3 Youths Nabbed Following Theft

 Seminole County Detective George Abby arrested three Lake Mary youths last night and charged them with breaking and entering in connection with the Tuesday burglary of Ralph Schwelckert's Amoco Station in Lake Mary.

Abby said a portion of the \$50 in cash taken from the station had been recovered from two burial places.

The detective said approximately \$35 was found after a bag was unearthed in the back yard of one of the accused, and another cache was discovered under a bush near the Lake Mary post-office.

All three boys, ages 15-16, were placed in the county jail awaiting juvenile authority action.

In a Sanford police report, officers are investigating the vandalism of Goldboro Elementary School Tuesday by a group of youths reportedly observed at the scene by a man who watched them leave by the school roof.

Several windows were broken and the front door smashed by them.

In other reports, approximately \$8 in coins and some cash was taken from Malouise Basting Rink, 182 W. Ocala Ave., when thieves entered a rear door.

A large quantity of tools were removed from Miami Brick and Stone Co., W. State Road 46 when that establishment was also entered.

4,500 Expected Mini-Rock Festival Coming?

 "Kids need to be patriotic and law abiding, and adults need to set the standards of leadership."

The Sanford Herald has established this standard with its crusade to have the public display flags... we tend to run down our young folks, most are good kids... it's the minority who stir things up. Churches and civic organizations should seek ways to entertain the kids."

These were the statements of County Commissioner Robert Parker yesterday when emotions ran rampant in a discussion of impending "rock festivals" at Sandaloo Springs.

Ray Knight, Altamonte Springs, appeared before the board to protest the promoters of a music festival advertising the event before being granted a permit under the county's recently enacted music festival ordinance. Knight said that Seminole would see a situation similar to that at the Winter's '70 rock festival at Bithlo where the promoters were refused a permit and tickets were sold anyway resulting in mass chaos.

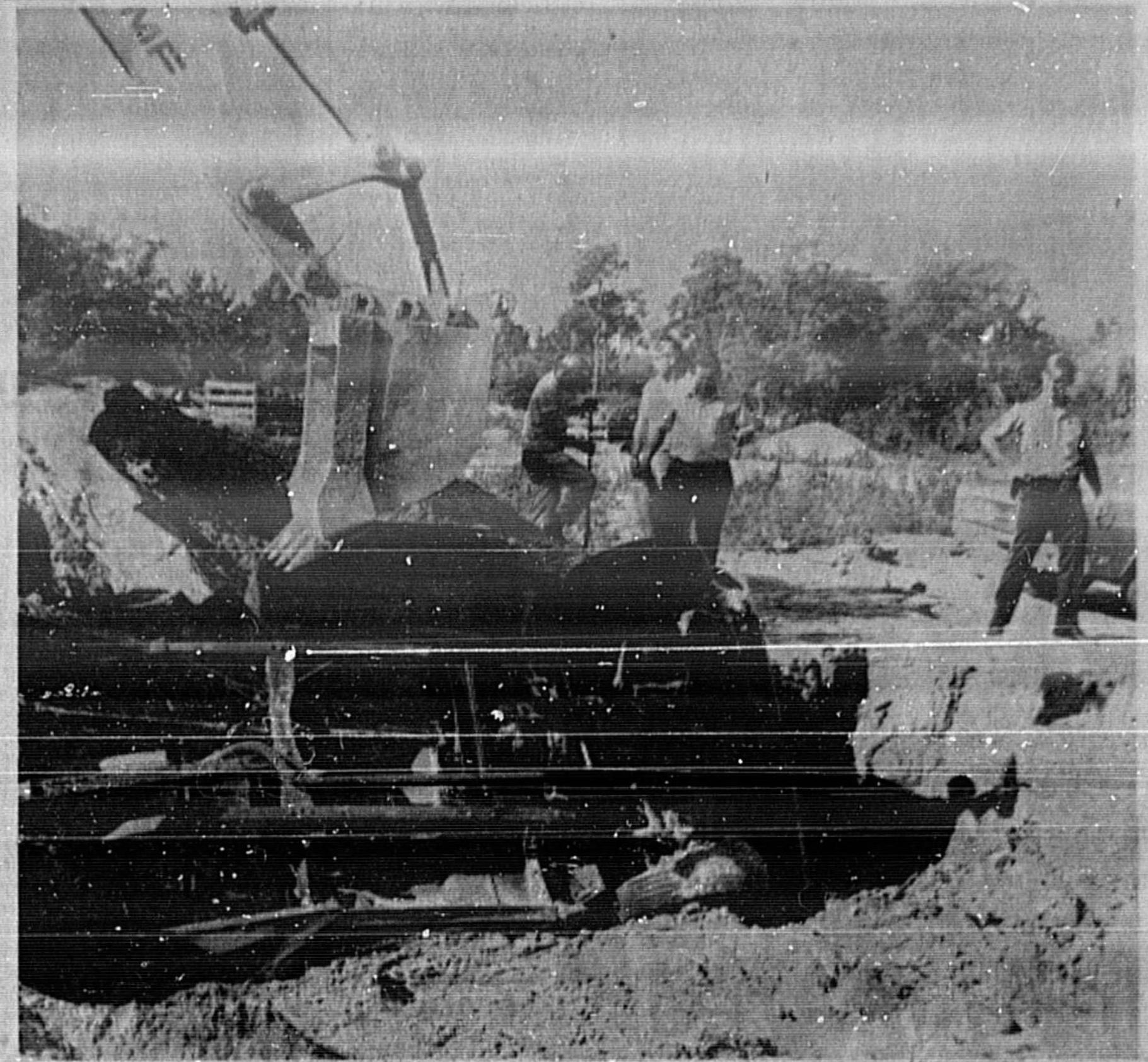
He said that the same persons which the promoters anticipate at Sandaloo would be in a wooded area, difficult to police, and questioned how there could be any guarantee there would be no "pot smoking or sexual excesses."

