(Continued From Page One) prepared later for General Marshall on the events of that fateful Sunday when the Japanese struck at Pearl Harbor. He said that two things convinced army leaders on that Sunday that an offensive Japanese move might be in the offing.

One was a section of an intercepted Japanese diplomatic message and the other was an order to the so-called Japanese peace ambassador to hand the message to Secretary of State Hull at 1 P.M.

Said General Miles: "We thought it probable that the Japanese line of action would be into Thailand, but it might be any one or more of a number of areas."

General Miles said that he urged that the Philippines, Hawaii, Panama and the West Coast be informed immediately. The General testified that General Marshall pencilled out a warning message after consultation by telephone with the Chief of Naval Operations, Admiral Harold S. Stark.

The Miles memorandum said that when General Marshall put down the telephone, he said, quote: "The Admiral did not think any further warnings necessary, since all the ferres had already been several times alerted."

Nevertheless, the new warning from General Marshall went out to Army commanders. Previous-

U. S. Navy Takes Steps To Protect Island Frontiers

MANILA, Dec. 4. (AP)—Activity in the Philippines indicates that the United States Navy is taking steps to see that the sea frontiers of those islands are not caught unprepared again.

The big constellation-type plane landed at Orly Field in the French capital this morning to end a 24-hour flight from Washington. A "stop" was made in London.

The Navy says it is getting rid of a great many bases throughout the islands and demobilizing its forces. But the Associated Press writer says Scabee battalions and native laborers are constantly at work extending others. There are miles of Quonset huts, new roads and docks at Subic Bay on Batuan peninsula and the Navy has moved away an entire

native town. Extensive work is going on at Lingayen Gulf and an admiral's residence is going up at the Baque Naval Hospital Reservation, 30 miles to the south-east. On the tail of Samar Island, the largest Navy installation is going up at Gulluan. The Samar site dominates both entrances to the central Philippines from the Pacific—the Surigao and San Bernardino Straits where a decisive sea battle was fought a year ago. This site was visited by Assistant Secretary Artemus Gates last week.

China Makes Plans To Construct Dam On Yangtze River

(By Associated Press)
China Yangtze River may be called China's main artery. Its waters rise and course on a journey of more than three thousand miles from the high plateau land of Tibet down into the East China Sea.

To thousands of Chinese, the Yangtze is the only home they have ever known. There they have lived, spending their entire lives on houseboats and junks, content to eke out a bare existence as fishermen and cargo-haulers.

Travel on the Yangtze has undergone some changes in the past few decades. Navigation through the gorges, where the river becomes a noisy torrent, now is possible by means of special, flat-bottomed steamers. Before their invention, it was necessary to change from ocean-going steamer to a small river vessel. These went 500 miles farther inland, past the lake country and rich agricultural districts to Ichang where steam navigation ceased, and the famous Gorges began. At this point, the traveler was forced to change once more, to the ancient, unwieldy junk.

These were towed by men on the shore end of bamboo hawsers which were sometimes a half mile long. Canals and locks were built to facilitate getting over the rougher parts, but methods were so primitive, boat owners ran the risk of seeing their property fall into whirlpools and smash against the rocks. If the tow-ropes broke, the tow-men often toppled into the river, and the junk went spinning its way toward jagged rocks and shoals.

Engineers long have eyed the Yangtze as a possible source for electricity. Toward this end, China has planned a dam that will cost about \$35,000,000. This tremendous project would harness the Yangtze, making China possessor of the world's largest power plant.

If such a dam is eventually built, electricity may replace oil for the lamps of Central China's population which, within a 300-mile radius of the dam site, is greater than that of the United States.

With such a project, China then will be able to envision itself as a modern nation, able to take its stand with other commercial countries of the world.

Hurley Tells Of Effort To Aid China Reds

Two U.S. Diplomats Sought Lend-Lease Arms To Destroy Chiang Government

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5. (AP)—Major General Patrick Hurley has accused two career diplomats of trying to destroy the government of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek. Hurley told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that George Atcheson, Jr., tried to undermine Chiang by getting Lend-Lease arms for the Chinese Communists.

Hurley said this happened while he left Atcheson in charge of the embassy at Chungking, but that the arms were not given to the Reds and that Atcheson was recalled from China. Atcheson had written the Secretary of State proposing the furnishing of Lend-Lease arms and equipment to the Chinese Communists.

The other diplomat criticized by Hurley was John Stuart Service. Both Service and Atcheson are presently political advisers to General MacArthur. Hurley said that Service in October, 1944 proposed that the Chiang Kai-Shek Government should be allowed to collapse. The former Ambassador to China said he was unable to file Service at the time.

WINDS CAUSE DAMAGE

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 5. (AP)—A storm with winds as high as 80 miles an hour has caused the deaths of at least three persons in the Pacific northwest. The blow brought down trees and blew poles and unroofed buildings in Oregon and Washington. FDR Rejected Plan For Joint Military Move

Wallace Calls For Full Employment Program Without Raiding Treasury

NEW YORK, Dec. 5. (AP)—Messages from President Truman and Commerce Secretary Henry Wallace have been read at the opening of the golden anniversary Congress of American Industry. The Congress was called by the National Association of Manufacturers.

Both officials praised the wartime role of industry. President Truman's letter touched on reconversion labor disputes, but stated the opinion that reconversion problems can be solved orderly and speedily. Secretary Wallace called for a program of full employment, but said it would be impossible to spend our way into good business conditions just by dipping into the Treasury and the Federal Reserve. He said American industry must increase mass purchasing power and raise the standard of living.

He added that obviously the answer isn't simply one of raising wages, costs and prices, leading to a vicious spiral of inflation. Wallace also warned of the dangers of deflation when he said that the earnings of farmers and wage earners would drop lower in the next few years than they were during the war.

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
