

House approves sweeping crime prevention package

TALLAHASSEE. Fla. (UPI) -The House's approval of Speaker Jon Mills' sweeping crime prevention package, which ranges from preschool programs to gun control, has won praise from Attorney General Bob Butterworth.

The package embraces Mills' philosophy of attacking crime on several fronts, including prevention, education, incarceration and post-incarceration supervision. It runs from special assistance for low-income 4-year-old children at risk of dropping out to tougher sentences for career criminals.

"We not only talked about putting (criminals) away, but we talked about how to prevent them even coming into the system," said bill sponsor James Burke, D-Miami. "We talked not only about jail care, but we talked about child care."

"This is probably one of the finest days for law enforcement in the history of the state," Butterworth said after the House passed the package Thursday "I've never seen so many good bills pass out at one time.

The crime package was incorporated in four major bills (HBs 1574, 1649, 1653 and 614). Those bills in turn incorporated more than 65 related proposals originally contained in separate

Major provisions of the bill include revising the sentencing guidelines to give more leeway to judges when sentencing criminals. That sole provision is expected to cost \$37 million this

Upon going into the back yard again, officers reportedly met Mrs. Bogucki. who gave them permission to search the house.






The rains came, may come again

A lightning strike lifted a house up in Conn. off its foundation, blew a hole in a wall, knocked doors off hinges and rearranged furniture, but left the occupants unhurt as they played gin rummy. The house is near a country

club in an area that has been lashed by lightning four times in the last five years.

'But I've never seen anything like this anywhere," said Fire Chief David Davin. "After I made sure everyone was OK, I immediately called for a photographer to take pictures of the damage."

The lightning struck in the parlor Wednesday, near where the occupants were playing cards after breakfast, and left a hole in the wall and blew two wooden cellar doors off their hinges. Strong thunderstorms con-

tinued pounding much of the Pacific Northwest this morning as showers drenched Alabama and northern Florida and a cold front marched across the upper Midwest.

Longwood landscape ordinance passes first hurdle

LONGWOOD—A proposed comprehensive landscape ordinance that has been in the works for a year and a half has passed the first hurdle toward becoming law with the addition of last minute revisions. A public hearing is scheduled for June 6.

The city commission unanimously gave tentative approval to the landscape ordinance at a special meeting Monday night.

One of the changes made on the suggestion of City Commissioner Henry Hardy, who operates a local tree service,

minimizes and in most cases prohibits, digging, filling or trenching under the dripline of trees except with a waiver from the city administrator.

It would require contractors installing underground utility lines to tunnel under the feeder roots to protect specimen or historic trees. City Planner Chris Nagel said it will be up to the city commission to define and designate by resolution which trees fall into such categories.

Commissioner Richard Bullington expressed concern that contractors would not know

work because they would not know which trees are protected. He said it would cost about \$100 a foot to tunnel under a root system and that contractors would not only have to un-derstand the law, but also make a judgment call to submit a bid for work.

Seminole County Forester Mike Martin said the question of trenching under trees or tunneling under root systems is controversial and can be expensive. but with historical trees it can be

Martin said the jack and bore method is an involved and expensive process and is not needed for all trees.

Martin agreed to lend his expertise to help the city determine which trees are eligible for the historic or specimen designation.

Other revisions changed the person authorized to grant waivers from the "city planner or his designee" to "city administrator or his designee" and include a requirement that new trees be

City Administrator Gene De-Marie said he is "impressed" with the comprehensive ordinance. "It goes a long way to maintain the esthetics of an already beautiful community.' he said.

Although long and complex. Nagel called the ordinance fair. He said although it sets higher minimum landscape requirements, it allows developers more flexibility in the types of plants and trees that can be used for a particular site. It gives more

He said the buffer yard requirements in the new ordinance were recommended by the Land Planning Agency and a lot of public input. Nagel said previously when conflict came about because of a proposed shopping center next to single-family residential area, it was necessary to negotiate with the developer to get him to go beyond minimum requirements in order to make the project more acceptable to neighboring

Architects sent back to the drawing board

SANFORD — Seminole County Commissioner Bill Kirchhoff said "no" to a high-tech \$50,000 audio-visual system for the proposed remodeling of the county commission chambers. sending architects back to the drawing board for the entire project.

When project architect Don Devernardo explained the system included cameras to film county meetings for public records, in-desk monitors for commissioners and two display monitors for the audience to view display materials, Kirchhoff suggested changing the entire chamber seating plan to accomodate one projection screen that could be seen by both commissioners and the audience.

"You could probably save some money if you do this," Kirchhoff said.

Other commissioners at Tuesday's workshop suggested Devernardo consider the suggestions and bring back additional design proposals in two

weeks. Devernardo suggested the state-of-the-art system in conjunction with the planned expansion of the existing com-

mission chambers. The proposed forum-style seating arrangement of the expansion project would be more of a baseball field-shaped room, with the audience seated in a semicircle facing the board. instead of the current rectangular room. The forum style was favored by commissioners in March because it offered more scats with better visibility.

The forum-style would have added about 70 more seats, bringing the total to 186.

However, Kirchholf suggested moving the audience to the back of the chamber and leaving the commissioners in a front corner to allow both commissioners and the audience to see a single projection screen. Assistant County Administrator Montye Beamer said moving the audience scatting may reduce the number of seats back to the size of the current chambers.

Devernardo said the changes were possible, but "not as high-tech" as the original proposal.

The entire remodeling is expected to cost between \$500,000 and \$600,000 and will be funded with proceeds from the 1987 \$10 million capitol improvement bond sale.

