur.

The big airliner apparently hit the wires while making its turn for Nouaceur.

The Ilyushin 18 provides the backbone of non-jet service on Communist airlines. Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev and other Soviet officials often use them on long journeys.

\$14,000 DuPont Car Damaged In Mishap

A \$14,000 continental car owned by Mrs. A. V. DuPont, wife of the wealthy industrialist from Ft. Lauderdale, was involved in a two car collision on SR 66 early Tuesday afternoon, the Florida Highway Patrol reported.

Two persons were injured in the mishap and the driver of the DuPont car, William Rogers of Ft. Lauderdale, was charged with failure to yield the right of way and having no valid driver's license, Trooper Bill Stringfield said.

Stringfield said that Rogers attempted to make a left turn on SR 66 from Dunwoody Lane when his car was hit by a vehicle operated by Mrs. Ruth Stubbings of Eau Gallie. Mrs. Stubbings and her son, Christopher, were injured and treated at Seminole Memorial Hospital for lacerations and bruises.

Damage to the DuPont car was estimated at \$1,500 and \$800 to the other car.

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Kennedy Nears Manpower Decision

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Kennedy administration today neared a decision on how many additional men and how much more money will be needed to meet increasing Soviet threats.

The defense department said Tuesday it would ask for additional defense funds immediately and may call up reserve military forces.

The most likely figure was said to be between \$5 billion and \$6 billion, on top of the \$45 billion Kennedy already has requested for the current fiscal year.

Deputy Defense Secretary Roswell L. Gilpatrick raised the possibility of an emergency military call at a news conference.

He said the administration was considering mobilizing both the military reserves and the National Guard. Guard units would presumably be summoned first, since they are in a more advanced state of readiness.

Regular forces, Gilpatrick said, could not be built up fast enough and there is no intention of trying.

He said the reserves and the national guard could be brought on duty within six months, giving the armed services a "flexible" manpower boost.

Spy Satellite Fired By U. S.

POINT ARGUELLO, Calif. — An experimental Midas spy satellite tumbled aloft today, aimed at an orbit that would take its infrared-looking eye looking for heat signs from enemy missiles.

If successful, Midas III—one of the kind fired toward an all-weather polar orbit—would pass over every spot on earth at one time or other as it zooms around the world with its infra-red eye looking for heat signs from enemy missiles.

Astronauts Get Final Tests For New Flight

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) — The two men who will follow astronaut Alan B. Shepard into space atop a Redstone rocket began final preparations today for America's second and last manned space flight.

Marine Lt. Col. John H. Glenn Jr. and Air Force Capt. Virgil I. Grissom are getting daily workouts in a spaceship "simulator" at the cape while scientists keep an hourly check on their physical condition.

If all goes as planned, one will set his chance next Tuesday morning to follow in the footsteps of America's first astronaut, Wally Byrd, to orbit about 115 miles into space inside a one-ton "Mercury" capsule aboard a Redstone.

For the other, a chance at a trip into space probably will be a matter of waiting just a few weeks longer. If nothing goes wrong with the Tuesday shot, the nation is expected to try its third "sub-orbital" manned spaceflight late next month or early in September.

Detailed physical examinations during the next five days will decide whether Glenn or Grissom goes next. The man left behind this time will be cast as a "back-up" ready to step in should something happen at the last minute.

Stemper Attending Citrus Seminar

W. H. (Bill) Stemper, local realtor and appraiser, is attending a week long seminar for the "Appraisal of Citrus Groves and Properties."

The Citrus Appraisal school which is being held in the Cherry Plaza Hotel, Orlando, is sponsored by The American Institute of Real Estate Appraisers.

The course includes the study of types of citrus trees, how to analyze soils, selection of root stocks, citrus diseases, productivity and the interpretation of market trends.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The General Accounting Office (GAO) told Congress today that the Radio Corporation of America (RCA) withheld information from the Air Force in order to pad the price of 442 long range radios.

The GAO said RCA withheld the information while negotiating a \$5.3 million contract with the Air Force for pressurized airborne communications equipment.

RCA denied the accusations, but said it would be willing to consider a possible refund.

The auditors said RCA told the Air Force that one of the radio's major components would cost about \$222 a unit. However, the report said, RCA had previously received a subcontractor's bid to build the part for \$655.

