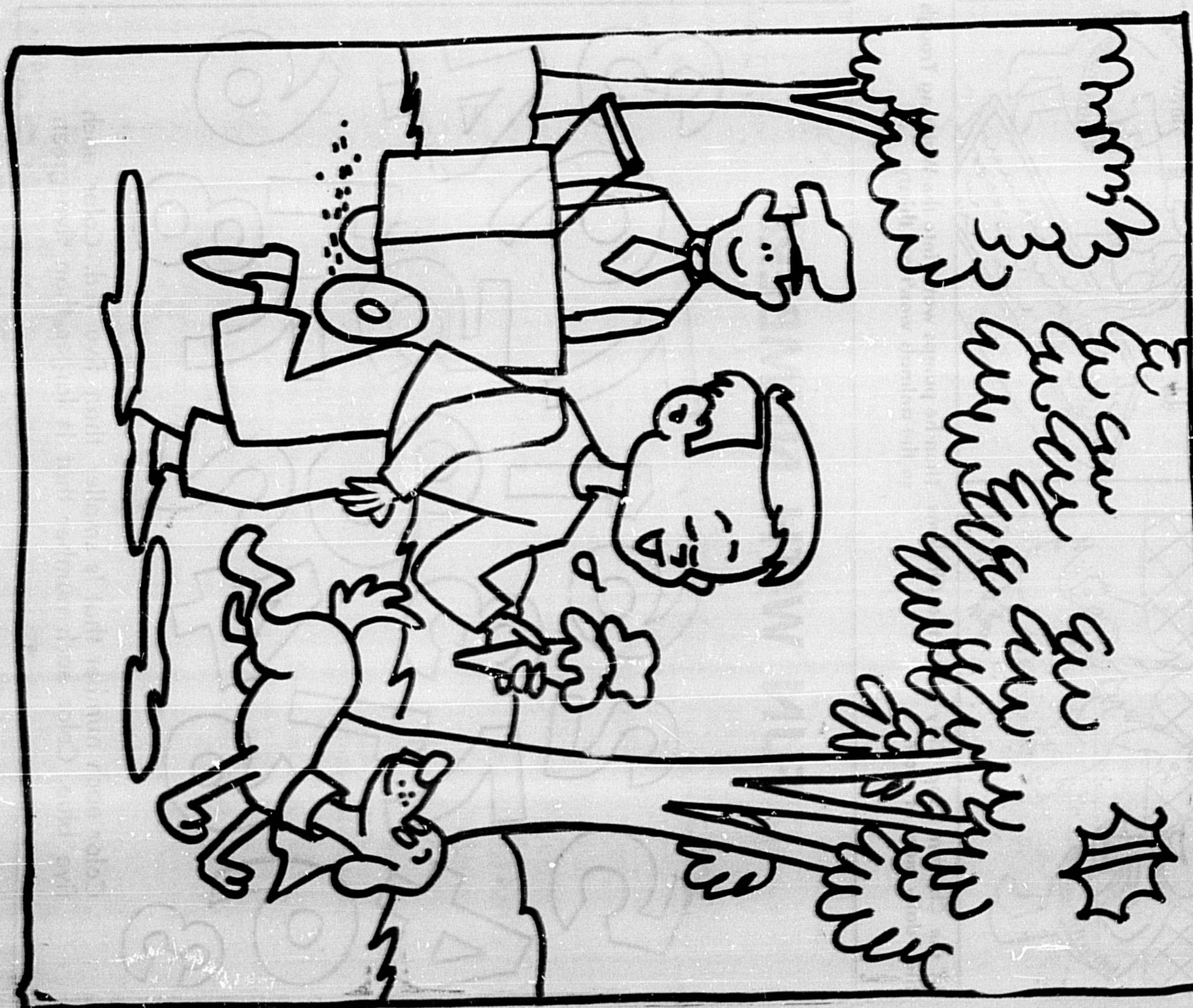

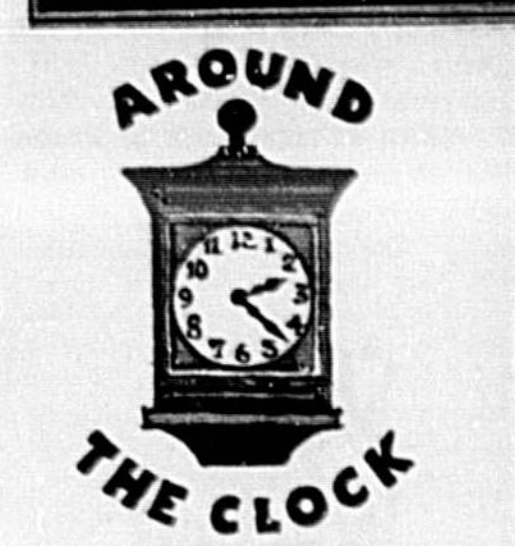

## Cabinet Will Give Answer Police Academy Decision Tuesday

"The third time it's a charm!"

With that old adage in mind a trio of Sanford and Seminole County officials will appear for the third time tomorrow at the meeting of the Florida State Cabinet to seek placing the State "Police Training Academy at Sanford Airport."

Sheriff John Polk, Sanford Mayor Lee P. Moore and Industrial Director David P. Kelly will explain the city's proposal to lease at \$20,000 a year a three-story airport facility to be used by Florida Law Enforcement authorities to train state lawmen in advanced techniques of crime fighting.

William Reed, in previous statements, has indicated his desire to place the academy on a site just outside Tallahassee but the Sanford argument hinges on the economics of obtaining a first class facility at far less than the cost of constructing a new building.

Members of the State Cabinet have toured the airport at various times since the first move to gain the academy was made nearly four months ago and several have expressed interest in having the state secure the facility.

**CONNER IMPRESSED**

Doyle Conner, Agriculture Commissioner, after viewing the structure, stated his desire to have the state acquire the building for some use, even if not for the academy.

At the present time, police training of the type that would be carried on at the airport is being conducted in a rented portion of a state building but Commissioner Reed has continued to push for a Tallahassee location so he can have influence toward the city's request.

**GUNTER ENDORSEMENT**

Just this week a letter from Sen. Bill Gunter to each Cabinet member was made public, in which the legislator pointed out the advantages and savings to be made by the state in obtaining a Sanford academy location.