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EDITORIALS We won't win until it's won

Any attempt to answer the question "Are we winning the war on drugs?" is certain to generate more hard emotion than hard data. The president says the country is making progress because "drug seizures are at an all-time high," but as Secretary of Health and Human Services Otis Bowen reminded him the other day, that number can be easilyperhaps more easily—be used to prove precisely the reverse. When there is no market for drugs, drug seizures will be at an all-time low.

Numbers in this field are notoriously unreliable: the number of addicts, the number of children who've traded one or another drug, the price of drugs on the street. But there's no more ground for proclaiming victory today than there was for the politically fueled hysteria about the drug menace that began at just about the same time before the last election.

What is certain is that the country needs far more resources for drug treatment, as Bowen pointed out, and a much greater willingness to tolerate treatment facilities in local neighborhoods. It also needs still more intensive educational programs and, more fundamental, it needs to create the hope and the opportunities for which drugs are so commonly an alternative. To pretend, as the president has done, that things are working. or that just tougher laws are enough, is political smoke.

We should have learned from hard experience that in the long term, the investment that's not made in education, housing and hope eventually has to be made in law enforcement and prisons. There are signs, which again must be qualified by the unreliability of the numbers, to indicate that among the affluent, drug use has started to level off. There have been previous waves that followed a similar path: experimentation and high-status consumption among the fancy people, followed by distillusionment and some understanding of the harmful effects, followed by decline in both the status and use of a particular drug. That message may be starting to come through again. But that hardly suggests that the war has been won-neither among the middle class nor. certainly, among the disillusioned poor. To accomplish this is going to require a great deal more, including money. It is hard to just say no when there is so little to which to say

Don't close doors


Robert Bork has left the federal bench for the lecture circuit, and probably to write a book. But the legacy of his ill-fated nomination to the U.S. Supreme Court lives on. The controversy surrounding his nomination and the extremes of rhetoric voiced on both sides have prompted a task force to suggest that future confirmation hearing be held in secret. That idea should be rejected just as strongly

The proposal comes from the Task Force on Judicial Selection, chaired by former New York Gov. Hugh Carey. Its report said open hearings can distort a candidate's qualifications, adding that "the confirmation process has become dangerously close to looking like the electoral process."

Certainly the Bork nomination generated more hype than necessary, on both sides. The campaign-like atmosphere was incidental to the televised hearings, and the hyperbole was designed to influence members of the Senate Judiciary Committee. But if senators cannot insulate themselves from such pressures. maybe they shouldn't be in Congress. Holding Supreme Court confirmations behind closed doors won't stop the pressure.

Open, televised meetings give the public a chance to see how a nominee reacts as a person. Whether that person exudes arrogance, as Judge Bork did, or a more reasoned sense of compassion, as did Anthony Kennedy. Good government flourishes best in the open: Supreme Court confirmation hearings deserve to stay there.

White House puts astrology in limelight

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The White House has put an official imprimatur on the practice of astrology.

First lady Nancy Reagan's interest in the occult and President Reagan's high degree of superstition are not so unusual in a world of unknowns. But raising the interest to a point of legitimacy casts the White House in a different light and brings into question whether ratio-nality, logic and of course politics, guide decision-making.

Former White House chief of staff Don Regan. albeit disgruntled, chronicles in his new book, For the Record: From Wall Street to Washington," an amazing amount of intrusion of astrology into the day-to-day operations of the Oval Office. Since the truth will make you free. that bit of knowledge is an important contribu-

tion to the history of the Reagan administration. Regan, who targets Mrs. Reagan throughout his memoirs, wrote that the first lady called the shots on the scheduling of travel, speeches and news conferences for the president. Since they

were at odds on the timing of such events from the start with Regan assuming the total power that a passive president deferred to him, there was bound to be a clash.

The modus operandi also accrued to Joan Quigley, a San Francisco astrologer, incredible power to manipulate official activities, well meant and unintentional as that might be.

News syndicate officials say that they can eliminate any feature except for horoscopes. They are read by the true believers, the skeptics and the hopefuls, all in search of a better future.

But when it comes to running the government. Americans have a right to hope that decisions are based on armioads of facts. thinking through the issues. listening to all sides and taking into account how best the public will

Doing the nation's business by astrology puts the United States in a bizarre class that can only be damaging.

It is true that the president has said that he has never made policy decisions on the position of the stars. But no one in the White House has denied that on the periphery the timing of

Reagan's public pronouncements, holding of a news conference and travel have been affected by the first lady's worries and fears.

Mrs. Reagan is influential in her husband's affairs as she has a right to be. She has his interest at heart and the country's. If anything, her advice has been sounder in terms of nudging the president to be more amenable to peace negotiations in Nicaragua, arms control and to move away from the right wing issues as he prepares to leave the White House.

It is to her credit that she has pushed him in the direction of a more conciliatory attitude on the international front. Above all she has tried to shield him from the repercussions of the Iran-Contra scandal. Her whole intent was to save the shattered presidency in the last months of 1986 and all of 1987 as disclosures of a private government run by the top aides on the national security staff came to light.

While Reagan was calling Lt. Col. Oliver North a "national hero" after he fired him for diverting funds to the Contras from Iranian arms sales, the first lady was less complimentary.

JEFFREY HART Moral truths are set

In this age of cheap relativism. when every form of behavior is merely a "life-style" or "sexual preference." It is bracing to know that there once was something else-and therefore could be again. As T.S. Eliot once remarked, no cause is ever lost, because no cause is ever wholly won-and so. perhaps, we can do something about moral relativism, a polite term for moral nihilism.

These thoughts are elicited by a wonderful anecdote in the book "The Wise Men: Six Friends and the World They made," by Walter Isaacson and Evan Thomas, a book about such WASP aristocrats as Dean Acheson, Robert Lovett. Averell Harriman, and Charles Bohlen, who made mistakes, indeed, but knew who they were and were not afraid to shoulder respon-

Back in the 1920s Harvard law professor Felix Frankfurter sent the young lawyer Dean Acheson to work as an aide to Supreme Court Justice Louis Brandeis. The young Acheson actually wrote many of Brandels's opinions.