Commissioner Greg Drummond said that he, too, was disturbed over the radio advertisements of the event that rock bands were advertised and that the promoters were saying something and doing another. He went on to say that the surface had only been touched as to what's going on and suggested that the county look into the background of the individuals involved, one of whom allegedly advocated the legalization of marijuana and "stated on publicly."

Drummond noted that the public should ascertain the background before letting the "assessors go" if they were not going to be more than "fun."

Commission Chairman John Alexander said that it was not legally possible to outlaw rock festivals, but that they were related to items which the court defines relative to the public health, welfare and safety.

County Attorney Harold Johnson was requested to advise the promoters that they are advertising without a permit, and

Drummond Slaps SCA Funding

The proposal was rejected on the grounds that it was in conflict with county programs which were in the process of being implemented.

Of the total grant, approximately \$40,000 will be used in administrative costs, with the remainder, according to Rev. Jones, of six salaried workers receiving \$100 weekly plus 10 per cent fringe benefits and \$1,500 transportation to obtain food.

Commission Chairman John Alexander advised the board that since the funds were to document the need for a program which was already in existence, it was unjustified. Commissioners had approved the Food Stamp program last winter, and it received the approval of the U. S. Department of Agriculture a few months later. Alexander alluded to this by saying, "If the funds are to document the need for a Food Stamp Program, then we (the board) signed a contract for... well, what?"

Alexander also took umbrage at Rev. Jones' statement that the proposal was approved by Dr. Frank Leone as "chief welfare officer." Alexander said that Dr. Leone was, in the first place, not the welfare officer, (the position is held by Mrs. Abby Boyd) and secondly, he did not have the authority to approve any such program.

Drummond injected that the county was already in a position in being able to proceed once the matter of who will fund the program is established. He continued that there will be a program and that to spend money to ascertain the need is "a waste of tax funds." Drummond also felt the "F.O.E.O. will soon employ as other bona fide jobs as we read about in the Reader's Digest."

Sunken Docks Stop Prospect

Sanford Marina's sunken docks have prevented an Orlando marine operator from locating a seaplane sales and service facility on Holiday Isle.

