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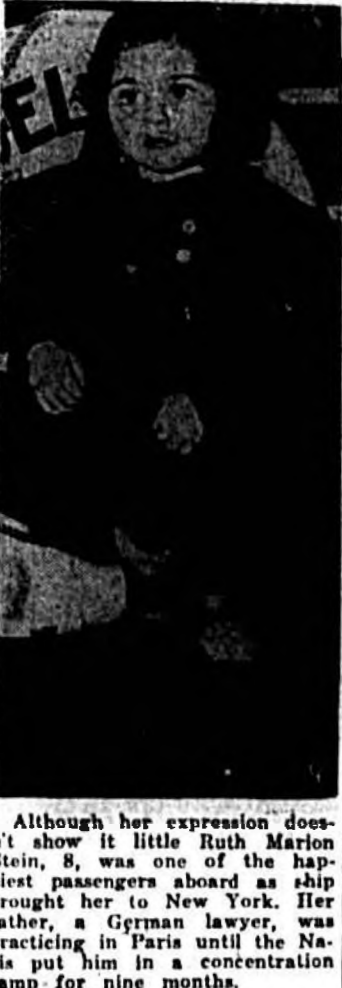

Government Ban On Oil Exports Asked By Ickes

Action Is Taken Because Of Threat To U. S. Supply

WASHINGTON, June 17 — (AP)—A complete ban on oil exports from the east coast of the United States, without prior government approval of individual shipments, was proposed today by Secretary Ickes, defense petroleum coordinator.

The action followed close on the heels of the stoppage of a 240,000 gallon shipment of oil from Philadelphia to Japan because of a threatened oil famine on the eastern seaboard.

The government acted yesterday to guard consumers against any unwarranted increase in bread prices.

Leon Henderson, price administrator, sent a letter to leading bakers asking them not to advance bread prices without consulting his office.

Aides of Interior Secretary Ickes said he had secured agreement of the Sinclair Consolidated and Standard Vacuum Oil Companies to halt loading of the oil aboard the Japanese ship Asuma Maru at Philadelphia.

Ickes stepped in, they said, after the Philadelphia oil consumer, the Wilson Martin division of Wilson & Co., had protested movement of the oil from the east coast at a time when it had no assurance it could get adequate supplies to continue operations.

Defense Unit Is Given Rifles At Regular Meeting

Rifles were issued to members of the Seminole County Defense Force and the men were measured for uniforms at the regular meeting of the unit last night at the Armory, E. C. Harper, captain, said today.

Approximately 50 uniforms were ordered today, and Captain Harper said he expected to receive them soon. Others will be ordered when further measurements are taken.

Three additional enlistments were accepted for the Defense Force last night. The men are William L. Williams, Terry V. Wright and Richard S. Verroy. Applications for enlistment were received from 12 other men, but have not yet been acted upon, Captain Harper stated.

Now that members of the defense unit have their rifles, instruction will be started next week in the fundamental principles of handling firearms with emphasis on safe handling.

Target practice, with sub-caliber rifles, already is under way. The new rifles will be used in drilling.

Captain Harper said that by Monday night, when the Defense Force will hold its next regular meeting, he hoped to have a waiting list prepared of those who wish to join the unit. He added that men interested in signing up should make application early so they can be taken in.

Motorists Must Pay Extra For Car Tags

TALLAHASSEE, June 17 — (AP)—Persons who refuse to pay an additional \$5 for license tags which they bought early this year before a mix-up in tag price scales was discovered are subject to criminal prosecution, Attorney General Watson ruled yesterday.

Several thousand tags for new models of medium-priced cars were sold for \$10 before it was found the models were in the weight range requiring \$15 tags, Henry J. Driggers, motor vehicle commissioner, said today he refused to exchange their plates and asked the attorney general what to do about it.

Senator Explains Bills Affecting City And County

Referendum Will Be Held On 2 Items Applying Locally

WASHINGTON, June 17 — (AP)—Congressman Peterson announced yesterday that \$5,000,000 had been allocated for the local training school of the Army Air Corps at Sebring.