It's Gonna Be Rough Next Year

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Starting next year businessmen may find it harder to deduct from their income taxes the cost of yachts, hunting lodges and lavish night-club spending.

Legislation imposing new curbs on tax deductions for entertainment, gifts and other business spending won tentative approval Tuesday of the House Ways & Means Committee.

The proposed restrictions fell far short of the drastic curbs requested by President Kennedy to stop "widespread abuses" of business expense accounts. Moreover, there was considerable doubt that Congress would complete action on the measure this year.

The legislation was included by voice vote in a sharply amended version of the administration's \$17 billion tax revision bill.

Here is how the proposed new curbs would operate, starting Jan. 1:

Entertainment, amusement and recreation, including theater tickets, and yachts, lodges and other such facilities — Tax deductions

would not be barred, as proposed by Kennedy. But businessmen would have to show the spending was "directly related to the production of income and not merely for the creation of good will." No claims would be allowed unless backed up with detailed records.

The new rules would not apply to business conventions and stockholder meetings.

Gifts — A \$25 a year limit would be set on gifts to any one individual for which deductions could be claimed. The administration requested a \$10 ceiling. There is no limit now.

Club dues and fees — Deductions would be barred, as the administration proposed, for all social, athletic or sporting clubs or organizations. The only exception would be payments made by a professional athlete, such as a boxer, for use of a gym or other facilities "essential to the conduct of his trade or business."

Lunches and dinners — Reasonable tax deductions would be permitted for the cost of food and beverages purchased "under cir-

cumstances . . . of a type generally considered to be conducive to a business discussion." Colin F. Stam, chief of the congressional tax-drafting staff, said this meant the businessman would be risking his tax deduction if he just took his customers out to lunch at "chorus girls." The administration had recommended a flat \$4 to \$7 per guest limit.

Out-of-town business trips — Reasonable deductions would be permitted for food and lodging. The

Kennedy administration had recommended a \$30 a day maximum. The law now requires the tax commissioner to allow deductions for all food and lodging expenses.

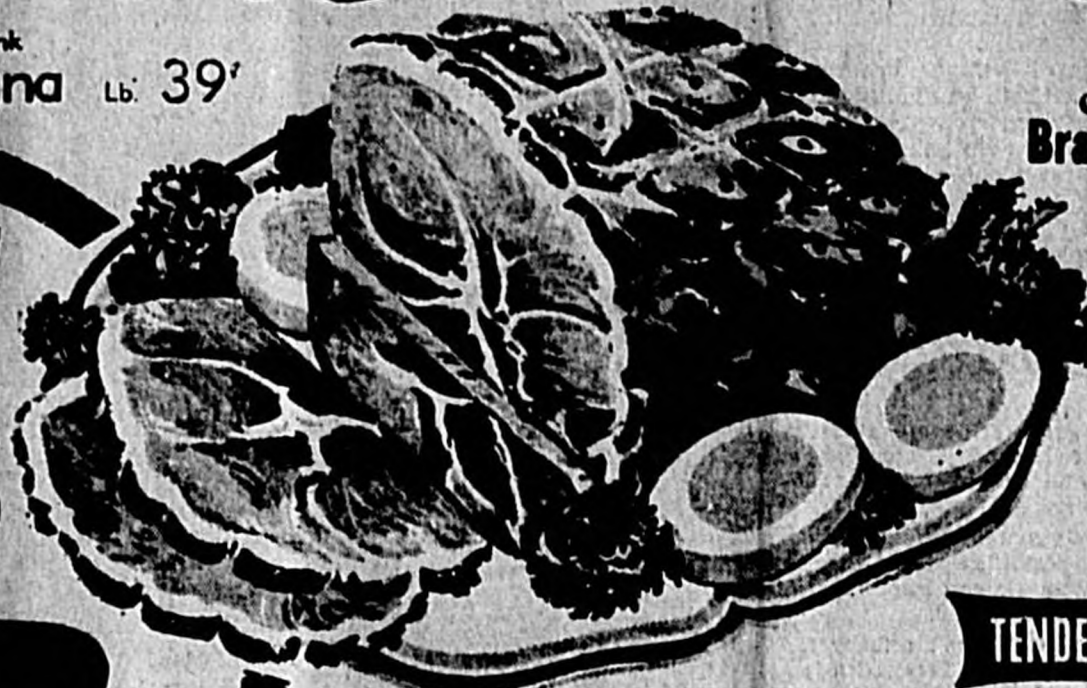

ROME, Italy—Things I'd Like to Know—And Maybe You Would, Too:

(1) Why does the strongest, richest and, if an American may say so, nicest country in the world have to spend so much time and effort courting the little, weak, threatened countries of the world?