Senator Gunter stressed to the Cabinet members the savings of an estimated \$50,000 to \$55,000 a year in interest alone to the taxpayers if the local site is chosen, plus the extra time that could make the facility operational a full 90 days before such a facility could be built.

At least two other areas, including Revere and Palm Beach Counties, are expected to have representatives at tomorrow's hearing.

## Three Youths Held On Dope Charges

Sanford police struck a hard blow toward area narcotics during the week-end when three Lake Mary teenagers were arrested on possession of illegal narcotics charges and a quantity of marijuana and mescaline was confiscated.

Jailed in lieu of \$2,000 bond was Susan Lynn Jackson, 18. Two 16-year-old juveniles were placed in detention.

Det. Sgt. William Foster reported the trio was arrested at the Royal Castle restaurant parking lot, located on French Avenue at the 27th Street intersection.

Foster reported seven match boxes of marijuana and mescaline tablets were found in an auto after a long surveillance of the area. Assisting in the investigation were Patrolmen Gary Swain, Jack Petrucci and Foster.

A 62-year-old Longwood bulldozer operator has been arrested on child molestation charges and is being held in the Seminole County jail in lieu of \$5,000 bond.

Wilbourne B. Hall, 524 East Church Avenue, was charged Friday night by Deputy R. G. Wingo, who made the arrest, according to records at the sheriff's office.

## Two Men Are Killed In Traffic Mishaps

A Sanford man was killed when his automobile was struck by a train at Apopka. A Jacksonville man was killed when his car left Interstate 4 at the Deltona interchange, the second fatality in a week and the fourth in a month at that general area.

Linwood Lee, 41, of 311 Tucker Drive, Sanford, was killed Saturday after his car was struck by a Seaboard Coast Line train at the Sheeler Avenue crossing in Apopka.

According to police reports Lee was killed immediately when his car was struck and dragged several hundred feet down the track. The train was reportedly on route to Wild wood when the accident happened.