Joe Barrett of Barrett Marine on North Orange Blossom Trail told The Herald he hoped to establish the facility this Summer, but because of the dock condition, there was not enough space in which to locate the aviation anchorage. "I own a plane and have located six other area owners with planes, and they are looking for a suitable place too," Barrett advised.

The marine operator said he already had his boat moored at the Lake Monroe marina, but said because of the sunken docks the Sanford Marina was getting bad publicity.

Barrett informed a house boat rental concession firm was going to approach the city commission concerning a lease of the rear part of the marina and advised he was thinking of working out an arrangement with the concessionaire over space for the aviation base.

"All of this is subject to Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) approval of the site and etc.," Barrett said.

He indicated he had also talked with Monroe Harbor Inc., officials about the proposal, but did not disclose the nature of the discussions.

Monroe Harbor Inc. is the lessee of the property from the city and in the past the city commission has not looked too kindly toward any other group leasing on the lake front which would be in competition with the lessee.

Mayor Lee P. Moore was contacted by The Herald relative to Barrett's request and he indicated the commission had frowned on allowing any other firms to locate in the area, if it violates the protection accorded the marina operators in the lease agreement.

Now For Some Practice Of Good Communications

Recognition of a problem is the first and most important step toward its solution. Communication between and within the governmental bodies which control such affairs for Seminole County has been in such flux that any mounting of a unified drive for the goals which this growing county needs has been stymied.

It is with this premise that we hail the decision of the Seminole-Orange legislative delegation to create the machinery which could bring some order out of this mess.

There is one step which can be taken in Seminole County, however, which has already been accomplished in Orange County—our legislative teams. This is the formation of a responsible and active County Council of Local Government.

But there is a Seminole County Board of Commissioners and it will be for them to now show their recognition of the import of this move by the Seminole-Orange legislative delegation to be more co-operative and more communicative even with those legislators who have been uncommunicative in the past.

Lawyer On Law

Justice Campbell Thornal of the Florida Supreme Court said some things at a swearing-in of new lawyers which we believe are so pertinent to current events and so sound that we will use them from the account in The Florida Bar Journal.

After pointing out that law is the essential ingredient between "anarchy and ordered liberty" Justice Thornal told the lawyers: "In this leaving process you must concede that the right to dissent should remain inviolate but under no circumstance does it imply a right to destroy."

"The right to organize peacefully to accomplish legitimate objectives is an aspect of the democratic process. However, a conspiracy to achieve desirable ends by violent means is not protected by any constitutional guaranty."

"One of the grave tragedies of our times occurs when a peaceful assembly degenerates into an irrational mob. It is the naïveté to suggest that the legal profession has the opportunity—indeed is charged with the responsibility—of preserving our historic legal system for the orderly settlement of disputes."

"Samuel Johnson suggested that 'The law is the last result of human wisdom acting upon human experience for the benefit of the public.' You will find that your participation in the application of the law as thus defined will be a most engaging and challenging responsibility."

"When Marshall announced his landmark decision in Marbury v. Madison he, of course, settled a dispute between a little-known justice of the peace and the great Secretary of State. He did more. He recognized the sanctity of the organic law and the authoritative function of the judiciary as its interpreter."

"He did even more than that. He, in effect, proclaimed that every individual or group of individuals, that every government and every segment of government is subordinate to and controlled by the provisions of the Constitution which, under our system, is supreme."

"I have said this to lead me again to the suggestion that one of your most important functions as exponents of the law is to oppose the excessive or abusive exercise of power whether it is asserted by government, by an unscrupulous majority or by rampart, ruthless, or organized minorities."

"The prevalence of lawyers in government and in positions of community leadership establishes them as a critical group in the increasing assaults on our democratic processes."