But Brandeis was not a relativist or a nihilist. There follows a beautiful anecdote.

'At the core of Brandeis' analytical approach was the avoidance of a mushy moral relativism. Like Acheson, the Justice believed that laws necessarily had to fellect the shifting attitudes of society. Yet both men believed, with a firmness that sometimes produced a conflict with their pragmatic instincts, that certain trancendent moral principles remained immutable. Acheson once took Professor Manley Hudson of Harvard to see Brandels. Hudson asserted that moral principles were simply generalizations to be made from the prevailing mores of a time. 'The eruption was even more spectacular than I anticipated," Acheson later wrote. "The Justice wrapped the mantle of Isaiah around himself, dropped his voice a full octave, jutted his eyebrows forward in a most menacing way. and began to prophesy,' Morality was truth; and truth had been revealed to man in an unbroken. continuous flow by the great prophets and poets of all time."

What a shocking statement from the Jewish Supreme Court Justice from Kentucky, after whom Brandeis University is named. It is doubtful that Justice Brandels would be allowed to speak at Brandels University today.

Yet the great judge was surely correct. Not everything is a matter of "Lifestyle." The hard pillars of right and wrong have been established for dozens of centuries. and in the best philosophy and

Industry comes back

WASHINGTON (NEA) - Deep inside the federal government's most recent report on nationwide employment trends is evidence of an intriguing development - job creation in the manufacturing sector has boomed in recent months.

Employment opportunities in manufacturing increased by a respectable 12,000 in March and an impressive 44,000 in April, according to the Bureau of Labor-Statistics.

That is noteworthy because in the rush to a post-industrial society dominated by a service sector. old-fashioned manufacturing is supposed to be morthund.

Indeed, the manufacturing sector's share of total employment nationally has declined inexorably for almost four decades, from more than 30 percent in the early 1950s. to less than 20 percent in the late 1980%

Even during the recent surge in manufacturing employment. growth was far more rapid in the service sector, where 201,000 jobs were created in March and another 117,000 in April.

But a new study commissioned by the Eastman Kodak Co., "The Case for Manufacturing in America's Future," provides an important perspective on the continuing importance of manufacturing.

"A strong manufacturing sector is essential to the health of the overall economy and our future standard of living." says Eastman Kodak Chairman Colby H. Chandler in his introduction. The report debunks what Chandler describes as "the popular myth that it is inevitable and desirable our country enter a post-industrial, service-based

Manufacturing industries account for only about 20 percent of the country's gross domestic product but are responsible for more than 95 percent of the research and development expenditures crucial to

Manufacturing jobs consistently pay 20 percent to 30 percent more than those in the service and trade sectors. The average hourly wage in manufacturing is \$15.70, compared with less than \$12.20 for service.

Although manufacturing employment has declined by almost 2 million jobs from its 1979 peak. goods-producing industries still employ 19 million members of the country's civilian work force of 115 million people.

"The American economy is unlikely to succeed in meeting the twin goals of full employment and higher living standards unless the competitiveness of the manufacturing sector is restored." warns the report prepared by economists at Harvard University and the MIT.

But Chandler says the manufacturing sector is endangered by "the largest budget and trade deficits in our history.

One measure of that trade deficit: Between 1970 and 1985, this country's exports of manufactured goods increased at an annual average of only 3.4 percent. The comparable figures for the same period are 9 percent for Japan and an astounding 13 percent for newly developing nations such as South Korea, Taiwan, Brazil and Mexico. Those recently developing countries no longer specialize in exporting textiles, clothing, footwear and other low-cost items. South Korea, for example, now is shipping substantial quantities of Hyundai autos. Leading Edge computers and other sophisticated products into this country

"Import penetration ratios, especially in capital goods industries, have risen sharply. Without the major defense buildup which is now coming to an end, the manufacturing sector would have contracted significantly," the report

SCIENCE WORLD Study links **Asbestos** with SIDS

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Signs of asbestos were found in the lungs of nearly half of 15 babies who died of sudden infant death syndrome, indicating the babies may have had difficulty clearing for ign particles from their lungs, a recent study

Autopsies of 46 infants in the Texas study showed about seven, or 46.6 percent of the 15 children who died of sudden infant death syndrome, had ashestos bodies in their lungs, compared to 9.7 percent of the 31 babies who died of other

Sudden infant death syndrome, or SIDS, claims the lives of more than 6,000 babies per year in the United States, but the exact causes of the disease remain a mystery. Researchers suspect breathing pro-blems may be involved, and the finding of ashestos bodies in the babies' lungs sopports this suspicion and may help explain the problem more precisely.

Ashestos bodies, considered a sign of exposure to asbestos, are an iron-protein complex secreted by cells to coat inhaled asbestos fibers.

Most of the infants studied were born and lived in the Galveston County, Texas, area and ranged in age from one month to 27 months.

Dr. Abida Haque, of the Universiof Texas Medical Branch at Galveston, who conducted the study, said the asbestos levels found in SIDS bables' lungs were relatively low and probably did not cause their deaths. But Haque said her findings provide evidence that the lungs of SIDS victims do not clear foreign particles as efficiently as other babies lungs.

We know that children who are prone to SIDS have patterns of difficult breathing during their sleep. It sort of makes sense that they are not able to clear materials through their lungs the same as normal children." Haque said.

The pathologist said some theories on the cause of SIDS have suggested the infants have an underlying, abnormal lung physiology.

The three babies without SIDS who had asbestos bodies in their lungs all died of broncho-pulmonary dysplasia - a disease of premature infants involving structural problems with the respiratory system.