If they earnestly seek freedom, protection and help, what is it to stop them from sending missions and high-ranking executives to us instead of vice-versa?

Lyndon Johnson travels thousands of miles to sell the United States to small Asian countries. Stevenson goes the other way. It seems to me, if the small Asian countries sincerely aim for the rights of every man, that they would send delegations to America to study our methods, to watch us work slowly, but surely, toward making every man a first-class man. The same goes for Latin America.

In short, why aren't they trying to sell themselves to us, not us to them? Do their leaders really believe that America seeks war, in an imperialist nation? If they do, then isn't it time we said (couched in diplomatic language, of course) that they were slightly off beam, and needed in quit having the tail shaking the dog?

Would it be possible (still another question) that a handful of men, miles superior to their countrymen intellectually, are making a game of playing themselves against America and Russia?

(2) How do you go about alienating something that is already alienated? Seems a hard trick. Yet Senator Fulbright warns against unilateral action against Communism lest we alienate most of Latin America and Africa.

Along these same lines, how do you avoid unilateral action if no one will join you to make it multilateral? Who has volunteered to help us stop Communism in Cuba? Who has raised a hand and said help was coming for Laos, Tibet, Korea, or anywhere else?

I trust Sen. Fulbright doesn't mean that if no one comes to your aid in putting out a fire you are

supposed to let the flames go on burning until nothing is left.

The Senator also appears to be against defending the periphery of freedom well. If you don't defend the edges, what is to prevent the edges from finally becoming the middle?

(3) How does the United States go about allowing the world to picture the upcoming Berlin crisis as a heading charge between two stubborn men—Pres. Kennedy and Khrushchev—both armed with nuclear power, and each determined to collide?

The Berlin ultimatum was delivered by Khrushchev. He rattled the swords. He put the train on the track and gave it a shove. Yet the world now sees it as a battle between two stubborn men, with the blame equally divided. If the finale is war, then Kennedy will share the blame. It doesn't make sense.

(4) If Russia fears Germany so much—and it is obvious a powerful Germany is all that Russia is afraid of—why is a threatened free world so wary of making Germany strong?

Does anyone believe that Germany, armed with everything in

CHEESE SUPPORT UP

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The government is stepping up its price support of American cheese. Uncle Sam bought only 236,000 pounds of cheese in the year ended March 31, but since then has purchased nearly four million pounds. The support price currently is 36 cents a pound, about three cents higher than a year ago.

SCOTCH POPULAR

NEW YORK (UPI) — Americans drank 7,919,000 cases of Scotch in 1960, an all-time record, and by 1964 they'll be knocking it off at a rate of 19 million cases a year, according to a distillery director from Scotland. The director, Tom Scott of George Halcantope & Sons, Ltd., said Scotch also is getting more popular in Europe.

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Putting the question of Communist China's admission to the UN on the General Assembly agenda for debate this September can lead to one of the grandest ballups in the world organization's 16 years of existences.

When a new nation wants admission to the UN, it submits a formal application. This signifies its willingness to abide by the obligations of the UN charter.

Communist China — having knowingly but not admittedly violated the charter by supporting the North Korean invasion of South Korea in 1950—doesn't want to come into the world organization in this way by the front door. So there never has been and probably never will be such an application for membership.

The simple fact of the matter is that the Chinese Communist don't want in the United Nations as long as the National Chinese gov-

ernment on Formosa sits in the world organization as representative of the Chinese people.

So the objective of Red China is to substitute itself for Nationalist China as the sole representative of the Chinese people. The Reds don't accept the "two-China" theory. Their reason for this is technical but understandable so far as gaining admission to the UN is concerned.

Article Four of the UN charter, specifies that admission shall be made by the General Assembly on recommendation of the Security Council.

So if Red China tried to get into the UN the normal way, as a new member, it would first have to clear the Security Council. Nationalist China now sits on the Security Council as one of the four permanent members. It can therefore block the admission of Communist China by casting a veto against its application for membership.