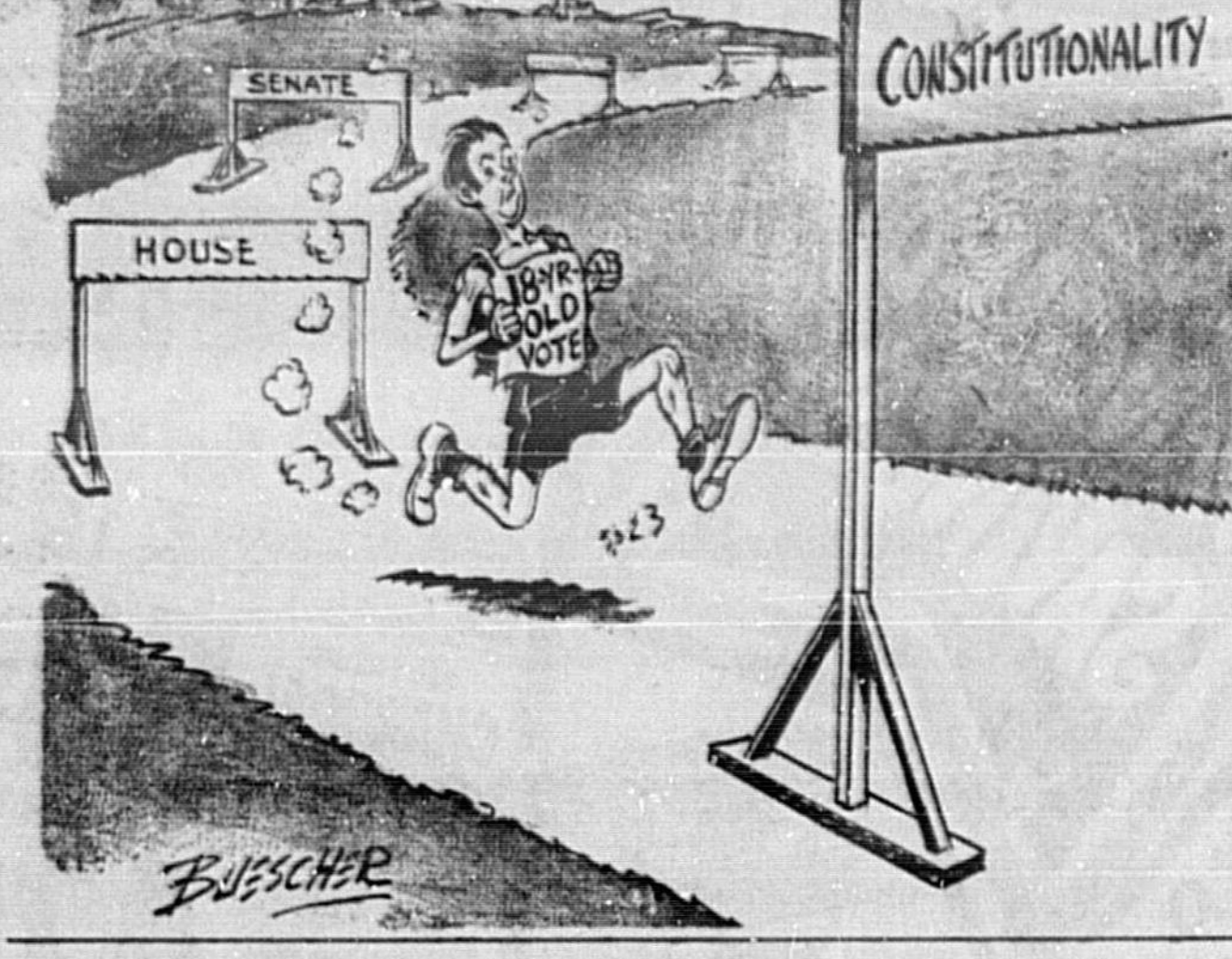

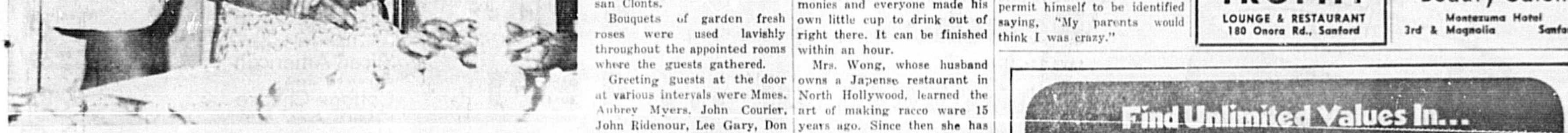

These are so simple to make and easy to keep that one can make them up whenever the urge for an old-fashioned pickle hits.