At the same time, the War Department advised Senator Peterson the Sebring allocation was \$4,981,656, which did not include engineering overhead of nearly a million in funds held for an Air Corps in special accounts.

Peterson's figures, however, included the engineering overhead, and he put the total allocation at more than \$1,000,000 over the original estimate of the funds to be spent on the Sebring air school.

First announcement of the Sebring school was made last week at which time the War Department announced the purchase of a 220-acre site five miles south of the city for a secondary air training school.

At that time, the War Department did not announce the funds to be spent on the project, but Peterson said it would total about \$3,400,000.

The Army hopes to have the school in operation by October of November and when completed it will accommodate 1500 of fliers and men and 250 flying cadets. When in full operation, possibly in 1942, probably 2,500 officers, men and cadets will be garrisoned there.

Necessity Of Morale In Army Is Cited By Exalted Ruler

Leo Butler, exalted ruler, announced today that Sanford Elks Lodge is giving the fullest measure of co-operation to the campaign of the United Service Organizations in the effort to raise \$1,000,000 for use in the creation of 339 recreational clubs in the areas of Army camps and military stations.

In discussing the program, Mr. Butler stated that the Elks recognized the importance of maintaining proper morale among the young men now in the service and that recreational clubs would provide wholesome surroundings where they could meet their relatives and friends by letters and enjoy the comforts and conveniences which are essential to them when in the service.

Mr. Butler recently received a letter from James R. Nicks, chairman of the Elks national defense commission, calling on the Elks to help in the campaign to raise \$1,000,000 for the USO. Mr. Butler said that the Elks in this connection by referring to their activity in the past World War in which the Elks raised over one million dollars for financial help to soldiers in France and constructed and presented to the United States government the first convalescent hospital in the country as well as helping 30,000 honorably discharged soldiers to reach their homes at the close of the war.

President Roosevelt's order padlocking all German consulates in the United States and demanding the ouster of various Nazi agents created a tense atmosphere in Berlin.

In Rome, Italy's fire-brand editor Virginia Gayda, who often speaks for Premier Mussolini, asserted Roosevelt's economic and financial strictures against the Axis constituted an open declaration of economic war against the Axis powers which may lead to actual hostilities.

On the North African front, where the British opened a counter-offensive Sunday, the Germans and Italians asserted the situation is developing favorably for the Axis forces.

The British said fighting is continuing with unrelenting fury, with British mechanized units striking at Axis communication lines in north flankish thrusts.

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Florida Had 28,614 Retail Stores In '39

WASHINGTON, June 17 — (AP)—The Census Bureau reported yesterday that there were 28,614 retail stores in Florida during 1939, that their sales amounted to \$614,464,000, that their stocks were worth \$76,748,000 and that they employed 73,190 clerks to whom they paid \$64,244,000 in wages.

The report said independent stores in Florida during 1939 numbered 26,879 and that they did 71.8 percent of the total business. There were 1886 chain stores and they did 21.1 percent of the business. The census report included, house-to-house selling establishments, commission or company stores, farmer and consumer co-operatives and the like.

Private Debt Payment From Italy Blocked

Freezing Of Fascist Credits In U. S. Brings Reprisal; Germany Will Act

Italians Benefit By U. S. Measure

Rome Officials Say Americans Have More Investments

ROME, June 17 — (AP)—The Italian government, freezing American credits in Italy, blocked all payments from Italy on private debts to Americans today in reprisal for the freezing of Italian credits in the United States.

Fascist spokesmen estimated the freezing of Italian assets would be better than two to one in Italy's favor, placing American investments in Italy at \$145,000,000 against Italian investments in the United States at \$65,000,000 in the United States.

Germany announced officials she will take necessary measures to protect investments in the United States action in freezing German funds in America.

Spokesmen also indicated that Germany would retaliate promptly for the closing of both credit lines and the freezing of assets in the United States. An Italian spokesman also indicated that Italy would retaliate for the freezing of Italian assets in the United States.

Italy's action was seen as a sign of a new phase in the economic struggle between the Axis and the Allies.