Jimmy Leon Price, a 23-year-old Jacksonville man, was killed when a car, borrowed from a friend at a Baker County hunting camp, plunged off I-4 at the Deltona exit. The car, according to Florida Highway Patrol Trooper Tommy Tomlinson, fell down a concrete embankment and landed under the interstate.

The man's body was thrown clear of the wreck and found by investigators in a nearby ditch. Price's death is the fourth fatality to occur in the area within the last month and the second within a week.

# Could Cost \$250 Million Reserves, NG Hike Seen

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite severe defense spending cuts, top Pentagon officials are reported moving toward a 10 to 15 per cent boost in funds to modernize the National Guard and reserve units.

As an increase of that magnitude could total a quarter of a billion dollars or more based on this year's \$2.4 billion spending level for the guard and reserve forces.

With the Nixon administration cutting back the regular armed forces at a rapid rate, the nearly one million-man ready reserve of the Army, Air Force, Navy and Marine Corps is to be the country's main line of defense.

The administration's plan to field a relatively small and compact all-volunteer force by mid-1973 is based in large part on a compact ready reserve, which includes the National Guard.

Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird told a citizens group last week that, "in the future, we will give priority to calling the reserves and the National Guard when men are needed" in a crisis.

For this reason, the Pentagon is inclined to be relatively liberal in all spending on the guard and

reserves while cutting deeply in many other areas.

The biggest immediate problem, as senior defense officials see it, is to equip the reserve forces with modern arms, communications gear and other materials. Much of their equipment is now antiquated.

A large portion of the proposed reserve budget increase, it is understood, would buy new equipment rather than relying on hand-me-downs from the regular forces—although the reserve element also will be receiving arms and equipment from regular forces as the Vietnam war winds down.

Part of the reserve budget increase will be devoted to improving training and probably some raise in drill pay.

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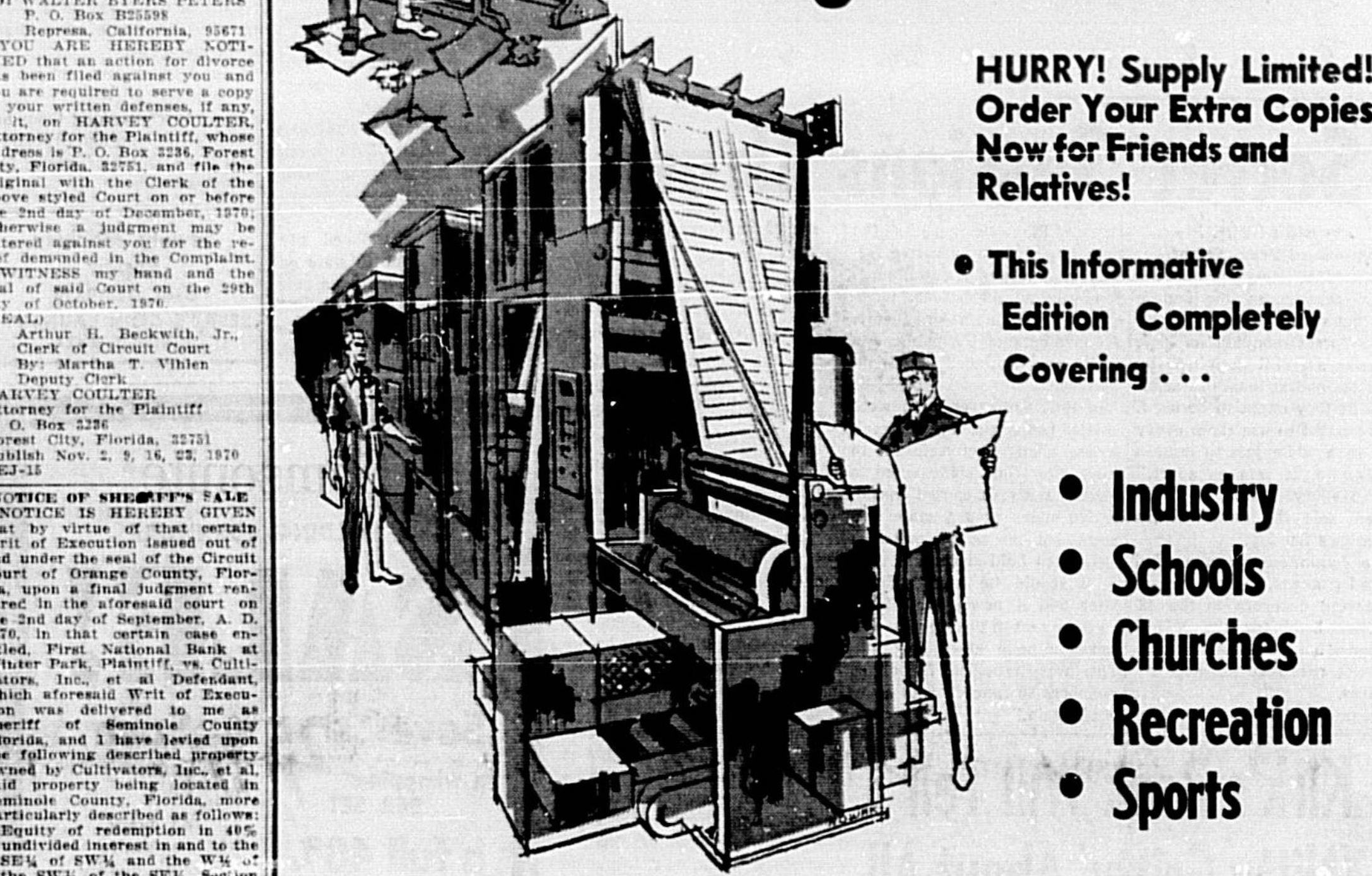