No asbestos bodies were found in the lungs of children who died of pneumonia, brain injury or other

Researchers said that in addition to physiological abnormalities. greater exposure to asbestos in the air or water may account for the asbestos bodies in the babies' lungs.

Jesse Jackson looks to 1992 and beyond

WASHINGTON - An oft-asked question still hangs over the Democratic Party: What does Jesse Jackson really want? The answer, according to intimates, is that he really wants to be president.

Most likely, Jackson will fall short of winning the Democratic nomination. But his 1988 campaign is merely another lap in a longer race. He is looking down the road. associates say, to 1992 or 1996.

His immediate objective, they tell us, is to open the presidential election process to blacks and increase their political clout. He has brought black voters swarming to the polls. In some states, close to 100 percent of eligible blacks have registered to vote.

His skin color has probably caused a higher percentage of black voters to vote for him than white voters to vote against him. Yet his appeal to black voters goes deeper than skin color.

The sight of Jesse Jackson standing tall among the white candidates, holding his own in the presidential debates, has stirred black America. As the first black presidential contender to be taken seriously, he is viewed as a heroic figure assaulting another barrier.

His next goal, associates confide, is to strengthen black leverage within the Democratic Party. At a closed-door meeting with party elders, he repeated his claim that he didn't want to be regarded as a black candidate. But participants told us a "sense of race" dominated the discussion.

Jackson told the party leaders that they shouldn't fear him. He doesn't intend to blackmail the Democratic Party, he assured them. If he should lose the presidential

nomination, he said, he wouldn't form a third party or stage a protest. He would do nothing, he promised, to divide or disrupt the party.

One participant suggested that Jackson moderate some of his views to attract wider support. This was as close as the party elders came to saying to Jackson's face what they have been whispering behind his back — that he would be a political liability because of his wild spending proposals and Robin Hood rhetoric more than because of his race, and that his nomination not only would endanger the ticket, but would bring down congressional and gubernatorial candidates with

But Jackson rejected the suggestion. The message he is delivering. he said, is in the true liberal tradition of Franklin D. Roosevelt. Jackson made it clear that he would remain a loyal Democrat within the party structure. What he would expect in return, he implied, would be political IOUs, which he will cash in the next time he runs.

He has discovered that his message is beginning to strike home among unemployed white workers and dispossessed white farmers. So Jackson is willing to wait, if necessary, for the economic recession or depression that he expects will come, associates explain. This will create more distillusioned whites who will pay more attention to his message than to his race.

Meanwhile, Jackson is stepping up his campaign. He is investing most of his money in the last big primary states, California and New Jersey. He sees California as the springboard into the Democratic convention. And he wants to go to Atlanta with enough leverage to collect a lot of IOUs.

Eight killed, dozens trapp when furniture factory collapses

MEXICO CITY (UPI) - Rescue teams with dogs searched today for survivors in the wreckage of a five-story furniture factory that collapsed during a thunderstorm in the central Mexican city of Aguascalientes, killing at least eight people and trapping dozens more.

The Red Cross reported 69 people were injured - 15 seriously — and they were pulled from the rubble of the JM Romo factory in the hours after the collapse Thursday.

"Some of the youths begged to be saved as rescuers neared them but others screamed that they wanted to die because they couldn't stand the pain." one witness said.

There were conflicting reports on the number of people killed or still trapped in the demolished factory, where police said 80 to 90 people were working at the time of the

Late Thursday, police said 14 people were killed, then lowered the number to eight without explanation and reported one worker still trapped. Red Cross rescue worker Eduardo Zapata said 18 people were found dead and three still were trapped alive beneath the tons of rubble when the police and the army scaled off the factory late Thursday.

A police official said by telephone that the Red Cross's death toll was wrong.

Withdrawing Soviets attacked

KABUL, Afghanistan (UPI) - U.S. armed Moslem rebels have warned they will mount extensive operations to coincide with the beginning of the Soviet withdrawal from Alghanistan this weekend and already have besieged the southeastern city of Kandahar.

Western diplomats said Thursday that Soviet forces in Kandahar, 275 miles southwest of Kabul, are under heavy attack and face severe problems in withdrawing from the city, which is expected to become the first to fall to the guerrillas after the Soviets leave.

Noriega denies latest reports

PANAMA CITY, Panama (UPI) — An aide to Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega said he has held eight secret meetings with U.S. negotiators but that the Americans had not yet offered to drop drug trafficking charges against Noriega in exchange for his resignation.

Romulo Escobar Bethancourt, a senior Noriega adviser and his representative in talks with the United States, said Thursday he has discussed the federal indictments against Noreiga with Michael Kozak, a U.S. deputy assistant secretary of state responsible for negotiating a deal under which Noriega would step down.

Bethancourt said in an interview that Norlega took part in the first two of eight secret meetings with Kozak, but was not at recent discussions.

INF treaty details finalized

BRUSSELS, Belgium (UPI) - Secretary of State George Shultz arrived today to brief NATO allies on agreements with the Soviet Union on disputes delaying Senate ratification of the Intermediate Nuclear Forces treaty.

In Geneva Thursday, Shultz and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze said all details of the treaty abolishing a whole class of nuclear weapons had been completed with the signing of a diplomatic note.

But a senior aide to Shultz said later it took a marathon negotiating session that did not end until 7 a.m. today in Geneva to settle a new point raised by the Soviets regarding treaty verification.

Fuel plant reopening sparks controversy

Alarmed officials, led by Gov. Richard Bryan, explored a legal fight Thursday against Kerr McGee's unexpected reopening of its rocket fuel plant despite unanswered safety questions.

Authorities want Kerr McGee to keep production halted until state fire and safety investigators determine why nearby Pacific Engineering blew up May 4 in a series of town-ripping explosions that killed two company executives and injured more than 300 other people.