The Communist bloc countries therefore argue that sending Red China in the UN is not a question of membership, but a question of credentials. They want the China membership in the UN—including Security Council seat now held by the Nationalist Republic of China on Formosa—transferred by vote in the General Assembly to the Communist People's Republic of China on the mainland.

This is what the debate will be all about if the question is placed on the agenda by a majority plus one of the countries present and voting in the General Assembly. Representatives of countries who are absent or who abstain from voting will not have their nations counted in the total vote.

In view of the uncertain positions of the neutral nations and the 25 African members, eight of whom actually recognize the Chinese Communist government, it is impossible to predict how the vote would go on a question of substituting Red China for Nationalist China as the Chinese charter member of the UN.

If the question is ruled procedural, it will be decided by majority vote in the General Assembly. If it is ruled substantive, a two-thirds majority will be required.

For the past ten years the United States has been able to keep

the question of Chinese membership off the UN General Assembly agenda. The record vote was 49 opposing, 27 favoring, seven abstaining, in 1957. Last year the vote was down to 42 opposing, 34 favoring, 22 abstaining.

The Kennedy administration has made no official statement beyond President Kennedy's reply to a press conference question April 12. He said flatly, "The United States is going to meet its commitment to the people on Formosa." Then he added:

"But—and that we had no—cannot make a final judgment as to what the vote on the moratorium will be on the admission of Red China." This garbled sentence was later corrected to read, "We have not made a final judgment as to what the vote on the moratorium will be on the admission of Red China."