# Chile Recognizes Fidel Castro

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — Chile's new Marxist president has recognized Fidel Castro's Cuban regime, joining Mexico in defying the diplomatic boycott voted by the Organization of American States last year.

President Salvador Allende said in a broadcast Thursday that positive measures taken by the OAS against Communist Cuba did not "serve the interests of peace and friendship."

"The measures regarded the normal development of relations that should exist among the people and governments of Latin America so they can achieve political and economic independence and guarantee their places in the community of nations," he declared.

The U.S. State Department had no comment on Allende's announcement. Diplomatic sources in Washington said the critical question is whether other Latin American governments will follow Allende's lead.

The OAS expelled the Castro regime on Jan. 31, 1962, and called on all its members to sever diplomatic and consular relations with Cuba, because Castro was trying to spread communism and subversion throughout Latin America.

Chile, Bolivia, Mexico and Uruguay abstained on the issue. The OAS against Communist Cuba was trying to spread communism and subversion throughout Latin America.

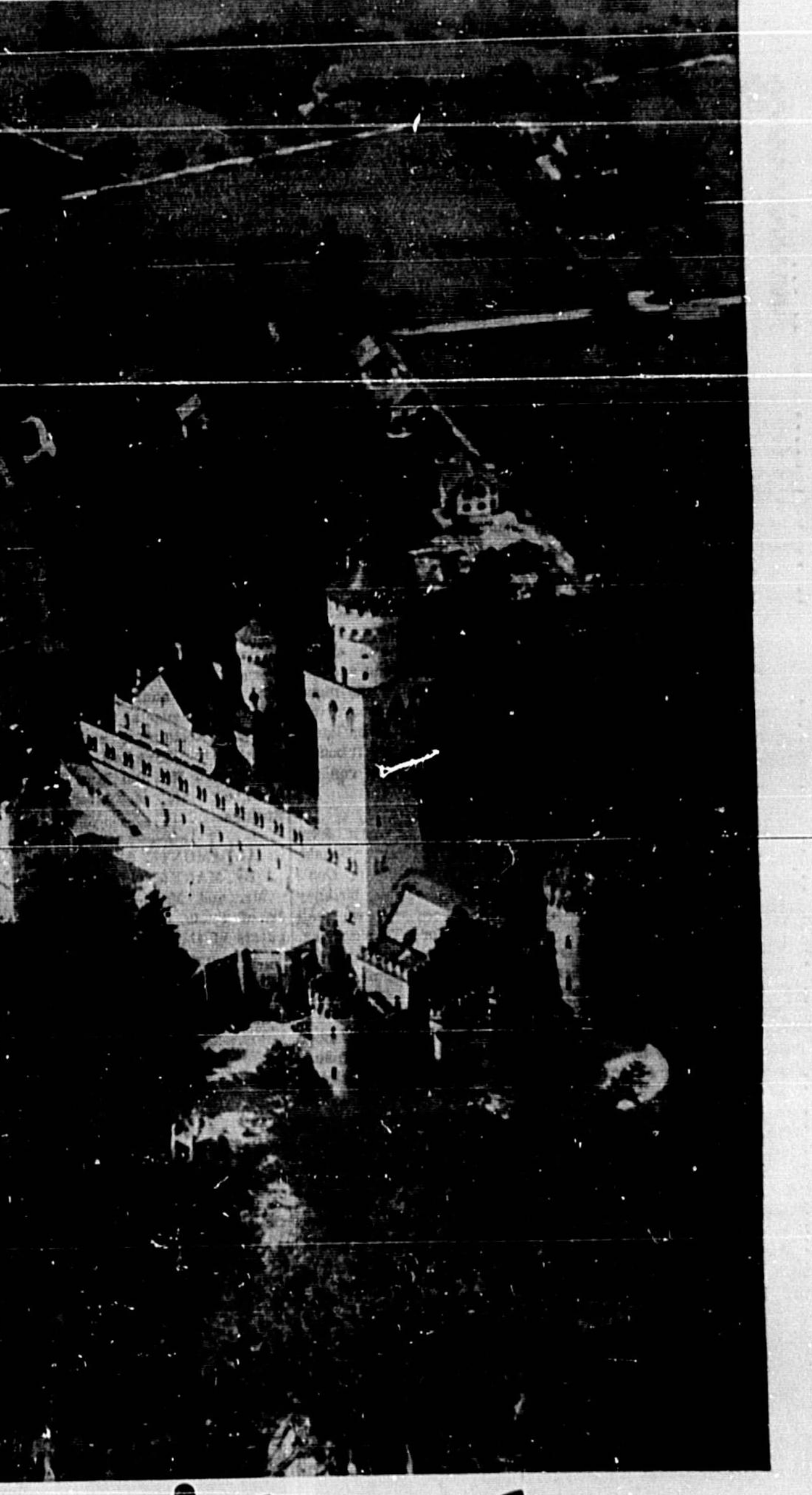

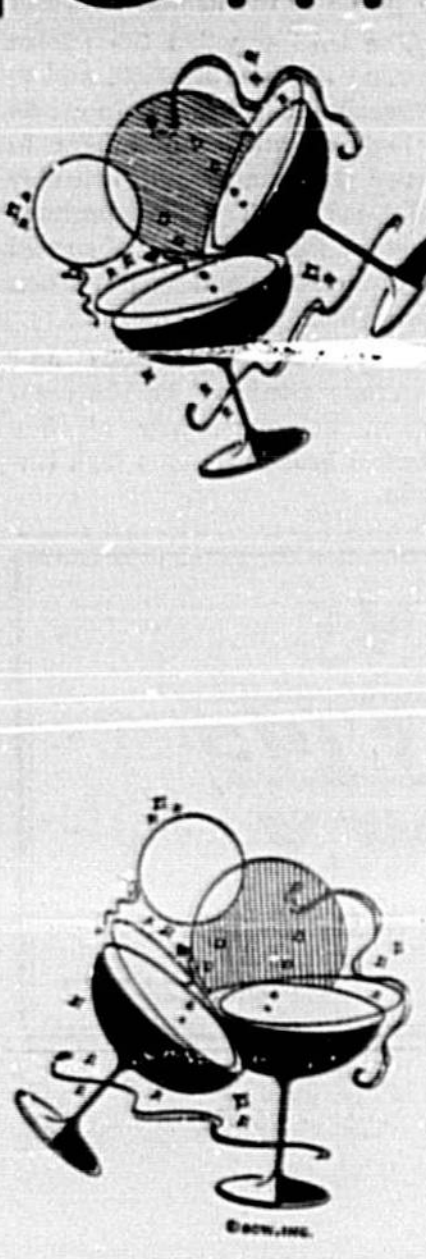

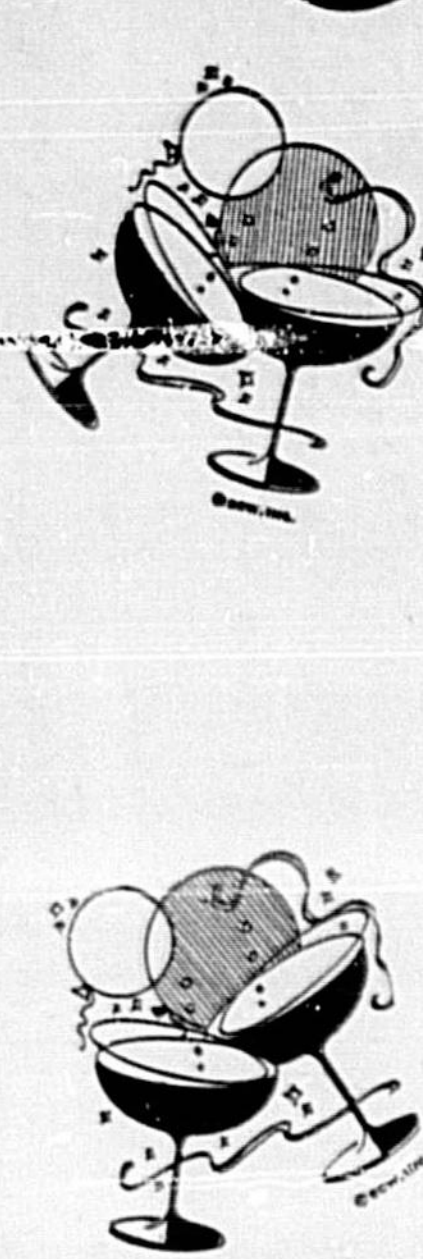

## Worry Clinic

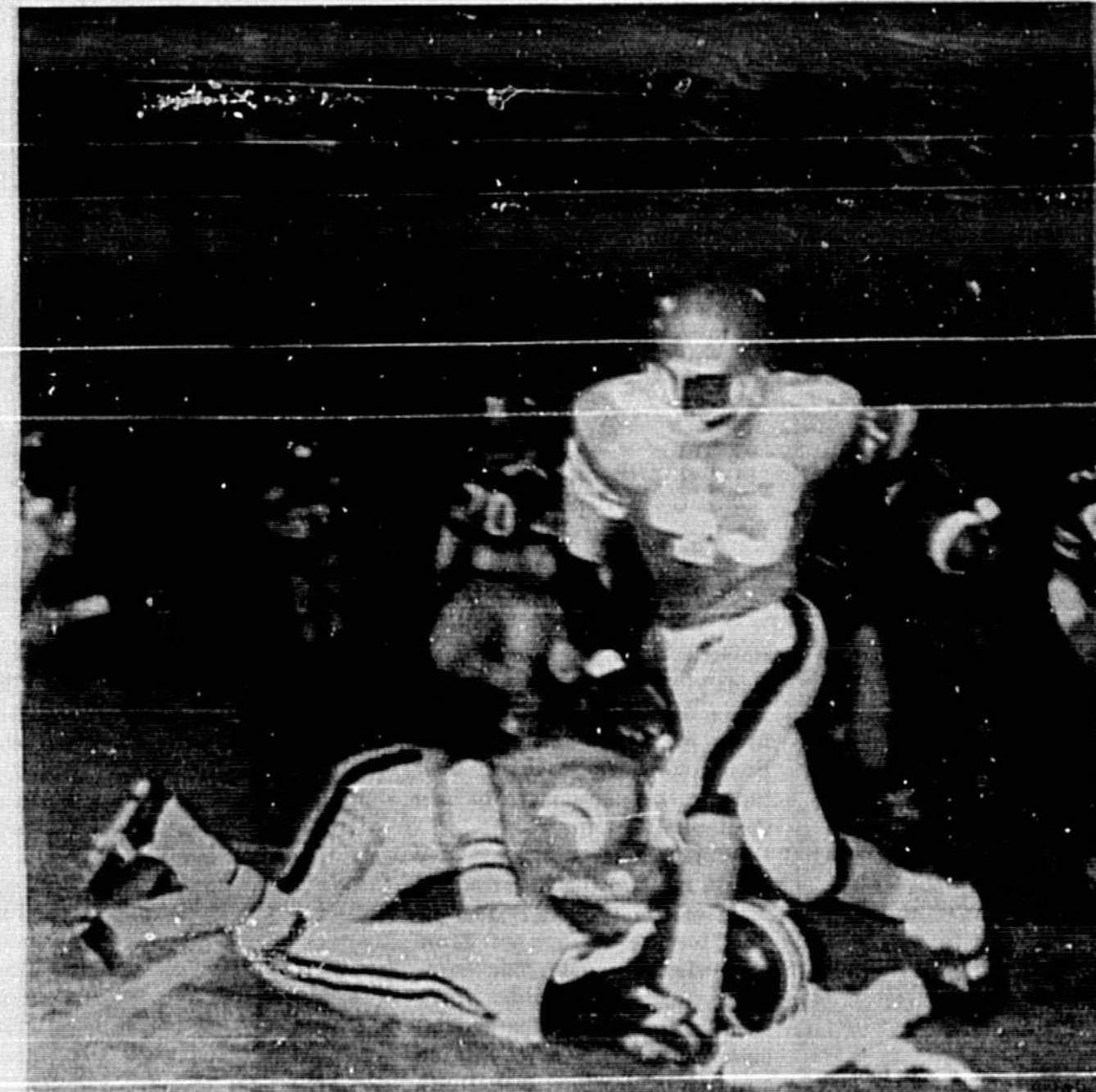

# Olympic Progress

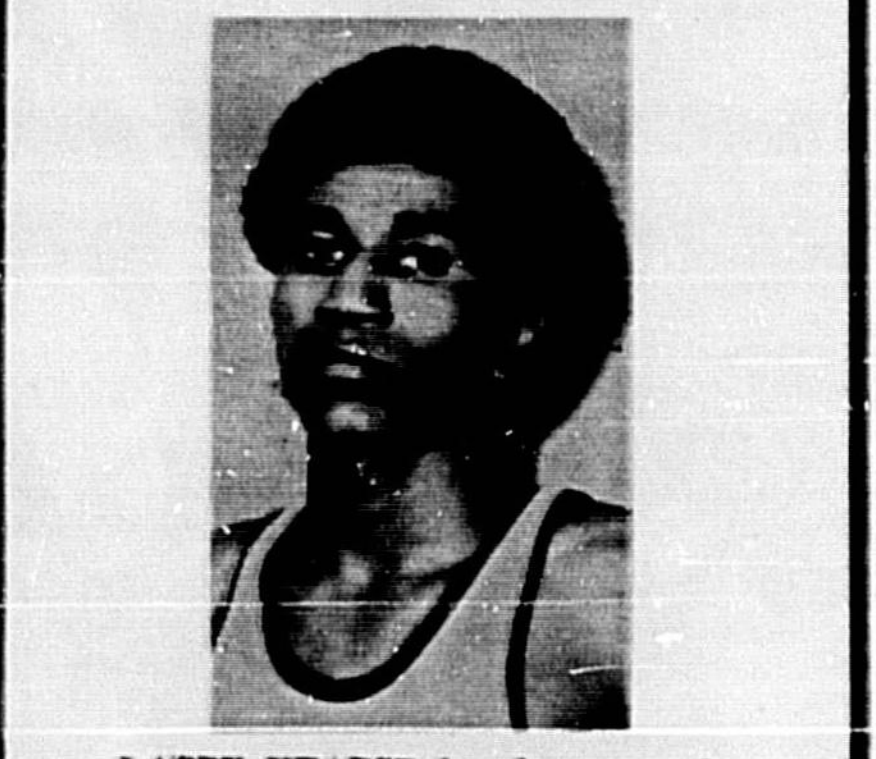
NEW YORK (UPI) — The principal construction work for the 1972 Summer Olympics in Munich, Germany, has been completed, says the German National Tourist Office.