Kerr McGee and Pacific Engineering, two miles apart, were the only U.S. producers of

ammonium perchlorate, an oxidizer needed for solid rocket fuel. Pacific Engineering was destroyed by the accident.

The Henderson City Council called an emergency meeting, where city attorney Shauna Hughes was to report on ways the city could force Kerr McGee to shut down.

Government abandons efforts to develop total artifical heart

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The government is giving up its effort to help develop a permanent totally artificial heart. throwing its money instead to research on implantable devices to boost a patient's own organ.

The National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute announced Thursday that with regard to four development contracts awarded in January, it would "exercise the option of not continuing these contracts beyond Sept. 31, 1988."

"This action is being taken to permit effort and resources to be focused on clinical assessment of totally implantable left ventricular assist systems," the institute explained in a statement.

Officials said a good deal of research already is accumulated on the assist devices and they soon will be ready for human tests. The apparent conclusion was that the permanent totally artificial devices showed little

Plan could cut phone bills

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Consumers could save \$1.6 billion on telephone bills in four years under a government plan to cap and then cut rates gradually for long-distance

The proposal by the Federal Communications Commission would limit how much American Telephone & Telegraph Co. and local phone outfits can charge their customers for interstate calls. In return, the companies would be allowed to increase profits, currently limited by government regulations, if they could reduce costs and boost productivity.

The plan announced Thursday by the FCC would pass along some of the business efficiency savings through an annual "consumer productivity dividend," or an automatic reduction in rates. If approved in final form by the commission this year, it would take effect in April 1989.

Killer wants execution 'at once'

OZARK, Ark. (UPI) - Ronald Gene Simmons, charged in the nation's worst family mass murder, asked a judge to grant him "the right to be at peace" by immediately executing him for two of 16 killings.

Simmons, 47, a retired Air Force sergeant, was convicted of murder Thursday, then sentenced to death by the jury for killing two people Dec. 28 in a 40-minute shooting rampage in the town of Russellville.

He still faces trial July 18 on charges he methodically killed 14 family members as they gathered for Christmas at his Ozark Mountain home in the days before the Russellville murders.

Simmons showed no emotion when the circuit court jury of seven men and five women returned its verdict after just 90 minutes of deliberation Thursday. After Judge John Patterson released the jury, Simmons' attorneys asked whether their client could make a statement, and Patterson reluctantly agreed.

"The news media did not cause or influence me in making this statement." Simmons said. "I want no action to be taken toward an appeal. Carry the sentence out at once, it was correct and proper.

Lbelieve in the death penalty. Anything short of death for me would be cruel and unusual punishment," he said. "I am of sound mind. Grant me the right to be at peace."

The judge looked flabbergasted for a moment, then said. "This is very unprecedented."

Little 'preacher' back in school

MARION, N.C. (UPI) - Duffey Strode, the Bible-toting boy whose fire-and-brimstone proclamations at his schoolhouse door have led to three suspensions, vowed to defy his principal and preach again today before his return

"Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel," Duffey said Thursday, explaining why he refuses to stop preaching at school. "You serpent, you generation of vipers, how can you escape the damnation of hell?"

The 10-year-old has been suspended from Eastwood Elementary three times for refusing to go to class on time. a requirement that interferes with his preaching. His third suspension ended today, and school officials were warning in advance that he would be suspended a fourth time unless he complied with the rules.

'We hope he or his parents change their minds and he will walk inside and take his seat with the other children." assistant principal Shirley Ramsey said Thursday. "But we probably will replay the scenario from two weeks ago. He will not be allowed to re-enter the school until he obeys the school's rules."

Archaeologists hope to dig'up missing priests

PENSACOLA (UPI) -Archaeologist Judy Bense admits her next dig is a bit weird," but if she finds coffins under one of the oldest churches in Florida it will finally settle a mystery about three "missing" priests.

"My job is to find the caskets and to tell them where those bodies are," said Bense about the two-month dig that begins Monday un-der the Old Christ Church. She said it's the first time she's looked for specific people. "It's weird."

Old Christ Church was built in 1832 and is the oldest Protestant church building in Florida still standing on its original site. In 1903 the congregation moved and the old church is now a museum.

Before the Civil War, three church rectors were burie under the floor. But legend has it soldiers looking for loot desecrated the graves and removed the bodies. And the congregation wants to know once and for all where they

"They were important people to the establishment of the Episcopalian church here, and they feel that it is wrong to have them misssaid Bense, an archaeologist at the University of West Florida.

Seven years after the church was built the first pastor, Joseph Saunders. died of Yellow Fever at the age of 39 and was buried in the vestry room under the spot where he often sat.

Seven years after Saunder's death the Rev. Frederick Peake died of natural causes and was buried under the floor. Then seven years after Peake's death the Rev. David Flower died of Yellow Fever at 33 years of age and was buried under the chancel.

The Rev. Madison Currin. current pastor of the church. said a story several generations old claimed Union troops uncarthed the coffins and reburied the remains in the back yard. Nobody has ever known for sure.

Currin and the congregamystery by sponsoring the \$38,000 excavation. If the remains are under the church markers will be placed on the floor. If the bones are in the yard they will be reinterned at the original sites under the floor.

Archaeology students from the University of West Florida, members of the Pensacola Archaeological Society and a group called "Treasure Hunters" are participating in the dig expected to last two months.

Strike collapses, Polish workers return

WARSAW, Poland (UPI) - Solidarity leader Lech Walesa was not among the thousands of workers who returned Thursday to their jobs in the Lenin Shipyard in Gdansk following the collapse of their nine-day strike that reportedly could result in \$50 million in losses to the Baltic Coast facility.

Two days after the collapse of the most serious strike since the outlawed union was founded in 1980. Walesa told a news conference that Solidarity had not initiated the labor uprising.