Chinese Cuisine Lettuce

Some of the most interesting cooked dishes in Chinese cuisine use lettuce. Sometimes the lettuce leaves are used as crisp "wrappers" for cooked combinations of meat and vegetables in a small amount of savory sauce or for fried rice. The lettuce leaves are brought to the table and eaters pile the cooked ingredients into the leaves and wrap the lettuce around the filling. As each portion is wrapped, it is eaten.
Sometimes coarsely shredded lettuce is added to cooked ingredients; sometimes the ingredients are served on a bed of shredded lettuce. And sometimes both additions are used in one dish.
Today we're offering you just such a Chinese dish featuring iceberg lettuce. For the dish shrimp, pineapple, green pepper, mushrooms and shredded lettuce go into a slightly sweet-and-sour sauce; then the whole thing is served on a bed of the crisp lettuce. A pleasant combination.

As a preface to the Pineapple Shrimp you might serve wonton soup. As an accompaniment to the dish itself, fried rice. And as dessert, almond cookies.
"PINEAPPLE SHRIMP"
1 head iceberg lettuce
1/4 of a large green pepper, cut in small squares
1 can (1 1/2 oz) pineapple chunks in heavy syrup
1 can (2 oz) button mushrooms
3/4 tablespoons cornstarch
2 tablespoons salad (not olive) oil
2 tablespoons catchup
2 teaspoons cider vinegar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon Japanese-type soy sauce
1/4 cup cold water
1/2 pound medium-size shrimp (cooked, shelled and deveined)
Core, rinse and thoroughly drain lettuce. Cut off 1 cup small pieces of thick-cut lettuce near core area; set aside. Cut remaining lettuce head in half lengthwise; with a long sharp knife, finely shred enough lettuce across heart to make 2 cups. Spread shredded lettuce over the bottom of a small serving platter.
Drain pineapple and mushrooms, mixing and saving liquid.
In a 1 1/2 quart saucepan stir together until smooth the cornstarch, salad oil, catchup, vinegar, salt, and soy sauce; gradually stir in saved pineapple-mushroom liquid and water. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until thickened and boiling. Add thick-cut lettuce, green pepper, pineapple chunks, mushrooms and shrimp. Heat through, stirring gently. Sprinkle shredded lettuce on platter. Serve at once.
Makes 2 to 4 servings.
Note: Instead of the cooked plain shrimp, you may use a 6-ounce package of frozen breaded shrimp, thawed. Cook the shrimp as the package directs for pan-frying and keep warm until you are ready to mix it into the sauce along with the other ingredients.

CHIOPPINA
Use a very large, heavy pot with a cover. Place on the fire and add 1/2 cup Olive oil. Add the following ingredients:
1 No. 2 1/2 can of tomatoes
1/4 cup sherry dry wine
1/4 teaspoon sweet basil
2 8-ounce cans tomato sauce - paste
1 1/2 cups water
3 Tablespoons minced parsley
1/4 Teaspoon salt-pepper
Cook over low heat, stirring constantly for a few minutes. Add the following:
1 1/2 pounds Rockfish, cleaned and filleted
1 pound raw shrimp, in shell
1 dozen clams, scrubbed, unopened
1 pound flatfish
6 lobster tails - in shell
Cover pot and cook over low heat for one hour without disturbance. Serve each person a portion of each type of fish and ladle the rich colorful sauce over all. Serve with a crisp, green salad and hard rolls with sweet butter.
Most of this meal is eaten with a fork and assistance from the fingers so don't use the best tablecloth. Do give your guests libb and a bowl of water sprinkled with lemon juice - in which to cleanse soiled fingers.