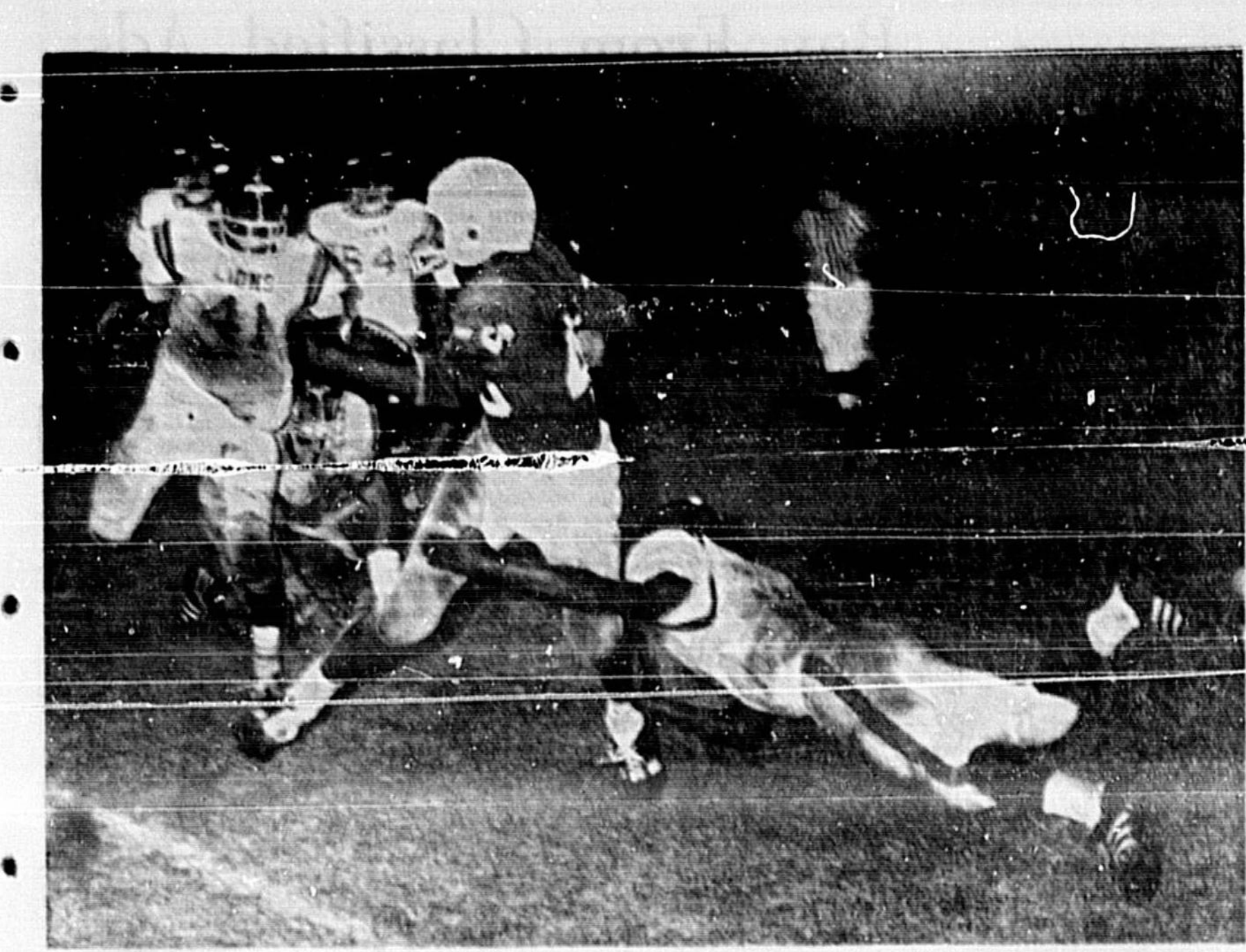

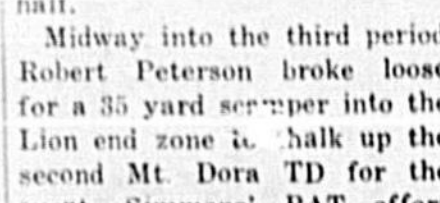