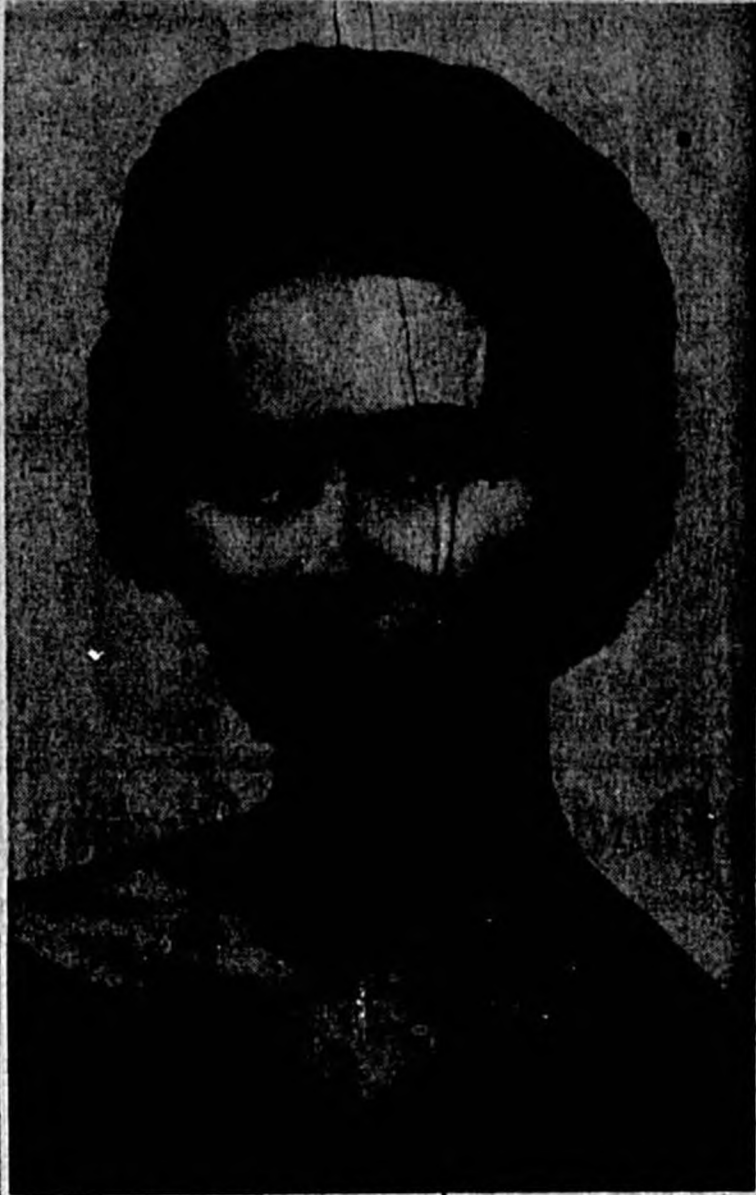

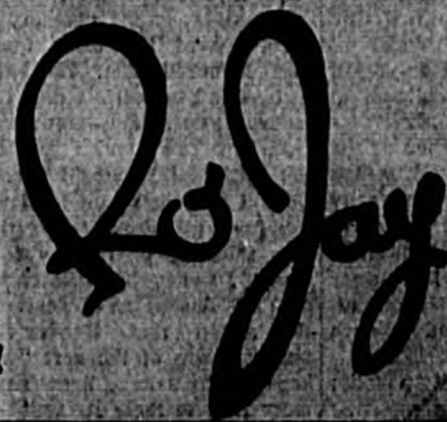

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The National League, which specializes in beating the American League whenever their All-Star games go into extra innings, trailed the Junior circuit today by only a 16-14 margin in the 30-year series.

Roberto Clement saw to that Tuesday when he hit a single to right center which sent Willie Mays home from second base in the 10th inning for a 3-4 squeaker over the Americans.

The clutch blow, Clement's second in the error-riddled contest, cut the American League's lead to two games. It also marked the 10th win in the last 16 All-Star contests for the older circuit, still unbeaten in extra frames.

In 1959 the National won, 6-3, on Red Schoendienst's homer to close things out after 14 innings. They went 12 before downing the American N-L, in 1958.

A total of seven errors was registered to set a mark for miscues. The second half of the double feature moves on to Boston's Fenway Park on July 21. And there will be no complaints from American League players who declared that Candlestick Park's tricky winds were strictly for the spectators.

"The conditions were as near impossible as anything I have ever seen," manager Paul Richards said during the locker room wade.

And Stu Miller, who came out the winner although his mates committed four errors behind him during the last two innings, observed, "It sure is tough to pitch in this park."

Warren Spahn was the hero in the first three frames as he retired all nine Americans who faced him while striking out Norm Cash, Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris in succession. Mickey went hitless in three trips.

For the first eight innings, the National League hurling staff of Spahn, Bob Purkey and Mike McCormick held the powerful Americans to one hit. That was a pinch homer in the sixth by Harmon Killebrew.

Death Secretive As Life For One-Time Spy

WESTMINSTER, Md. (UPI)—The news magazine's writers were trying to whoop it up at the New York Christmas party, so the legend goes, when out of the festivities walked one man.

And soon when others followed, their eyes narrowly on the clock and the deadline not far off, they found an unmasked present—their

decks. The man had written all that needed to be said for the holiday issue of Time.

Now only the legend remains. The man, Whittaker Chambers, 60, died at his farm home near Westminster Sunday.

His dying was as secretive as his days as a Communist courier before World War II.

What his testimony did lives after him—as Alger Hiss and Richard M. Nixon can testify.

It was a Federal Court jury that convicted Hiss, the brilliant young State Department officer, of perjury for denying that he turned State Department documents over to a Soviet spy apparatus. But it was Chambers' testimony that convinced the jury Hiss was lying.

And it was as head of the subcommittee probing the Hiss affair that Nixon, then a little-known member of the House of Representatives, was launched on the career that eventually carried him to the Republican nomination for president.

Death came to Chambers after a series of heart attacks, the last of which killed him before a doctor could reach his bed. The family doctor was called at 6:30 a. m. Sunday, and by the time she arrived at his home a half-hour later, Chambers had died.

Funeral director John Myers Jr. announced the death Tuesday at the request of the family.

Major Defense Contractors Ready To Ban Discrimination

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Eight major defense contractors were ready today to give the government their pledge that they will bar racial discrimination against workers in their plants.

President Kennedy planned to announce a White House ceremony marking these new milestones in federal efforts to assure equal job opportunity to companies doing business with the government.

The President's Committee on Equal Employment Opportunity, headed by Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, worked out agree-

ments to be signed by executives of these companies:

Western Electric; the Boeing Company; Douglas Aircraft Co.; General Electric Co.; the Martin Company; North American Aviation; Radio Corporation of America; and the United Aircraft Corporation.

These agreements follow a peace setting document signed earlier this year by the Lockheed Aircraft Corporation, which Kennedy hailed as a big breakthrough in the civil rights field.

Lockheed, before signing its agreement, had been the subject of complaints that Negroes were being discriminated against in its plant at Marietta, Ga.