Orange Raisin Bread

ORANGE-RAISIN BREAD
4 1/2 to 5 1/2 cups unbleached flour
1/4 cup sugar
1 1/4 teaspoons salt
2 packages active dry yeast
1 cup milk
1-3/4 cup water
2 large eggs, at room temperature
2 cups golden raisins
grated (medium-fine) rind of 2 medium oranges (1/4 cup)
In a large bowl thoroughly stir together 1/2 cups flour, sugar, salt and undissolved yeast. In a small saucepan stir together milk, water and butter; heat over low heat until liquids are warm - butter does not need to melt. Gradually add to flour mixture and beat 3 minutes at medium speed of electric mixer, scraping bowl a few times. Add eggs and 1 cup flour at enough flour to make a thick batter. Stir in raisins and orange rind. Beat at high speed for 2 minutes, scraping bowl a few times. Then, turn enough additional flour to make a soft dough. Turn out onto lightly floured surface; knead until smooth and elastic - 8 to 10 minutes. Place in greased bowl; turn to grease top. Cover; let rise in warm draft-free place until dough has doubled - 1 1/2 hours. Punch down dough; turn out onto lightly floured surface; divide in half; shape into loaves. Place in 2 greased 8 1/2 by 4 1/2 by 2 1/2 inch loaf pans. Cover; let rise as previously until doubled - about 1 hour and 15 minutes. Bake in preheated 350-degree oven on rack below center until done - about 40 minutes. Turn out of pans onto wire rack; turn right side up; cool completely. Makes 2 loaves.

Sanford's Marina Termed A 'Dump'

 The sunken Sanford Marina docks received attention at this morning's Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce executive committee meeting when C. Vernon Mize, member, moved to suggest that the three groups involved with the city-owned facilities sit down together and discuss the situation with the Chamber Banker's Committee.

The topic was brought before the committee by George Touhy, chamber president, who advised the problem was a three-corner hassle between the marina lessee, city commission and the dock manufacturers.

He said the dock manufacturers claim the Lake Monroe facility docks, which has been leased to Monroe Harbours Inc., to operate, had not been given proper maintenance and there is a disagreement between the city and the lessee over who is responsible for the dock sinking in the west marina.

Touhy stated the chamber should serve as a catalyst in getting all sides together to discuss the situation.

John Mercer, member, advised he had been contacted by two firms interested in purchasing the facilities, so a first class operation could be instituted, but after an investigation of the dock situation, these firms had withdrawn from the proceedings.

Garnett White, member, agreed with Touhy and said the docks are half-filled with water and the whole operation was half-way gone.

Ten days ago at a city commission meeting, Monroe Harbours Inc. was asked to live up to their dock contract agreement with the city.

Chamber Instigates Census Hunt

Sanford's declining population, according to the 1970 U.S. government census, is going to be checked for accuracy.

This was decided at this morning's meeting of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce executive committee, when the head count figures showing a 1,218 drop in the city's population in the past ten years was brought up for discussion.

Chamber President George Touhy, disputing the 1970 figure compiled in April as compared with 1955 census figures taken at the time of the city's incorporation in 1960, asked "should we as a body try to get a more accurate figure?"

The answer was "yes" judging from the motion of John Mercer, member, which was unanimously approved. Mercer moved to have the chamber undertake an effort to implement means of getting a true population figure.

Presumably, the chamber will be seeking the help of state groups such as the Jaycees, Boy Scouts and others to conduct the actual survey taking in a door-to-door census.

John Krider, chamber manager, advised he would be filing before the census was officially certified.

Krider also said a newspaper being asked "Were you counted?" could be run in the local press and these could be cut out and returned to the census office in Sanford.

The manager stated that persons in the military service and those in college were county residents but were not counted here and this could mean a drop of several hundred persons.

He also advised that since the Navy left the area, the average family population decreased from 3 1/2 to 2 3/4 persons. "That, I don't believe you have lost population," he continued. Krider applied the group business trade commission figures compiled in 1960 and 1969, which showed a large increase in all areas.

Pollution Rearing Again In County

 Pollution has again reared its ugly head in the county with the allegation by a resident of the Lake Destiny area, Mrs. Ball, that the state Water and Air Pollution Control Agency has asked for an immediate reply in order that the matter may be pursued by the commission some time ago to see and much the lake area in which considerable dredging had been done to make a beach. Commissioner Greg Drummond advised that the erosion of the area was continuing, and that no recommendations were forthcoming from the state.