Walesa, who founded Solidarity and won the 1983 Nobel Peace Prize, works as an electrician at the shipyard. He asked for and was granted a month-long leave of absence from his job following the end of the strike.

"These latest strikes in Poland were not initiated by Solidarity. They were spontaneous. Solidarity could not have acted in any other way except to join in," he said in response to a question on the union's future.

'Imagine a strike somewhere without Solidarity. It would have gotten into a very awkward

situation had it failed to join, even though it was unprepared.

The official daily Zycle Warsawy said the nine-day stoppage at the Lenin Shipyard was expected to result in losses of up to \$50 million. The shipyard management, which had set Thursday as a deadline for the return to work of the 12,000 employees, said it expected to recover its losses by scheduling weekend overtime hours.

"It looked like a normal day today," said an eyewitness in Gdansk, confirming official reports about the thousands of employees returning to their jobs. "Workers began streaming back to the shipyard almost as if nothing had happened."

The strikes and protests in Poland were sparked by stiff price increases in food and other products as part of government reforms of the centralized economy. The demands later expanded to include political issues, such as Walesa's insistence on political pluralism in Poland and official recognition of Solidarity by the communist authorities.

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Nuclear test canceled

YUCCA FLAT, Nev. (UPI) - U.S. scientists blaming technical problems, canceled the third announced nuclear blast of 1988 for the second day in a row Thursday at the Nevada Test Site. where six Soviet scientists were visiting.

A Department of Energy spokesman did not immediately announce a new time for the explosion of the thermonuclear weapon buried 1,500 feet beneath the Nevada desert.

Scientists had been hoping to detonate the device at 7 a.m. following a previous 24-hour delay because of adverse winds.

Cancellation of the test was announced after unspecified trouble caused officials to send crews to trailers situated 540 feet from ground zero where cables connect to the device underground.

Exploding of the weapon, code-named "Schellbourne," was to be the third announced nuclear test this year.

It would have been the first time that a nuclear test was conducted while Russlans were within the boundaries of the classified compound, which is the center for the nation's nuclear weapons testing program.

A half-dozen Soviets scientists have been visiting the Nevada Test Site in preparation for a joint nuclear verification experiment later this year. They were to be confined at blast time to Mercury, a Nevada Test Site base camp, about 45 air miles from ground zero at Yucca Flat.

No nuclear experiments were conducted when Soviet scientists were at the test site in January to discuss nuclear weapons verification techniques or in 1972 when a Russian group toured sites of U.S. nuclear experiments conducted to develop peaceful purposes of nuclear power, such

as gas exploration or earth moving.

Government officials said "Schellbourne" would have a designed yield of less than 150 kilotons. The atomic bomb dropped on Hiroshima

to end World War II measured 13 kilotons. Previous announced U.S. tests this year were conducted on Feb. 15 and April 7.

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - The House Thursday voted to require auto emissions inspections in six Florida countles where air quality has slipped below federal standards.

Those six counties are Dade, Broward, Palm Beach, Hillsborough, Pinellas and Duval. If air quality in those areas is not brought up to standard, Florida could lose millions of dollars in federal highway and sewer projects ald.

The Clean Outdoor Air Law requires inspections of all cars registered in those six counties, though new cars would be exempt for the first year. Those inspections would begin in March 1990, and could cost no more than 8.10.

Lehder case goes to jury today

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) - Defense attorneys for alleged cocaine czar Carlos Lehder first argued that he was a legitimate businessman and then that he was framed by drug smugglers, U.S. Attorney Robert Merkle says.

"What you have seen in this case over the last several months has been what I'll refer to as the Jacksonville shuffle," Merkle said Thursday in closing arguments at Lehder's trial, said to be one of the most important drug cases in U.S. history.

Merkle said attorney Edward Shohat began the trial by saying Lehder was a businessman who wanted to develop a resort on Norman's Cay in the Bahamas. "Now he is saying. 'My client may be a bad boy, but he is not a part of this indictment." Merkle said.

Merkle was scheduled to finish his agruments today, followed by jury deliberations. U.S. District Judge Howell Melton said the jury would be sequestered and could deliberate through the weekend.

Eastern inspection completed

MIAMI (UPI) - A Federal Aviation Administration 30-day ramp inspection of Eastern Airlines planes revealed no major safety problems, a spokesman for the agency said, although it will be several weeks before a report is released.

"We did every plane an average of five times," said Jack Barker, an FAA spokesman in Atlanta. "There were no major discoveries found. I know that."

The inspections of the 267 planes in Eastern's fleet ended Thursday, one month after the program began April

Salmonella cases traced to eggs

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) - An outbreak of salmonella in the Northeast has been traced to uncracked eggs, a development that surprised public health officials who thought the problem was wiped out in the 1960s, researchers said.

Health officials have reported more than 21 separate outbreaks of egg-related salmonella infections in the last three years, mostly in seven Northeastern states, stemming from uncracked eggs.

"It's surprising because eggs have been a very safe food product for many years." Robert Tauxe of the Centers of Disease Control in Atlanta told a news conference Thursday during a meeting of the American Society of Microbiology.

GAINESVILLE (UPI) - Fuel cells, which in the past have been of use only in space or scientific laboratories, are being adapted by University of Florida engineers for clean and quiet operation of city buses.

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Democratic presidential front-runner Michael Dukakia solidified his support on Capitol Hill Thursday and bitterly denounced any moves by President Reagan to drop charges against Panama's Gen. Manuel Antonio Norlega.

Before taking his campaign to the West Coast, the Massachusetts governor made the rounds among leading Democrats in Congress and picked up a handful of endorsements.

Senate Democratic leader Robert Byrd of West Virginia and Rep. Dan Rostenkowski of Illinois, the head of the influential House Ways and Means Committee, were among those jumping on the Dukakis bandwagon.

