Union Pension Funds Are Under Federal Scrutiny

The Federal Pension Administration has made more than \$30 million worth of transactions in the past two years involving giant pension funds. The government officials who approved the arrangements, including one of the largest pension funds ever made by the FPA—since it has become president of a subsidiary of a corporation partly owned by the pension fund.

The transactions, on the other hand, the FPA's San Diego office, came to light during an Associated Press investigation. The FPA in Washington says it does not believe it knew at the time of the transactions that they involved the Transmitters Union's Central States, Southwestern and Southern Areas Pension Fund, the nation's largest labor-management pension fund.

The transactions include: —insuring a \$3.26 million loan at market interest rates for another such corporation.

This Transmitters pension fund, commonly called the Central States Fund, has been the subject of numerous government investigations.

Transmitters president James R. Hoffa was convicted of mail fraud in connection with Federal States fund dealings. A federal grand jury is probing the fund's financing of a massive Los Angeles land development project. A lengthy series of federal court trials in New York concern alleged kickbacks paid to get fund loans.

Total Agreement At DOT Meeting

There was total agreement at Tallahassee yesterday during the meeting between Department of Transportation (DOT) officials and Greater Sanford Area Chamber of Commerce representatives over the vertical and horizontal clearance for a new Osteen Bridge.

This was stated today by Harold Kastner, sub-chairman of the Sanford Chamber's Long Range Planning Committee, who with John Krider, chamber executive director and chairman of the St. Johns Indian River Canal District, met with the transportation department on the bridge replacement.

Kastner said the following agreements were unanimously approved:

The new bridge will be designed with a vertical clearance of 25 feet above high water and horizontal clearance between fenders of 55 to 60 feet.

The structure will be designed so as to enable the road department to convert the facility at a later date to a haque-type bridge to provide for future use in commerce when the St. Johns-Indian River Canal is constructed.

Transportation engineers anticipate that preliminary bridge designs will be completed within 90 to 100 days no a request can be made to the U.S. Coast Guard before the end of 1970 for a permit to start construction on the new facility in the 1971-72 fiscal year.

Kastner further stated that he would present these recommendations to his full chamber committee and to the Seminole and Volusia County Commissioners.