County Engineer William Bush was asked to write to the firm requesting an immediate reply in order that the matter may be pursued by the commission at a meeting on July 7. If there is no compliance on the part of the firm, the county will pursue the matter "more formally." Drummond also recommended that the state Water and Air Pollution Control Agency be notified that conditions are worsening and requests information and suggest for corrective action.

Commissioners accepted the low bid of Senco Corporation, Winston-Salem, N. C., for refuse transfer and disposal equipment to be used in the central sanitary landfill program. The lease purchase will include dump trucks, refuse packers, container packers and open top containers in the amount of \$187,995.54. Initial payment of \$25,000 was authorized with equal payments of the balance over a three year period.

Discussion was held upon the possible use by the municipalities of North Orlando and Longwood of the county dog pound. The pound is located on the county property on Hwy. 17-92, and is used in the county's rabies control program.

The county has considered the use by the two cities, based upon paper insurance and a charge of \$1.50 - \$2 per animal per day, on a space available basis. The cities will also be requested to sign an agreement authorizing disposal of a stipulated holding period at a cost of \$45.

Drummond queried about the county facilities following a complaint from a citizen to the Sanford Herald that the city of Sanford dog pound afforded little room for the animals. Drummond was advised by County Sanitarian, Val Robbins, that the county had good facilities and the animals were in comfortable and humane conditions.

Chairman, John Alexander, said that he had spoken with representatives of various municipalities concerning the pound, and that Altamonte had indicated that the county's costs were higher than the current one within the municipality. Alexander stressed that the individuals in the municipalities with whom he spoke expressed that they could not speak for the municipalities.

The approving of a budget request and a request to change the name of Onora Road to Airport Boulevard highlighted this morning's Sanford Industrial Commission (SIC) meeting.

With some minor changes, the industrial promotion group approved submission to the city commission a 1970-71 budget request of \$47,400, a 2.1 per cent increase over the 1969-70 budget, which ends September 30.

David F. Kelley, SIC director, passed out a preliminary budget request to industrial board members and explained that he had included a "slush fund" amounting to \$1,500 to be used by the SIC to provide food, lodging and transportation for industrial prospects while they are in Sanford.

Outside of the \$15,000 annual salary for the director, the main budget cost item was \$16,500 for advertising in such media as Wall Street Journal, New York Times, newspapers and various industrial magazine publications.

North Orlando Village Hall will remain open both 7:45 and Monday.

SIC Budget Is Pondered

Thomas McDonald, SIC member, advised that city commission was studying a six per cent increase for other city employees.

SIC, in another action, approved a motion by John Mercer, member, to ask city and county commissions to change Onora Road name to Airport Boulevard for the portion which winds from the Sanford Airport gate to SR 46 west.

The artery crosses US 17-92 and it is also felt that the state will have to be consulted in some manner regarding the change. Mercer's motion came after Kelley asked if there were some way, direction signs could be placed directing people to the airport.

Other items: business, the SIC approved leases of airport property to Cesco, Inc., of Houston, Texas, a cleaner of air-space materials used at Cape Kennedy, and employer of 12-15 persons.

Allied Boat Company's lease on an airport structure was renewed for another year at total \$1,272 a year.

Mobile Regulation Questioned

The continued hearings upon the adoption of regulations governing RM-1 single family mobile home residential districts again saw Hal La Bohn, Executive Director of Florida Mobile Homes Association, opposing some aspects of the county's regulations.

La Bohn told county commissioners that the primary concern of his industry is "people" and that this county is an island in regard to mobile homes, with only five mobile home park districts in the area which the association "could be proud of."

La Bohn indicated that if Seminole County wishes to be successful in inducing industry, it will be mandatory that the county provide for housing in the low and middle income class. La Bohn noted to the commission that the regulations provide more space under the RM-1 category at 3,000 square feet for the building site than it imposes for standard homes at 7,500 square feet.

He went on to say that the industry considered seven units per acre as ideal and that they were welcoming regulations. The director also took issue with stipulation of a 58-foot road width, with 24 inches of paved surface, with curb and gutter. La Bohn maintained that a 30 foot road would be sufficient with a 22 foot paved surface.