Dukakis called Thursday a "very good day" and contended that a key goal of his was to show lawmakers that he recognized the need to work closely with Congress.

While basking in the new support, Dukakis also fired some tough new blasts at the Reagan administration, citing reports that it was considering dropping drug trafficking indictments against Norlega in exchange for his departure from power in Panama.

"I don't believe you drop indictments against suspected drug dealers and murderers," Dukakis declared, contending the administration was engaged in a poor effort "to salvage something" from its Central American policy.



As ticks are to dogs, so chinch bugs are to lawns

weather, the possibility of chinch bugs in St. Augustine grass is ever present. Plan now to control these pests before large, dead areas appear in your

Not all brown grass is a result of chinch bugs. Determine if your St. Augustine grass is infested with chinch bugs before applying control chemicals.

There are two ways to find chinch bugs. When they are present in sufficient numbers to cause yellowing and browning. they can be found by parting the grass at the margin of the injured areas and closely examining the thatch and base

With the arrival of hot of the grass. The bugs may be seen crawling over the grass and in heavy infestations can be seen crawling over sidewalks. The Immature chinch bugs are about the size of a pinhead and are bright red with a white band across the back. Adult bugs are one-lifth of an inch long, dark brown to black in color and have white wings that look like an "x" across its back.

> If you can't see chinch bugs by examining the grass, try the coffee can technique. To do this, cut both ends out of a coffee or similar size can and sink the can 2 to 3 inches into the soil at the edge of the yellowish area of grass. Then fill the can full of



water. If chinch bugs are present, they will float to the top of the standing water in a few minutes.

When testing for chinch bugs, don't be satisfied by just testing in one place. Try the test in several locations, provided you don't find them on your first

attempt. A mistake most often made by gardeners in testing for chinch bugs is that they test in areas where the grass is already brown or dead. Chinch bugs already have feasted on such grass and have headed for greener pastures. Therefore, make your test in green grass adjacent to the brown areas. The can should be sunk in green grass approximately 10-12 inches from the dead or brown St. Augustine grass.





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

The editors take a step up movie ladder

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) —
Question: What do Gabriella Cristiani, Claire Simpson and Thom Noble have in common?

Indeed, who are Cristiani. Simpson and Noble?

They are the last three winners of Academy Awards for best film editing - Cristiana for "The Last Emperor," Simpson for "Platoon" and Noble for "Witness."

They are members of perhaps the most important group of artists in movies who labor anonymously in small dark rooms either standing at movicolas or hunched over KEM editing machines monotonously going over thousands of feet of film. splicing, cutting, juxtaposing the work of their directors.

Movicolas are complex machines that project the film on a tiny 4-by-5-inch acreen. clattering along with the sound blaring. The new KEM is an aluminum complex of spools, sprockets and threading knobs that also projects on a small screen. Both have cutting devices to make splices.

The better the editor, the better the motion picture.

Often top movies become nominated for best picture of the year because of their editors. Yet their names are as unfamiliar to moviegoers as the names of newspaper editors to readers.

A handful of film editors have gone on to become internationally renown directors. Robert Wise, Mark Robson, Fred Zinnemann. Hal Ashby and David Lean among them.

One of the most noted editors in recent years was the late Verna Fields who was credited with saving director Steven Spielberg's "Jawa" from the scrap heap. Fields won the Oscar in 1975 and later became a vice president of Universal Pictures.

She was the studio's heroine when she brilliantly assembled tons of footage sent to her from Spielberg's locations on the East Coast during production.

Film, gditors our make or

They are a quiet breed whose symbols of labor are white cotton gloves with which they handle the film - to prevent fingerprints on the celluloid and to cut down wear and tear on their digits.

Many editors are content with their jigsaw puzzle work. fitting bits and pieces of scenes together, selecting the best, most artistic "takes" to give flow, pace and continuity to motion pictures.

Others aspire to become directors, taking full charge of movies, gaining prestige. higher pay and a high profile in the process.

One of the most in-demand editors in recent years is Mark Goldblatt, whose work on ac-tion films, "The Terminator," 'Rambo: First Blood Part II" and "Commando" earned him the opportunity for his first directorial assignment in "Dead Heat." a new comedy-thriller starring Treat Williams and Joe Piscopo.

It is a dream come true for Goldblatt who began his Hollywood career as a production assistant (gofer) for "B" filmmaker Roger Corman. fetching coffee and donuts for everyone clae on a movie directed by Joe Dante.

Dante eventually hired him to co-edit "Piranha," followed by a job editing Dante's "The Howling." In 1981 Goldblatt edited "Halloween II" and he

was on his way. He has worked for such other directors and producers as James Cameron, J. Lee Thompson, Joel Silver and Larry Gordon.

Like thousands of other craftsmen in Hollywood, Goldblatt once aspired to acting. A native New Yorker, he attended the University of Wisconsin and The London Film School, where he decided he would rather direct than

Bald, black-bearded, stocky and congental, Goldblatt sometimes is mistaken for actor-director Rob Reiner, who is about a foot taller than Goldblatt.

"Very few film editors become known to the public." he said. "By its very nature. editing is not flashy or romantic. It's hard work in a dark room.

But the power is mindboggling. An editor is entrusted with thousands and thousands of feet of film and he is expected to follow the director's vision in putting it together to make the best movie possible.

"He also has power over stars and actors. An editor can make a good actor look better or worse, and the same for bad actors.

"It is all a matter of his choices of which 'take' to use, when to cut from one actor to another or intersperse shots effectively to create the sort of feeling the director wants from a scene.

"We go through each day's work one frame at a time, running a scene through the movicola scores of times, marking the film as we go. It is often repetitive."

The editing process begins on the first day of production when the exposed film comes back from the lab and is deposited in the editor's lap.

He must agree with the director's overview of the film. understand its point of view and philosophic concept. While the director may have the final cut, it is the editor who has the first cut, a fact of which all editors are proud.

The director then goes about shooting a day's work, often printing dozens of shots or takes of a single scene master shot, two-shots, close-ups, over-the-shoulders, reverses - and a hundred other varieties of camera angles and points of view.

Those shots that are printed are shown the next day usually during the lunch break in a small studio projection room - to the director, editor, cameraman, actors, and often one of the producers. Showings of the raw footage, once called "rushes," are known as "dailles." loday fer during the screening of the disjointed, unconnected film, relying on the clapper board with its scene and shot number for reference.

The editor takes notes on the director's preferences. The director also listens to his editor's suggestions regarding additional shooting.

When the director returns to the set to resume shooting, the editor finds himself cutting the daily footage, following the director's preferences but also making his own contributions.

Some directors almost cut their film in the camera because their shots are so precise. They know exactly what they want and find it unnecessary to shoot excess footage. They can expose as little as 40,000 feet of film. Others shoot as much as 250,000 feet or more for a feature film. Some have gone as high a million feet.

"I'd say the average director shoots 15 or 20 feet of film for every foot used in the final print." Goldblatt said. "The average film runs about 110 minutes or approximately 10,000 feet."

That means the editor is un to his epiglottis in reels and reels of film that will be discarded. If he is working with a perfectionist who prints take after take of, say, a closeup of an actor reading a dozen lines of dialogue, the toil becomes enormous.

Most editors work with two assistants and an apprentice on a film, necessitated by the diminishing lead time between the end of production and release of the finished product. "The more film a director

shoots, the better the selection for the editor," Goldblatt said. Certainly, it is better for an

editor to be given too much film than too little. It is not uncommon for an

editor to find one scene following another without a transitional shot to bind the two together.

Malden gets mash notes

By Joan Hanauer UP! Peature Writer NEW YORK (UPI) - Karl Malden smiled broadly as he read the note sent to him by lans at an adjoining table in a New York restaurant - a dozen secretaries being taken

out to lunch by their boss. The note made it clear the boss was paying by American Express.

"This doesn't happen often to me," Malden said. "And you see, after 50 years, 20 years in the theater, 12 years making films, five years on 'The Streets of San Francisco' they only remember me for American Express commercials.

He tucked the note into his suit jacket and added, "I have to show this to my wife to prove to her I still have some charm feft."

The note bad interrupted a conversation about Malden's latest work in a distinguished career - the role of Adm. Elmo R. Zumwalt Jr., in "Hy Father, My Son," to air on CBS Sunday May 22, 9-11 p.m. Eastern time.

Keith Carradine plays his son, Elmo R. Zumwalt III, and the TV film is based on the book of the same name written by father and son.

It was Adm. Zumwalt, now retired, who ordered the use of the defoliant Agent Orange in Vietnam in 1968, He son was serving there as a Navy lieutenant. The son now suffers from two forms of cancer lymphoma and Hodgkins discase. Father and son believe It was caused by exposure to Agent Orange.

Malden and other members

of the production met the younger Zumwalt and asked him if he thought his father. knowing the results, would give that order again.

"Elmo said they discussed it and his father said he thought he would because he felt he had saved more lives than there are boys who have cancer," Maklen said.

We asked Elmo what he thought and he said. 'Because he did it, I'm still alive today. I think if he hadn't done it I'd be

"He said the ratio of boys being shot down was tremendous because the jungle came right down to the canals on the riverfronts, so the Victoong could come right up to the tip of the water and the boats were only 25 yards away. It was like a shooting gallery. They were popping them off left and right."

Malden said there were nine crewmen on young Zumwalt's swift boat and he is the only one with cancer. In addition, Malden said. Elmo's own son, who is now about 14, has a learning disability that the family believes is related to his father's exposure to Agent Orange.

Malden said the admiral had heard about a substance farmers in Kansas used for defoliation and had his aide investigate. The substance, Agent Orange, was reportedly very effective. What he did not know about was the rise in the incidence of cancer in the area after its use.

"Then, two years after the war, boys are calling him up and saying. Twe got cancer because of that damn stuff you used to clear the area," Malden said.

Maiden was very impressed with the tightness of the Zumwalt family, the loving and caring ties between father and son and their determination to lick cancer.

"This isn't a war picture," Malden said. "Only about a

third of it takes place in Vietnam. It's really a fatherson love story. You expect them to be kind of downbeat but they won't let you feel sorry for them."

'My Father, My Son" is the latest in an acting career that began when Malden came to New York in 1937. As he told

"My first play was 'Golden Boy' with the Group Theater. I was the assistant stage manager and played a very small part. There was a young man who also had a small part named Julie Garfield, who then went to Hollywood and became a big star as John Garfield. Then three or four years go by and I'm in a play. Sons and Soldiers,' and there's a young man who after the play went to Hollywood and became a big star -Gregory Peck.

"Then again a couple of years go by and I do a thing called "Streetcar Named Destre," and a young man in that play named Marlon Brando went off to Hollywood and became a big star. Then a couple of years go by and I do a play called 'The Desperate Hours,' and a young man in that play called Paul Newman goes to Hollywood and becomes a big star.

"And I kept saying, 'When is it going to happen to me?

It happened in 1947 in a film called "Boomerang," directed by Elia Kazan and starring Dana Andrews and Arthur Kennedy. He went on to appear in a long list of films, won an Oscar as best supporting actor in the film version of "Streetcar," and his latest is "Nuts," in which he plays Barbra Streisand's father.

For years he played Michael Douglas's detective partner in the TV series "Streets of San Francisco," which led to the American Express traveler's checks commercials.
